Two previously unopposed candidates for county offices picked up opponents this week as political tensions gets tighter as Monday's filing deadline grows





The first of the week was highlighted as two local men jumped into the race for the county's top post — that of county judge — and another filed as a candidate for a previously unopposed county commissioner position.

IN OTHER major political action in the city, James "Dub" Boyd filed for reelection as a Hereford City Commissioner to Place 3. Boyd, 50, will be seeking his second term to the post and is opposed by Harvey Milton, who recently filed for the position.

Of all the city, school board, county, and district offices up for election, only one had not been filed for as of noon Wednesday - that of Criminal District Attorney. However, Andy Shuval, the incumbent in the position, is expected to announce before the weekend as a candidate for re-election.

FILING Deadline for county and district offices is Monday. Fees for filing range from \$50 up to \$150 for most complete county offices and \$400 for criminal district attorney. District In 3-Way Tie

Herd Claws Tigers

Hereford's Whitefaces kept alive their hopes for at least a share of the firstround title in District 4-AAAA by capturing a 63-54 decision over the Snyder Tigers in a bruising battle here Tuesday

The Herd's accuracy at the free-throw line was the eventual difference, but Coach Barry Arnwine saw his starters build up a 15-point advantage before emptying the bench in the closing

The triumph, along with Coronado's win over Lubbock High and Monterey's defeat of Plainview, set up a showdown for the Herd in Lubbock Friday night. Hereford meets Coronado Friday with a Herd triumph meaning at least a share of the first-round title. Hereford, Coronado and Plainview all have 3-1 records.

THE DISTRICT plays two rounds with the champions of each round playing for the championship. A tie for the first-half lead could result in all kinds of possibilities in the second roundunless one of the teams won the second round outright. Coronado was the preseason pick to win title, followed by Plai-

In the game here Tuesday night, Snyder took an early lead and held a 14-10 edge after the first quarter. Hereford gained the momentum in the second period of the rough contest, and took a 31-26 advantage at halftime. The Herd upped the lead to 10 points, 45-35, going into the final period.


BIG DAN VanderZee paced the scoring attack for the Herd with 19 points, and guard Mike Albiar was close behind with 16. Dennis Noggler had 10, while James Harris and Lynn Tarr chipped in 8 each for a balanced scoring

Hereford was charged with 12 fouls in the game and Snyder with 15, but the Herd took advantage of the one-and-one situations to gain a big edge at the charity line. Hereford hit 17 of 24 free shots, while the Tigers hit only 6 of 14. Center Larry Johns led Snyder with 14, while Chester Cobb and Welton Cobb added 12 and 10 points, respectively.

THE VICTORY left Hereford's season record at 18-8, and Snyder is 8-17 for the year. In the other District 4-AAAA contests, Monterey clamped a strong defense on Plainview in the second half to come away with a 51-37 victory, and-Coronado outlasted the Lubbock Westerners by 87-78.

Hereford won all three contests here Tuesday night. The junior varsity rallied from a 15-point deficit in the second half to score a 58-52 victory, and the Hereford sophomores scored a close 55-54 win in a double-overtime battle.

County Approves \$29,840 Bid

Furnishings Completed

Purchase of equipment and furniture for the new county library was completed at a total cost of \$29,840 when Deaf Smith County Commissioners held a regular meeting Monday

Commissioners, in other action. approved an alcoholism program proposed by the Mental Health Mental Retardation center, approved a crime prevention program through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, authorized expenditure of \$6,428 as the county's portion of radio communications cost with the PRPC, and approved an increase in the mileage allowance for county officials when on business out of the county.

Commissioners had previously accepted a low bid of some \$22,402 from the Sperry Rand Corp. for furniture and installation of shelving and other items in the new library. To complete what was termed the "total package" for the interior furnishings, the county approved an additional \$7,438 in expenditures Monday. Scott Cherry, Sperry Rand Corp., and

Herb Brasher, architect, met with the court to discuss the additional furn

AFTER A short discussion, commissioners approved the increase of mileage allowance from 10 to 12 cents a mile for county officials on business out of the county. The court decided to pay actual expenses on lodging and meals, rather than going to a 'per diem'

Two items on the agenda were postponed for further study. One concerns the holding of juveniles when committed to jail, and the other concerns a "management analysis" of the sheriff's department through a PRPC

The court approved the crossing of a county road with a water line in Precinct 2, after receiving the request from

THE COUNTY'S participation in the new alcoholism education program will be to collect an additional \$35 from driving-while-intoxicated offenders, then pass the money on to the MIT MR Center for its classes.

Under the new program, the judge of the appropriate court can and the test face and require the DWI offender to attend an eight-week course in alcohol education. The sessions will be one hour each, one time a week.


Fred Ready, director of the Alcoholism Program at Northwest Texas Hospital, and Bill Cooke, director of education at Amarillo for the Texas Commission on Alcoholism, were at the county meet to present the proposal, They reported it has been initiated in other area towns and proving successful in decreasing the number of DWI of-

ANUMBER of agencies are providing input into the eight-week courses, Cooke noted, with the MH MR centers handling it on the local level. There is no cost to the county. If the \$35 fee assessed to the offender does not take care of expenses, the balance will be borne by the Alcoholism Treatment Program.

Cooke pointed out that alcohol is now officially the number one health problem. It ranks behind cancer and beart failure as the leading killer, however it becomes number traffic deaths related to alcohol are

The program is proposed as a continuing one for at least a year. A fulltime, professional counselor will not only work with the DWI cases, but with other court-referred people as well.

The resolution on the Governor's crime prevention program authorized PRPC to make application for assistance in the creation of a "crime prevention unit" to serve the 25 county Panhandle region. The crime prevention public information unit is designed to upgrade prevention efforts in each community and to assist local law enforcement agencies in conducting prevention programs.

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
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
Moving Wrecked Train

Hereford Men Elected To NORM

SAN ANTONIO-Three Hereford men were reelected to the National Organization for Raw Materials, Inc. (NORM) board here last week during an annual meeting and econom conference in the San Antonio Convention Center.

Harlan VanderZee, Hereford banker, declined the nomination to a third term as NORM president, but was elected as the executive vice president. The 74-member board gave VanderZee a unanimous "thank you" for his leadership the past two years. NORM now has members throughout 33 states.

Two other Hereford men-Gerald McCathern and A.R. Dillard, were also reelected to the NORM national board of directors. Texas Commissioner of Agriculture John White was a featured speaker at the economic conference sponsored each, he stated. 'The impact in
