## For Split Taxes

Friday, November 30, is the final day for payment of state and county taxes for 1934 under the split payment plan. First-half payments must be made before December 1, and then the last half will be due on or before June 30,

If the taxpayer does not electo follow the split payment plan, then all taxes are due on or before January 31, 1935. After February 1 the whole bill will become delinquent.


