### County Entries Place At Show Held In Houston

Deaf Smith County entries in the Junior Livestock Show and the Junior Commercial Steer Show of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo held recently placed in all divisions entered.

Competing with entries from other Texas areas and surrounding states were Larry Minks and Becky Higgins, both 4-H members, and members of the Future Farmers of America, Jackie Andrews, Joe Shultz, Steve Conaway, Edward Allison and Pat Smith.

The Hereford calf shown by Minks placed third in the lightweight division of the show with the Higgins' calf showing 20th and making the sale.

In the lightweight division of the show, approximately 100 calves had been entered. The division was described as "one of the roughest divisions of the entire show."

Lefty Thomas, county agent, said, "The division was excellent. An Angus calf, shown in the middleweight division by Jackie Andrews, FFA member, placed third. He was the only FFA entry in the calf show.

Other FFA members were entered in the Junior Commercial Steer Show. Shultz pen of 10 were graded good with five Angus shown by Smith in the pen of five rated good. Allison's entry in the pen of ten rated five good and five standard with Conaway showing one good and two standard in the pen of three division.

Pat Smith and Joe Shultz placed high in records for the show, according to Jess Robinson, vocational agriculture teacher. Records included the feeding of the animal and the economy of the program.

A detailed report outlining the activities of the Hereford Police Department for 1961 showing a marked decline in criminal arrests, increased patrol activities, and a 90 per cent conviction rate in traffic cases has been presented to the City Commission.

The report pointing out patrol activities averaging six miles per hour per unit was read at the regular Commission meeting here Monday night by Henry Aycock, chief of police.

In the covering letter accompanying the report, Aycock wrote: "I am very pleased with the 'Best in Texas' award that we were recently honored with in regard to traffic safety. I know that engineering, legislation and enforcement made the award possible."

(The award was recently presented to the chief of police for the outstanding safety record compiled in the city during 1960. No traffic fatalities were recorded during the period.)

He also called to the attention of the Commissioners the "marked reduction of intoxication arrests in relation to the preceding year."

According to the report, criminal arrests involving intoxicants showed a reduction during the year. Driving while intoxicated arrests dropped from 42 in 1960 to 15 in 1961 as drunk in auto arrests declined from 22 to 10.

Arrests involving liquor violations showed almost 50 per cent decline during the year with 23 persons arrested. In 1960 arrests totaled 43.

"The number of persons arrested for being drunk tumbled from a high of 248 recorded in 1960 to a low of 147, the lowest figure since 1957, according to the report.

Convictions in drunk cases were also high during the year as well as convictions on other offenses committed in the city. However, convictions for driving while intoxicated, drunk pedestrian, and drunk in auto totaled approximately 100 per cent.

According to the report, 16 persons were charged with DWI, 15 were tried with 15 convictions. One hundred and (Continued on Page 6)

## Herd Edges Plainview, 4-3; Plays Two Here With Pampa

Timely hits, including three extra base blows in the last of the seventh, enabled the Hereford Whitefaces to win their first baseball game of the season here Tuesday afternoon.

Trailing all the way, the Whitefaces finally rallied for three runs to beat the Plainview Bulldogs 4-3.

On Friday the Whitefaces will play host to another 3-AAAA team, the Pampa Harvesters, in their opener. The two teams have slated a doubleheader with the first game starting at 2 p.m. One of the games likely will be abbreviated to five innings.

Although it was the first game of the season here Tuesday, you would never know it from the pitching which approached midseason form.

And the hitting was pretty well limited until the bottom of the seventh, when Hereford trailed 1-4. John Buck doubled and sophomore catcher Eugene Green, a pinchhitter, slammed a screaming homer over the left fence to tie the game. Arnold Powell singled and Dan McDowell doubled. With one out, Joe Mack Hale laid down a squeeze bunt as Powell beat

the tag at home for the winning score.

As the game opened, first baseman Tommy Thomas of Plainview put his team ahead with a home run over the center field barrier.

With two down in the bottom of the inning, Arnold Powell sliced down the right field line and McDowell doubled. Bill Steele walked to load the sacks, but the Herd was unable to score.

Plainview's Dwaine Ritter tallied in the third after drawing a base on balls. He moved around on a single and a fielder's choice. The Bulldogs put runners on second and third in the fourth inning, but were

stranded there.

In the last of the fourth, Hereford picked up a single run as Ronny Duncan got on by error with two out. He scored on another error and a single by John Buck.

Plainview picked up its third run in the top of the seventh as Thomas walked and moved around on a single and an error.

Trailing by two, Hereford showed its power as Buck doubled into left field just before Green's homer, which marked his first appearance in high school baseball.

## City Approves Annexations On First Reading At Meet

City Commissioners meeting in an abbreviated session here Monday passed three annexation petitions on first reading and heard the annual report on activities of the Hereford Police Department.

The petitions for annexation were submitted by Wayne Wallace, the Hereford Rural High School District and the Hereford Area Foundation.

The area included in the petitions includes a new subdivision, the site of the Methodist home and school property adjoining the northwest section of the city.

Commissioners unanimously approved all three petitions. However, the petitions must be approved at the next two meetings before the area is taken into the city.

The annual report submitted by Henry Aycock, chief of police, outlined in detail the activities of his department during 1961.

Information included in the report showed that patrol activities had increased during the year with the arrest rate for criminal offenses dropping.

Offenses involving drinking also showed a marked decline during the year, but juvenile arrests had increased.

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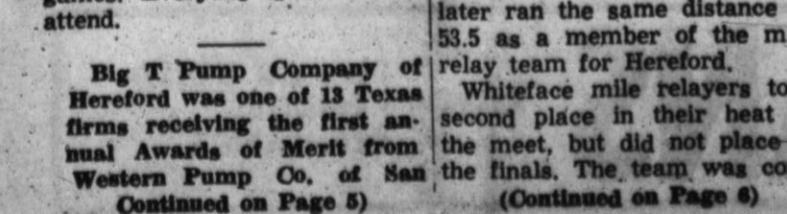

REP. ROGERS WRITES

Col. John Glenn Lauded For Orbital Space Flight

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18th DISTRICT:

February 20, 1962, saw a new personality cross the horizon. This personality crossed the horizon as a contributor in the advance of civilization.

He was to this Nation in 1962 what Christopher Columbus should have been in Spain in 1492. Actually he exemplifies Christopher Columbus, the Mayflower, the Pilgrims, Robert Fulton, Lewis and Clark, Sam Houston, the early pioneers of the West, the Wright brothers, Marconi, Lindbergh, and all the other pioneers rolled into one.

He came to the Nation's Capitol in a great display of fanfare and ceremony. He visited with the President of the greatest Nation in the history of mankind and paraded from the White House to the Capitol to address a joint meeting of the Congress of the United States, a distinction usually reserved for the heads of state.

It might be added that at that joint meeting of the Congress, the representatives of heads of state all over the world were crowded into the Chamber, along with the Members of the President's Cabinet, the Justices of the Supreme Court, and the Joint Chiefs of Staff of the Defense Department.

The galleries were packed and jammed and standing room tickets were exhausted within minutes after it was announced that this pioneer of outer space would address the National Congress and that his fellow teammates, including two other pioneers of outer space, Alan Shepherd and Gus Grissom, would be present.

All of this was happening to a lieutenant colonel in the Marine Corps of the United States. The eyes and ears of the world were trained on Washington to see what this new hero looked like, and to hear what he had to say. He was escorted into the Chamber by a committee appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President pro tem of the Senate.

The House members were Mr. Albert of Oklahoma, Mr. Boggs of Louisiana, Mr. Vinson of Georgia, Mr. Miller of California, Mr. Halleck of Indiana, Mr. Arends of Illinois, and Mr. Martin of Massachusetts.

The Senate members of the committee were Mr. Mansfield of Montana, Mr. Russell of Georgia, Mr. Kerr of Oklahoma, Mr. Fulbright of Arkansas, Mr. Dirksen of Illinois, Mr. Saltonstall of Massachusetts, Mr. Wiley of Wisconsin, and Mr. Kuchel of California.

NEEDLESS TO SAY, COL.

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Glenn's entry into the Chamber brought everyone to their feet in a spontaneous and tremendous blast of applause. It took some time to stop the applause. It was then that the Speaker introduced his newborn hero in these terms: "Members of the Congress, it is a privilege, and I deem it a high honor to present to you a brave, a courageous American, a hero in World War II and in the Korean conflict, who recently in a most notable manner added glory and prestige to our country, the first U. S. astronaut to have achieved orbital flight, Lt. Col. John H. Glenn Jr., U. S. Marine Corps."

This brought forth the second round of applause, which lasted longer than the first.

Lt. Col. John H. Glenn then proceeded to address the joint meetings of Congress for a period of 15 minutes. His remarks, although confined to a very short time, contained references to his reactions in this history-making episode, as well as references to his reactions both before and after the flight.

Perhaps the one that caused the greatest display of laughter in the Congress was his relation of his introduction to Caroline Kennedy and I quote for you his exact remarks taken from the Congressional Record:

"I think after all of our talk of space, this morning coming up from Florida on the plane with President Kennedy, we had the opportunity to meet Mrs. Kennedy and Caroline before we took off. I think Caroline really cut us down to size and put us back in the proper position. She looked up, upon being introduced, and said, 'Where's the monkey?' And I did not get a banana pellet on the whole ride."

All of this added up to a banner day in the history of this

great Country. How it appeared to others, I would not undertake to say, but to me it brought into the clearest focus the America that all of us love and the real strength upon which it is built. Many philosophers, educators, politicians, etc., have long debated as to what should come first to claim man's allegiance. Some say that the order of allegiance should be religion, country, family, and fellowman. Others take the position that one's country should come first, then his religion, then his family. Others take the position that fellowman should take precedence.

Of course, the Communists take the position that the country or state, whichever you prefer, comes before the family, and incidentally before everything else, because they have no religion. I subscribe to the philosophy that all of these attempts to separate and segregate these matters are nonsense. The fact is that a man's family, his country, and his religion are and should be so intertwined, interwoven, and so welded together that they constitute one.

I think this was so clearly established as the basic philosophy of this country when Lt.

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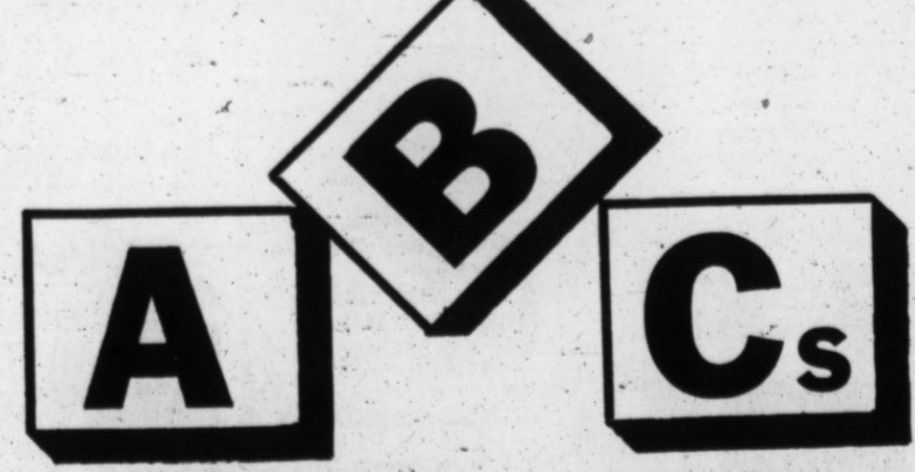

This is a pleasure that most people enjoy only in the summer months but the Alsups cook out the year around. Mrs. Alsup says, "Clyde particularly enjoys eating and cooking so Saturday, his day off from work, is generally his day to cook. Mike and I look forward to

some mighty good eating on that day." The Alsups will soon be leaving Hereford to make their home in Canyon where he is associated with an insurance firm. The recipes listed below are typical of a meal prepared outside by the members of the Alsup family.

**CLYDE'S BARBECUE SAUCE**  
8 ounce container  
4 ounces catsup  
2 tablespoons Worcestershire

**Sauce**  
1/4 teaspoon garlic salt  
1/4 teaspoon onion salt  
1/2 teaspoon smoke sauce  
1/4 teaspoon pepper

Fill container to 7 ounces full with ingredients and water. Shake until well mixed. Brush top of meat at least 30 minutes before placing on the charcoal grill.

Place meat on grill with side up which has sauce on it. Let bottom side brown well and turn, applying light coat of sauce to top of meat immediately after turning.

**BAKED BEANS**  
2 cans of pork and beans (2 pound size)  
4 tablespoons catsup  
4 tablespoons brown sugar  
1 small onion  
Dash of Worcestershire Sauce

Mix, place in covered baking dish and cook for one hour at 350 degrees. Top with melted cheese or crisp bacon strips.

**POTATO SALAD**  
4 medium sized potatoes  
2 hardboiled eggs  
1 small onion  
3 medium sized sweet pickles

Boil potatoes until done but not soft. Drain and dice. Chop other ingredients and add to potatoes. Add dressing and mix well. Salt and pepper to taste. Sprinkle paprika over the top.

**DRESSING FOR POTATO SALAD**  
1/2 cup mayonnaise  
1 teaspoon mustard  
2 tablespoons milk

Mix well and pour over salad.

**LEMON CHIFFON PIE**  
1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin  
1/4 cup cold water  
4 eggs, separated  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 cup lemon juice  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind

Soften gelatin in water for five minutes. Beat egg yolks and add 1/2 cup sugar, lemon juice and salt. Cook over boiling water until of custard consistency. Add lemon rind and softened gelatin and stir thoroughly. Cool. When mixture begins to thicken, fold in stiffly beaten egg whites to which remaining 1/2 cup of sugar has been added. Fill crumb shell and chill. Spread with whipped cream.

 ed, I knew nothing about cook-  
 ing and now can cook whole  
 meals by myself. In 1959, I won  
 a blue and a red ribbon and in  
 1960, I won a purple, 2 blues

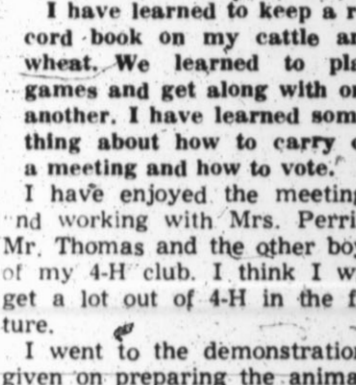
**JERRY TYLER**

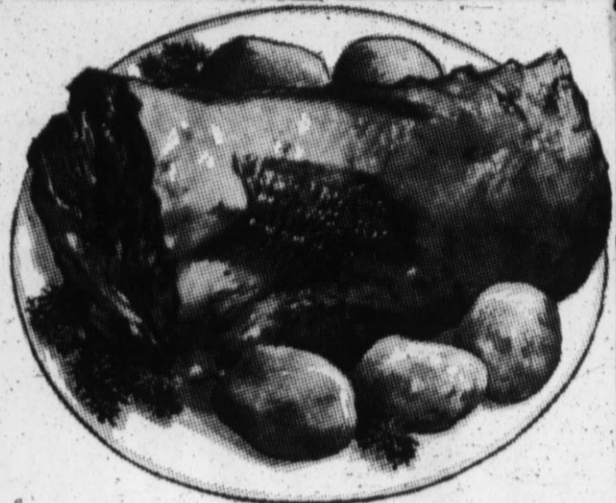
I had five acres of barley for a project. My daddy bought it from me for a dollar per bushel for seed. It made 60 bushels per acre.
