

#### **NEWSPAPER EDITOR IN RACE** FOR CONGRESSMAN-AT-LARGE

TO THE VOTERS OF TEXAS: I herewith announce my candidacy for Congressman-at-Large. In making this announcement I submit for your consideration the principles upon which I seek your suffrage. Being a native Texan, born and reared on a farm, and with my many years of newspaper experience and close contact with the people of all walks of life, I believe that I thoroughly understand the needs of the people of this state and that I can render efficient service in the National law-making body if I am chosen as one of the ody, if I am chosen as one of the three Congressmen-at-Large. If you agree with me on the main principles of my platform I shall highly value your vote and support.

1. I favor liberalization of our banking laws so as to maintain a sufficient volume of currency at all times to care for the needs of the country. The Federal Reserve Board should be charged with keeping in circulation at all times not less than \$50.00 per capita and to increase this amount with the need of the banks to accommodate the large of the na-

2. I favor extension of power of the Federal Land Banks with a short of a crime against our counview of aiding home ownership and try. to protect the borrower so long as the value of the land given as se-curity is maintained and the soil and buildings are properly cared for. In all Federal Land Bank foreclosures I favor giving the borrow-er two years in which to redeem his property at the mortgage prize

a view of restoring prosperity. The Government owes the ex-service men approximately \$2,250,000,000.00 for services rendered during the recent war. This is a just obligation of the Government and should be paid in cash. The man who shouldered a gun and went overseas to fight for American freedom while others remained at home, many of whom made large fortunes while the soldier fought for a dollar a day, should not be forced to borrow any portion of his adjusted compensation and to pay forced to borrow any portion of his adjusted compensation and to pay interest thereon. I favor issuing treasury notes (currency) sufficient to pay every ex-service man in full. This will add approximatein full. This will add approximately \$18.00 per capita to the money in circulation, bringing the total up to approximately \$58.00 per capita, or about what it was immediately after the war when the country was at the peak of its prosperity. By thus increasing the medium of exchange, the demand for merchandise will start the factories to working, furnishing employment to working, furnishing employment to idle workers, prices of farm products will rise, and business generally will be normal again. And the Government will have dissharged its just obligation to the

4. I favor a higher income and inheritance tax in the higher brackets with a view of breaking up the immense fortunes and decentralization of the country's wealth which is now in the hands of the few.

5. I favor modification of the Volstead Law. I am opposed to the return of the old saloon with its many evils, but I am convinced that prohibition under the present law is not enforcible and has contributed more toward corruption in government and degeneration of the morals of the country than any one morals of the country than any one thing. I believe the law should be modified so as to enlist the support of the majority of the people and make enforcement possible.

6. I favor consolidation of the useful bureaus and commissions and the abolishment of all those which have been created to give employment to the "lame ducks." This should be done in interest of efficiency and economy.

7. I favor development of our ports and of our navigable streams with a view of aiding industry and commerce, through lower freight

8. I favor legislation promoting co-operative marketing of farm products. Agriculture is the basic industry of our nation and must be rehabilitated and maintained on high plane in accordance with the American standard of living. Those who feed and clothe the world must be protected to the extent that they may enjoy every comfort others have, and that they be made secure against the ruthless exploitation of the gamblers and market manipulators who levy a tremendous toll upon everything the farmer produces

9. I favor voluntary arbitration of labor disputes, by representatives chosen by each side of the controversy. I am unalterably op-posed to granting injunctions in controversies arising between em-

marketing or producing of the nation's crops, or financing of the nation's commerce and industry.

To maintain our livery to protect our nationals and our commerce and to properly prosecute any war of defense into which the nothing.

11. I am against cancellation or country by the foreign powers.
There is a growing sentiment in
Europe and in this country that we
should reduce the amount of these
war debts, or cancel them altogether. I shall never vote for any lus interest and costs.

3. I favor immediate cash payfor no spoils of war and received ments of the adjusted compensation to veterans of the World War with a view of restoring prosperity. for our own part in the war, but for

A copy of the American Chamber of Commerce Journal, a Phillipine publication with offices at Manilla, which came to this desk contains a refreshing article quite out of line with the news we hear so often these days. The article is by J. R. #### ON TEXAS FARMS

There were 5 containers of food canned per inhabitant in San Augustine county in 1930, and 39 in 1931. Perhaps this is a greater ratio of increase than in the State as a whole, but it bears out the belief that Texans have gone a long way toward "selling the home market first."

F. G. Rodgers of Spur is making American cheese as coached by the Dickens county home demonstration agent and is selling it to his grocer. He says it is a good way to dispose of surplus milk.

"When \$1 a week pays the grocery bill it isn't hard to sell enough eggs and butter, even at low prices, to make a living," declares Mrs. J. Eastman, 4-H pantry demonstrator in Mason county.

After two years of effort in getting state certified cotton seed plant ed in Hopkins county the county agent reports that local bankers, buyers and warehouse men agree that the market last year was 20 points above the base market. There were 18,000 bales sold there.

In Brazoria county the men who have been demonstrating the value of improved pastures claim that one acre of improved pasture is worth more than three ordinary pastures. About 20,000 acres are reported by the county agent mowed to rid fields of weeds, and shade trees have been planted, drainage ditches dug, and better watering facilities aded.
