Much effective work has been done by the Press the past few years to aid the home merchant against the incursions of the mail order houses of the large cities; much more work yet remains to be done. There is hardly a town in the entire south which has not felt the unwholesome results of the general practice of sending away to Sears Robuck, Montgomery Ward and others for such articles as could be had of the home merchant at practically the same price.

No better argument has ever been put forth along this line than that offered by Gov. Joseph W. Folk in addressing the retail merchants of Missouri at their recent convention. He said in part:

"We are proud of our splendid cities and we want them to increase in wealth and population and we also want our countries to grow. We wish the city merchants to build up, but we also desire the country merchants to prosper. I do not believe in the mail-order citizen. If a place is good enough for a man to live in and take his money in, it is good enough for him to spend his money in."

"No merchant can succeed without advertising in one way or another. Patronize your town papers, build them up and they will build our town up and build you up in increased trade and greater opportunities. Do not be afraid your business is going to be hurt by the recent exposure of wrongdoing in the commercial world. No man who is doing an honest business can be injured by the light. All business will be better for the cleansing process it is going through andamping out evils."

Forty Bushels.

The idea that soft wheat will not do well in this country has received a knock-out blow. C. M. Thomson of Moore county threshed forty bushels and one peck to the acre off four acres farmed according to the Campbell system. Thirty acres farmed the old way averaged thirty bushels.—Dalhart Texan.

The above is only one of the many instances in which the Campbell system of soil culture gains a decided victory over the careless and haphazard methods which have too long been practiced in all parts of Texas. We believe this new method of farming in the West is destined to become universally adopted, for its advantages cannot help but be seen by everyone who has witnessed the results. Deaf Smith and Castro County farmers practicing the Campbell System to a considerable extent, to which fact alone may be attributed the abundant grain crops the past two years. If the farmers of West Texas will be even more careful in the observance of the fundamental rules of soil culture in their preparations for wheat sowing this fall, better results will follow than have hitherto been known.

Ransom, promoter of the "Panhandle Short Line" Road, arrived from Boulder, Colorado, this week and is making headquarters in this city, pending the arrangement of details, such as bonuses, right-of-way, etc. Mr. Ransom stated to a BRAND reporter that his company is now ready to start the survey as soon as our people come up to the requirements which have been repeatedly named in these columns.

As yet there has been no systematic canvass for the \$15,000 bonus which is asked of Hereford, but what soliciting has been done has been freely responded to by the most of the citizens. There are yet many others to be seen and the committee will look after this part of the work at an early date.  mand for labor which it is impossible
 to supply. There are numbers of
 houses, besides much other work,
 which are waiting to be built, but
 which must be deferred to a time
 when they will take their regular
 turn. Not only are all the trades
 and professions prospering, but busi-
 ness in all lines has been far above
 the standard this season. In our
 recent rounds, we have been unable
 to find a single business man who
 has not enjoyed a lucrative trade.

With the successes of the past and
 the bright prospects which the future
 holds out to us, we have every en-

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Fixing Salaries and Per Diem of Legislators.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION authorizing the submission to a vote of Section 24, Article 3, of the State of Texas, fixing the salaries and mileage of members of the Legislature, and preventing the acceptance, for themselves or for others, by members of the Legislature of free passes, franks, rebates, privileges or advantages from certain persons and corporations.

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That at the next general election of the State of Texas, or at any previous election, in case an election for the State shall be had or ordered by the Governor for other purposes, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas, for their approval or disapproval, the following amendment to the Constitution of the state of Texas, as provided for in Section 1, Article 17 of said Constitution, relating to proposed amendments thereto, it being intended to amend Section 24, Article 3, of said Constitution, relating to the pay of members of the Legislature, so that the said Section shall read as follows:

SEC. 23 The members of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury such compensation for their services as may from time to time be provided by law, not exceeding one thousand dollars for the year succeeding their election, payable in equal installments, on the first days of January, February, March and April of the year succeeding their election, and five dollars per day for each of every special session held during the second year of the term for which said members shall be elected. In addition to said compensation the members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed three cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railways or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session. It shall be unlawful for any member of the Legislature during his term of office to accept any free transportation over any railway line or lines in this State, and any member of the Legislature violating the provisions of this Act prohibiting the acceptance of free transportation shall forfeit the office to which he has been elected. And it shall be unlawful for any of such members to accept, receive, have, use or enjoy, directly or indirectly, for themselves or any other person, any free pass, frank, rebate, privilege or advantage not accorded to the general public from any railroad company, telegraph company, telephone company, sleeping car company, or other corporation, or any persons, firm or corporation acting as a common carrier in this State. Any member of the Legislature violating this provision shall forfeit his office. And the necessary laws shall be enacted to carry out the provisions of this Article.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Levy of a Tax to Pay Jurors.

JOINT RESOLUTION amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the levying of a tax of not exceeding fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, to pay jurors.

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for road and bridges, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollars valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25th, 1883, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, in any one year, and except as is in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws.

SEC. 2. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified voters of the State of Texas, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1906, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, "For the amendment to authorize the levy of a tax to pay jurors." The voters opposed to this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, "Against the amendment to authorize the levy of a tax to pay jurors."

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Relating to Certain Exemptions from Taxation.

JOINS RESOLUTION to amend Section 2 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to certain exemptions from taxation.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 2, of Article VIII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended that the same shall read as follows, to wit:

"All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the Legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools, also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales, made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages; that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale, by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

SECTION 2. The Governor of the State shall and is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election for State and County officers.

SECTION 3. The qualified electors for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas shall vote upon this amendment on the day of _____, at which election all persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "For amendment to section 2, Article 8 of the Constitution exempting from taxation endowment funds used exclusively for school purposes." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "Against amendment to Section 2, Article 8, of the Constitution exempting from taxation endowment funds used exclusively for school purposes."

SECTION 4. The sum of \$5000 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication, proclamation and election.

ONE OF THE BEST CROPS.

J. J. Edgerton of Channing Experiment Station Writes Interestingly About Popular Pan-handle Crop.

"One of the best crops for the Western farmer to grow in the place of a part of the wheat acreage, is the dwarf milo. This is a good crop for these localities because it is well adapted to the moderate rainfall and generally severe crop conditions that often prevail here. It is also a good crop for these sections because it is giving evidence of being a most excellent feed for the fattening of cattle, sheep and swine. This latter is very important as this portion of the country should, for the sake of the productiveness of the land if for no other reason, grow and fatten a large amount of live stock and utilize every bit of the manure that results therefrom.

It is a well established fact that one year's experimenting does not establish any given point, but the work done here at Channing last year, in co-operation with the Department of Agriculture, indicates that quite thick planting of this crop will give larger yields of grain than will be obtained from thinner plantings. In the rate of planting test with this crop the thickest planting gives a yield of 40 bushels of grain per acre, while but 30 bushels were obtained from the thinnest planting. The thin stand results in large heads and an appearance, when looking at the field, of a much larger yield of grain but when threshed and weighed up it was found that the greater number of heads on the thicker planting had much more than made up what they had lacked in size.

This factor, if it so proves, of yielding more grain from thick planting, is a very important one as it enables the crop to be grown in a manner to produce the highest quality of roughage without decreasing the yield of grain. The forage of this crop is not generally considered to be of much value. This impression I find to be due to the fact that the crop is not generally cut at the proper time. If cut at the right time it is most excellent feed, especially if it has been grown in a good thick stand. It should be cut when the seed is in the stiff dough stage. If left until the seed is fully ripe the leaves dry up and begin to drop off. The stalk also becomes rapidly woody at this stage.

As above indicated, this result in yields is not to be taken as conclusive but only as the result of one season's conditions. In other years, with a different distribution of rainfall, the result might be very different. The rate of planting in the above test ranged from 4.25 to 17 inches between the stalks in the row, and the rows were 42 inches apart.

As to the feeding value of the grain above referred to, we are now conducting an experiment with it, and while this experiment is not yet complete, it has progressed far enough to justify the statement that the grain is a most excellent feed for the fattening purposes. The steers, which we have been feeding four months, have made very satisfactory gains, and on a comparatively small amount of grain. We have a bunch of hogs behind each lot of steers to pick up the waste, and up to the present time less than five and one-half pounds of grain have sufficed to make a pound of beef and pork combined.

Taking, as a basis, the result thus far obtained a thin bushel crop of milo would produce over 380 pounds of beef and pork, and a forty bushel crop over 500 pounds of beef and pork per acre. A small amount of cotton seed cake is fed in the above ration to partially balance it.

From the time of cutting this crop last fall until late this spring our horses were fed entirely upon bundle milo together with a little bundle Kaffir corn as a variety. No other grain was used for horses at hard work and they kept in excellent condition all the time. It is not so hard as corn and can be ground with less expenditure for power. For horses, it can be fed in the bundle or in the head with good results, as they will masticate it thoroughly, scarcely any sign of grain being found in the droppings. For cattle or hogs, however, it is essential that the grain be ground. — Farm and Ranch.
