Great Pumpkin Leaves Moisture-Filled Snow Treat

An unusually early winter storm continued powerdering snow on the Panhandle area for the second day Thursday, and the cold front which brought the white magic to the region gave signs of more of the same of today after snowfall accumulations had already reached a record for this early in the year in many areas by late Thursday .--Prospects are great for a white Halloween.

LIGHT SNOW continued to fall shortly after 8 o'clock this morning in the city of Hereford after moisture-filled flakes had descended on the local area intermittently throughout the morning and afternoon Thursday.

KPAN radio logged a snowfall total to 3 inches for the city Thursday afternoon, prior to the beginning of this morning's snowfall, and the local station had also recorded a moisture total of .30 inches received thus far in the storm.

The snowfall, which began here late Wednesday, has fallen slowly and without wind, thus allowing area cropland to derive maximum benefit from the moisture contained in those magic snow crystals, while leaving an eye-pleasing setting on the area landscape to boot.

Only one thing could make the white Halloween any better on the local scene, --- and that would be if local farmers had totally finished their corn and grain sorghum harvesting.

CORN HARVEST was in its final week here prior to the arrival of the storm, and excellent progress was also being made on the grain sorghum harvest.

A spokesman for a local elevator

indicated that the storm may delay harvest an extra week, but unless it is of a prolonged nature, should not cause any serious damage to the grain remaining to be harvested.

A spokesman at Easter Grain south of Hereford indicated that only a few fields of corn remained to be harvested in that area prior to the snowfall, in addition to some seed milo.

Another spokesman at Pitman Grain here had expected the local corn harvest to end by this weekend prior to the storm.

THE PITMAN spokesman did point out that yields on this year's corn crop may be average dry weight corn yield of 9,500 pounds, with dry weight yields as high as 11,000 pounds reported.

The quality of some of the late milo crop, already damaged by an unusually early frost during the first week of the month, may deteriorate a little more,

depending on how long the wet weather hangs on.

But behind every snow cloud there's a silver lining, and although the weather may have caused some problems in trying to finish up one grain harvest, the wet snow is a blessing for the county's wheat crop.

There's a saying among local farmers, particularly in the county's dryland areas. to the effect that a man should take an inch of moisture any time he can get it, because he won't get it often in this country.

MOISTURE ACCUMULATED from the snowfall may be something short of an inch thus far, but it's just what the doctor ordered for both the irrigated and dryland wheat crops locally.

Democrats Predict Slight Win For Carter, Mondale

The Deaf Smith County Democratic Club has conducted a survey of the 11 county precincts and predict a slight win for their candidates. Based on poll of residents in the

respective precincts, Andy Shuval, president of the club, said Thursday that presidential nominee Jimmy Carter and his running mate Walter Mondale will win the county by about 53 to 55 per cent of the votes cast.

Of course, the Republican party candidates under the leadership of Wes Fisher, County Republican chairman, feel their presidential nominee Gerald Ford and his running mate Robert Dole will carry the county.

Shuval said it is a rough estimate but that indications are good for a Democratic sweep here. He is leading the party effort here along with Raymond Higginbotham, co-chairman of the Carter campaign.

Republicans have forged through with an annually strong campaign effort with a local headquarters and constant meetings with candidates primarily Jim Reese, an Odessa Republican running for the 19th Congressional seat.

Democrats are backing the powerful George Mahon, who seeks another term in the congressional post he has held for 42 years. Refer to the ballot printed inthe the Thursday issue of The Hereford Brand for other local and state wide races.

The polls for the election set Tuesday, Nov. 2 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the respective voting boxes across the county. A list of them will be carried in the Sunday issue of The Brand.



refillable bottle costs an average of five cents less than in a throwaway bottle or can. Beer in returnable containers costs 52 a case less than a case of throwaways. Those are the key findings of a 28-city survey conducted by the League of Women Voters and announced today by the Environmental Protection Agency. The study provides further ammunition for groups seeking to ban throwaway bottles and cans to save energy and protect the environment.

Veterans To Receive More Benefits Under New Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)- Some 1.2 million veterans attending school under the GI Bill will begin getting higher benefit checks, starting Monday, and the first check will have an extra bonus.

A new law boosts veterans' éducation benefits 8 per cent, effective Oct. 1. The new benefit checkd due to the mail Monday also will include the higher a, benefits that were retroactive to Oct. 1.

"C ... The law also increased from 36 months to 45 months the eligibility time period for undergraduate study; previously the extra nine months could be used only for graduate study.

Since men and women who join the military after Jan. 31 are not eligible for that program, the VA and the Pentagon are prepaing a new

program for them. Under the except flight training, which new law, men and women joining the military after Dec. 31 may contribute \$50 to \$75 monthly from their salaries, up to a maximum of \$2,700. The VA will match that at the rate of \$2 for every \$2 contributed, and

the total can be used for education. VA Administrator Richard L. Roudebush said that for a single

veteran attending school full time, the new monthly allowance is \$292, up \$22 from the previous rate. The new monthly rate for veterans enrolled in full-time training with one dependent is \$347, compared with \$321; with two dependents \$396, compared with \$366. For each dependent above two, the

rate is \$24, up by \$2. The 8 per cent increase applies to all GI Bill training. remains the same.

. The new law is estimated to cost \$473 million in this fiscal year. decreasing to \$68 million in fiscal year 1981.

Roudebush said that because of the priority placed on getting out the GI Bill increases some 16,000 checks that veterans enrolled in vocational rehabilitatation training receive Monday will include only the 8 per cent for November. The October increase will be sent later.

There is no change in the requirement that a veteran use his GI Bill benefits within 10 years after leaving military service or by Dec. 31. 1989, whichever is earlier. The new bill expires in 1989.

The law permits those who enlist before Dec. 31 to come. under the old program even though they don't actually begin serving until next year. The program for future GIs

will be administered jointly by the VA and the Defense Department, with up to 36 months of assistance offered.

Under the law, the VA next June 1 will stop making advance payments at the start of the month of those in school under the GI Bill. Payment will be made at the end of the month instead. And advance payment at the start of the training will be permitted only if the veteran requests and his school agrees to follow the law in reporting.

That provision was written into the law in light of the millions of dollars paid out to veterans under the advancement payments plans that was lost because the VA was not informed by the veteran or his school that he had dropped courses or quit school.



BIG SPRING. Tex. (AP) -Defense lawyers for a U.S. Air Force major failed in an attempt Wednesday to get District Court Judge Ralph W. Caton to order that any news reporters covering the legal proceedings have law school training.

Maj. Harold Roy Freeman is charged with sex crimes involving a step-daughter and step-son. Judge Caton granted a defense request to prohibit photographing, televising and broadcasting from inside the courtroom, but he denied other parts of the motion.

George Gilkerson, a Lubbock defense lawyer, wanted the court to order that any reporters covering the trial be either licensed attorneys or have 60 hours of training in law school. Two Big Spring Herald newspaper reporters testified that they have college degrees. but no training in law.

Discipline Labled 'A Family Affair'

[EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of a two-part series on children's behavior.]

COLLEGE STATION -- Discipline is a family affair involving both parents and children. llene Miller, a family life education specialist, says.

Through personal example. repeated explanations and daily guidance, mothers and fathers help their children learn how to behave in different situations, she noted.

This specialist is with the **Texas Agricultural Extension** Service. The Texas A&M University System.

"Primary responsibility for making judgements about their children's behavior rests with parents until the children are mature enough to make their own decisions. But a child will be slow to act responsibly, if he does not have opportunities to learn what is expected of him. Young children must be told, guided, shown how and often told again before they learn what parents expect. Children need lots of positive direction; they need to know what they can do rather than what not to do. Positive directions help them learn how to act in different situations, she said.

schoolers need firm guidance because they lack the maturity and experience to know how to behave in many situations. In contrast, older children in the family may be ready for more

freedom and responsibility. "Parents should set and enforce a few reasonable rules which consider the needs and abilities of each individual child. In setting limits, decide what rules are necessary for the well-being of the child and for the protection of property. Do not hesitate to change the rules once the child outgrows the need for such limits," she advised.

Young children need to know the possible consequences of their actions, and why some rules are necessary. Parents help their children make wise responsible decisions by talking about what could happen if the







Science May Confuse 'Curcurbita' For Squash on Halloween Day

NEW YORK (AP) - Peter, Peter, curcurbita eater. Then there's the "Legend of Sleepy Hollow" which a ghost

throws his curcurbita head at Ichabod Crane. Or, how about Cinderella's golden coach fashioned by the good fairy from a curcurbita?

Doesn't ring quite true. does "Curcurbita," however, is the scientific name for "pumpkin." It's not all that scientific. though. since "curcurbita" means both "pumpkin" and 'squash."

Imagine, the lowly pumpkin, every Halloween witch's favorite vegetable - or is a fruit? has no scientific name of its own. Botanically speaking, there is no distinction between squashes and pumpkins.

Somebody ought to do something about it, but before

they do that, they'd better decide what word "pumpkin" itself means. You see there's no agreement on that, either.

The word "pumpkin" is a culinary term, and botanists don't find it very precise. What do they know? They're the ones who settled on "curcurbita". The name appears to come from the Greek "pepon" or "large melon" by way of the French which coverted it to "Popon" and then "pompon" and eventually "pumpion". The ending was converted to "kin" in the American colonies and "pumpkin" became a word. In Shakespeare's "Merry Wives of Windsor," there is a reference to a "gross, watery pumpion." That's sounds mighty like a melon.

But anybody who's ever carved a jack o' lantern knows

knows what the Europeans did that a pumpkin is not a melon or a squash either. And besides for jack o' lanterns until then perhaps they carved up when the Greek word "pepon" was doing all that evolving, cucumbers. there weren't any pumpkins in

TUC Gets Seven Intervention Cases

AUSTIN (AP)- The Texas proposed business rates as Utilities Commission announced Thursday it has received cases in the Southwestern Bell rate case. The deadline for filing was noon on Tuesday.

Houston recommended approval of the firm's proposed "411"" charge for calls to information. And Houston asked that it be combined with Dallas in the lower cost Rate Band 9, and that there be no increases in local rates.

The federal government. represented by the General Services Administration, recommended a revenue increase of \$29 million, based on a rate of return of 7.62 per cent.

Neither Texas Retail Federation and nor Texas Alarm-Signal Association filed alternative dollars figures to Bell's request for \$298.3 million, but the former attacked Bell's

statewide basis. The Bell case opens before the commission Monday.







The highest ranking in Texas Tech's history and the Southwest Conference football leadership are at stake Saturday when the Texas Longhorns come calling. Tech Coach Steve Sloan quips "I'm just glad I have a ticket."

Sloan might be lucky at that. It's the tightest ticket in the school's history. Of course, Tech has never been ranked sixth in the nation before and the five straight victories mark the Red Raiders quickest start since 1941.

Scalpers are asking between \$50 and \$100 per ticket and getting it. Spectators are being urged to get to Jones Stadium 90 minutes before kickoff. The "Saddle Tramps", Tech's spirit group, is selling Red and Black scarves to wave at the Longhorns. "They'll be sitting on apple





Henry Schwartzschild of New York noted that two men are to be executed in Texas in November and January and said those executions would "recall to the world" the events of Nov. 22, 1963-- when President Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas.

Schwartzschild joined executive director John Duncan of the ' Texas Civil Liberties Union and two Texas lawyers in announcthe creation of a state coalition against the death penalty.





Driving in Turkey Is A Free-For-All

By EMEL ANIL

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) - An average of 6,000 persons die on Turkish roads every year. Traf-fic accident and death rates here are among the highest in the world and are on the rise. Turkey, with its population of 40 million, claims 6 per cent of the world's traffic fatalities. Authorities estimate that traffic deaths will reach an unprece-

dented 10,000 in 1976. In the first seven months of this year, 4,526 persons were killed in traffic accidents and thousands injured. On the first three days of August, 50 lives were lost - two of them traffic policemen on motorcycles.

Many causes are cited for the mess which is Turkish traffic. According to Premier Suley-man Demirel, the inadequacy of roads is an important factor. He has pointed out that the main thoroughfare connecting Turkey's largest cities, Ankara and Istanbul, was built to accommodate daily traffic of 10,-000 vehicles, but it now carries 40.000

Highway improvement has

drivers with little respect for traffic regulations. Red lights are not necessarily considered stop signals. If the other side seems clear, few Turkish drivers can resist the temptation to speed through a red light. At night, many vehicles do not bother to dim their bright lights and blind approaching cars. Trucks park on highways without any warning lights.

Bus and truck drivers are overworked and have been known to fall asleep at the wheel. In the cities, jay-walking is virtually a national sport. Writings painted on to the back windows of taxies and buses say more about the Turkish philosophy of driving than the official book of traffic rules. Mostly in rhyme, they read: "This is fate, my friend," or "Do not come near you will be smashed, do not attempt to pass you shall regret, or "If you are a lover, play the gui-tar; if you are a driver step on the gas pedal.' Turkish traffic acquired a

semblance of order when the military took over for a few

Inflation has rendered fines \$2 for passing through a red light - meaningless. According to the new bill, fines are to be upped as much as \$60 or \$70. Interior Minister Oguzhan Asilturk has promised to double

the 5,000-man traffic police force. But it is estimated that it

will take at least a year before the passage of the new bill and its enforcement can be realized.

In the meantime, Turkish roads are likely to remain a free-for-all, with towing trucks busy and first aid stations overcrowded.

These clubs offer the thrill and excitement of a lottery and guarantee a new car, boat or airplane to each member within 60 months

Ford Motor Co. of Brazil finds a major market in the clubs and now runs 2,300 of them, selling 20 per cent of its total Brazilian production to buying clubs. Since the first buying club was started nine years ago, Ford has sold 140,000 cars with this method. Ford has also had inquiries about the program from Europe and other Latin American countries and plans to offer it in the Phillipines.

Consumer members of the buying clubs agree to make monthly payments to the club for 60 months. The monthly payment is determined by taking the price of the item being purchased and dividing that by the number of members which, by Brazilian law must total 120. The club would buy two cars outright each month. thus avoiding interest charges. A lottery is held monthly for the

names of the winners of the two cars. A new member might win a car the first month, but will still have to keep making his monthly payments for the five years. In order to keep an early winner from defaulting on his monthly payments or disappearing with the car or airplane, two co-signers are required before delivery. There is also provision for increasing payments over

In a report published today, the doctors said, "We do not believe that vitamin C has widespread usefulness as a cold remedy. The study, led by Dr. John L. Coulehan of the University of Pittsburgh Medical School, appears in the New England Journal of Medicine. Discussion over this use of the drug has been going on since 1970, when Nobel laureate Linus Pauling said people who took large daily doses of vitamin C would have fewer colds. He also said the colds they did get would be less severe. Coulehan's part in the controversy began in 1974. when his team published the results of a study conducted on navajo boarding school students in Arizona. They concluded that the pupils who took vitamin C had milder colds.
