AGED MAN FALLS TO TRAGIC DEATH

J. M. Sligh, 69 years old, a resident of Vernon for the past two years, and a frequent visitor here for many years prior, died at 10:30 Tuesday morning at the home of his nephew, C. D. Shamburger, as a result of a fall from a second story window. The accident is thought to have occurred about 5:30

Tuesday morning, and the stricken man was discovered an hour later by a street car conductor starting on his morning rounds.

The exact manner in which Mr. Sligh met his death will never be known. Members of the family were unaware of the accident until notified by the street railway employe, and Mrs. Shamburger had just gone to call Mr. Sligh.—Vernon Record.

HOUSTON UPTON IS INDICTED BY JURY

Floydada—Houston Upton, the young man who was found wounded in a school house early in the morning of Monday, Feb. 27, following the fatal shooting of Gladys Solomon, 15, and Nell Umberson, 15, at the home of Mrs. Martha Umberson, a widow, in the Sunset community in Floyd county, has been indicted on a charge of murder by the Floyd county grand jury.

Upton, who is only eighteen years of age, was thought to be fatally wounded when he was found, but his condition is said to have steadily improved since his removal here the day of the tragedy. It is now believed he will recover.

The wound was self-inflicted, according to statements officials declare he made shortly after he was found.

The two slain girls, together with Vera Wilson, a neighbor girl, were all sleeping in one bed at the Umberson home, where the tragedy occurred.

According to a statement made by Miss Wilson following the shooting, the tragedy was the outgrowth of a lover's quarrel between the Solomon girl and Upton, who were sweethearts. The two quarreled Sunday afternoon after they with others, had attended a B. Y. P. U. meeting at the neighborhood school house. Upton is said to have visited the Umberson home and talked with Miss Solomon once during the night before the shooting occurred at 4 o'clock in the morning.

Upton is a son of J. H. Upton, a prominent and well-to-do farmer and business man of Floyd county.

CHANGE IN ROUTE SOUTH WEST TRAIL

Anthony, Kans., has won her fight for routing the Southwest Trail between Wichita and Canadian. All members of the executive committee have voted to adopt the Anthony, or southern route as against the northern route thru Attea and Harper, which route was selected at the Woodward meeting last November.

This information was given out Saturday by L. A. McAdams of this city, president of the Southwest Trail Association. He had just received the votes of the four presidents.

The highway thru Anthony runs due east along a state road to Joplin, Mo., and it is quite probable that an organization will now be perfected to build another branch of the Southwest Trail from Anthony east to Joplin, and on to St. Louis. The road from Anthony east to the Kansas line is already a great road, and all that is necessary to make the extension to St. Louis is to perfect the organization.

Tourists returning from California are very liberal in their praise of the condition of the Southwest Trail from El Paso to Clovis, thru the Panhandle and on to the Oklahoma line. They say it is found to be in good condition, giving cars no trouble at all, and far surpasses all other roads. The Southwest Trail is destined to become a great route, and a highly popular one.—Canadian Record.

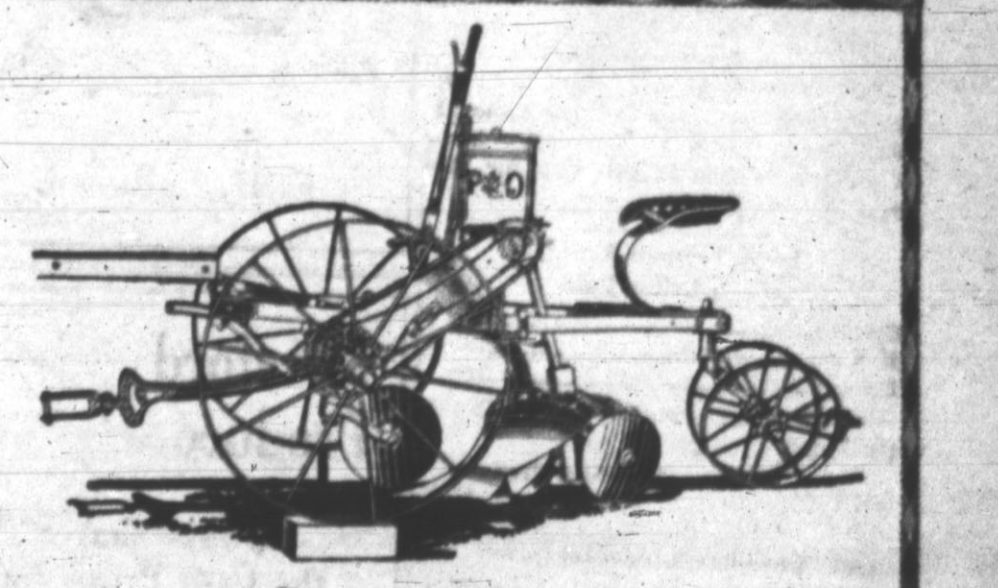

stock and ordering feed and for a while one car a week was shipped from this territory. Several auction sales of purebred hogs have been encouraged and a permanent county fair has been started. Farmers have been encouraged in testing and weighing their milk, feeding balanced rations and keeping a record of milk production under the direction of the county agents. One farmer at Liberty Hill reports after following the county agent's instructions that it developed that every cow he had in his herd which was a poor producer traced back to one heifer he had purchased in 1913 while the outstanding cows or good producers in the herd traced back to another heifer purchased at the same time and that through this testing and record keeping he has been enabled to discover the profitable and unprofitable milk producers.

CAPTAIN MORRIS IS REPRESENTATIVE OF MILITARY CAMP IDEA

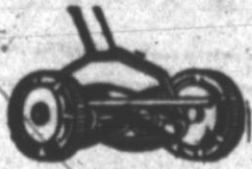

A Summary of the Results of County Agent Work in Williamson County
During the past year reports of County Agent G. L. Crawford on file in the Extension Service, A. and M. College of Texas, show that the forty-five tons or approximately eighty-seven thousand rats were killed in the rat killing campaign conducted in the county the past year and that the cost of ginning to farmers was reduced from three to four dollars a bale, while the cotton acreage was reduced about 25 per cent and the acreage to feed crops was consequently increased.
