Picked on Main Street Convenient to all Country Roads

E. Cook, president of the Guthrie Cotton Oil Company of, Guthrie, Okla., accompanied by one of his mechanics, C. Jones, arrived in Hereford Wednesday morning, following official notice to him that the cotton gin bonus had

Before nightfall Mr. Cook had looked over the field, selected and purchased a site, and had his stakes for his buildings driven in the ground.

That is believed to be a record for go-get-it-ivness and swift efficiency. The site selected consists of seven lots, 75-140, lying on the west side of lower Main street, between the City Park and the oil storage tanks of W. C. Fallwell. It is a stategic location for the handling of business from every direction coming into town and there is plenty of room all around it for the farmers' wagons and for yard-

Thursday morning F. B. Tillotson of Guthrie, who will manage the gin this year for the company, came in on the morning train, took hold of things at once and before the second day had passed some material was on the ground and dirt had been broken for the foundations. Mr. Cook returned to Guthrie Thursday, leaving Mr. Tillotson in charge.

The lots were purchased from the Santa Fe railroad at the very moderate price of \$1.00 per front foot, J. Frank Potts handling the deal. Three sheet iron houses will be erected, the gin house and boiler room, which will be about 90x22, a cotton house 30x30, and a seed house about 20x30. Mr. Tillotson states that the boiler is already loaded on the car at Guthrie and will come forward at once, with the rest of Lubbock as Tech the machinery to follow closely at its

## City Ditches Are **Dangerous Where** Used by Children

The operation of the big ditching machine now engaged in the work of extending water and sewer lines for the city of Hereford has attracted the curiosity of the children of the city to such an extent that Mayor Knight has felt impelled to issue a notice in dodger form addressel to the parents of Hereford asking them to keep the children away from the machine and the ditches in the interest of safety... In part, the Mayor says:

"Children are especially fond of playing on the banks of and in the ditches. They frequently do some damage by running over pipes that have been laid but not yet covered. But Methodist Sunday most important of all, it is dangerous for the children.

"Within a few days some very deep ditches will be dug, twelve or fourteen feet deep, and some child is very likely to be seriously frurt if allowed to jump into or play in them. These ditches must be kept open a few days.




