## Tower defeat more bitter than bad wine

WASHINGTON (AP) - His adversaries, even a few subordinates, used to call him the Littlest Caesar in Washington, a nickname as prophetic as it was derisive. In the end, just shy of the 60th birthday, John Tower was done in by his fellow patricians in the Senate.

He wanted so badly to crown his public career as secretary of defense he even swore abstinence, sort of, from the nectar of grape and grain. A Texas friend, George Bush, continued to swear by him. But those oaths were not enough to win Tower the oath of office.

The Senate's 53-47 vote late Thursday sealed the first rejection in history of a Cabinet nominee of a newly elected president. More astonishing to some is that the Senate turned against one of its own, a four-term member who once headed the very committee, Armed Services, that dealt the cruelest blow by declaring him, on a largely party-line vote, unfit.

Tower, 63, surely is among the least surprised that knives were drawn by his former colleagues in the onefabled, self-protective society of the Senate, which never before had rejected a former senator for an executive post.

Twenty-two years ago, Tower waged a lonely battle against the

censure of Democratic Sen. Thomas Dodd, the late father of current Sen. Christopher Dodd of Connecticut. He recalled then that Sen. Prescott Bush, another Connecticut senator and the late father of the president, had once been asked by a young woman if senators really were courteous and deferential to each other, regardless of political belief.

"He replied: 'Yes, young lady, it is true ... but when one of us breaks a leg, we eat him.'"

Broken leg or not, Tower may have been particularly vulnerable to those carnivorous instincts. He left the Senate in 1985 with an especially low reservoir of good will for a departing committee chairman.

He had monumental confrontations with leaders of his own party, much less the Democrats who watched him ram Ronald Reagan's massive defense budgets through the Senate. He waged jurisdictional wars with other Republican chairmen, and few members were spared his acid tongue in floor debates.

Indeed, the only Senate club that John Tower seemed to care about was the one he figuratively carried on his shoulder. Compromise was not his cup of tea. He once refused, even, to shake hands with the Democratic congressman,

Robert Krueger, who dared run against him in 1978.

"John Tower is a former member of the Senate, but it is probably also the case that he doesn't have a lot of intimate friends here or any aura of popularity or good will," said Republican Sen. Richard Lugar of Indiana. "He is not necessarily a person who ingratiates himself with anybody."

Though his confirmation hearings opened with a tide of good will, many senators became disturbed by Tower's dodginess and pattern of denial over the alcohol issue. He admitted to "excessive drinking," but steadfastly asserted he had not "abused" alcohol. He claimed his switch from scotch to wine was evidence of moderation, a refrain often heard from problem drinkers who fail to acknowledge that average servings of wine, beer or liquor all have the same alcoholic content.

He took a pledge of abstinence, but conditioned it on confirmation - he continued to drink wine, he said, in the meantime. To some, that too smacked of the problem drinker's claim that he or she can quit any time - but not just now.

## Hodges wins junior bee

## Survey: One-third of teens consider suicide

ATLANTA (AP) - One out of every three eighth- and 10th-graders surveyed in 20 states said they have seriously considered killing themselves, and many have poor health habits that include drinking, smoking and ignorance of safe sex.

Thirty-four percent of the 11,000 students - 25 percent of the boys and 42 percent of the girls - reported that they had thought seriously about ending their lives, and 15 percent had gone so far as to attempt potentially fatal injuries, the national Centers for Disease Control reported Thursday.

Dr. Lloyd Kolbe, director of the CDC's Division of Adolescent and

School Health, said the suicide figures were surprising. "We just didn't think it would be that high," he said.

He said it was the first time the suicide question had been asked in the National Adolescent Student Health Survey, so researchers lacked a benchmark for comparison.

"Many schools in the nation are teaching more about suicide, about how to identify friends who may be suicidal and many school faculty are being trained in how to deal with suicides should they occur," Kolbe noted.

He thought the findings added urgency to such activities. "I think what it means is that we need to begin exploring this a little more and looking at what we can do," Kolbe said.

The 1987 survey addressed questions about alcohol, drugs, violence, suicide and sex to eighth- and 10th-grade students in randomly selected classrooms chosen from a

national sample of 217 schools in 20 states.

In the eighth grade, 51 percent had tried smoking and 77 percent had tried alcohol; by 10th grade, the numbers rose to 63 percent for smoking and 89 percent for liquor.

Overall, 22 percent reported smoking in the previous month and about 32 percent reporting having five or more drinks at one time in the previous two weeks.

"Drinking and drug use ... contributes very substantially to homicide and suicide," Kolbe said.

One bright spot was that more than 90 percent knew that having sex with a person infected with AIDS or sharing drug needles increases the chance of transmitting the virus, according to CDC researchers.

Kolbe said education and awareness could prevent many needless deaths among young people.

## North complained of 'asinine' quizzes

WASHINGTON (AP) - Oliver North angrily complained about having to answer "asinine" congressional questions, according to a witness in his trial on charges of lying to Congress about the Iran-Contra affair.

Daniel L. Conrad, the liaison between North and conservative fundraiser Carl "Spitz" Channell, said North made the comment in the fall of 1985 and then told Conrad the two had to stop meeting at North's office.

Conrad's name appeared on a log at the Old Executive Office Building each time he visited North and "he didn't want meetings to be so often," Conrad testified Thursday.

Conrad said North told him the National Security Council recently had received a letter from a congressional committee asking about NSC staff

members' involvement in fund-raising and other activities for the Nicaraguan Contra rebels. At the time, Congress had banned U.S. aid to the Contras.

"He angrily went through the questions and he was irritated that he had to develop answers to these asinine questions," recalled Conrad.

Because of the political heat from the congressional inquiries, North then said that "we need to not meet so frequently in these offices," Conrad added.

He said the two then started meeting outside North's offices, chiefly at a hotel across the street from the White House, but that after congressional pressure waned, they began meeting again at North's office.

"These things run in cycles," said Conrad. "They would cool off and we

would meet again in his offices."

Four of the 12 criminal charges against North are that he made false statements and obstructed Congress in 1985 by denying he assisted the Contras. Then-National Security Adviser Robert McFarlane signed letters containing the denials and the government alleges that North prepared the responses.

The House Intelligence Committee sent McFarlane a list of questions on Sept. 12, 1985, asking whether North had been handling contacts with private fund-raising groups for the Contras. The question mentioned several groups, but not Channell's organization, the National Endowment for the Preservation of Liberty. North is charged with making false statements to Congress in responses made on Oct. 7 of that year.

Conrad recalled another meeting in North's office in December 1985 in which a newspaper account described the shooting down of a Soviet HIND helicopter in Nicaragua by a Redeye missile launched by the Contras.

"Col. North pointed to the clipping with some pride and said it was the first time a Soviet helicopter had been shot down in the war," recalled Conrad. "He made the point that the Redeyes only cost \$8,000 apiece. In other words, we could do a great deal for the freedom fighters by getting them Redeye missiles."

Conrad also said that he tried to get North to tailor his pitches to contributors based on how much the private fund-raisers thought the donors would be willing to give.

## Galveston wants to attract crowd

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) - While some spring break destinations are bracing for a wave of rowdy young tourists, city officials here are embracing the annual influx of college students seeking warm beaches and good times.

Vic Maceo, co-coordinator of the city Park Board's Spring Break '89 and director of the Galveston Beach Patrol, said the city is sponsoring a host of athletic events to lure students.

"We're competing with Corpus Christi and Padre Island in a major way, so we've got to offer something different," he said.

Included in the events are surfing competitions, volleyball tournaments, a 5K beach run, a tennis tournament and a tug o' war, to name a few. The city also is sponsoring a couple of free concerts.

Other events include a sand sculpting contest sponsored by the University of Texas architecture department and a St. Patrick's Day Street Party on March 17.

Barring bad weather, 35,000 college students are expected to converge on this coastal community Saturday, and another 35,000 are expected next weekend.

"Everything's covered - the security, plenty of people working, all the entertainment - but rain will kill us," Maceo said.

The National Weather Service said temperatures were expected to be in the 70s through the weekend, and no rain was forecast.

Last year was Galveston's first attempt at organizing spring break activities, and the city drew an estimated 35,000 for each of two March weekends. There were fewer than 10 spring break-related arrests, a far cry from most of the established destinations, Maceo said.

Last year in Port Aransas, for instance, Texas lawmen were kept busy during a weekend that included a riot, four stabbings and two drownings. The Galveston Park Board has spent \$100,000 organizing spring break activities and advertising them statewide, officials said.

Park Board director Don Schattel said the bulk of the bill was footed by corporate sponsors.

"We're more sports-oriented, and that's drawn some attention," Maceo said. "We've had calls for East Coast schools wanting to know what we've got down here, because they want something different from Florida."

And in keeping with the competitive spirit, Clean Galveston Inc. will sponsor the "All American All-Aluminum Can Collect-Off," on March 11-12 and March 18-19. Students will be asked to form teams and collect aluminum cans on the beach.

I was doing a little research at one of our treasures, the Deaf Smith County Library, on Thursday. I wasn't there long enough to do much, but I was looking up stuff on maps and was struck by how accurate some of those old maps were, especially considering how very little was known about anything 20 miles from where you lived in, say, 1400, much less the other side of the world.

Of course, back then they thought the world only extended from the British Isles to China. But they knew about China and India and Africa and the Arabian Peninsula, and some of those maps aren't bad. I mean, you can recognize things and places and oceans.

They weren't exactly drawn to scale. On one, Africa is kind of a square, and it just ends in "Interior Ethiopia." Asia is also a square, but when you consider that these guys had no photographs, only crude drawings and recollections, with which to work it's amazing.

Of course, maps are basically unusable objects anyway. They're a pain in the palms when you unfold 'em, and doubly painful when you try to fold them back up.

And you have to work to find something. I know about those "guide numbers" they have. Heckville is supposed to be, say, at "J8." So, with the map in your lap, you put one finger on the J and the other on the 8, then bring them together across the map.

You end up in Vernon or somewhere.

Another feature that makes maps "easy" are longitudinal and latitudinal lines. They're easy if you remember which is which. It took me 20 years to remember which was horizontal and which was vertical, and people expect me to find something at, say, 100 degrees west, 40 degrees north. Which, I think, is either somewhere around here or South Dakota.

Today's highlight in history:

On March 10, 1876, Alexander Graham Bell made the first telephone call, telling his assistant in an adjoining room in Boston, "Mr. Watson, come here. I want you."

On this date:

In 1496, Christopher Columbus concluded his second visit to the New World as he left Hispaniola for Spain.

In 1629, England's King Charles I dissolved parliament. He would not call it back for 11 years.

In 1785, Thomas Jefferson was appointed minister to France, succeeding Benjamin Franklin.

In 1848, the Senate ratified the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo, ending the war with Mexico.

In 1864, Ulysses S. Grant became commander of the Union armies in the Civil War.

In 1880, the Salvation Army arrived in the United States from England.

In 1948, the anti-Communist foreign minister of Czechoslovakia, Jan Masaryk, plunged to his death in Prague.

In 1949, Mildred E. Gillars, who had made wartime broadcasts for the Nazis under the name "Axis Sally," was convicted of treason in Washington. She ended up serving 12 years in prison.

In 1969, James Earl Ray pleaded guilty in Memphis, Tenn., to the assassination of civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. Ray later repudiated that plea.

In 1980, the author of the "Scarsdale Diet," Dr. Herman Tarnower, was shot to death at his home in Purchase, N.Y. Jean Harris was arrested and later convicted of the crime.

In 1985, Soviet leader Konstantin U. Chernenko died at age 73.

In 1987, the Vatican issued a 40-page document on scientific techniques involving procreation, condemning such practices as surrogate motherhood, test-tube births and cloning.

Ten years ago: President Jimmy Carter arrived in Israel after three days of talks in Egypt with President Anwar Sadat. Earlier that same day, Carter had spoken to the Egyptian parliament, becoming the first American president to address that body.

Five years ago: In his fourth victory over Walter F. Mondale, Democratic presidential hopeful Gary Hart won the Wyoming caucuses, following his victories in New Hampshire, Maine and Vermont.

One year ago: New York Congressman Jack Kemp dropped out of the race for the 1988 Republican presidential nomination, saying, "We have not failed, because our ideas are winning."

# Tower rejection hurts Senate

DALLAS (AP) - Some of John Tower's allies say the Senate's rejection of his nomination as defense secretary cast a new set of standards upon politicians.

The White House said President Bush will move quickly to submit a replacement nominee to the Senate, but Gov. Bill Clements said Thursday that Tower's qualifications couldn't be matched.

"It is unfortunate that the Senate has rejected such a talented individual whose knowledge and background in defense matters is unparalleled," said Clements, who served as deputy

secretary of defense from 1973-1977.

Republican Sen. Phil Gramm of Texas said Tower's defeat was a loss to the state and the nation.

The Senate's 53-47 vote Thursday ended a week of cutting debate which focused on Tower's drinking habits, behavior toward women and lucrative consultant contracts with defense companies.

L. Brent Bozell, executive director of the Arlington Va.-based Conservative Victory Committee, which bought newspaper advertisements in support of Tower, said, "The ground rules for politics have officially changed."

"What I'm saying is that well-known womanizers and drunks voted against Tower," Bozell said. "And that will be an issue in their own re-election campaigns."

Paul Eggers, part of the Tower, Eggers and Greene consulting firm in Dallas that Tower left when Bush nominated him for the defense post, said he was disgusted with the senators who voted against the nominee.

"I'm deeply hurt for John because I know what this meant to him," Eggers said. "He'd been heading toward this post for 15 years. It's tragic, not only for John but for the

country because I cannot think of anyone more qualified to be secretary of defense.

"But what irked me most was the senators playing holier-than-thou," Eggers said. "They've created an atmosphere that will be thrown back at them."

"I guess John Tower's unhappy experience proves again that adage, that in the politics of Washington, D.C., if you want to be sure that you always have a friend, you better buy a dog," Gramm said.

# Moscow protests expulsion of 'spy' military attache

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Soviet Union lodged a "resolute protest" over the expulsion of a military attache allegedly involved in a spy operation aimed at learning how the U.S. government protects computer secrets.

Lt. Col. Yuri Nikolayevich Pakhtusov, 35, was told to leave Thursday. An FBI investigation had led to his arrest Wednesday night, just a day after the Bush administration opened a high-level dialogue with the Soviet Union.

Pakhtusov was described by a U.S. source as a significant catch because he is a member of the Red Army's GRU intelligence arm. One official said Pakhtusov was caught "red-handed."

But the Soviet Embassy issued a statement saying the expulsion order "could be only qualified as a deliberate provocation against a Soviet diplomatic official."

It denied that Pakhtusov engaged in any wrongdoing and said the embassy has lodged a "resolute protest" with the State Department. State Department press officer Dennis Harter said the Soviet Embassy was informed that Pakhtusov was being expelled for "activities incompatible with his diplomatic status."

According to one government source, Pakhtusov was asked to leave by Saturday.

In Vienna on Tuesday, Secretary of State James A. Baker III met for the first time with Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze and announced plans for a visit to Moscow in May.

The FBI probe was set in motion in August, two months after Pakhtusov's arrival, when he approached an American employee of a company that deals in classified information.

The American, who was not identified, reported the contact to the FBI, which began monitoring contacts between the two.

There is growing evidence that the Soviets are placing high priority on gaining access to Western computers with sensitive military, nuclear and space research information stored inside them.

A week ago, West German authorities charged a computer hacker with espionage and said a total of eight people were suspected of selling sensitive computer data from the United States and allied countries to the Soviets from 1986 through last year.

The German action was described

by officials as the first confirmed case of Soviet computer espionage. A State Department official, who asked not to be identified, said there was no connection between the German and Pakhtusov cases.

# Mexican president going strong

MEXICO CITY (AP) - Carlos Salinas de Gortari marks the 100th day of his presidency today politically stronger than during his protest-marred inauguration because of a carrot-and-stick approach that has earned the grudging respect of his critics.

The bald, mustachioed 40-year-old economist has widened his support with measures aimed at restoring economic confidence and political stability in advance of vital negotiations over Mexico's foreign debt.

"He has gained credibility," said Pablo Emilio Madero, former presidential candidate and a leader of the conservative National Action Party, the country's second largest behind the government's Institutional Revolutionary Party, or PRI.

Salinas took office after a fraud-marred election in which he polled barely more than 50 percent. The PRI ended up with a 260-240 margin in Congress, its lowest ever, and a vocal leftist coalition predicted he wouldn't last.

But the coalition put together by PRI dissident Cuauhtemoc Cardenas has ebbed into infighting. On the right, Salinas undercut conservatives by moving against corruption, towards a free economy and improving government relations with the Roman Catholic church.

"Salinas has more political strength now than he did at the start of his administration," said Jorge Arambide, director of an association of business chambers in the northern state of Nuevo Leon. "He has struck some spectacular blows with the purpose of getting massive popular support he did not have in the elections."

Salinas' popularity soared in January, when he cracked down on corrupt oil union leaders once considered invulnerable. He showed an even hand by also jailing top businessmen accused of shady dealing during the 1987 stock market crash.

Top union leaders used to dictating to their workers now face strong internal dissent encouraged by the government. On the other side of the fence, businessmen are being told to pay taxes or go to prison.

Salinas appeased those on the far left by firing a hard-line police official and releasing political prisoners, acknowledging their existence for the first time.

He also pledged to wean his party from its chronic use of state resources in election campaigns and rigging votes - pledges still questioned by the opposition.

"He is making decisions," said Jesus Cantu, director of the independent newspaper *El Porvenir*. "The question is whether the decisions will result in something good or turn out to be just a little makeup."

Salinas' most immediate problem is the foreign debt, set by the World Bank at \$107.4 billion. Salinas wants to halve annual payments, which totaled \$14 billion last year, to free funds to resume economic growth.

The economy has been stagnant for six years, and Salinas is under pressure from a growing population that has seen its standard of living drop steadily and needs one million new jobs a year.

"To us growth is the challenge and the foreign debt is the obstacle," said presidential press officer Otto Gramados.

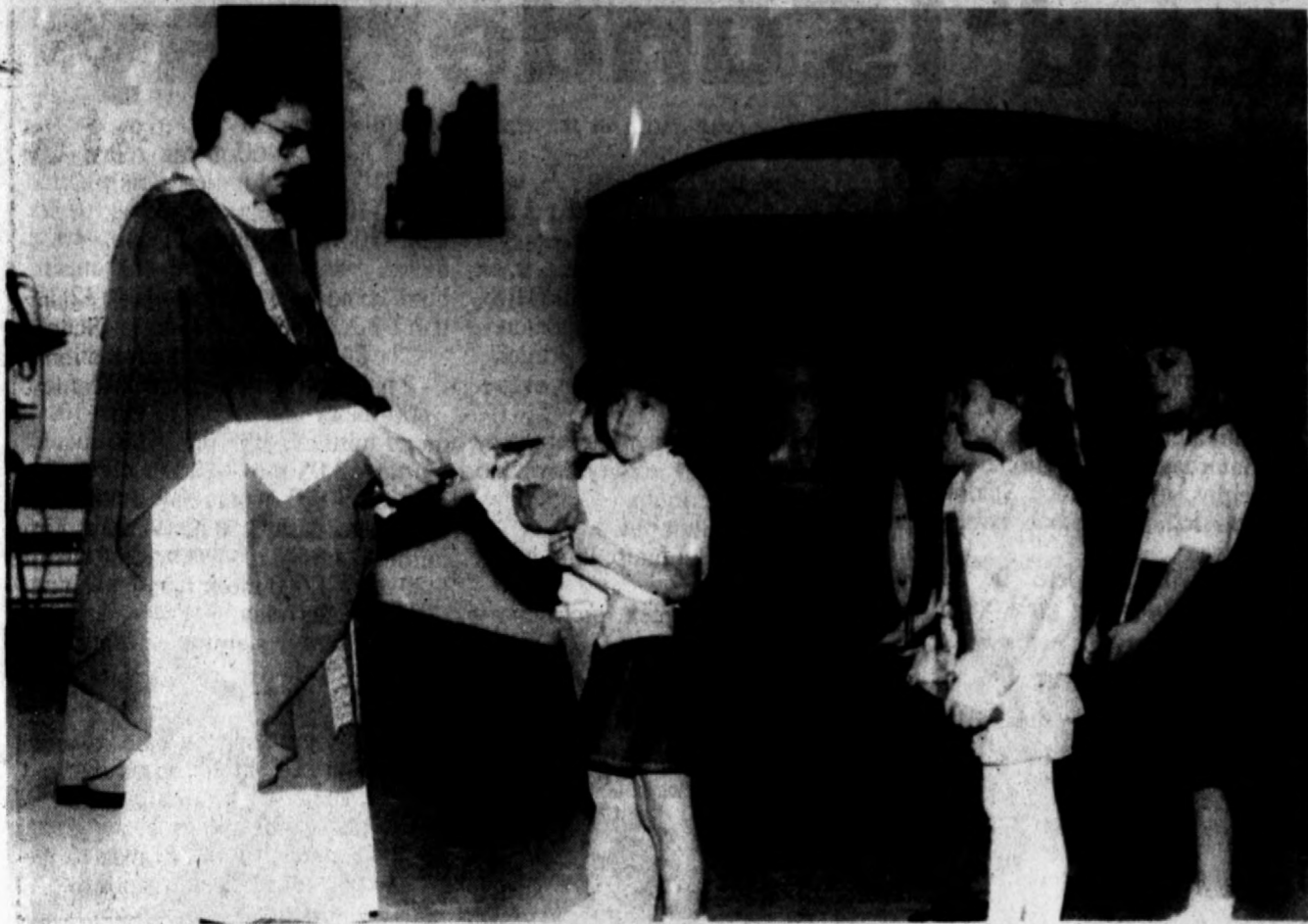

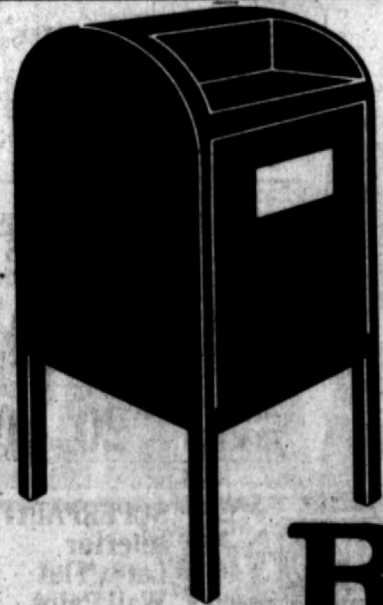

## Rangers seek new offer

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) - The spring meeting of major league owners left the Texas Rangers looking for another buyer and cities interested in expansion looking worried.

Outgoing Commissioner Peter Ueberroth said Thursday that some owners have requested that the expansion process be delayed and the American League once again rejected Edward Gaylord's bid to purchase a majority interest in the Rangers.

Gaylord, who owns 33 percent of the Rangers, was trying to buy controlling interest from Eddie Chiles.

Gaylord also was rejected in a bid to purchase a majority interest in the team three years ago.

"Right now, it's too early to say anything, but the numbers (votes) were bad," Chiles said.

Chiles added that he had given up any hope of selling the team to Gaylord.

American League owners were concerned over Gaylord's ties to television and the potential of more superstations.

"Edward Gaylord is a class man," Chiles said.

When asked if Gaylord was rejected again because of his connection to television, AL president Bobby Brown said, "Basically that's true. The same criteria applied."

Brown would not disclose the vote. Gaylord, however, has the right of first refusal over any deal Chiles' makes.

Brown said he didn't know if that would pose a problem. "That's a legal question."

Brown and Ueberroth have made efforts recently to find other parties interested in buying the Rangers in the Dallas-Fort Worth area.

"There's a lot of mind-changing going on (in Texas)," Ueberroth said. "I frankly have to take a deep breath. There are still some independent actions I can take."

Ueberroth, who leaves office on March 31, has indicated he would prefer that the team be sold to a group headed by George W. Bush, the son of President Bush, and Edward "Rusty" Rose.

The Rangers' sale was the main topic at the AL meeting, but both leagues had expansion on the agenda.

In recent weeks both, Ueberroth and incoming Commissioner A. Bartlett Giamatti have said there was a timetable for expansion targeted for the early 1990s.

Cities that have expressed interest include Denver, Washington, Tampa Bay, Fla., and Buffalo, N.Y.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I live in Stockton, Calif. A great many people who had never heard of Stockton became aware of us recently when a psychopath shot five little children to death and wounded 29 others. He then turned the gun on himself, which seems to be the style these days.

The drifter responsible for this carnage bought a AK-47 rifle in Oregon last summer for \$300. In case you don't know much about weapons, I will tell you that it can fire 600 rounds in one minute.

How can a mentally deranged person like that get to own such a weapon? It's simple. The National Rifle Association has one of the richest and most powerful lobbies in Washington and they say it is the right of every American to "bear arms." Never mind that some of these Americans are high on drugs or just plain crazy.

A spokesman for the National Rifle Association appeared on NBC's "Today" show after the shooting. He sounded like an escapee from the loony bin. I could not believe my ears when I heard him blame the judges and law-enforcement officers. He said that if they had done their jobs, the killer would have been in jail instead of

running around loose killing children.

It seems as if we are becoming an increasingly violent, gun-happy society and I fear for the future. Do you see any answers out there, Ann? What can we do about this horrendous problem?—A.D., Stockton, Calif.

DEAR A.D.: You can write your senators and congressman and put the heat on. Let them know that you will not vote to re-elect them if they support the National Rifle Association. Sign your name.

Joseph Cosco, a staff writer of the Virginian-Pilot in Norfolk, brought home the severity of the problem when he published this list:

Dec. 3-A man driving home with his wife after celebrating their 29th wedding anniversary was shot and killed by a motorist on the Nimitz Freeway near downtown Oakland. The assailant said he wanted the traffic to go faster because a passenger in his car had to go to the bathroom.

Dec. 16-A distraught 15-year-old student killed one teacher and wounded another at Atlantic Shores Christian School in Virginia Beach.

Jan. 17-A drifter in combat gear opens fire on a schoolyard in Stockton, Calif., killing five and wounding 29.

Jan. 20-Gunfire erupts outside the Old Dominion University

fieldhouse after a high school basketball game. Two are wounded.

Jan. 23-A disgruntled employee wounds the body shop manager and another worker at a Norfolk car dealership before killing himself.

The experts, Cosco said, blame increased violence on a number of factors, including more stress, the glorification of brute force in the media, and the erosion of moderating influences such as family and religion.
