Sanitarium To Be Closed Up If Tax Payers Are Unwilling To Relieve Stockholders of Burden

If the county of Deaf Smith and the surrounding communities are to have the benefit of the continued operation of the Eereford Sanitarium, then the tax payers of the county will have to take over the institution and maintain it.

That was the sense of the meeting of the stockholders of the Sanitarium, held at the courthouse last Friday night, and also the report of the committee appointed at that meeting to devise way and means of keeping the institution open, and which committee reported to the luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce Monday.

The committee report says in substance that the small number of stockholders are financially unable to carry the burden of the institution alone; that it is unjust to expect them to do so; that the sanitarium is a county-wide institution, for the benefit of all the people and a necessity from a humanitarian point of view; and finally, that if the tax payers of the county are unwilling to share equally in its maintenance, the committee recommends that the doors of the institution be closed, hard as that recommedation is to make. The committee recommends that a petition be circulated according to law, asking the commissioners court to call an election for a bond issue of \$15,000 with which to take

NORMAL PROFESSOR IN APPEAL FOR AGRI-CULTURAL WORK

Dr. Atwood Gives Concise Definition of What He Stands For

Short talks by Dr. E. B. Atwood, pasor of the local Baptist church and president of Wayland College at Plainview, and Prof. Frank R. Phillips of the West Texas Normal at Canyon, illumined the weekly luncheon of the Chumber Phillips argued the value of the teach ing of agriculture and live stock in the Hereford public schools.

The luncheon was a dinghummer and attended by thirty-seven men. Homer Wilkinson presided in the absence of President McDonald. Routine business was first disposed of. Captain E. D. Morris of the local National Guards was appointed local representative for the summer Civilian Military Camps.

A proposition from the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce that Hereford join other Panhandle towns in a stand to stop guarantees for char tauquas, lyceums, singers, etc., was declined by a majority vote. The idea of a guarantee was unanimously disapproved, but it was felt that without it Hereford, with small population, could not hope to secure high class talent, and it was preferred to solve each such problem as it arose. Chairman Britain of the Cleanup Committee told how his committee is making a go of the present campaign. Chairman Knight reported for the Sanitarium committee. as reported elsewhere in this issue.

Prof. Phillips told of his work of training boys for better agricultural pursuits and for stock judging; he gave an outline of the national law which contributes federal money to the school that employs trained men to teach agriculture ;and outlined how Hereford could secure this aid. Chairman Parker of the school board responded that the board was studying the question and would be glad to take it up further with Prof. Phillips.




