## SATURDAY'S PICNIC.

People of Deaf Smith and Castro County Spend Day in Pleasing Celebration.

At an early hour Saturday morning, carriages and wagons began rolling in at a lively rate bringing people from the four quarters of this and adjoining counties, their purpose being to participate in Hereford's annual celebration. The day was rather an unfavorable one owing to the constant blowing of the wind which created considerable dust, but the pleasure lovers were not to be daunted by a little dust; so by noon the entire grounds about the court yard and business center were thoroughly alive with the throngs as they surged to and fro.

Those present were somewhat disappointed at the speakers who had been invited not being present, but soon after all had refreshed themselves with a sumptuous repast a large degree of the disappointment was removed by the announcement that speech-making would not be overlooked.

A. J. Lipscomb after a few brief announcements introduced A. D. McNair of the Farm & Ranch who spoke briefly but interestingly in a eulogy on the plains.

J. W. English, who was next introduced, opened his speech by saying "A little nonsense, now and then, is relished by the wisest men." For several minutes Col. English kept the crowds in an uproar of laughter by his ready wit and good humor.

### Mrs. Georgia Herron-LeGrand.

The subject of this sketch was born in 1884, July 16. She departed this life on Thursday the 31st day of August 1905, being 21 years, one month and fifteen days of age. She had for some years been a true Christian. There are left, as chief among the many who mourn her death, a father and mother, two sisters and a noble husband of only a few months. Besides these, there join in grief and sympathy a large circle of relatives in central Texas, Tennessee and elsewhere, not to mention an innumerable host of friends and brethren in every place where the family has lived. The bereaved husband, Frank LeGrand, likewise has the sympathy of a large and much respected circle of relatives and friends.

Owing to the peculiar circumstances surrounding sister Georgia's death, it seems best that the writer, who understands the troubles of the past few months leading up to the dear girl's taking of her own life, should say some things in this place concerning the sad event.

There is no occasion, should any uninformed person feel inclined to do so, for reflecting in the least in any way upon the motives or conduct of any one connected with recent occurrences. It was simply one of those cases of aberration of mind caused by ill health and anxiety over which medical skill seemed to have no adequate control. I know Georgia's soul to be pure white. Particularly during the recent days of her life, she spent long seasons in prayer and the reading of her Bible. She talked much of going into the future of peace and rest, desiring to be free from the mania which often seized her. Her greatest burden seemed to be a semi-morbid fear that she had not done all that was right. No, no thought of guilt can be imputed to her in the untimely taking off. Responsibility alone makes sin possible. The Lord took her to His own arms. It will matter little to none of us what shall be the manner of our home-going, providing that we also are ready and have acted up to the full measure of responsibility while our own reason shall last. So be it. The faithful pure little woman was loved best by those who knew her best. The Saviour knew her best of all. This writer deeply felt the dear girl's suffering, and was drawn toward her in a way which words can not express.

It is hardly necessary, it would seem, to express to the family, particularly to Bro. Herron, the heart felt grief of the entire people of Hereford, and their deep and unanimous sympathy in this hour of their brother's trial. While circumstances may have temporarily operated to make him shut himself up to his own troubles, yet I am authorized to say that in word and deed every member of his own church and every man and woman and child in his home town is and has been a friend. The very children in the street would pause and wipe at least one tear from the eyes of himself for his loved ones.

On Friday afternoon, the sorrowing family took up the journey to Graham, Texas, bearing the loved remains for interment. There accompanied the family to the old home Mrs. L. Gough, Mr. N. E. Gass and the writer. Arriving there, a great multitude sadly welcomed the party, another token to cheer the broken-hearted. The interment took place Sunday morning. The writer was assisted by Eld. T. Hammer, pastor of the Christian church in Graham. Surrounded by a great concourse of those who knew her, the body was gently lowered under the grasses, but she herself looked down upon the scene from the heights of Peace.

Georgia's body sleeps under the oaks where she played in the years ago and dreamed dreams of the yet-to-be. A voice is heard,

Come away! Come away! You can hear them calling, calling,  
Calling us to come to them, and roam no more  
Over there beyond the ridges and the land  
that lies between us,  
There's an old song calling us to come.  
Come away! Come away! there is nothing  
now to cheer us—  
Nothing now to comfort us but love's road  
Home:  
Over there beyond the darkness there's a  
window gleams to greet us,  
And a warm Hearth waits for us within.  
Be thou faithful unto death, and

## Durum Wheat.

The following article on Durum wheat, written by M. A. Carleton, cerealist of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, appeared in a recent issue of the Kansas farmer:

The cultivation of Durum (macaroni) wheat is increasing very rapidly in the Southwest. During the past several years certain mills in South and North Dakota have been grinding the wheat and doing it as readily as they grind other wheat, as soon as they have become used to the proper methods of handling it. There never was a time when the Department could not tell a man where he could sell his durum wheat and the demand has increased each year in commercial quarters, and is now, and will probably remain for some time, considerably in excess of the supply.

During the winter of 1903-1904 the wheat sold for about one dollar per bushel in Duluth and Buffalo. The past winter the price has been just as good even in the face of a large crop.

Owing to the fact that local mills and elevators will not always handle the wheat, farmers should arrange to ship to Kansas City or Omaha in car lots. Many mills in the drier districts have encouraged the farmers to grow no other kind of wheat, and they are wise in doing so, because in these places it is the only kind that can be depended on to make a yield.

About twelve or fifteen varieties have been very largely distributed by the Department, and as some of these are undoubtedly much superior to others great care is urged in finding the best varieties in each locality and in keeping the seed pure. Durum wheat mixed with soft wheat cannot be milled, as it is extremely important that the seed of the two kinds be kept separate.

The durum wheat crop of this year will probably reach fifteen or twenty million bushels.
