(1) We have a higher guaranteed price for beets through our contract than any of the other crops we grow in this

(2) The other crops we grow depend mainly on export market, while we only grow approximately one-half of the sugar we use in the United States. (3) Sugar beets stand hail better than

any other crop.

(4) According to information we get from all the grower associations, there will be a short sugar crop in 1974. We believe this will mean a higher price for

(5) With our new varieties, we believe we can produce from \$20 to \$50 an acre

more on beets. (6) We believe the records will show we can grow higher sugar with less water which will mean higher profit per acre.

# Milk Plant Begins Operations Here

Bright red and white delivery trucks may have already been noticed on the streets of Hereford announcing the opening of this city's newest business, Hereford Pure Milk Co., Inc. which

began operating recently. Open house for the industry, which processes its own milk and milk biproducts, is planned later this month or early in February by owner Hugh Kirkland.

"The open house will give people a chance to see what is involved in processing milk," Kirkland commented.

The company presently employs six persons and delivers the dairy products with the two trucks.

Kirkland said deliveries are made to stores and residents in Hereford, but that he plans to deliver to other nearby towns as the business grows.

The plant's facilities could easily produce from 6,000 to 7,000 gallons of milk each day he said. Raw milk is purchased from Associated Milk Producers, Inc. Kirkland explained that almost all milk plants in Texas buy milk from Associated Milk Producers, Inc.

"WE CAME because the people of Hereford deserve a fresh product, and because we feel the local people will support our business," Kirkland said.

milk cartons which currently displays the "Town Wilhout a Toothache" slogan. will change periodically to promote industry in Hereford.

Kirkland said that about \$100,000 has been invested in the industry for the milk-processing equipment and the building, which is located at U.S. 60 and Main Street

He said Bill Phipps, state inspector, is required by law to inspect the plants facilities once a month, but that he comes

by almost daily. 'He has tried to help us and any time there are questions, he has taken whatever time is required to find the

answer," Kirkland said. KIRKLAND, 44, is a native of Virginia,

but has lived in Amarillo since 1959. He earned a degree from Virginia Tech in 1951 with a major in dairy products. He served two years in the Army during the Korean War before working for Seal Test Foods as assistant superintendent of the Birmingham, Ala, plant, 5

He left Alabama in 1959 to work for Seal Test in Amarillo as superintendent. Kirkland is president of the Hereford Pure Milk Co., Inc., with Dr. C.J. Lambert of Dallas as vice-president; and

# Year-End Review Shows News Highlights

A year end review of the news highlights indicates an active past year for Hereford.

The 75th Diamond Jubilee Anniversary Celebration here during August was the major news event in the city during the past year. However, stories relating to the beef price freeze, fuel shortage, football team and industrial and economic growth also played major roles in the news during

Highlights of Hereford from the first half of 1973 apeared in Sunday's Brand and the following is a summary ccount of the news highlights during the months July-

Jim Hale took office as president when Hereford Lions Club installed new officers for the year ... The wheat harvest in Deal smith County was pronounced the 'most productive' in years, up as much as 50 per cent over the previous year.

Building permits for the past month were placed at \$1,081,480, including new school additions and buildings in a shopping center on West Park Ave.

A market news office was opened in Hereford, it was announced by John White, Texas Agriculture Comas area vegetable crops began to hit the market . . . The first annual Hereford Junior Olympic Preliminary Track Meet was held with 250 entrants, and three West Texas AAU division records were broken; Deaf Smith Chamber of Commerce sponsored the event.

CITY Commissioners approved leasing to county 4-H Clubs a tract of city land just southwest of town for use as motorcycle trails, with supervised riding specified . . . Flagwaving, marching, music, food and oratory with Americanism as its topic made up a July 4th celebration for Hereford Residents in Dameron Park; State Rep. Bill Clayton was the speaker.

Holes-in-one became almost ordinary at John Pitman Municipal Golf Course as Glen Bilbrey sunk the third of his career and Earl Springer his second, shortly after Bub Sparks rang up a second and Mike McWhorter his first . . . A new firm, Grain Handling Corp., located in Hereford with Wister Clevenger as manager.

STATISTICS of the Texas Civic Judicial Council showed the number of cases filed in district court in this county during 1972 down 4 per cent from the year before . . . Bank deposits were up substantially over the second quarter of 1972, Hereford banks reported at the summer bank call . . .

County Commissioners set the county tax rate the same as the past year in a session that saw the resignation of Charles Eppler as county road superintendent . . . Jimmy sesko was elected commander of the local American Legion post . . . Good rains fell over the county with 1.1 inches recorded in the city, more in Dawn and Easter communities.

OPENING of a milk processing and distributing plant, Hereford Pure Milk Co., in the near future was announced... Water usage increased sharply in the city, to almost 123 million gallors, with generally warm, dry weather . . . A

contract was awarded for \$350,182 to construct a library

building for the county

Luis R. Garcia of Lubbock was found guilty of the murder of his wife on a street in west Hereford, and sentenced to five years' imprisonment after a four-day trial in district court here . ... School board members approved sale of a \$150,000 unused bond issue as a move toward construction of a new elementary school building.

SANDY CAISON, Miss Hereford 1973, won her division of the talent contest in the Miss Texas pageant events at Fort Worth, representing this city . . Another Hereford girl, Sherry White, who was Miss Hereford 1972 and Miss Lubbock 1973, was in-top spot in her talent division and swim suit

Sheriff's deputies were given a pay raise in the form of a clothing allowance from County Commissioners, but Sheriff Travis McPherson asked for more . . . Hereford Whiteface gridders were rated a "building" team for the 1973 race ....

AUGUST

Eugene Suttle broke a state record and won the rocking chair marathon sponsored by Hereford Jaycees as a preliminary to the city's Diamond Jubilee celebration, rocking 91 hours and 21 minutes to beat a field of 52; runnerup Larry Driver also passed the previous state record

Jack W. Watson, employe of a construction firm erecting ower lines for Deaf Smith County Rural Electric Co-op, was killed when he came in contact with a high voltage power line at work west of Hereford . . . Announcement was made that a

statewide food stamp program would become effective in this county in the fall, replacing a county-administered

Jubilee preparations picked up speed during the month with a queen contest, oldtime style show, cleanup campaign, contests and promenades stirring interest. . The Armour meat packing plant here shut down for a short time as the government price freeze on beef forced a sharp reduction in the company's processing operations over the nation.

Building permits for the past month were reported at \$467,550, including \$350,000 for the new county library; this brought the 1973 total of \$2,736,595, almost as much as the amount for the entire year 1972.

WEEKEND activity of city police and sheriff's deputies resulted in 15 arrests in the city on marijuana violation charges . . . District 4-AAAA grid coaches were entertained at a dinner attended by about 100 fans who heard the coaches' pre-season evaluation for their 1973 teams ...

A dress and hair code for Hereford Public Schools was adopted by the school board as a \$3.6 million budget for the coming term was approved .

A train-truck collision east of Dawn caused the death of George W. Farmer, an Amarillo man who was driving the truck ... Hereford Whitefaces were picked to finish fifth in District 4-AAAA, with Lubbock Monterey predicted to win the crown, by the Harris Rating System in its Texas Schoolboy grid for cast for the season.

MERCHANDISE valued at more than \$1,000 was taken from a window in a burglary of Cowan Jewelry Store . . . A

Each of the persons questioned were asked if they believed the oil shortage was a real problem in the United States, and if so, how urgent?

heard reports from reliable sources that say that at this time all the major refineries have full storages of oil. "Of course, the Arab oil situation has depleted the U.S.

supply somewhat," Frye said. "However, I think Americans have rallied and decreased their use of electricity and fuels more than was expected.

The shortage is not as bad as we have been led to believe. We certainly have a shortage. But I feel that the long-range plans of our government of importing foreign oil have kept America's natural resources sait. Frye added. "The shortage is causing some of the ecologists to back up."

These conservationists have gone too far the other way in some matters and the crisis is giving us a chance to make some needed developments.'

RAY SIMPSON, Conoco Oil Jobber : "I think people are becoming more aware of the reality of the oil shortage. Up until recent times, people didn't believe that the shortage was real. Some people still don't,

'The situation is pretty urgent and will probably get worse before it gets better. It can become a really bad problem if some measures aren't taken," Simpson said.

'I think the conflicting reports concerning the shortage have people confused and not knowing what to believe. A hard-core education in publicity is necessary for the oil companies to help the public understand. Americans are cooperating quite well. However I think we have a long haul

CHARLES DUVALL, Northwest Elementary School: "I'm assuming the shortage is real. The school is cutting down in

"We've disconnected over 100 lightbulbs in our halls and

asked our teachers to car pool," Duvall said. "Of course the car pooling is not mandatory but I feel that many will comply. We have also adopted a policy of turning out all lights when they are not in use.

"Personally, as to the urgency of the problem, you can't believe everything you read or hear," Duvall added. "I think the amount of oil from overseas could have kept gas stations

# Briscoe Gives Grant

Governor Dolph Briscoe has awarded a graff of \$9,728 to the Pathandle Regional Planning ommission at Amarillo for the organization of a regional law enforcement civil disorder

The money will come from the Governor's Office, Criminal Justice Division. CJD adgrant from the Law Enorcement Assistance Administration under the Crime Control Act of 1973.

Funding will provide for the purchase of riot-control

equipment including protective wear for officers, chemical agents, various non-lethal weapons and a limited amount of lethal weapons. Riot-cont.ol training will also be provided for law enforcement officers in participation agencies. For city police agencies and

two county sheriffs' departments included in the project will provide a totaling \$1,717.

The PRPCraward was smong 52, for a total of \$3,766,578 considered by the CJD Executive Committee at its December 14 meeting.

# Lesly Makes Dean's List



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

The tough part about forecasting these days is the variables and uncertainties which can completely cancel out any forecast. Even though the Arab leaders are finding themselves increasingly embarrassed by the embargo and the fact that economic black-mail will inevitably fail, I will assume that the oil embargo against the U.S. will not be

MOST ECONOMIST predict a slowdown in the economy and a drop in the Gross National Product during 1974. I believe we will see an increase of 7.8 per cent in the GNP in 1974.

Experts have been making dire predictions about sharply rising demands of labor unions for wage increases in 1974 because of spiralling living costs. Do not expect this to be a

major factor in labor costs this satisfy further increases in

The number of workers under contracts that must be renegotiated in 1974 will be considerably less than it was in 1973, about 8 per cent of the labor force. The major area of concern for 1974 will be labor productivity, which is far more significant than increases in hourly wages. Remember, productivity improves sharply luring economic recoveries, but slows dramatically during boom periods.

YOU HAVE read numerous articles about the prospects for substantial unemployment in 1974 due to the energy emergency (emergency sounds better than crisis). You should be in for a nice surprise. Unemployment rates will very likely decline in 1974 due to the need for additional workers to

demands while plants are running at full capacity.

Moreover, we should begin seeing a slowdown in the rate of growth of the labor force in 1974. This is why there will probably be more people employed in 1974 than in 1973.

A major economic consequence of the Mideast War is a change in the attitude of Congress toward defense spending. Defense spending hould jump sharply throughout calendar 1974. This is good news for defense contractors for two

First, the Israeli hardware lost in the war will have to be replaced, presumably from U.S. producers.

Second, the Administration can now make a strong case

terms of sophisticated military hardware. Defense spending, which has been relatively flat in recent years, will take a rise in calendar 1974, further reducing the possibility of a recession.

SINCE corporate profits will drop next year, an increase in defense spending will prac-tically insure a federal budget deficit in 1974. This will accentuate the Treasury's financing job in 1974. This means that short-term interest rates will stay at this level or slightly lower next year.

The Mideast conflict emphasizes the vulnerability of oil supplies from the Arabian countries. It is reasonable to assume that eventually crude oil will again be imported from the Arabian states, but that the price of such crude will be substantially higher over a

Such price rises practically guarantee increases in fuel prices and a further push to inflation. Inflation rates in consumer prices will be accellerated as a result of shortages of fuel. This postpones the time when rates of inflation will decline ap-preciably. The shortage of oil will also weaken the demand for consumer durables, par-ticularly next Spring.

YOU should expect the Dow Jones Industrial Average to establish a base at the 750-800 level because the market has now adequately discounted the economic uncertainties confronting the nation. 1974 will be a rising stock market year for basic industry stocks.

Autos, banks, insurance, steels and telephone stocks will be above average performers.

country You have no understanding of the whole concept of the great American dream of our God fearing, stalwart forefathers. These men had known serfdom on lands owned by church and state. America for them was a land of utopian opportunity; a land where strong men who were willing to face hardships, even death, who were willing to work, sweat and toil could

become land owners. These men understood that the government which governs most extracts most; they knew that if the state were to give them food, clothing, land and the circus; then they would become the vassals of the state as had generations of men in the past; they knew that they would be told when to plant and when to sow; when to buy and when to sell; what would be extracted for the state and what they could charge for the meager amount they had left.

These men wanted no over lords, they were free men.

I am well aware that there are many things looming on the horizon as the New Year approaches. We may have to nge our way of living, cut down on use of gasoline, fuel, paper products, probably other things which we think are necessities.

When all things are measured, we of America have so much to be thankful for and many promises to look forward to, let us be glad that we live in the United States of America. THINGS for gardeners to do in preparation for 1974.

all the world.

Get out your plan for land-scaping and check it to see what was accomplished last year. If you do not have a landscape plan, make one. List plants you plan to continue to grow, and hose you wish to discard. Make a list of new plants to be added.

Check flower beds, lawns, trees, shrubs and other plants. If the fall cleanup was not completed, make use of days in which some of garden chores can be completed. A well kept garden will tend to keep down insects and make garden tasks

lighter in the spring. One which has debris and old plants standing will cause insects to hiber nate and these will give trouble another year. Plow or spade some of the flower beds and vegetable garden, and add mulch to the soil. The gardener that has planted rye or other grain for soil building is the lucky one.

Make list of plans to make the are bare spots these should be spaded. The old roots which have been killed destroyed. Prepare it for future planting.

If shrubs, roses, trees or other plants are rubbing against the house or fence, remove these limbs or branches, or fasten securely to stake or trellis.

Make a note that these should be sprayed with an emulsion which contains some oil to aid in keeping down insects. This is a protective measure all gardeners should use, However roses or evergreens should not

be sprayed. New catalogues are arriving. They will be good reading on the long shut-in winter days. Study carefully and plan to plant more seeds this year. We have been warned that plants will be much higher the coming growing

Even though seeds may be listed a dollar per packet, one can gain by planting and growing their own plants. Begonias, geraniums and many other plants can be grown from seeds for transplanting.

If you are growing house plants, watch them for insects. If insects do attack them, wash thoroughly with a soap suds. Tide suds are good for such

purposes. Remove wilted leaves. Clean around the base of stalks, removing waste material which has collected.

Feed regularly, reading directions carefully. Select a well proven plant food, and use the one recommended for the plant. Violet food for violets. etc. Turn pots regularly, thus and more attractive.

Chickweed is already showing in the flowerbeds. This is a real garden pest. They grow best in cool weather. To control, spray with a specific chickweed killer. To assure a better kill, bruise the plants so they will absorb poison more rapidly.

Winter days are a good time to read garden magazines which have been stacked away when you were too busy to read thoroughly. Also there are many new books pertaining to today's gardens and flower

Some which are recommended are: A Tree Grows Up, by J.M. Guilcher and R.H. Noailles. The authors have a vast knowledge of trees and their miracle performance. Anyone who grows a tree adds much to control environmental problems. Man cannot exist without trees.

Another new trend is that of growing living gardens or designs of landscaping in the house. Living Flower Arrangements by Margaret Davis explains various ways container grown plants can be

Cut flowers are often combined with potted plants to make the design, to add distinction to the decor of any room. Book also contains many new ideas for horticulture classes for flower shows, and various ideas of other combinations in different and interesting containers.



One such product is nutrient-rich manure, offering unique fertilization Through tests conducted at the U.S.D.A. Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland. Texas, we have learned specific facts relating to the use of our solid wastes as fertilizer. For example, application of only ten tons of solid waste material to an acre of moderately irrigated crop lands has been sufficient to obtain maximum yields. There is a residual effect through manure fertilization; process of decomposition continues to pr vide nutrients, at a reduced level, through years after application! There are definite economic advantages to the crop producer using the manure fertilization system. Initial cost, of course, and also

the economies of the methods of application. No special equipment is required: the material is deep plowed into the field and application can be made at the time of working fields prior to planting (the farther in advance of planting the better). Thus, fertilization occurs as a course of normal operation, with standard plowing equipment, resulting in fewer man hours required and, particularly important in light of the energy crisis. The table below lists the nutrient content of manure sampled from 23 feedlots on the Texas High Plains, giving the range, average percentages and average pounds of nutrients present in ten tons.

# Reservations Needed In Some Parks

Parks and Wildlife Department officials say that only cabins, lodge rooms, shelters and group facilities may be reserved. Campsites and trailer spaces in state parks may not be reserved but are continually available on a first-come, first-

served basis. Those wishing to participate in the Jan. 11 drawing must submit their reservation requests to the park superintendent where the facility is desired. Reservation requests will not be accepted by the

department until Jan. 1. Additional dates should be indicated in the order of preference to insure a greater chance for obtaining a reservation. Requests for cabins must include the total number of persons in the immediate

Participants in the drawing will be notified after Jan. 11 if their reservations have been confirmed. If not, the deposit will be returned.

After Jan. 11, reservations for cabins, lodge rooms, shelters and group facilities will be made on the usual first-come, first-served basis.
