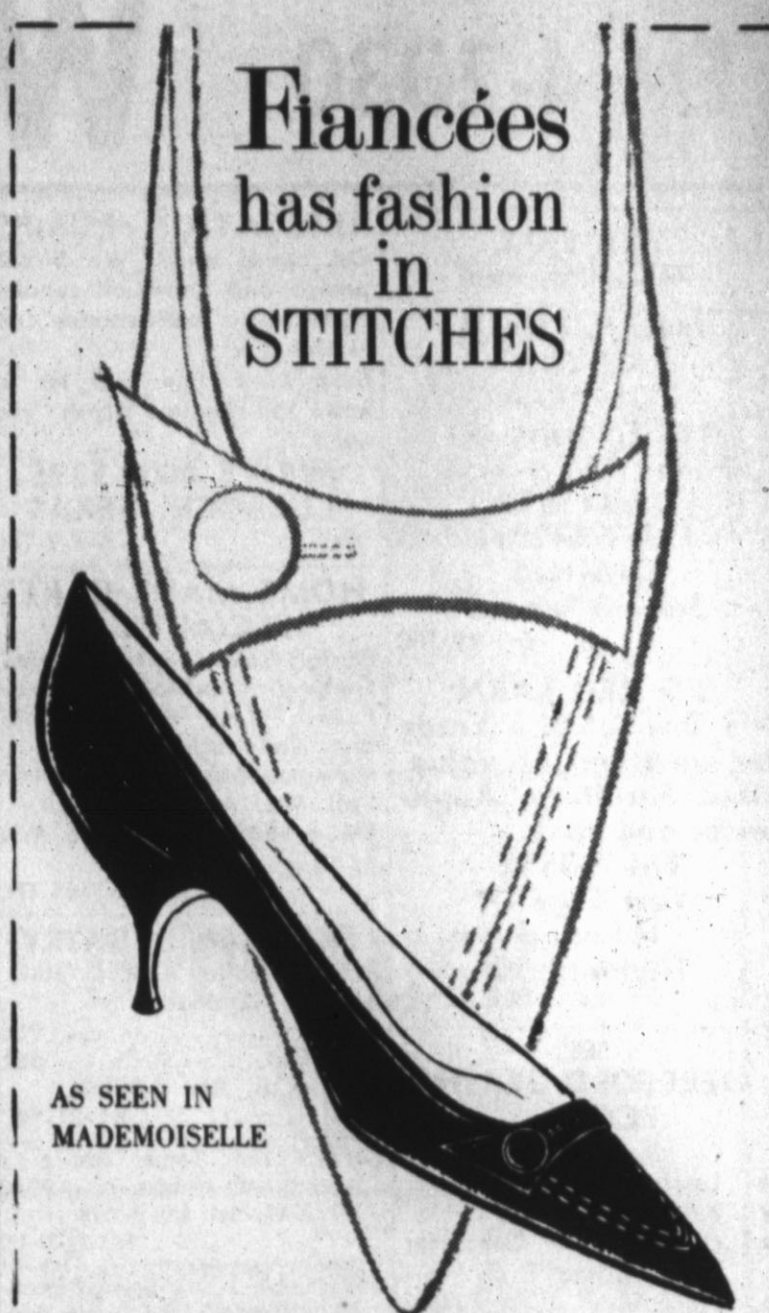

From what I have been hearing, the possibility seems excellent for another one of those super - duper governor races in Texas, come 1962. Secretary Connally, for instance, is gaining much comment these days as a probable candidate, backed and boosted by Lyndon Johnson. Ralph Yarborough also appears to be putting out some feelers concerning his chances, should he resign his senate post and make the race. Price Daniel, meanwhile, makes no bones about wanting to run for another term, but will likely be governed by decisions of Connally and Yarborough, especially Connally. There is also some remote speculation that, should Daniel decide to run, Allan Shivers might toss his hat in the ring. Marshall Formby says he will announce for the post after Jan. 1, 1962, and there will likely be several others, possibly including Will Wilson, who has long had his eye on the spot.

The Republicans, in my opinion, have very little chance with Mr. Cox. The GOP is stronger in Texas than ever before, but they must have a real strong candidate to get a look in, and I figure that most of the Cox vote in the last race was cast "against Daniel," rather than "for Cox." Deaf Smith County in particular is becoming far more interested in the man than in the party, and the feeling seems to be spreading over the entire state.

Recently, I was no little surprised to learn that Hereford now boasts some 15 or 16 prayer groups. Mostly, they are non-denominational, and are small groups, ranging from 10 to 20 people who gather at some home or at some meeting place for an hour of meditation and prayer. 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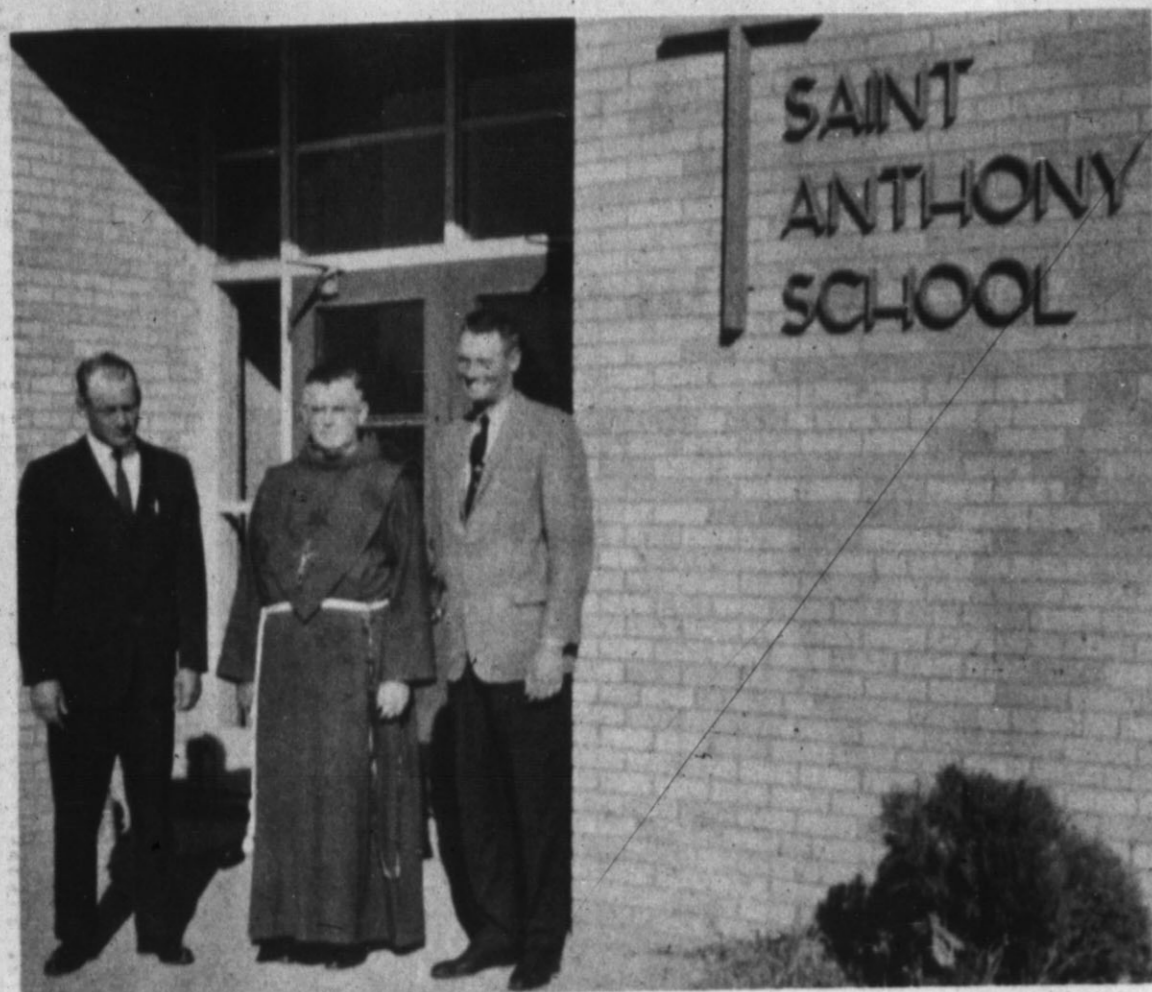

in the egg, much like a ship's hatch and pop out leaving the shell almost intact, with the tiny hatch on its tip.

If an orphan chick is found the mother quail will take it in to her brood and care for it faithfully and so one will find chicks of all ages in one family or brood of quail.

The dangers to the birds when very young include cats, foxes, hawks, skunks, gila monsters, coyotes and the chapparral or road runner. The mother quail will flutter away from her in the egg, much like a ship's brood making little cries of pain to attract the marauder away from her precious family.

The quail is a rover and the covey or family never spends the night in the game place. They are very susceptible to disease, and perhaps this is one of nature's ways of giving them a clean bed at night.

Studies have shown that there are 150 males to 100 females and the unmated males continue the haunting mating call throughout the summer, unless they find a woad that needs help with the children. One of these unattached males gave out 1430 calls in one day. Breeders have captured these males and put them with artificially hatched chicks and they eagerly took over the job of fostering the young. Sometimes if one of the males were given an expectant mother he would refuse to

accept her and continue his calling, showing his dislike for the female chosen for him.

When bobwhites go to roost they form a circle with faces out and tails to the inner part of the circle. In rocks and underbrush they blend into their surroundings until it is difficult to see them unless one looks for the distinct pattern of the feathers. With tiny ears around the circle it is very

hard for their enemies to slip up to snatch one for a meal. Quails are fascinating birds and the bobwhite the most fascinating of all. It is great fun to go out and sit quietly and watch them in their court n g dance and observe the waiting male, waiting to snitch his chance to court without hunting choice food to tempt his favorite from another, more ambitious male.
