2. /Jewelers clean jewelry by using a brush with soap and water to which a little ammoniawater has been added; rinsing in alcohol and drying in boxwood sawdust. If you have not this means at your disposal, then use brush with soap and warm water, rinse in boiling water (use a small wire thread to hold the article) and dry quickly with a soft linen cloth.

3. Don't ever put pearls in very hot water as it will ruin their color. I will tell you more



TESTS OF WINTER WHEAT.

Turkish Red Found to Be Best, the Report Says, for Planting in Nebraska-The Need of Rich Soil.

The Nebraska agricultural experiment station has just issued bulletin No. 89, entitled "Winter Wheat. Co-operative Experiments with the United States Department of Agriculture." The bulletin gives the results of variety tests from 1902 to 1904 inclusive. The cause and treatment of many wheat troubles, the effect of good and poor seed and the effect of good and poor tillage are shown and discussed. The bulletin will be sent free to all residents of Nebraska upon a request addressed to the agricultural experiment station, Lincoln, Neb. A brief summary is appended below:

The variety tests include over a dozen sorts. These were of native, Russian and Hungarian origin. Of these Turkish Red was found to be far superior to all others and was recommended for general planting in Nebraska. The Hungarian and Russian sorts mostly mature too late to produce the highest /yields, but they are becoming earlieft.

Kharkof and Beloglina, Vested in Northern Nebraska, were found to be extremely hardy but did not yield so well as Turkish Red where the winters permitted its growth. But these two varieties, being hardier, would probably extend the winter wheat region farther north than at
