SUMMER NORMAL OPEN

Panhandle Teachers Gather for a Six Weeks' Training Course.

The Panhandle Summer Normal began a six-weeks session Tuesday morning. Teachers had been arriving in the city for several days, a large number coming in Monday and Tuesday. It was evident that the opening would be large, but the number has exceeded the expectations of the faculty. The first days show a total enrollment of sixty

teachers, by far the largest number ever enrolled in the Panhandle Summer Normal during the first two days. Conductor Quigley expects the enrollment to reach one hundred by the close of the session.

Conductor W. B. Quigley, in connection with Pres. Elliott of the College, has bent every effort to advertise the Normal and the attendance demonstrates that this has been well done. Every section of the Panhandle is represented. There are quite a number from Oklahoma,

New Mexico and North Texas.

The opening exercises were conducted in the chapel of the College. The enrollment of the teachers and the arrangements of the daily program occupied the hours of the morning.

Most of the Normal students are being entertained in the dormitories of the College. Special preparations had been made for the Normal by the College and the large number who have taken rooms there indicates that the faculty and students are being well cared for.

On account of unavoidable circumstances some changes have been made in the personnel of the faculty. As it now stands the following make up the corps:—Prof. W. B. Quigley, Conductor, Amarillo; Prof. R. W. Silvey, Clarendon; Prof. J. F. Johnston; Prof. Jno. W. Herod, Hereford.

At the beginning of the second day all in attendance got right down to earnest work and every one seemed to take a lively interest in the work of the various classes.

The people of Hereford extend to every one of the Normal force, both teachers and instructors, a hearty welcome and insist that they feel that all the privileges of the city are theirs during their stay with us.

SHOULD BE LOOKED AFTER

Sometime ago when street grading
was first agitated, the officials of the
Pecos Valley Road signified their
willingness to tunnel under the road
bed at the depot so that the large
accumulation of water from Dewey
Avenue could find an outlet. While
this matter seems to have been lost
sight of in connection with our recent
street grading, it is nevertheless an
important one and should be again
taken up with the proper authorities.
One or two big rains would almost
put some of the business men on the
south end of this street out of busi-
ness under the present arrangements.

RECENT investigation among our
farmers brings to light the fact that
there has been a sufficient amount of
wheat raised in Deaf Smith and
Castro Counties this year to keep a
flour mill of medium capacity run-
ning for the greater part of a year.
This wheat is of as high grade as
can be grown in Ohio or Illinois and
there is no good reason why it
should not be manufactured into flour
here and consumed by the people of
this and surrounding counties. To
be sure wheat raising in the Pan-
handle is a profitable industry, even
when it has to be shipped to market,
but it would yield a far greater
revenue and induce more farmers to

RAILROAD MEETING.

Citizens Come Together to Hear Proposition from Mr. Ransom.

A call meeting of citizens was held at the court house on Thursday evening of last week to confer with John H. Ransom, capitalist and railroad promoter of Boulder, Colorado, who has been in the city for several weeks quietly working up an interest in building a railroad from some point in Colorado via Hereford to a connection with the Texas Pacific near Sweetwater.

At this meeting, G. A. F. Parker acted as chairman and C. W. Dodson, secretary.

The first business to be taken up and disposed of was the report of the committee on right-of-way which was made through its chairman, C. G. Witherspoon and which was to the effect that the right of way through the town had been secured. After this report had been received, accepted and the committee discharged, a stirring address was made by Judge Jno. P. Slaton in which he pointed out the importance of prompt action on the part of all citizens. At the conclusion of his address, Judge Slaton offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:

Hereford, Tex., June 14th, 1906.

Whereas, John H. Ransom, of the State of Colorado, representing The Colorado-Texas Townsite & Investment Association, a corporation existing under the laws of the State of Colorado, has submitted a proposition to the citizens of the town of Hereford in Deaf Smith County, Texas, whereby he proposes to build and maintain a standard railroad from said Hereford to a juncture with the Texas & Pacific Ry.; provided that the citizens of said town of Hereford would donate to such enterprise or to the builders of such railroad the right-of-way through said town for such railroad, together with sufficient ground for sidings and switches, depot grounds, grounds for round houses and machine shops and ground south of said town sufficient for stock shipping pens, together with the sum of (\$15,000.00) Fifteen Thousand Dollars bonus, which shall hereafter be more specifically provided for by contracts to be made and entered into by and between the said John H. Ransom and the said citizens of Hereford:

Therefore, be it Resolved, by the citizens of Hereford, in mass meeting assembled on this date, that said proposition of the said John H. Ransom is accepted, and the said citizens ready and willing to enter into binding contracts, when called

upon to do so by the said John H. Ransom, to carry out and perform all the demands of the said John H. Ransom as above specified.

No further business coming up for consideration, the meeting adjourned subject to a call from the chairman.

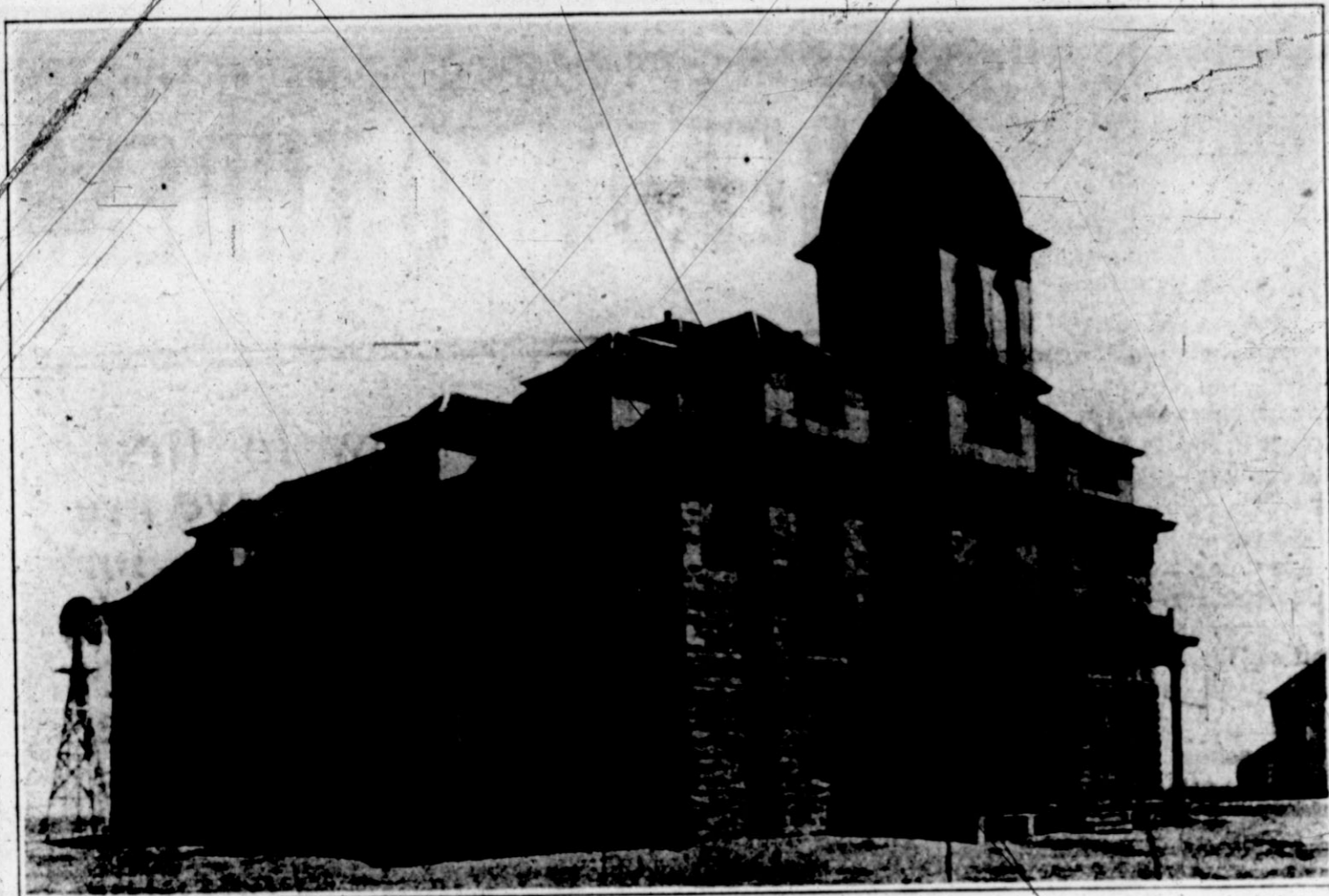

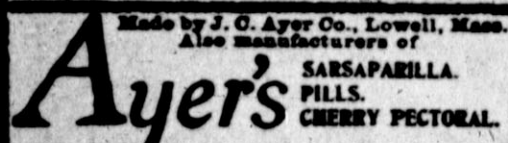

Main As Fattening Ration.
The following taken from the Ft. Worth Record presents an able argument in favor of milo maize as a fattening ration for all kinds of live-stock and especially hogs:

The superior qualities of milo maize as a food ration for animals are only recognized in part by the farmers of West Texas. Time and experience, principally the experience of others, are required to change habits long formed in the pursuit of agriculture, and as our fathers knew nothing of milo maize, their sons do not seem eager to form its intimate acquaintance; yet no grain so far cultivable in the semi-arid portion of West Texas yields with more certainty, produces so abundantly and affords so much of roughage and fattening material for livestock as does milo maize and its cousin, Kafir corn.

As a fattening ration for hogs it is unsurpassed, even by Indian corn, the king crop of the country. Less than two weeks ago a farmer from Donley county brought to the Fort Worth market a carload of hogs of his own raising fattened on milo maize that averaged near 250 pounds and made near the top of the market.

Last season Swift & Co. put two lots of common Texas hogs on feed in their experimental pens near the packing house, one of which was fed on Indian corn and tankage and the other on crushed milo maize and Kafir corn and tankage, and when the two lots were slaughtered, the one fed on milo maize excelled the corn fed lot in the percentage of dressed meat.

The merits of milo maize as a cattle ration where roughage is required to supplement the winter's supply of grass have come to be recognized in many places in West Texas, but the merits of this cereal as a fattening ration, exclusively or in combination with other feeds, have not become widely known, or if known have not secured for the grain a general use.

The X. I. T. ranch, however, has pursued a course of steer feeding with milo maize that is worthy of close imitation by others, because the results obtained justify placing this grain on a par with Indian corn as a fattening ration for steers and ahead of cotton seed meal or cake.

The X. I. T. ranch reports fifty steers on feed followed by hogs, the steers making excellent gains and the hogs doing very well behind them. Month before last some of the steers made over three pounds a day average gain and were dipped during the month. Nearly four pounds of gain per head per day were made last month on a bunch of ten. The steers were not selected, having among them some very ordinary ones, and all in poor condition when put on feed.

A bunch of hogs fed on the same ranch on maize meal and water for thirty days made a gain of over fifty-two pounds per head in that time.

West Texas farmers can materially assist in emancipating themselves from adverse conditions by going in for the cultivation of milo maize and feeding it to steers and hogs.

Executive Committee Meets.

The County Democratic Executive Committee, Hon. Carl Cilleland Chairman, met Monday afternoon and after several hours of arduous work perfected arrangements for holding a Democratic primary election on July 28th. This was the last "day of grace" and the committee had to do some fast work to make the necessary arrangements.

A form for the official ballot will be prepared within the next few days and this office will print same free of charge to the candidates.
