### Crop That Talks.

The crop that is bringing the largest dividend to the property owner of this portion of the Panhandle today is the much-talked-of alfalfa.

Clarence Wheeler, who now has sixty-five acres in this valuable forage crop on his ranch a few miles east of town, is now engaged in marketing the first cutting from thirty acres which has already been spoken for at \$12.50 per ton. Owing to there not being more than a half stand on the ground, Mr. Wheeler only harvested about a half ton per acre this time, but he says he will get three more cuttings which will net as much as the first. In other words, with only a half stand Mr. Wheeler will sell about \$25 worth of Alfalfa per acre this season, which is by no means a bad proposition for \$10 or \$15 land.

### First Harvesting.

G. W. Orr of Boom, was in the city a short time Monday making arrangements to begin harvesting wheat on Tuesday morning. The first of this season's harvesting was H. K. Monroe's twenty-acre field near Boom. Mr. Orr stated that this piece of wheat will easily thrash 20 bushels per acre. At any rate, those who have seen it so express themselves.

Harvest is coming on early this year and reports from all parts of Deaf Smith and Castro counties are to the effect that we have a well matured crop of wheat and oats.

The BRAND confidently believes that it will have the pleasure of reporting as high as 30 or 35 bushels of wheat per acre in several instances this season.

### Adjusting Taxes.

The Commissioners Court has been  
busy all this week in their endeavor  
to equalize the taxes of the county.  
They have made a careful investiga-  
tion into the renditions of city prop-  
erty and find that in many instances,  
in fact in most instances, Hereford  
really is put in at from 25 per cent  
to 35 per cent of its real value.  
While on the other hand, certain  
stocks of merchandise is rendered at  
about 50 per cent and in some in-  
stances above this, which is too high.  
The court is evidently doing all in  
its power to adjust the matter and  
they invite any one who thinks his  
taxes too high to come before them  
for a fair adjustment.

The BRAND editor finds, upon ex-  
amination, that he is only paying  
upon about 35 per cent of his prop-  
erty valuation, save upon his resi-  
dence, which is rendered at about 50  
per cent. However, we have no com-  
plaint to make. If there are those  
who are paying too much taxes the  
court invites such ones to come and  
reason with them on the question.

**THROUGH PALMER COUNTY.**

County Assessor Wyche Gives Interesting Description of Our Attached Neighbor on the West.

Your correspondent has just returned from a trip through Palmer, an unorganized county attached to Deaf Smith for judicial purposes.

One is somewhat surprised to find comfortable and well appointed houses in a county recently occupied entirely by herds of cattle, and attending cow-boys. Mr. C. E. Oliver has such a home in Palmer county, 25 miles southwest of Hereford. This ranch embraces 5000 acres of land, 800 of which lies in Castro county.

Mr. Oliver formerly lived in Central Kansas, pursues the methods he followed there in the preparation of his lands for wheat; and it is needless to say he is a firm believer in deep plowing.

Continuing 13 miles southwest of Oliver's ranch, brings us to the headquarters of the Star ranch, which is owned by Kelly Bros. of Chicago. This ranch size is seven by eleven miles, and is a chip off the old X. I. T. ranch that formerly embraced the entire county. The first thing that impresses one on arrival here is the neat and up-to-date appearance of the grounds and buildings.

The next is the immense scale on which things are carried on, there being 3000 acres in cultivation in the various crops. We find here Mr. B. B. Curtis, formerly of Hereford, as manager, and everything bespeaks exclusive ability.

The dwelling is a two-story, well finished structure of 18 rooms, surrounded by a well kept park of thrifty young shade and fruit trees. Large barns and spacious sheds are in keeping with the surroundings.

The farm work on this ranch is done by a reliable self-respecting class of young white men, and who seem to have imbibed the spirit of hospitality of the popular manager, and everyone who chances to stop here is treated with the utmost civility by every one. Mr. Curtis has 60 acres of fall wheat, that although damaged by the dry weather, prior to the rain of ten days ago, is good for 20 bushels per acre, notwithstanding the fact that heavy pastured up to the 10th of April.

Leaving the Star Ranch for Bovina, and looking to the north we could see on the horizon a moving train on the Pecos Valley railway 18 miles distant.

Bovina is a growing young town on the Pecos Valley railroad in Palmer county, and does a thriving business with the surrounding ranches and settlers.

We next visited the experiment farm of Mr. H. W. Campbell, six miles northeast of Bovina. The wheat crop here had suffered some from the dry weather prior to the late rains, but looked much better than we expected to see growing on sod land. Mr. Campbell expects a yield of 30 bushels or more per acre from it.

The oats on this farm are late, owing to the delay in getting the seed. Kafir corn, milo maize, sugar beets and other field and garden crops have been planted, some of which are just up.

Mr. Campbell will summer till the land from which he harvests this year's wheat crop, that will be an eye opener.

At summerfield we were shown a crop of spring wheat by Mr. J. J. Anderson that promises a yield of 20 to 25 bushels.

On Mr. S. B. Harbison's ranch, four miles southwest of Hereford, we found thriving fields of alfalfa and speltz, and an excellent field of fall wheat. J. S. W.

### RAISING ALFALFA AND HOGS.

**Farmers in the Panhandle Making that Country to Bloom.**

(Ft Worth Farmer and Breeder.)

J. W. Conway returned Friday from a week's trip into the Western Texas plains country and to points in New Mexico. An overland ride across Hale county and talks with a number of the citizens of that and surrounding sections brought out strongly the changes now being wrought throughout West Texas. "The one thing which represents to me, more than anything else, the great possibilities of that country," said Mr. Conway, "is the interest being taken in alfalfa and hogs. Everywhere one goes he hears the settlers talking hogs and alfalfa. The amount of land out there that is being put in alfalfa is a revelation to one who has not recently visited the plains. Almost every piece of land on which it is thought the plant will grow is being put under cultivation. I rode through fields in which the alfalfa stood a foot high, and I saw some fields in bloom.

"At Plainview, in Hale county, the people are enthusiastic over the building of a new railroad, a Santa Fe branch from Canyon City to that town. Grading for this road is now under way. The new line will enable the alfalfa, kaffir corn and milo maize raisers along its lines to get busy with hogs in earnest and will open up a new territory to the Fort Worth hog market. Plainview people believe that at some not far distant date the Santa Fe will extend its lines from Plainview to San Angelo.

"It is only a matter of a few years until there will be a settler on every quarter section. Homeseekers are flocking into West and Northwest Texas in great numbers, the railroads bring carloads after carload. The lands and many of the rapidly growing towns are being advertised in nearly every town and city throughout the Middle states, and hundreds of well-to-do farmers in

Missouri, Illinois, Indiana and other states are selling their high priced lands there and buying the cheaper priced lands on the Texas plains. They are going in for diversified farming, and will be raising most all kinds of crops and live stock. Many of them have been hog raisers all of their lives and will not think of quitting the business in their new homes.

"The range is in fine condition, grass being green everywhere, plenty of rain having fallen, and cattle rapidly fattening. Cattlemen tell me that general conditions could not well be improved."

**How a Kansas Cures Alfalfa.**  
An interesting method of curing alfalfa hay is that used by Hon. J. W. Berry of Jewell, Kansas. According to Prof. Ten Eyck of the Kansas Agricultural College, Mr. Berry's plan is to cut alfalfa as soon as the dew is off in the morning, rake it green and haul it in the same day that it is cut, the only precaution being there be no moisture on the hay other than that contained in the green stems and leaves. He stores the hay in large corn cribs, the bottoms of which are elevated several feet above the ground with more or less open spaces, and the sides of the cribs are also open. The cribs are large enough to store a single cutting of alfalfa from eleven acres of ground and only cover the bottom of the crib to a depth of four or five feet. The hay is spread over the whole crib bottom in an even layer and not tramped but left light and loose as it is thrown in. The second cutting of alfalfa is placed above the first, and the third above the second, until the crib is full to the top. For three seasons now Mr. Berry has put up the hay from this field in the manner described above and each winter he has baled the hay and sold it at an average of \$2 per ton above the market price of good alfalfa hay. The hay stored and cured in this way has been greener in color and of better quality than alfalfa put up by the usual methods.

Our experiment stations have not given us as much information on hay curing as they should. There are several methods of hay making and each is adapted to certain conditions. The problem in the humid regions is a knotty one. Alfalfa hay has been put up too green in Texas and the reputation of it has suffered accordingly. Here is an excellent field for investigation by our experiment stations.—Ex.

### Work to Begin.

Arrangements have been perfected for the commencement of soliciting funds with which to erect additional room at the public school. Thus for W. B. Parmer is the only one whose services have been enlisted in the work, but those who know Mr. Parmer will understand that he will make a whole team by himself. He will begin soliciting at once and continue till he raises sufficient funds to build either a brick or frame structure to consist of three or four rooms. The plan is to prepare a list showing amount subscribed for a brick and also for a wood building.

In this connection, we wish to urge upon all the importance of prompt action, as the time from now till September is short and in order to complete the building for the opening of next session will admit of no delay.
