



One Killed, 8 Injured in Truck-Pickup Crash

Driver Charged in County's 3rd **Fatal Accident**

One Mexican national worker was killed and eight persons injured in a truck-pickup collision at the intersection of two dirt roads about three miles southwest of Hereford Monday

Jose Leon Manzo, 20, was dead on arrival at Deaf Smith County Hospital. Seven other laborers were injured, none critically, and Jack Johnson, 28, driver of the pickup was also slightly injured. About 35 Mexicans were in the

Charges of failure to grant right-of-way at an intersection were filed against Jose Maria Rios-Linares, 31, driver of the

Both the truck and pick-up were turned over and were termed total losses. Registration records show the truck is owned by Fred Texas Highway Patrolman said

MANZO was the county's third traffi fatality this year.

The workers had been picking cotton and were on their way to barracks at Tri-County Gin Corp. Ambulances from Gililland Funeral Home and Kreig-Marcum Funeral Home made several trips from the wreck scene to Deaf Smith County Hospital.

Johnson was treated for head bruises and cuts and released.

The workers who were treated were Julio Romero, 60; Juan, Medina, 40; Luis Medina Gonzales, 33: Ponsian Trevino, 37: Jose Gutierrez. 27: Manuel-Minos, 28, and Jose Enez Murrillo. 51. All were released Monday night except Romero and Murrillo who were held overnight. Murrillo was released Tuesday morning and Romero was kept for further observation.







Hors d'Oeuvre Subs for Dips

ONCE IN A WHILE, WHEN YOU'RE ENTERTAINING, you might enjoy straying from the ubiquitous spreads and dips that nowadays are usually served with crackers, raw vegetables and

For an occasion when you are ready and willing to do some preparation ahead, small sandwiches dipped in a French-toast mixture and fried until golden brown will be something different to offer your guests. The filling for this nors d'oeuvre combines deviled ham with cheese and pickle relish, and the attractive garnishes are pickle "fans," pimiento stars and strips and sliced stuffed olives. If you can't resist adding a dip to your snack bar, you can hollow out a small red cabbage, fill it in five room modern house, 41/2 with a mustard or spicy, fruit sauce and surround it with small hot frankfurters. The franks are dipped into the sauce, so you'll need to have a small container of wooden cocktail picks at hand. The filling for the French-toast hors d'oeuvre also makes an excellent spread served with some of the new potato crackers or with small squares of pumpernickel bread.

FRENCH-TOAST HORS D'OEUVRE

Ingredients: 1 can (4½ ounces) deviled ham, 1 cup (1/4 pound) grated sharp cheddar cheese, sweet pickle relish, .16 slices thin bread, 2/3 cup evaporated milk, 2 eggs, 2 teaspoons prepared mustard, 1/2 teaspoon caraway seed, butter or margarine, pickle fans, tiny stars and strips cut from drained canned pimiento, sliced stuffed olives. Method: Mix the deviled ham and grated cheese with pickle relish to taste. Trim crusts from bread. Spread about 2 tablespoons on the filling on 8 of the slices; top with remaining slices. Cut into triangles, squares or oblongs. Beat evaporated milk (undiluted) During the business program the eggs, mustard and caraway seed together in a shallow pan. Dip sandwiches into mixture, turning to coat both sides. Preparation may be done several hours ahead and at this point sandwiches may be refrigerated in a covered container. 

Choose a shampoo that is right for your particular hair, not one that your friend admires. Many shampoos are designed for problem hair, some are designated specifically for dry or oily hair.

A vigorous brushing before a shampoo will help loosen up foreign particles that seem to cement themselves to the scalp. But a thorough rinsing is necessary to rid the hair of this dirt-ridden soap. Some women put a great deal of effort into the soaping and whipping up the lather, and then do an incomplete rinse job, leaving the dulling soap film on the hair.

Dry your hair as soon as possible, and particularly if your hair is inclined to split or break with towel rubbing, use a dryer. These are easier to use these days as the newer dryers are more substantial than the older ones. There are jet air dryers that send out with a dryer.

It takes only about five minutes to dry wet hair prior to setting, and about 20 minutes to a half-hour to dry hair which has been set, depending upon the amount of wave lotion.



Surplus Sharing Is Launched by **Thanksgiving**

NEW YORK, N. Y., - Thousands of Protestant churches joined this week in a special coast-to-coast chain of Services of Thanksgiving, launching the 1957-58 Share Our Surplus program through which foods from our national stocks of surplus are distributed free to needy people abroad.

Three major observances - one in Washington, D. C., one in Manhattan, Kan., and one in San Francisco - held simultaneously on Sunday afternoon, spotlighted the emphases of each region's churches, through which millions of Protestant Americans of all denominations will give voice to their gratitute to God for the abundance with which America has been favored and for the privilege of sharing their blessings with those in need in other lads.

BY THE END of 1958, approximately one billion pounds of U. S. government surpluses are schedul ed to have been distributed free to hungry people since the beginning of the SOS program in 1954 This was reported by Dr. R. Norris Wilson, executive director of Church World Service, in announcthe nation-wide chain of Thanksgiving Services which will launch the fourth consecutive year of the Share-Our-Surplus program carried on by Church World Service on behalf of the churches of

The community SOS emphases during the Thanksgiving Week will occur in both individual church and community gatherlngs, a major portion of them on Thanksgiving Eve or Thanksgiving Day.

Goal for the 1958 program is 300 million pounds of surpluses, estimated in value at upwards of \$40 millions, to relieve hunger in areas of distress in Asia, Europe, the Middle East, Africa and Latin America. Approximately a millon dollars will be required to carry out the 1958 schedule of SOS

THE SHARE OUR SURPLUS appeal to the people of American Protestant churches is for funds to cover costs of overseas distribution, administration, etc., in the world-wide relief program.

Pointing out that more than 300 pounds of food is currently being distributed for each dollar of contribution, Dr. Wilson characterized the SOS program as "the greatest food relief bargain In the history of the American churches.'



On June 10, 1943, Lt. Col. J. W. Fraser reported that incendiary bombs had been dropped on Oregon forests in an attempt to start fires in 1942.

On Jan. 1, 1945, a giant balloon, believed to be of Japanese origin, was found in Portland, Ore. On Jan. 14, 1945, Attorney General Biddle reported on the evidence of Japanese submarines and planes 'having operated off U. S.

West Coast after Pearl Harbor.' On June 7, 1945, 6th Service Command disclosed that balloons were dropped in Michigan without disclosing date or specific place. On Aug. 15, 1945, it was reported that 'nearly 230 bomb-laden (Japballoons or remnants (were) recovered by July 30', from Alaska to Mexico, and as far east as Michigan.

The U. S. Navy reported on Aug. 21, 1945, that 13 attempts were made by Japanese submarines to enter Los Angeles harbor. The report also stated that only Anderson is No. 21 and Wellborn one U-boat passed Ambrose Light-No. 33, and if you can't get to ship, New York harbor during the

San Diego Station Ready To Track Earth Satelite

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (A) - Scientists here are ready to pinpoint the position of the manmade earth satellite as it comes hurtling through space high over the Pacific on its first trip around the

Electronic instruments Brown Field Naval Auxiliary Air Station, a few miles southeast of here, are now in position to pick up its signals.

Built and operated under supervision of the U.S. Navy Electronics Laboratory, the Brown Field Station is identical to eight other primary minitrack (minute detail tracking) stations in the Western Hemisphere.

TWO OF the others are in the United States - at Blossom Point, Md., and Ft. Stewart, Ga. The system stretches south almost to the tip of South America in an electronic "fence" which practically guarantees that one of the stations will got a fix on the space traveling satellite on each of its 94-minute orbits.


Each of the stations will be able to pick up the satellite's signals in a cigar-shaped area — at 300 niles elevation — 600 miles long a north-south direction.

This coverage is made possible by an array of eight antennae, at each station. The antennae, which look somewhat like metal grape arbors raised about six feet off the ground, are laid out in a precise diamond pattern 250 feet east and west and 250 feet north and south.

With their delicate instruments, cientists will detect the infinitesimal differences in time it takes the satellite's radio signal to reach the different antennae. This will permit them to plot the satellite's position in space.

The stations also have separate quipment for monitoring the periodic signals some satellites will broadcast, giving readings of measuring devices carried in the sat-

AT THE EXACT center of the antenna array is a special polarnounted Schmidt camera. Every two or three weeks, or oftener, it will photograph against a star background a high-flying aircraft transmitting a signal just like a satellite. This will enable scientists to calibrate the accuracy of the





Seek Voters' Okay for Schools Expansion Plans

TRUSTEES SCHEDULING \$639,000 BOND ISSUE

needs for additional classroom and other facilities needed for students in Hereford public schools, trustees last week approved expansion proposals bearing a \$639, 000 price tag. And they agreed that to finance repayment of the bonds they hope to have issued to finance the building program, the school district should adopt Senate Bill 116, which raises the ceiling on taxes 'that can be levied' for financing the school program. Taxpaying voters in the district will have the final say on whether or not the program for buildings and financing is adopted.

The actual calling of the bond election will be done in the immediate future on the petition of 20 qualified voters. Details of the petition, the election and the scheduling of bonds will be handled by a bond agent employed during a special board of trustee session Monday. Columbian Securitiés, a San Antonio firm, through its Amarillo agent Bob Davis is the agent employed.

Davis is well known in Hereford and has been fiscal agent for the City of Hereford for its past three bond transactions.

The board has decided on January as the time for the election on the two proposals, "issuance of \$639,000 in bonds, and adoption of SB 116. The exact date has not yet been determined.

THE IMMEDIATE NEEDS that the \$639,000 bond issue will meet, according to the school trustees and the school administrators, include the expansion of high school facilities to meet an anticipated enrollment of 850 students (640 was the peak enrollment this year); expansion of elementary school facilities to meet enrollment through 1960; adding cafeteria facilities at the Central school gym: improvements at other school buildings within the district: and for the acquisition of additional school sites.

The boards action, which followed more than a year of study of the multiple problems involved, was based on recommendations made by Dr. Morris S. Wal-lace, head of the education department, Texas Technological College, Lubbock. Dr. Wallace had been employed in a special consultant capacity by the trustees. His recommendations were along the same lines as those made earlier by University of Texas specialists who studied the Hereford school system, and include findings similar to those of local citizens advisory groups.

The memorandum submitted by Dr. Wallace to the Hereford school board follows (Proposals 1, 2 and 4 are those on which the board re-





located due north of the present high school plant. Since the present high school is more centrally located with respect to the elementary school units, I suggest the board consider converting the present high school into a junior high school and constructing a new high school to the north. The new high school, or a new unit, will be a necessity by 1962 to 1965. This new high school site should be large enough for a complete athletic plant. This latter could well be constructed in the near future, if the site were secured, before the main building. This would permit the removal of the preent athletic field and expansion of playground and parking facililies for both the present high school and elementary school.

While, I am aware that the board owns a 27-acre tract in the northwest part of the city, I would suggest that a site in the north part of town would be more centrally located to the school population. In this case, a part of the 27 acres could be used for an elementary school and the remainder sold and used in purchasing the site in the north part of the city.

5. The board should consider the problem of elementary buildings in the "immediate future. Some remodeling would be in order but a new unit must be provided in the northwest part of town in the next two or three years. I see no reason for a school unit south of the railroad at this time. At the most, if a unit is built in the south part it should be a temporary






