800 BUSHELS GOOD SEED FROM THE TUESA FA

MONDAY LUNCHEON OF CHAMBER OF COMMERCE GETS RIGHT DOWN TO BRASS TACKS. MONEY ADVANCED BY BANKS.

THE TIME FOR REAL ACTION IS NOW

Thousands of Fertile Acres Lying Idle Over This Territory That Will Take Care of All Cattle, Hogs, Grain Crops And Cotton For Many Years. Work Together.

the Chamber of Commerce for cotton acreage in the Hereford trade territory in 1923. In fact the cotton committee consists of Geo. L. Muse, president of the First National Bank, chairman; G. A. F. Parker, president of the Western National Bank, and Albert Herbst, Vice President of the First State Bank &

At the weekly luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce Monday these three gentlemen agreed to advance the necessary money with which to purchase good seed, adapted to this territory. And the Secretary was instructed to purchase 300 bushels of selected Acala cotton seed from the farmers of Swisher County through the Tulia Chamber of Commerce. Before three o'clock Monday aftermoon the order had been placed and the contract closed. The seed will be shipped by freight in the near future, as soon as the Tulia people can secure the right kind of seed and get it over here. When it arrives it will be stored in a warehouse and issued to purchasers as required by the firm of Jones & McLean. warehouse and issued to purchasers as required by the firm of Jones & McLean, who will give this service free for their community. The Tulia Secretary, upon receipt of the order, exclaimed that "Hereford certainly has public spirited bankers to get behind a movement like this in times like this."

The committee selected the Tulia Acala seed after going over the merits of other offerings for the reason that the information obtained from Tulia, Floydada and other Panhandle points apparently agreed that this seed was the best for all around purposes in this climate. It was purchased at Tulia because that was the nearest point to Hereford where acclimated seed could be purchased in quantity and where good service was assured.

Upon receipt of the seed a selling campaign is to be put on and farmers who pledge acreage and others who will do so will be urged to take the seed home and have it ready for spring planting. There are several cotton planters who will have some native seed to sell, but not enough to go around, and the comscient acreage to attract a good gin it was necessary to supply the seed.

The matter was discussed frankly and freely Monday. It is realized by the committee that there is an element here who oppose the idea of raising cotton on the Plains. They also realize that there is another large element indifferent to the entire matter. But there is no question in the minds of these bankers, or in the mind of any thinking man, that now is the accepted time for constructive action in this territory to hold our people now here and to bring in badly needed immigrants. The proponents of the cotton County Teachers acreage believe that there are plenty of broad acres in this country, now idle and unproductive, to take care of all the cattle, and all the feed crops, and all the hogs, and all the cotton that will be raised in this section for years to come. There are literally thousands of acres of fertile soil lying in the state in which God created them, ready for the plow. If there is any sane reason this country needs is people-and then some more people. The committee beand may possibly help wonderfully in securing more people, on the Plains. And that now is not the time to hesidetailed objections that will be raised to the introduction of any new thing CAPTAIN ESTES IS into this country.

So the die is cast and the campaign is on. The committee does not wish any man to pledge more than he can safely attend to in 1923, and make a good job of it. Plots of 25 acres or less will be welcomed.

Try out a few acres next year. Don't go in deep enough to hurt if the year hould be unfavorable. That's the proram of the committee. Help the cause long by listing your acreage with the ecretary, telephone 30, or with any one of the three banks. Do it Now!
