

## **Farmers To Vote On Price Support** In Referendum

Upland cotton producers voting in the national referendum to be held on Tuesday, Dec. 11, will be voting for comparatively high price supports and market-ing quota penalties or 50 per cent price support and no penalties, commented Faust Collier, local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office manager.

Producers will not be voting for or against allotments, he added. These have already been set by the Secretary of Agriculture under provisions of the A-gricultural Adjustment Act as amended.

If two - thirds of the producers in the nation favor quotas, they will be in effect on the 19-63 cotton crop. Marketing penalites will apply to excess cot-

Price supports ranging between 65 and 90 per cent of parity will be available to farmers who comply with their farm acreage allotments. However, if more than a third (Continued on page 10)

Farmers joining the program must comply and no changes in diverted acreage may be made after the Dec. 14 deadline.

If a producer withdraws from the program after the deadline he will lose price supports, diversion, and incentive payments even though he has planted within his allotment.

Under provisions of the 19-63 program, cattle may be grazed on diverted acreage fall seeded in wheat and barley until May 1, 1963. A11 wheat on the acreage must then be plowed under and put to conservation practices.


Also to be commended were volunteers from the Deaf Smith County Red Cross chapter and members of the La Madre Mia Study Club, who aided in many ways.

## Follow Rules Of Gun Safety

This is the time of year when homebound office workers suddenly are transformed into latter-day Daniel Boones, intent upon putting meat on the table ...

Fall offers excellent hunting opportunities, with different game and birds coming into season almost every week.

Also approaching is the time of year when many youngsters look forward to owning their own gun.

With these facts in mind, it seems appropriate to cover a few basic points about guns and hunting, in order that the Brand will not have to write about one of the hunting accidents, including what seems to be the inevitable phrase, "Mr. ---said he thought he was shooting at a deer (substitute turkey, goose or any other hunting objective)".

This year, Texas has had a series of hunting deaths, most of which may be attributed to a lack of caution.

As a reminder for the veteran hunters and as a guide for those who will be getting their first guns, we'd like to pass along these Ten Commandments of Safety: 1. Treat every gun with the respect due

a loaded gun. This is the first rule of gun safety. 2. Guns carried into camp or home, or

when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded and taken down or have actions open; guns always should be carried in cases to the shooting area.

3. Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from chamber before firing.

4. Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle even if you stumble; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.

5. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.

6. Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay while handling a gun.

7. Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.

8. Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull à gun toward you by the muzzle.

9. Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water; when at target practice, be sure your backstop is adequate.

10. Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

Remember that a gun is made of metal and wood. It has no mind. Guns don't hurt people; but people sometimes do . . with guns;

Selling To The Public At "Wholesale"

Some catalog houses sell to retailers at prices properly described as "wholesale." Some catalog houses sell to both the retail trade and directly to the public. The Federal Trade Commission has found that statements made in catalogs distributed to individual members of the public falsely represented that the firm sold all merchandise at wholesale prices. In one recent complaint the Commission charged that the wholesale prices used by a catalog house and the alleged retail prices with which they were compared exceeded the usual retail prices generally charged. for merchandise in the trade area where the claims were made. The differences between the advertisers coded and retail prices did not represent savings from generally prevailing retail prices, the complaint charged.

A comparative price used as the basis for a savings claim for a particular product property should be either the current going price for the article in all the trading areas to which the catalog is circulated, or the regular and usual selling price of the catalog house immediately prior to reduction. The language used to describe the comparative price should indicate which type of price it is. If a catalog is distributed in nany trade areas it is quite possible that the current going price may vary from area to area. It is inaccurate in such cases to base a savings claim from a current going price which does not exist in each area to which the catalog is distributed. **Real Versus Mythical Savings**

Dear editar:

I don't know where they get the figures, I know they don't use any of mine, but some government experts come out once a month with a report on what the cost of living index was the previous month.

Under this system, if the cost of living goes up so many points as it has for the past several years, certain wage earners get an automatic increase in pay.

I was reading the figures for the past month and noticed that among the people getting an automatic increase were farm equipment workers. What I would like to know is why don't these experts figure out a way to give us farmers an automatic pay increase that's tied in with the economic index? It's the only way to meet the increased cost of farm equipment resulting from the increased pay for the farm equipment workers. It wouldn't be too hard to do. Since we don't get paid by the hour, it would have to be figured on a yearly basis, but I'd agree to wait till the end of the year for my check.

As I understand it, the value of a dollar fluctuates, it's not the same today as it was last month or last year, and this program is designed to see that workers get a living wage. When a dollar buys less, they get more dollars; when a dollar buys more, they get a little less, although this latter situation hasn't come up so far in the last 25 years. A living wage is not enough to get by on these days. It takes more than that. At least, there aren't very many people left willing to try it.
