# Wheat Harvest In Slow Start

Wheat from Deaf Smith County farms began to trickle into area elevators as harvesting operations made a slow start this week. The first load of grain in Deaf Smith County was brought in by J. T. Gilbreath, 441 Ave. B, from his dryland farm two miles west of Hereford.

Gilbreath cut approximately 7000 pounds of grain from a 20-acre field Monday. It had approximately 16 per cent moisture content and averaged between five and six bushels to the acre.

## Airport Rental Requests Are Tabled By City

The Hereford City Commission at its regular meeting Monday discussed two proposals concerning the renting of facilities at the Hereford Municipal Airport.

During the discussion, the members of the Airport Advisory Board, appointed at the last Commission meeting, were called in to give an opinion.

The first of the proposals considered was the renting of office space to Leslie Sharp to set up a charter flight and instruction service at the airport. The office would be rented on a monthly basis.

A second proposal was the renting of the large hanger at the facility to A. L. Burcham of Amarillo. Burcham has asked for exclusive use of the building in order to set up a maintenance facility.

Burcham is a licensed aviation mechanic and is able to re-apply for his inspector's rating, according to Dudley Bayne, city manager. It was also pointed out that the Amarillo man is more interested in maintenance work than flying.

It was reaffirmed by the mayor and commissioners during the discussion that the city would retain control of the airport and its servicing facilities.

They also pointed out that there are no plans now to lease out the airport as has been done in the past.

According to the City Manager, the airport's rent hanger space and aviation gas and oil sales are netting a profit for the city of Hereford.

The two proposals made by Sharp and Burcham were turned over to the advisory board for further study. The board is to report back to the Commission. Action on the proposals will be taken by the Commission following the report.

In other action the Commission gave conditional approval to the Western Hills addition plat as Ed Lane, attorney representing the developers, appeared at the meeting.

Conditional approval was granted with the recommendation that one of the alleyways in the plat be changed to a

Grain men in the area are expecting the dryland harvest to be lighter than last year's crop due to the lack of needed moisture during the growing season this year.

They have estimated that the average cutting will yield between five to 10 bushels to the acre. However, in some instances, yields will run higher than average.

In the Hereford area, grain is ripening quickly. All that is needed, according to county grain men, is dry weather in order for the wheat to dry out.

Some of the dryland crop is still green and moisture content is still high due to the recent rains across the county and the high humidity of the last few days.

Irrigated grain is also ripening rapidly with harvesting expected to begin within the next week to ten days.

This year's crop, described as one of the earliest in years, is expected to be good. However, yields will not average as high due to the lack of moisture.

Total production for the county will also be lower due to the setback in acreage. Farmers were required to divert at least 10 per cent of their allotment and could put back more land if they wished.

The county allotment for wheat this year is 181,345 acres with an estimated 56,215 acres assigned by farmers as diverted, according to Faust Collier, manager of the local Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation office.

Total average allotment in wheat for the 1961 crop was placed at 190,100 acres.

With the grain, including barley, nearing harvest time, area farmers are anxiously following the weather reports as predictions of severe thunderstorms in the area have been broadcast day after day.

Some wheat and barley has already been damaged in the Hereford area due to severe weather conditions during the past three weeks. However, hail damage was scattered across the southeast, east and north-east sections.

Earlier this spring damage to dryland wheat was also reported due to hail and a heavy in-

## Suicide's Body Transferred To Laddonia, Mo.

A 21-year-old prisoner in the Deaf Smith County Jail was found dead in the shower of his cell Saturday night, after he had taken his own life.

Charles Peak of Muleshoe committed suicide at approximately 9:30 p.m. Saturday. The victim fashioned a rope from portions of a mattress cover with which to hang himself.

Peak carved his will on the wall of his cell. Justice of the Peace C. B. Miles, ruled the death a suicide.

The victim had gagged himself in order to prevent any sounds and had tied the cell door with strips of cloth in order to prevent being stopped as he took his life.

Peak was last seen alive shortly after 8 p.m. as sheriff's dispatcher Wallace Cox made

## Hereford's Oldest Firm Modernizes

As pioneer settlers convened here Thursday, talk of the good ol' days was the main entertainment. Many of those on hand were among the earliest residents in Hereford.

Talk often switched to the early hardships of farming and even to the early businesses and businessmen. Among the pioneer businessmen were J. M. Rockwell and his brother Alvin, who opened their doors shortly after the "Pea Vine Line" rails had come through Hereford.

These two were the founders of the present Rockwell Brothers Lumber Company, the oldest surviving business firm in the county.

Of course, there were other businesses operating in Hereford when the Eagle Lumber Company, as it was then called, opened its doors, but none have remained in operation to the present.

But even the old timers have a way of changing, and Rockwell Brothers Lumber will

soon hold the grand opening for modern new office space, as they have discarded the building which has served the purpose almost since the lumber yard's birth.

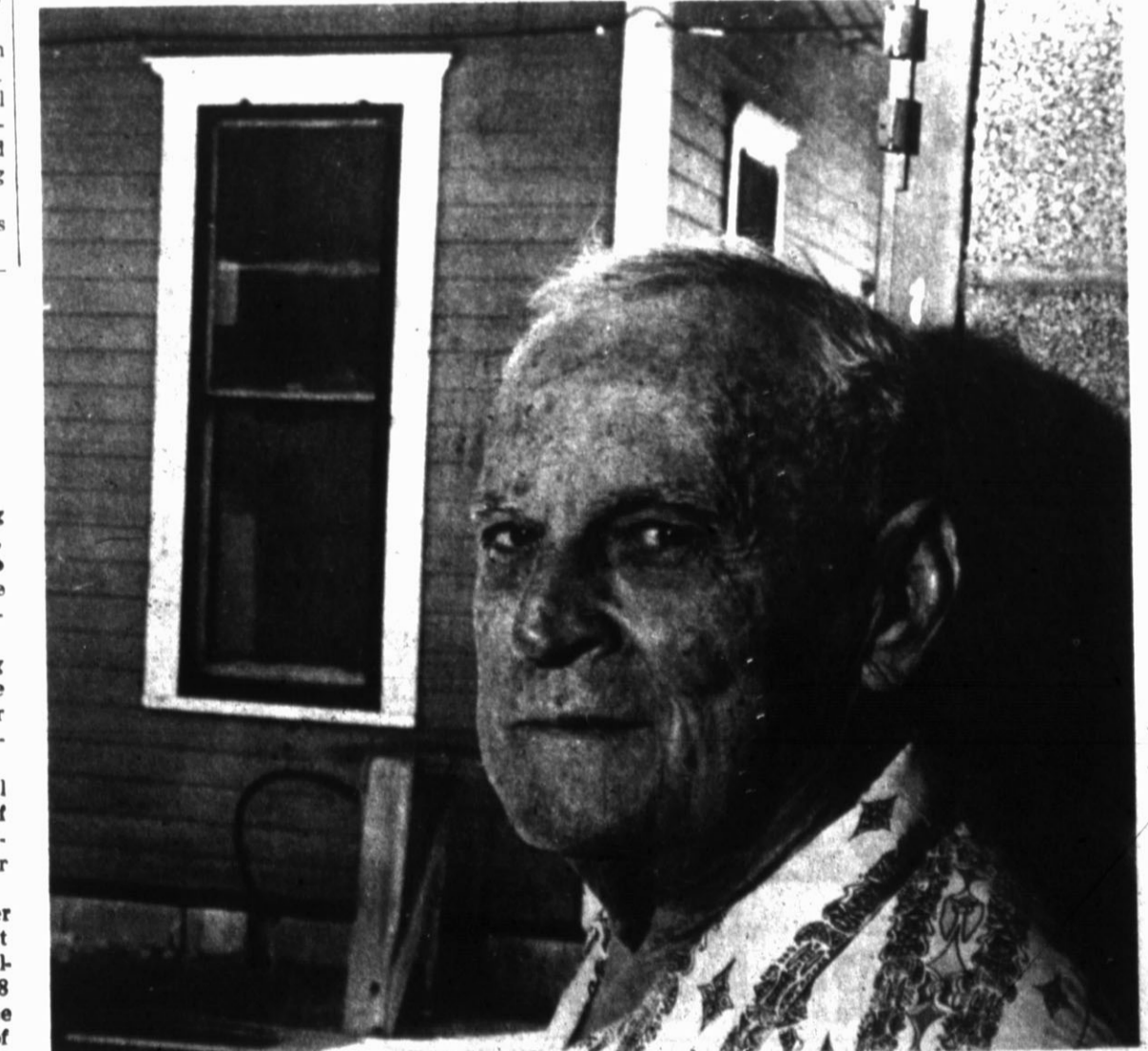
"When that old office building was built around the turn of the century, it was pretty fancy for its day," pointed out Cecil Rockwell, son of J. M. Rockwell.

No newcomer himself, Cecil Rockwell became manager of the firm in 1914, after the business had been in operation for many years.

"My father and his brother were heads of a corporation that put in lumber yards as the railroad came into an area. In 1898 they built the first portion of the yard on the southeast corner of the present location.

The yard was adjoining Dyer Brothers Lumber Company, which later sold out to the Rockwells.

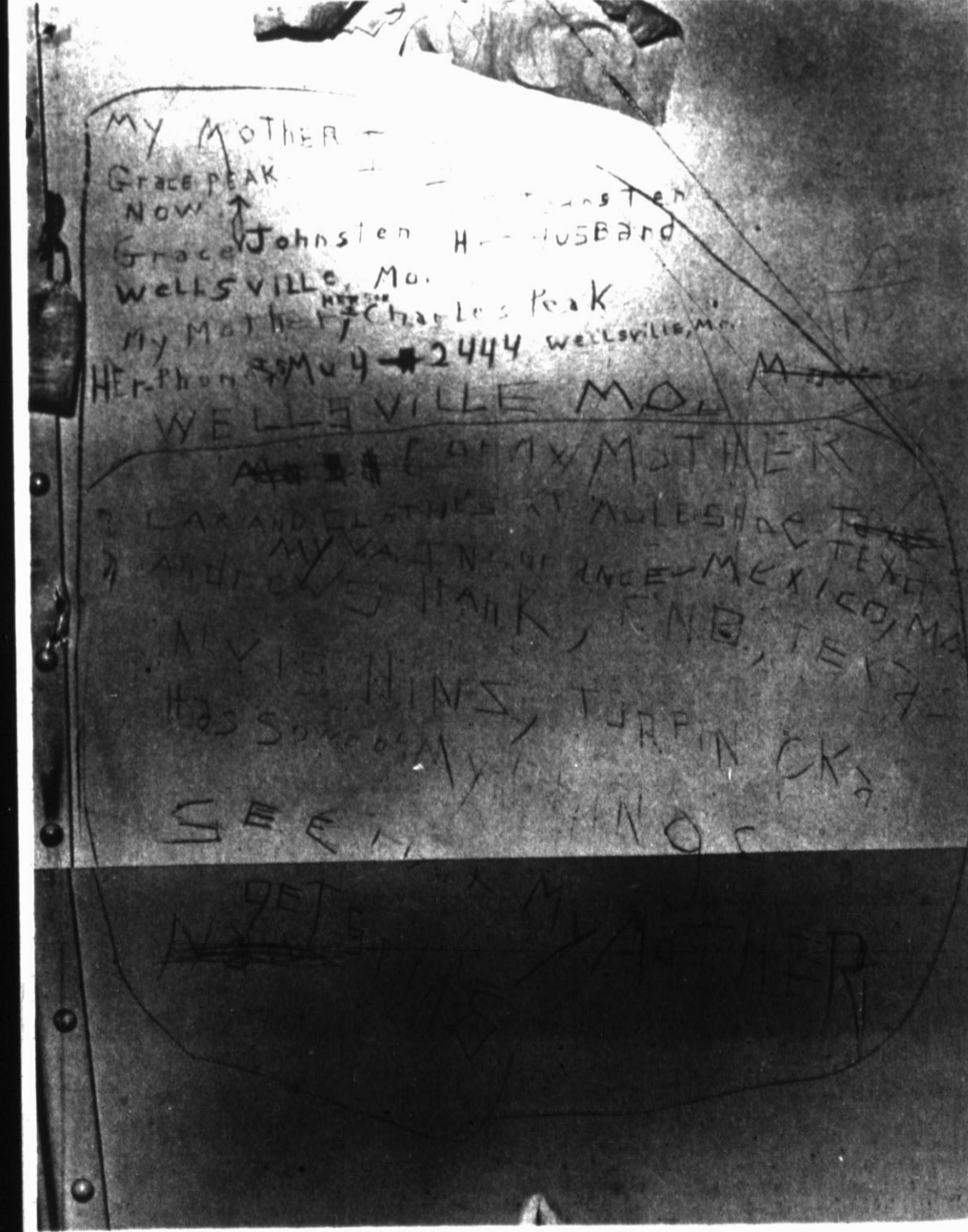
"Our yard was part of a corporation then, but just before

# HERE And THERE

With Mrs. Merita Kaul

Many former residents of Hereford were guests in Hereford homes this week so as to be here to attend the Annual Pioneer Day Celebration which was held at the Community Center last Thursday. Several of the "pioneers" also attended the Overstreet Class Reunion which was held at the Country Club Thursday night.

Surviving members of the family of the late W. B. Robinson came and made their "headquarters" in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Boyd London. Mr. S. London was Gertrude Robinson. Coming from Dallas were her sisters, Mrs. Grace McLeRoy and Mrs. Allene Henson, and brother Jim and his wife Ethyl, came from Colorado Springs, Colo.

Mrs. McLeRoy told how their family came to the Plains in 1901 with two covered wagons, a surrey, a buggy, and a saddle horse. It took almost 18 days to come from Gainesville (Cook County) to Hereford (Deaf Smith County). They acquired a farm five miles east of town but in the year 1903 Mrs. Robinson was staying in town with the seven children so that the older ones could go to school. It was on April 25, 1903, that Mr. Robinson came in from the farm, picked up Grace, Allene, Jim, and Gertrude to go out with him to spend the week end at the farm. Mother could not go as Celia was ill with typhoid fever and Gertrude was a baby. About 5 that afternoon he became very ill and sent Nellie and Allene to walk the five miles to town to get Mrs. Robinson and Dr. Estes. It soon got dark — pitch dark. Mr. Robinson was getting worse by the minute. He wanted Grace and Jim to go to the closest neighbor — one mile away — but they were young Jim, 7 and Grace, 11 — and were too scared to go. He would stand out on

the porch and wave the lighted lantern and say "Help! Help! Help!" barely above a whisper. Mrs. Robinson and the doctor, with Allen Bell and another man got out there about midnight. Allen Bell had to walk in front of the doctor's rig in the darkness and feel for the ruts in the road so that they could stay between the fences. Mr. Robinson died the next morning at 6:20. He was a diabetic and did not know about insulin then. He was buried at Hereford under the auspices of the Woodmen of the World.

John Purcell (1902) of Floyd, New Mexico was here when the first auto came to town. It was a Buick, run with chains and was cranked at the side. He says he was in the livery business but went "broke" when the autos came. His brother Charley Purcell now of Dallas was sheriff here for eight years.

L. E. (Jack) Cobb came to Hereford in 1900. He farmed and ranched until he sold out. He now lives at the Crazy Water Hotel in Mineral Wells.

Mrs. John Jacobsen, Sr. (Vida Orr) relates how her folks, the E. B. Orrs, came here in 1902. They lived 13 miles north on what is now the Straffus place. Her father paid \$1,000 for their section but they decided that it wasn't enough land to make a living on so he sold it and moved to town. The winter of 1902-1903 was a cold one with a severe blizzard. Vida Orr lived most of the winter in the Jeff Thompson home and taught the Thompson girls — Carrie, Ida, and Nora. Roy was too young for school and Arthur was away at Goodnight College at Goodnight. She remembers that they ran out of coal and had to put four mules on to the wagon and go to town and get a ton of coal. "But," she added, "with all the wide spaces, we were never lonesome or afraid."

C. J. Mountz, Roy Jowell, and John Patton told about being at Westway the day — and it was a Fourth of July in 1918 (they think) — that the Westway School was dedicated. John and Roy remember that they were playing ball and it got so cold and began to snow. It snowed so hard they couldn't see the ball and had to quit. The late Judge J. P. Slaton gave the land for the Westway School.

Mrs. J. E. Urshel (Ruby Norton) of Mexia: "I wouldn't be without the Brand. I read every word of it — even the ads."

Hal and Edna Brunner of La Jolla, Calif., were greeting many friends. They were guests in the Oscar Easley home and will visit his brother, Art K. Brunner, in Amarillo before returning to California. The Brunners came to Hereford in 1917 and in 1928 and 1929 Mrs. Brunner was superintendent of Deaf Smith County Hospital. Marie Carroll, now the school nurse in Friona Schools, was a nurse in the hospital then. The Brunners left in 1930 but didn't forget to come back to Texas.

The Rev. and Mrs. R. R. Gilbreath of Amarillo stopped at the Pioneer Day Reunion en route home from the Methodist Conference at Big Spring. They also visited in the home of his daughter, Mrs. Eula Cave. Mrs. Cave is director of the Community Center.

Lois Cobb Jones remarked, "I've been here nearly every year for the Pioneer Day celebration and it started in 1939. I can wear the 60-year badge." Mrs. Jones is from Mineral Wells and her brother, J. Otis Cobb, was present from Memphis, Tex.

Mrs. O. R. Jones of San Diego, Calif., attended the Pioneer Day activities and also the Overstreet Class Reunion. She was a guest in the home of Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Ireland. The former Mary Hinton, her father was B. T. Hinton, who had a ranch southeast of town. His brand was the Rocker H and he sold the ranch later to Louis Brady. Mary Hinton and Emily (Bell) Ireland were girlhood friends when both families lived on ranches south of Hereford. They recall going to Dawn to school — one room — all grades with Mr. Fred Johnson as teacher. They had to cross Tierra Blanca creek and would cross on stepping stones unless there was a rise in the water. Then the boys (brothers Earl and Charley Hinton) would make a pack saddles with their hands and the girls would be carried across. They had to walk five miles to school.

Mrs. George Cloyd came to the reunion with her daughter,

Mrs. Lon (Louise) Morton, of Childress. Her children always enjoy the story she tells of the time when her sister, Jessie Sullivan, had come from Pilot Point to visit with them. At that time burros were plentiful and could be picked up anywhere on the prairie. They had found three and fed them and kept them for the children to ride and keep for pets. She and Jessie decided to ride one of the burros down to the Dameron Ranch — about 1/2 miles — to visit the neighbors there awhile. They chose the largest one and both got on it and started out about 3 p.m. They made their visit and started home but burro didn't want to go home. He'd walk as close to the barbed wire fence as he could and the girls would have to get off. Then he'd balk. They'd get some broom weeds and switch him and he'd start on, but then they couldn't get back on. They got home about 10 or 11 that night, just as her

brother Walter Sullivan and a neighbor were getting ready to start out looking for them. Mrs. Cloyd and Mrs. Morton have been guests of Mrs. Pete Cocomonger, also a daughter of Mrs. Cloyd. So when he married, he says he had no money and no wedding — they just went and got married. The next week there was a very brief announcement in the paper of the marriage. "But," says Boyd, "I've always felt like they wanted it headlined 'White Woman Married a Barber.' However London has proved that the barbering profession can be respectable. 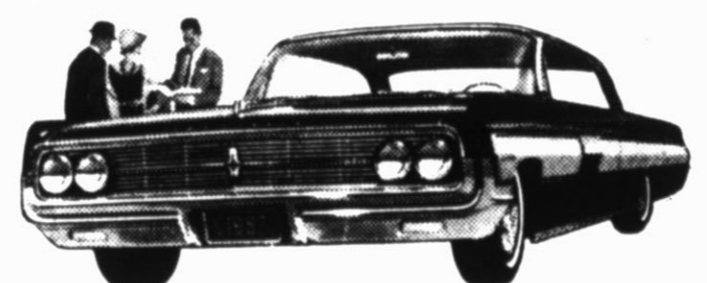

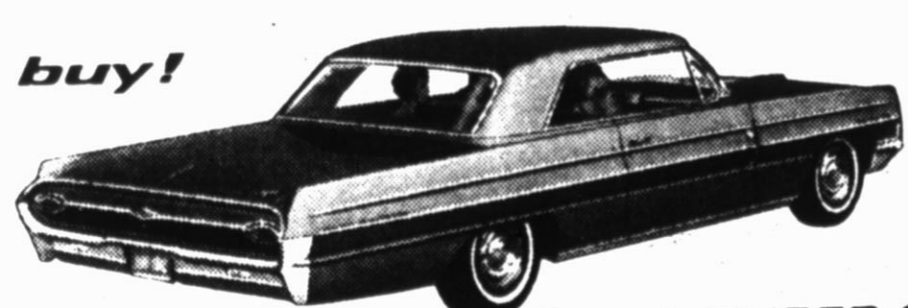

1½ tablespoons melted butter  
¼ cup hot milk  
1/8 teaspoon mace  
1/8 teaspoon cinnamon  
1 egg white, stiffly beaten

Peel hot potatoes and force through a sieve. Add the remaining ingredients except the egg white and mix thoroughly. Fold in egg white and bake in a greased casserole in a hot

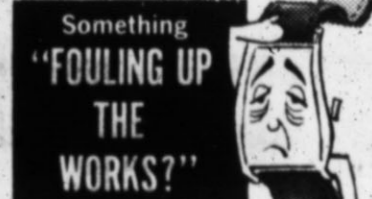
oven (450 degrees F.) for about 15 minutes or until lightly brown.

Whip cream, fold in the marshmallows and peppermint candy, and carefully spoon onto the crumbs. Sprinkle the remaining crumbs on the top and refrigerate for at least 12 hours. Serves 8.

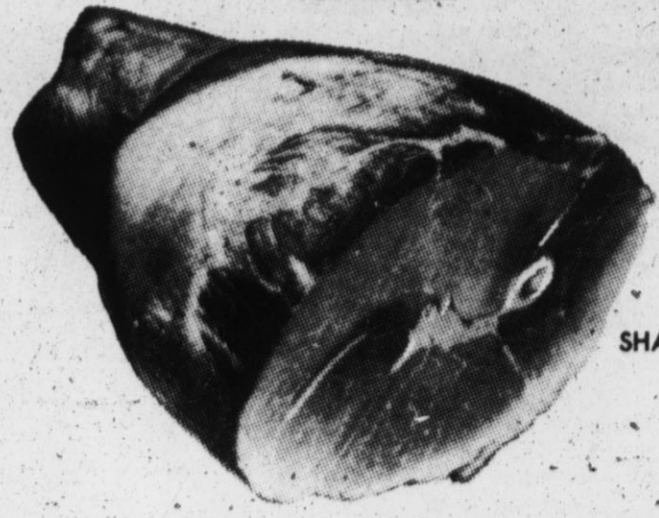

Trailing by six runs, the Red Sox could get just one in the top of the seventh. That came on three walks and a hit batter.

Kenny Justice worked two innings. He was touched for four runs on three hits, while striking out two and walking four. Gene Drummond finished up. He was charged with two runs on one hit. He struck out two and walked four.

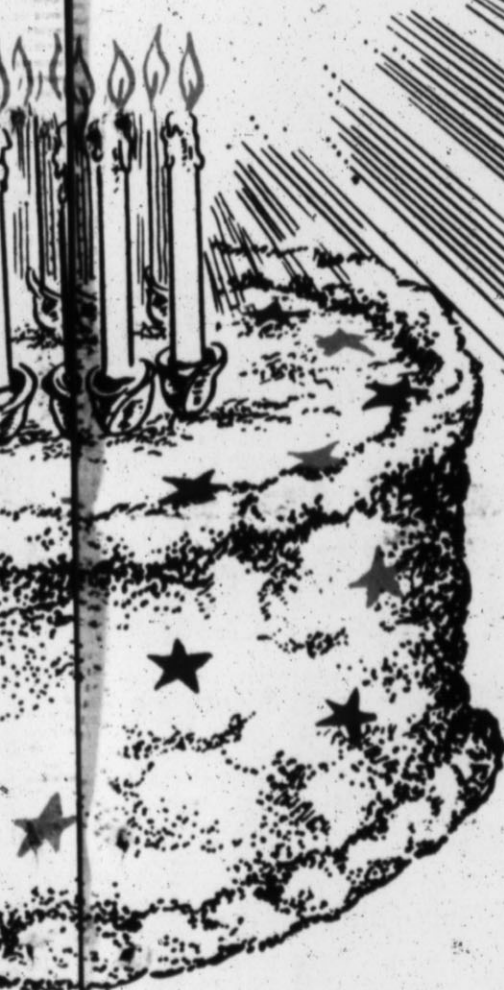

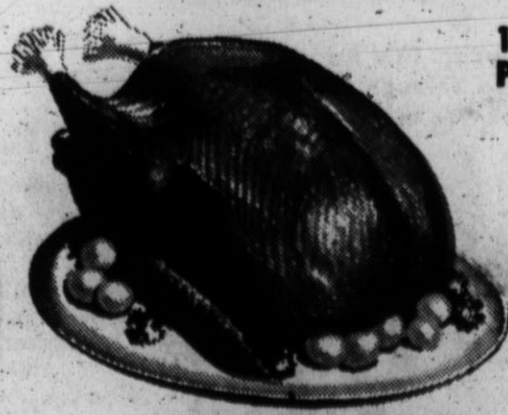
