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# Combest is optimistic

**Managing Editor** 

U.S. Rep. Larry Combest said Thursday he isn't taking the Nov. 8 general election for granted, but is optimistic about his chances to be elected to a third term as this area's congressman.

Combest was in Hereford to tour Frito-Lay's Southwest Grain Handling Division facility and Merrick Pet Foods.

"I feel a totally different attitude in the district from 1986," Combest said. "The attitudes of the people in the district are different. A lot of people have told

me they think my opponent (Hereford Democrat Gerald Mc-Cathern) ran just to run again."

Combest said a strong showing by Vice President George Bush would boost his chances, but discounts any "coattail" effect.

"I know that in the 1984 election the presidential race with President Reagan had a great deal to do with my success, but being an incumbent helps you a lot. By the third time, you have built your own identity.

"I really think I might run ahead of Bush in the district. I ticket with (Michael) Dukakis." Combest thinks he could top the 1986 election, when he captured 63 percent of the vote.

"Last time, we split the counties 8-7, and if you left Lubbock and Odessa out I would still have won," Combest said. "I would predict I would carry even more counties this time, but 63 percent of the vote is something to be plenty satisfied with over the entire district."

Combest's work with the 100th Congress was finsihed with last week's passage of a major anti-

"The final bill isn't as strong as what we passed out of the House, but I think it will help us," Combest said. "We all know drugs are a major problem: every community in the nation is concerned with drug problems." Combest said other major ac-

complishments in the past few months have been the corrections on the diesel and heifer taxes and the actual appropriation bills, rather than continuing resolutions, that passed on time.

"We also had the potential problems of the speaker (Jim Wright) that cropped up in the last four months of the session," Combest said. "I think we saw the olive branch extended by the speaker more than we had during the first part of the session.

"The whole potential problem area could have an impact on the next Congress.'

Combest is already working on what he would like to see in the next Congress: a comprehensive rural development plan that would deal with rural health issues as well as economic and social development.

"There has been an over-all rural development bias," Combest said. "The urban areas have always gotten more development funds, and I would like to see legislation that addresses rural development needs in comprehensive form.

"The rural healthcare problems are real everywhere. we need a comprehensive package that would deal with industrial growth, new jobs, development in agriculture, and expand our existing base.

"The local and federal agencies are already in place to implement what we need. We have a problem with people not recognizing our problems when things are bubbly and vivacious. We need to get started now, and not wait until there's a crisis situation.

# 10,000 to be helped by UWDSC

Almost 10,000 persons will be aided by the 1988 United Way of Deaf Smith County campaign, according to information from the budget and admissions hearings held this week by UWDSC.

The 12 agencies benefitting from UWDSC include Boy Scouts, Girls Scouts, Campfire, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Family Services, Rape Crisis/Domestic Violence, Red Cross, Salvation Army, Senior Citizens, YMCA, Childrens Rehabilitation Center and the High Plains Epilepsy Foundation.

Even if the 1988 campaign reaches its goal of \$123,500, the money will not be enough to meet the combined requests of the agencies.

The number of people assisted by the various agencies includes:

-Medical, mental and counseling

-Food, shelter and clothing: 2,797; -Rape Crisis/Domestic Violence:

-Big Brothers/Big Sisters: 53;

-Senior Citizens: 1,250; -Youth organizations, including scholarships and other special helps for youths who cannot afford to pay their way: 5,100.

Persons who have not pledged, or have decided not to pledge and want to reconsider, may mail their pledge to Post Office Box 206 in Hereford. UWDSC officials said no pledge is too small, because someone will benefit.

UWDSC officials also pointed out that less than 10 percent of the monies are used for administrative purposes and are direct investment for loved ones, neighbors and

# Bush levels new charges By DONNA CASSATA **Associated Press Writer**

George Bush charged anew that rival Michael Dukakis favors protectionism to promote U.S. trade as the Republican nominee collected yet another favorable nationwide poll. The Democratic candidate accused the GOP of waging a negative campaign to cover up Reagan-Bush administration failings.

"It doesn't make sense to stick our heads in the sand, as some in the other party have suggested, and try to build walls around America," Bush told an audience Thursday in California's Silicon Valley "It doesn't make sense to launch a trade war and plunge America and the world into a recession.

The vice president holds a ninepoint lead over Dukakis in the latest poll, which comes on the heels of recent surveys showing double-digit and high single-digit advantages for

Dukakis, looking to reverse that momentum in the last 11 days of the campaign, invoked the image of former President Harry S. Truman and his 1948 upset win over Thomas E. Dewey as the Democratic nominee campaigned in the

'Harry Truman was a fighter and so am I and so are you," Dukakis told supporters in Illinois. "The Republicans are trying to do in this do to Harry Truman and Jack Kennedy - distort the record, try to put labels on people. But we're not going to let them do it.

The Massachusetts governor later traveled to Independence, Mo., Truman's birthplace, for a town meeting where he scoffed at President Reagan's assertion that Truman would support Bush and the Republican Party today

"I cannot imagine him supporting George Bush," Dukakis said, laughing as he spoke. "That has to be one of the most incredible statements of all time. ... I know he'd be four-square behind the Democratic ticket.

At a stop in Kansas City, Dukakis sat for a 14-minute interview with Dan Rather on the CBS "Evening News' where he conceded that GOP advertising had hurt his candidacy.

"There's no mystery about why they put those ads on. They have done damage. There's no question about that," he said.

Dukakis suggested that Bush resorted to the commercials "to divert public attention from the fact that this administration has probably had more corruption and malfeasance than any in recent

memory, if not in history." The Democratic nominee was continuing his campaign in Missouri today before heading to Michigan and

campaign exactly what they tried to later Boston. Dukakis' running mate, ministration will keep the heat on." Lloyd Bentsen, was focusing on California - and its electoral prize of 47 votes - before returning to his home state of Texas.

Bush was also targeting California before traveling to Nebraska where he planned a joint appearance with Sen. David Karnes. The Republican candidate faces an uphill battle with former Nebraska Gov. Bob Kerrey for the Senate seat.

Republican vice presidential candidate Dan Quayle was touring the "Pennsylvania Dutch" region and scheduled a series of appearances at the state's high schools.

The Republican ticket, according to an NBC News-Wall Street Journal poll released Thursday, leads Dukakis-Bentsen 51 percent to 42 percent, considerably closer than the 17 points in a similar poll done just after the Oct. 13 debate.

The survey, conducted among 1,285 likely voters, had a margin of error of plus or minus three percentage points.

As he campaigned in the West, Bush said the Pacific nations represent "huge and growing markets" for American goods, "if we don't turn and run away.

"I will make sure that our trading partners continue to understand that our markets are vital to their growth as well," Bush said. "Free trade must be fair trade. A Bush ad-

But Bentsen, in a speech to the World Affairs Council in Los Angeles, said that under the leadership of the Reagan administration, the United States had become an international debtor, dependent on foreign investors as it battles huge trade and budget deficits.

"The United States must be able to compete not only militarily but economically," Bentsen said.

Dukakis, in the CBS interview, reiterated his populist view that the Democratic ticket favors average Americans while Bush is the candidate of the privileged class.

"I want the government of this country to be on the side of average Americans and I think that's a fundamental difference between me and George Bush," the Democratic

nominee said. Meanwhile, the Dukakis campaign announced that it is doubling its budget for Hispanic ads, targeting seven states with large Hispanic

voter populations. The campaign also is spending about \$3 million - 10 percent of its media budget - on black-oriented television and radio ads which began three weeks ago.

In five of the radio ads, former Democratic candidate Jesse Jackson tells listeners, "We have the power to make Mike Dukakis president. Let's

# Mortgage program will help older owners

**WASHINGTON** (AP) - A reverse mortgage plan designed to help the nation's "house rich and cash poor" would provide elderly homeowners with up to hundreds of dollars monthly for the rest of their lives and no

need to pay it back unless they sell. The Home Equity Conversion Mortgage Insurance program announced Thursday by the Department of Housing and Urban Development initially will insure 2,500 no-payment loans to older Americans who own homes but need cash to keep them up

or lead decent lives. Under the demonstration program ordered in a 1987 law, the lender takes an interest in the elderly borrower's property in exchange for supplementing his or her income. The limited number of reverse mortgages are to be available through banks and other lenders by next April, HUD officials said.

The mortgage principal, interest and insurance fees will be collected when the house is sold or when a borrower dies, just as a conventional mortgage would have to be settled before heirs could take possession of

"It will be possible for the elderly to take out a reverse mortgage without putting out a penny," said Judith V. May, HUD policy analyst who helped design the program and described it at a briefing.

The loans differ from regular home equity loans in that the money does not have to be paid back during the lifetime of the borrower, interest rates would be lower and there is no way for the borrower to default on the loan or lose the house.

There is a possibility that the homeowner may accumulate debts that exceed the value of the house if he or she lives long enough - but a built-in insurance program would ensure that neither the borrower nor heirs to the estate would have to repay the overrun.

To qualify, a homeowner must be at least 62, own his or her home outright or with a minimal mortgage and submit to counseling by HUD housing experts. Ms. May said an elderly borrower

would have the option of receiving monthly payments for life or larger payments for a set term or a line of credit to be drawn upon when need-Maximum loans would range from

\$67.500 to \$101,250, depending on

Federal Housing Administration

maximum insurance for different parts of the country. Monthly benefits on a 10 percent

mortgage would range from \$81 for a 62-year-old borrower in a house valued at \$50,000 to \$662 for an 85-year-old in a house valued at

\$100,000 or more.

# Republicans, Demos swap angry charges

AUSTIN (AP) — Charges are swirling over what the secretary of state's office says is a crackdown on voter fraud but Democrats charge is an effort to intimidate minority voters.

At the center of the firestorm is Assistant Secretary of State Randy Erben, who this week said some Hidalgo County paper ballots would be impounded because they made it appear that separate votes could be cast for Republican George Bush for president and Democratic U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen for vice president.

Democrats, using some of the toughest language of the campaign to date, Thursday said Erben should be fired because he and other Republicans were trying to keep Hispanics and blacks away from the polls Nov. 8. Erben said he and Republican Secretary of State Jack Rains are only doing their job, and that it's Democrats who fear an honest election.

"We and others will stand up for the voters and expose these dirty tricks. Texans want free and fair elections, and we will reject George Bush's intimidation," said Larry Veselka, general counsel for Democrat Michael Dukakis' Texas campaign.

"Partisan Democrats are upset that Rains will no longer tolerate dirty, back-room politics as usual. The partisan Democrats can cry all they want to, but Secretary Rains will never stop his crusade against vote fraud," Erben replied.

Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, Attorney General Jim Mattox, Democratic Party executive director Ed Martin and Jose Villarreal, Southwest political director for Michael Dukakis' presidential campaign, were among Democrats raising the charges.

Villarreal said Rains and Erben, instead of protecting the election system in an unbiased way, were "leading a campaign intended to impugn the integrity of Hispanic voters by creating an atmosphere of mistrust and embarrassment with the ultimate aim of suppressing Hispanic voter turnout."

Martin said Erben called a news conference Tuesday to make public accusations against Hidalgo County Clerk William "Billy" Leo without investigating what Leo said was only a printing error with the paper

"If the Randy Erben press conference is any example, I don't think we can trust the secretary of state to run the election fairly, unless that kind of behavior is stopped, stopped right now and apologized for," Martin

Erben said there was no reason to apologize.

"I am committed to preserving the civil rights of all voters whose votes may be canceled or diluted by illegal ballots. If this makes certain partisan Democrats mad, so be it. I can sleep well at night knowing I am on the right side of this issue," he said.

Other controversies are boiling as well. Democrats accused the Bush campaign of what they called "discriminatory tactics."

Those include telephone calls in some minority precincts telling residents to avoid lines at the polls by voting by phone, and broadcasting Spanish-language radio commercials in the Rio Grande Valley which the Democrats said "imply" that election officials would check citizenship papers.

Mark Sanders, a spokesman for the Bush campaign, denied that anything improper is being done and contended it would be Democrats whose tactics should be

"We want every registered Texan to vote. We don't want the gravevard vote, we don't want the Alice-in-Wonderland vote, and we don't want the precinct vote in Outer Mongolia," Sanders said. "Democrats in this state have been trying to steal elections since the turn of the century..."

And in a related development, two Democratic Travis County election judges accused the secretary of state of overstepping his power and trying to intimidate minority voters by issuing election orders that represent a "radical departure" from past prac-

In documents filed with the Texas Supreme Court, election judges Walter Timberlake and Jerry Buttrey take issue with a Rains memo that permits pollwatchers to leave polls to make phone calls.

They also challenged a requirement forcing election officials to contact voter registrars to verify whether a person is registered, if the person does not present a voter registration certificate at the polls, and warning that law enforcement officials will be on alert to respond to Election Day problems.

Erben said the procedures are consistent with state election law. The voter registration certificate issue was addresse i. Frben said, after the office received numerous request from local officials about the issue.

# Nancy Reagan recognized

## First lady stresses breast exams

DALLAS (AP) - First lady Nancy Reagan urged women to take early steps to battle breast cancer and said fear of the disease should never keep women from facing up to the need for mammograms.

Mrs. Reagan, who has recovered from breast cancer, was presented the 1988 Betty Ford Award at a Dallas hotel Thursday for promoting awareness of the disease.

"I know how hearing the word 'cancer' or 'malignancy' can just absolutely freeze you with fear," Mrs. Reagan told a luncheon audience of more than 2,000. "But that fear should never keep you from facing up to the need for mammograms."

Mrs. Reagan was diagnosed as having breast cancer in October 1987.

Founded in 1982 to fight breast cancer, the Susan G. Komen Foundation honored Mrs. Reagan with the Betty Ford Award, given annually to an individual outside the scientific or medical community who has greatly enhanced public understanding and awareness of breast cancer.

Former first lady Betty Ford, for whom the award is named, made the presentation. Also a recovered victim, Mrs. Ford was the first recipient of the honor, when it was called the Peace Rose Award.

"Your inspiration provided the leadership for all of us today," she said in introducting Mrs. Reagan. "You deserve so much credit because you were straightforward right from the start.

"If the first lady can have breast cancer and survive, then perhaps (other victims) can too."

Mrs. Reagan reminded the audience that her case is an example that the disease can strike anyone at

"I never really thought I'd be recognized for what has brought me here today," she said. "This wasn't an award I thought I'd get."

According to the National Cancer Institute, breast cancer affects one in 10 women, and 140,000 new cases will be reported this year. About 42,000 women will die from the disease this year, making it the second-leading cause of death among women behind heart disease.

"Medical science is so advanced today," Mrs. Reagan said."You have choices if you get that mammogram early enough, and I made the choice that I felt was right for

Also honored was Jill Eikenberry, a star of the NBC-TV series "L.A.

Mrs. Eikenberry, who successfully battled breast cancer two years ago, was recognized for her production of "Destined to Live," a television special broadcast earlier this month that deals with the emotional aspects of breast cancer.

Nancy Brinker, chairman and founder of the Dallas-based Komen Foundation, credited public figures like Mrs. Reagan, Mrs. Ford and Mrs. Eikenberry for stepping forward in their battle with breast cancer.

"These are the images that we relate to on a daily basis," Ms. Brinker said. "In fact, some of them we know better than we do people we live with. They are terribly influential in our life."

The Komen Foundation is named in memory of Ms. Brinker's sister, Susan G. Komen, who died from breast cancer in 1980 at the age of 36. It finances research projects related to breast cancer and seeks to make cancer detection affordable and

# Store coupons growing

NEW YORK (AP) - America's use of coupon-redemptions in retail stores continues its explosive growth, according to a report from a New York-based marketing communications company.

In the 1960s, coupon redemptions were very low compared with today's rates, notes the Howard Marlboro Group. In 1970, 16.4 million coupons were redeemed, and by 1980 the number had jumped to 90.6 million.

In the 1990s it is anticipated the number will zoom past the 400-million level, according to the report, which notes that as recently as 1984 there may have been 500 products in a store offering coupons, rebates and other special inducements.

# October: time to set clock back and snooze



WASHINGTON (AP) - An American family ritual comes around again this weekend: the changing of the clocks.

This is the weekend most folks get an extra hour to sleep, or carouse, or whatever it is they like to do in the wee hours of the morning.

Of course, that means it's also the weekend some people get stuck working an extra hour - factory workers and convenience store clerks, bartenders, police and even some news reporters.

For most people, though, it simply means having to remember to set the clock back - that's right, back - an hour before retiring Saturday night.

Technically, the change occurs at 2 a.m. local time, which becomes 1 a.m., and an hour is repeated.

Or, in the words of the Uniform Time Act which set up the system of switching between daylight and standard times, clocks are "retarded" an hour at 0200 on the last Sunday in October.

The move to standard time means that darkness will come earlier in the evenings now, with that hour of light shifted back to the morning hours to get the nation off to work on the right

Clocks will be "advanced" to daylight time next April 2, reports the Department of Transportation, which is responsible for keeping track of the semiannual switches.

That's the agency in charge of the time change because the system of uniform time zones was originally established, more than a century ago, to simplify time keeping for the nation's railroads.

Two other federal agencies share time keeping responsibilities for the nation, however.

The U.S. Naval Observatory in Washington is in charge of telling us minute and so forth. what time it is, at any given time. That's because knowing the exact

time is important for navigators trying to determine their position by looking at the stars.

The observatory started giving the time out publicly in 1845, by dropping a red ball from a flagstaff daily at noon. That gave sailors something by hich to set their watches.

Today, atomic clocks keep the correct time, and callers can get it by phone by dialing 1-900-410-TIME. The call costs 50 cents.

The National Institute of Standards and Technology - formerly the National Bureau of Standards is in charge of defining time.

That is, setting a standard for the exact length of time in a second,

"At this time we have more distractions than a team that plays Rice earlier in the year," Hatfield





# West Virginia faces Lions

All West Virginia has on the line Saturday is an undefeated record and a shot at a major bowl invitation. And all they have to do is beat Penn

On all counts, it will not be easy for the seventh-ranked Mountaineers.

West Virginia's 7-0 record is its best start since 1955. Since then, it is 1-30-1 against Penn State and 8-44-2 in the series, including 13 shutouts.

West Virginia's last five victories in the series were by a total of 24 points, including a 21-7 "romp" in 1955. The Nittany Lions have won 28 of the last 29 meetings with West Virginia.

West Virginia's last victory over Penn State came in 1964, when the Mountaineers won 17-14 at home. Before that, the Nittany Lions had won 25 consecutive games.

"This year, West Virginia has much better personnel. We have potentially good personnel, but we're a year or two away at least. They're there. They're there right now," Penn State coach Joe Paterno said.

"A lot of people don't know about West Virginia, and the first thing they ask is 'Why did you choose that?"' senior wide receiver Calvin Phillips said.

The Mountaineers are coming off a 59-19 rout of Boston College. Penn State, 4-3, has dropped two straight, scoring only one touchdown while losing to Syracuse 24-10 and Alabama 8-3.

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The Mountaineers' attack is led by quarterback Major Harris, who has completed 59 of 97 passes for 1,095 yards and seven touchdowns. He has rushed 72 times for 371 yards and five touchdowns.

"If we can beat Penn State and just get over that hump, it should be clear sailing the rest of the way," said Harris, a redshirt sophomore.

After Penn State, West Virginia plays Cincinnati, Rutgers and Syracuse.

In other Top Twenty action, No. 1 UCLA hosts Washington State, No. 2 Notre Dame visits Navy, No. 3 Southern California is at Oregon State, No. 4 Miami, Fla. visits East Carolina, No. 5 Nebraska hosts Kansas State; No. 6 Florida State is idle, No. 8 Oklahoma hosts Kansas, No. 9 Auburn visits Florida, No. 10 Wyoming visits Colorado State, No. 11 Arkansas hosts Rice, No. 12 Oklahoma State is at Kansas State, No. 13 Louisiana State hosts Mississippi, No. 14 Michigan is at Northwestern, No. 15 Clemson visits Wake Forest, No. 16 Syracuse is idle, No. 17 South Carolina visits North Carolina State, No. 18 Georgia hosts William & Mary, No. 19 Alabama visits Mississippi State and No. 20 Arizona State visits Oregon.

An undefeated season for the Mountaineers could mean a bowl bid to either the Fiesta, Sugar or Orange. Their last major bowl appearance was in 1963, a 42-19 loss to Georgia Tech in the Sugar.

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Penn State is trying to continue its NCAA record of 49 consecutive nonlosing seasons.

The top two passers in the country go head-to-head as No. 1 UCLA takes on Washington State. State's Timm Rosenbach is rated No. 1, not the Bruins' Troy Aikman. But Aikman has repeatedly said he would rather see his team be No. 1

Army was smart enough to drop the Irish; when will Navy learn? One of the nation's longest intersectional rivalries continues indefinitely, with Navy trailing 51-9 and losers of the last 24.

Notre Dame coach Lou Holtz, whose team is 7-0 and averaging 33.6 points per game, is expecting a strong-willed effort from the entire Navy squad.

"We're going to bring everything we've got," Holtz said. "I have too much respect for their coaching, too much respect for Navy, too much respect for how they play. They will play us a difficult game, make no mistake about it. Hopefully, we can play up to our potential." The last time Southern Cal lost in

Corvallis (1967) they also won the national championship. History may repeat for the Trojans as far as the national championship, but things look bleak for Oregon State in Cor-

The Nebraska Cornhuskers have been on a roll since UCLA blew them away early in the season. They have a five-game winning streak, the closest a 63-42 victory over Oklahoma State in which they led 35-0 after one period.

Clemson has scored 110 points in its three televised games, 66 in the other four. This one's not on the tube.

# Tyson, Trump, King in dispute

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) - Mike Tyson wants to promote fights with Don King, while Donald Trump wants \$2 million from the heavyweight champion to be spread among charities as payment for services rendered.

Trump said he considers the donation to be Tyson's payment for having helped the champion reduce the age Bill Cayton got from his manager's and personal services contracts.

"I don't want to answer any questions," Tyson said Thursday after announcing at a news conference, "Me and Don King have made a

"He'll be working with me as my associatie and partner," said King, who also has another deal with Tyson - a four-year contract to exclusively promote his fights.

King declined to discuss the specifics of the deal that made Tyson his promotional partner.

Tyson's first venture will be the lightweight championship fight between Julio Cesar Chavez and Jose Luis Ramirez on Saturday night at the Las Vegas Hilton.

The Hilton is negotating to get Tyson's scheduled Jan. 14 defense against Frank Bruno, which was originally to be held in London and has been postponed three times while Tyson has undergone personal problems ranging from injuries to divorce.

"I have every reason to believe the fight will be held January 14 at Las Vegas, with Mike Tyson's approval," Cayton said by telephone from New York.

"Mike is ready to fight," King said. "His hand is out of the cast. He's in a great mental attitude." Tyson suffered a hairline fracture

of the right hand when he hit boxer Mitch Green in a street altercation in New York in August.

Of the latest developments in Tyson's hectic career, Cayton said, "It's a total surpise to me."

Cayton was to fly to Las Vegas to-"I'm happy to talk to Bill any

time," King said. King declined to discuss the specifics of Tyson's promotional

In a letter to Tyson, Trump, a developer and hotel-casino owner at Atlantic City, N.J., said it was time for Tyson to keep his."promise of a \$2 million contribution to various

charities as selected by me." Tyson sought Trump's aid when he was seeking to break his managerial contract with Cayton. The dispute was settled out of court.

Trump said he was "very happy to beat Bill Cayton and reduce the ridiculous fees he was getting, both on his manager's and personal services contracts."

Cayton's manager's cut of Tyson's person was reduced from 33 to 20 percent. Trump claimed the personal services contract was virtually end-

"Over the course of your career I have probably saved you in excess of \$50,000,000," Trump wrote, 'therefore the \$2 million cotribution, all of which will go to worthy charities, is very reasonable."

DEAR DR. LAMB: I have a high cholesterol and have some questions about diet. Are potatoes or other no-cholesterol vegetables fried in corn oil OK? How about potato chips, no salt, cooked in corn oil?

Are pie crust, white cake, cookies or homemade bread made from scratch using non-cholesterol shortening, egg whites and no milk OK? Is there cholesterol in cocoa?

DEAR READER: You need to consider your total fat and saturated fat intake, not just the cholesterol content. So you really should avoid frying food with any oil or fat. When safflower oil and avoid the oils that contain lots of saturated fat. It is true that vegetables and cereals do not contain any cholesterol. It is better to steam, boil, bake or broil your foods. You can use many standard recipes by using about two-thirds as much oil as the solid fat called for in the recipe, but watch out for shortening advertised as "no cholesterol." It may be loaded with saturated fat and be more harmful than a little cholesterol. And you can use protein-fortified skim milk. It is a very low-fat, low-cholesterol item.

No, cocoa does not contain cholesterol as it is a vegetable product, but chocolate does contain lots of saturated fat.
