



Under this project donors will make bequests of their eyes which then will be used in making cornea transplants to restore sight. The eye bank will be maintained in Amarillo, and Lions Clubs in the Panhandle will keep special containers on hand in which the eyes may be rushed to the eye bank. The containers were made available to the clubs during the convention. Eyes may be ship-ped by air to other banks in the country if needed in other cities.

This project was inaugurated by the seven Amarillo Lions Clubs more than a year ago and is a pilot project which will be expanded to the rest of the state, if successful in this area. Omar Hermmseyer of Amarillo led the project as initial president of the non-profit corporation set up to govern the eye bank. Permanent officers and directors from the clubs in the District were elected during the convention.
