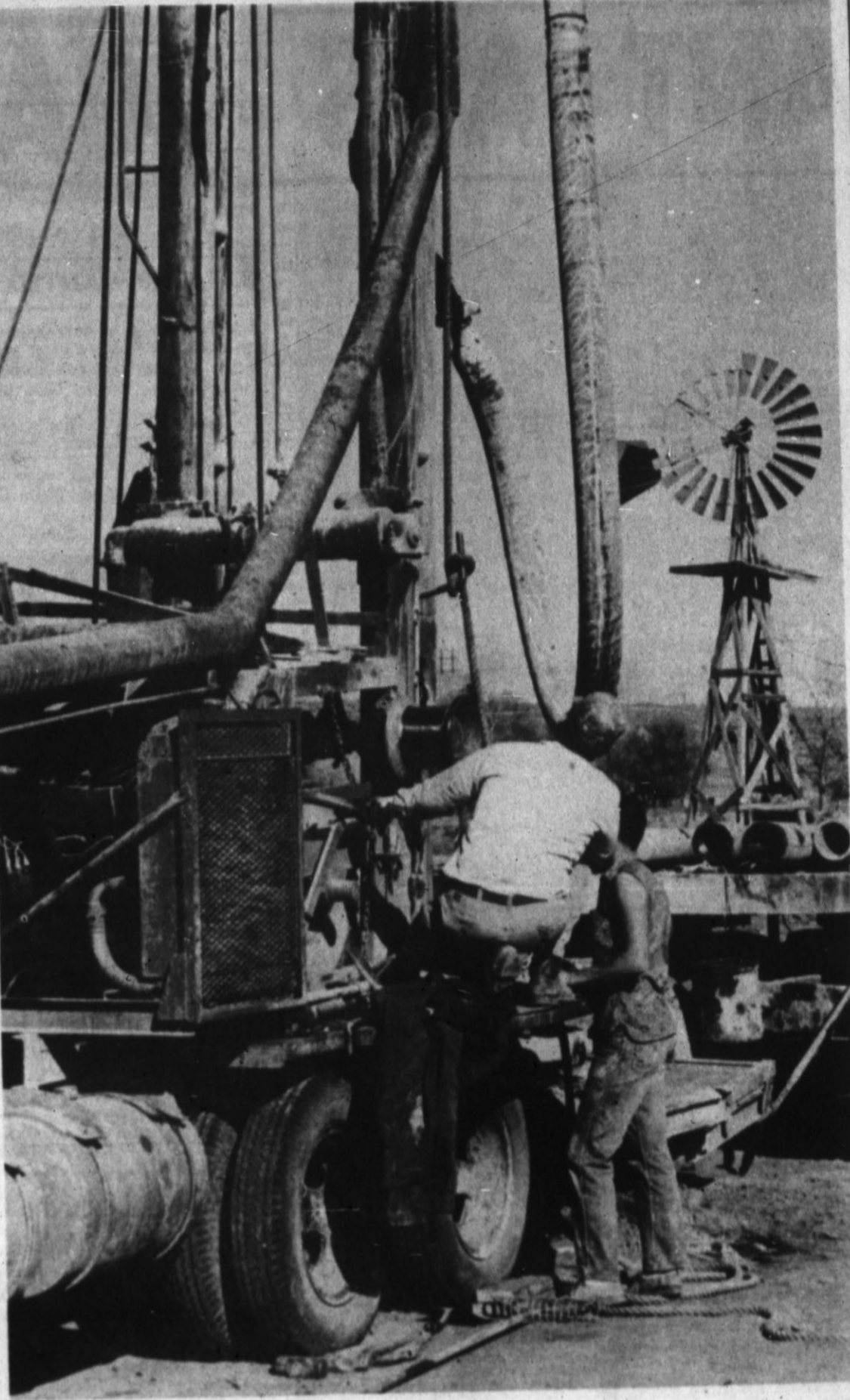
Explaining the need and operations of the organization were Clee Meharg, third vice president of the board of directors and Omar Hermesmeyer, president.

Youth Asked To 'Rethink' Their Purpose For Future

Students at Hereford High School were challenged to "rethink" their ideals concerning their purpose in life as an internationally known speaker appeared in a special assembly at the school on Tuesday morning.

"All Americans, and especially the youth of this nation, must revive their thinking. We must believe as strongly in our faith as the Communists believe in their faith," declared Mrs. Geraldine Conway.

An internationally known religious leader and youth worker, Mrs. Conway was in Hereford to speak at a Christian Fellowship Retreat which was held at the Wesley Methodist Church.

A world traveler, she has spoken to groups in many countries, including India, Japan, and Cuba.

In her speech at Hereford High School, she urged students to take a strong stand against communism, and then warned, "Communists have a faith... true it is a belief that there is no God, but yet it is a 'faith' she explained.

"Americans have a faith... it is a faith in God. But in recent years there has been an ironic wrong. Communists have gained control of millions of people through making them believe a lie.

"Communism is winning a battle with a lie, while we Americans are losing with the truth," commented the speaker.

"Communism uses hate as a weapon. They are teaching the people of other countries to hate Americans and what this country stands for. They are teaching that there is no God," she explained.

Mrs. Conway then pointed to a statement recently made by Dr. Billy Graham, quoting him as saying, "People in foreign countries have seen the high living standards of American people, they have seen our fine cars... they have seen our beautiful homes... and they have seen our televisions... but the one thing that foreigners have not seen, and the thing that they yearn to see, is the wonderful spiritual life which Americans once had."

"Foreign people look to the United States as a 'little bit of heaven on earth,'" Mrs. Conway stated. "We must strive to revive this image before the world.

"Communists are trying to blur this image, and they are succeeding in many cases," she added, relating her experiences in Cuba and other countries.

"I have traveled in many countries which are the target of communist aggression. In these countries, people are beginning to lose faith in America. I was in Cuba in 1960, before it was openly proclaimed a communist country.

"When Fidel Castro was climbing to power, he promised the Cuban people the things which Americans enjoy. The Cubans believed him. Now that country is communist, but there are some people who have not become communists.

"These are the ones who were Christians. Christians cannot become communists, because the two are opposite.

"Many people have the impression that 'the American way' is the opposite of communism. This is not altogether true, although many of the symptoms of being opposite are there.

"The only true opposite of communism is Christianity," declared the speaker. "For this reason, Americans must 'rethink' their ideas about their beliefs.

"Our country was founded by people who stood up for what they believe, and it became the greatest nation in the world because our leaders proclaimed to believe in God.

"Anymore, it seems that anyone who really strives to lead a proper life is considered by some people to be one of 'these,' she declared, making the teenagers' sign of a "square" with her hands.

"It seems to be the popular thing to have just a little bit of a 'bad streak'.

"Let me tell you some things I have seen which show that the trend is changing," Mrs. Conway continued. "Only a few weeks ago I was at Checkpoint Charlie, the crossing point between East and West Berlin in the Communist Wall of Shame.

"I carried with me an anti-communist film showing some young Cubans... not the young Cuban communists, but a group of teenagers who were fighting against communism in their country.

"The people in this film are Christians. In the film, they tell viewers why they will never become communists — because

students in the audience. "And so I urge you, no matter whether you are Protestant, Catholic, or Jew, to ask yourself a question: 'What am I doing in life?'"

"And I urge you then to put forth every effort to make your faith count for something, don't hide it under a bushel. If you will believe in your faith, whatever it may be, as strongly as the Communists believe in their no-God faith, many of the problems in the world will be solved."

The young Cubans also say that no one would become a communist if he had the opportunity to become a Christian. Young people, if we can take Christianity to others, we need not worry about communism ruling the world.

"Another example of young people rebelling against loss of freedom which I saw more recently was in an American high school. Students in this school gathered together for a morning prayer and devotional to begin each day.

"Their program was not set up by adults or school officials, it is directed entirely by the young people. There is nothing compulsory about the devotional, but these students are attempting to do something good... and no one is laughing at them.

"And what was more impressive, it was the young men of the school who were taking the lead in the program, not the girls. If this would happen in more places more often there would be a chain-reaction which might change the course of history.

In conclusion, Mrs. Conway challenged the more than 450

Shop Class Gives Practical Training

There are five shop classes at Stanton Junior High, including two eighth and three ninth grade classes. These are taught by Mr. P. M. Miller.

Purpose of the shop is to teach students the proper use, care and safety precautions of the various drawing instruments, hand tools, and power machines. By doing this the students have some mechanical knowledge for the future, no matter what their profession may be.

During the past 12 weeks of eighth and ninth grade shop classes have been studying mechanical drawing. This involves the use of drawing pencils, the drawing board, compass, T-square, various triangles, and the architectural scale.

Students are given certain problems to draw. With individual help from the teacher, and

class discussions, students are able to learn the proper use and care of these instruments.

Students also learn how to read a working drawing. This they must be able to do in order to build a project in wood shop. Shop classes will begin bench woodworking this six weeks. This class will involve the use of hand tools only. Eighth grade students have only one semester of shop, therefore, they will not be able to do any machine woodworking until they are in the ninth grade.

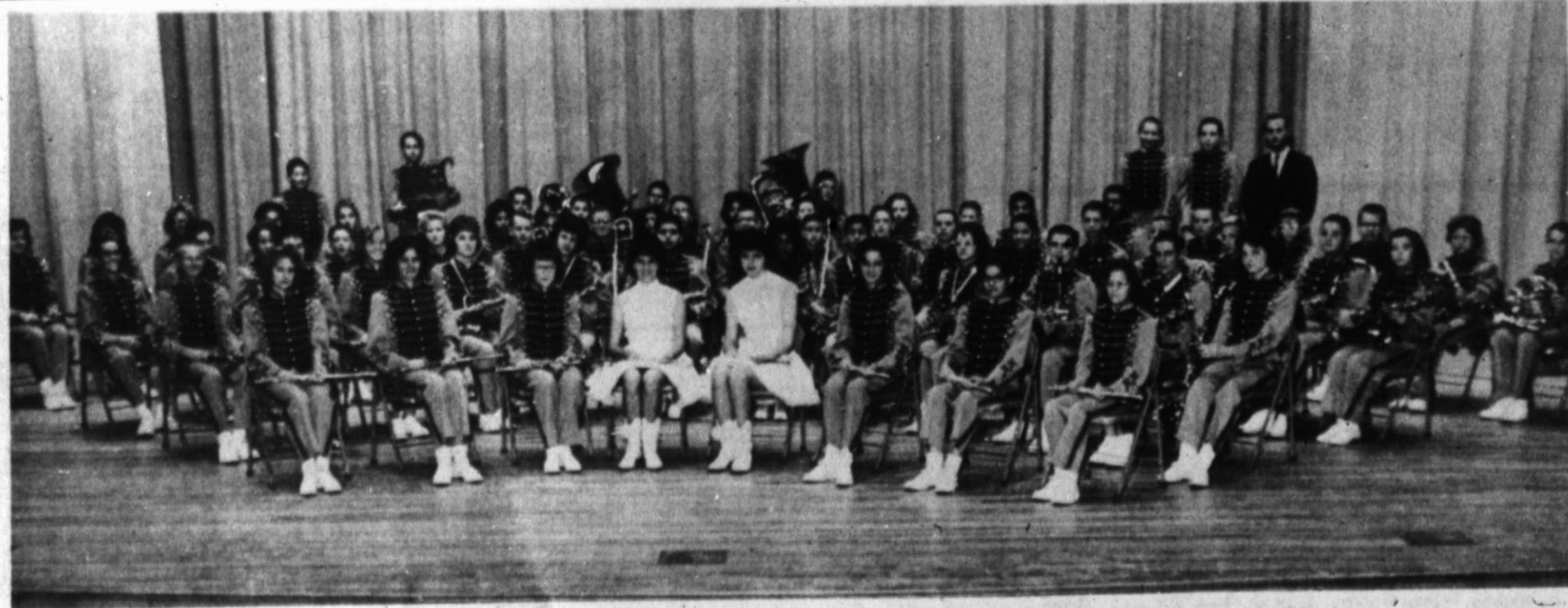
In both classes emphasis is placed on hand tools and smaller projects. No project will be larger than a coffee table or end-table. These projects are limited because the student must be able to use hand tools well before he can safely and effectively use power tools. (Continued on page 10)

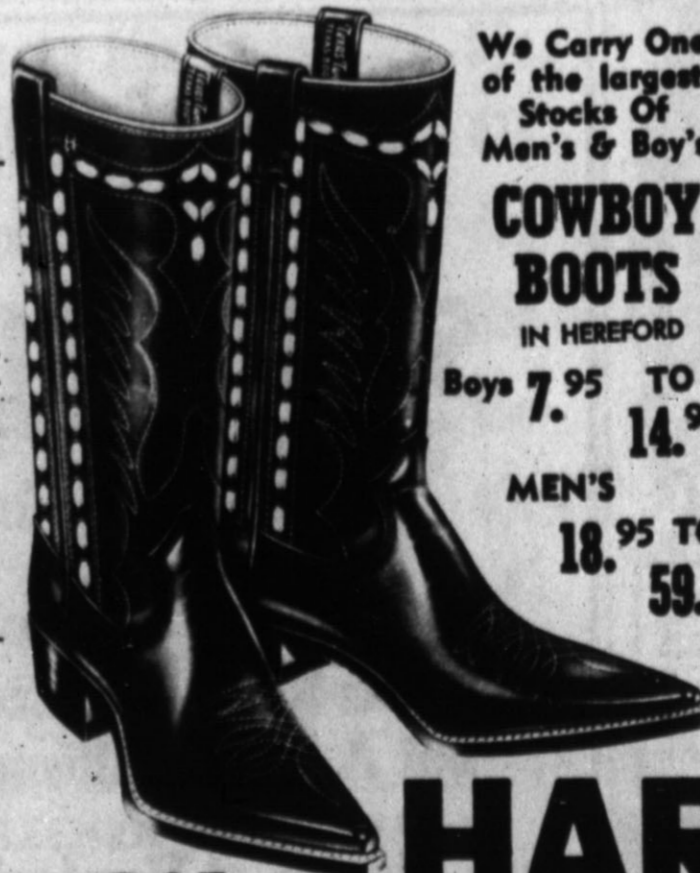

FONDANT

- 6 c. sugar
1 c. white corn syrup
1 c. water

Mix together and cook with a lid on the kettle until candy tests a very soft ball. Pour up into large platter and let cool until you can hold your hand on top of the candy. Then beat and beat and beat until mixture creams. Put into jar or pot with a lid, cover and let sit at least 24 hours.

It is best to cook fondant in a stainless steel or enamel kettle. Do not use aluminum.

Here's an original carrot recipe by Gladys Miller.

CARROTS SUPREME

- 12 large carrots
1 cup raisins (wash in not water)
Make a syrup with:
1/2 cup sugar
1 t. salt
1/4 cup butter

Cover carrots with water, stew until tender - Place carrots alternately in baking dish. Put raisins down center. Glaze with syrup. Bake in oven about 15 minutes.

1963 Sugar Beet Wage Rate, Price Hearings Set

A series of public hearings on wage rates and prices for the 1963 sugar beet crop have been set, according to an announcement from the U. S. Department of Agriculture this week.

Hearings for this area is slated to be held on Friday, Dec. 7, in Denver, Colo. The session will be held in the Century Room of the Cosmopolitan Hotel beginning at 9:30 a. m.

The series of hearings will be considered as one hearing, and testimony at each will become a part of the record.

In order to obtain the best possible information, USDA requests that all interested person appear at the hearings to express views and present information regarding fair wages and prices.

It was pointed out in the announcement that one condition which sugar beet growers must meet to qualify for payments under the Sugar Act of 1948 is to pay fair wages.

The wage rates to be paid may not be less than those determined by Secretary of Agriculture after public hearing and investigation, stated the announcement.

Cotton Market Quota Vote Set For December 11

Deaf Smith County cotton producers will vote Tuesday, Dec. 11 in a national referendum establishing marketing quotas on the 1963 crop, according to Frank Bezner, county chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

All farmers and their wives who have produced a cotton crop in 1962 are eligible to vote in the upcoming referendum, commented the county committee chairman.

According to Bezner, voting places for the various ASCS communities in the county are: Community "A", Dawn School, Communities "B" and "C", Commissioners' Boardroom, County Courthouse, and Community "D", Ford Community House.

Individual allotments producers will be given to area producers before the Dec. 11 referendum, he declared.

If the referendum is approved by two-thirds of the growers voting, price supports for the 1963 upland cotton crop ranging from 65 to 90 per cent of parity will be available to those complying with their allotments.

Marketing quota penalties will be set on any excess cotton produced on the farm.

If the referendum fails to pass by the required two-thirds vote, the allotment program will remain in effect, but price supports to cooperators will be at 50 per cent of parity.

Beginning in 1954, growers have approved marketing quotas on each year's crop. This year will mark the tenth consecutive year that growers have voted on quotas.


