Final Arrangements Perfected for Car to Make Northern Tour.

We give below a report from the Amarillo Herald of a meeting of the Panhandle Exhibit Association which was recently held in Amarillo:

A well attended and very harmonious meeting of the Panhandle Association was held Saturday night at the court house, and among other business transacted a gentleman was appointed to accompany the exhibit car on its Northern and Eastern trip. The selection was in the person of W. A. Ward, one of the most successful and prominent farmers of the Panhandle. Reports from the various committees were heard, and were, indeed, flattering, as the interest being shown in the work is better than expected. Mr. Morrow, the traveling representative, reported having received twenty memberships outside of the city making an increase of the financial end of about \$500. The subscription from the business men here amounts to \$400, and from the real estate men \$700—total, \$1,675. It is the intention

now to raise at least \$2,500, and possibly \$3,000. F. W. Zimmerman was appointed general solicitor for the exhibits, together with J. H. Wills, R. H. McAlpine and W. S. Roberts. Hereford has been invited to select an assistant to Mr. Ward, which will be done this week. Mr. Morrow is on the South Plains this week, soliciting membership.

AS our community continues to

 be better for the hotel proprietors,
 for the town and would prove a pro-
 fitable investment for some of our
 capitalists who have a few thousand
 surplus.

WE wish to make special mention
 of the splendid order which was wait-
 nessed on our streets last Saturday.
 Of all days when people are inclined
 to be disorderly, election days are
 perhaps the worst; but Hereford
 seems to be making a new custom
 in this respect. With the exception
 of a friendly interest which was mani-
 fested by friends for their favored
 Candidate, Saturday was not at all
 different from other days. In all our
 rounds, but few oaths were heard
 and not a single man was seen to be
 under the influence of intoxicants, not
 even any of the candidates seemed

MANY OPINIONS CHANGED

The fine red peaches which are
 now to be seen hanging from the
 trees in almost every orchard in the
 vicinity of Hereford are having a
 good effect upon old-timers as well
 as new comers in that the former
 impressions that peaches would not
 grow here have been entirely re-
 moved. If there are those who have
 not been permitted to enjoy this
 luscious fruit this season it is either
 because of their neglect in planting
 the trees or that they have not been
 here sufficiently long to grow them.

This year's crop will be the means
 of many small peach orchards being
 planted throughout this section of
 country this coming autumn and
 next spring. As great and surpris-
 ing changes may reasonably be
 looked for along the line of fruit
 growing on the plains as have been
 witnessed in agriculture.

\$20 LAND PREDICTED

It now begins to look as if Pan-

WHILE there is not being a great deal said about the railroad outside of this immediate community at present, nevertheless some effective work is being done as the days come and go. Mr. Ransom, the promoter, with others of our citizens, is now on the southern end of the line making a careful and thorough investigation as to the securing of the right-of-way and looking after other details which must have attention before the road can be built. In due time our soliciting committees will raise the required bonus for this town so that Hereford can, in every particular, comply with her part of the contract. There seems to be a disposition on the part of a few to stand back and wait for their neighbors to shoulder the responsibility of securing the funds and right-of-way to induce the road to be built. We believe that, at such times when the welfare of the entire community is at stake, every citizen owes the duty to himself and to his country to give liberally of his means and influence. "The Panhandle Short Line" can as well build through some other point as through Hereford and we can expect nothing more nor less that promptly come forth with the small bonus which is asked of us. Every one who has a dollar's worth of property in the community should carefully weigh the benefit which he would derive from the certainty of having the general offices for Texas and the machine shops located in Hereford, and freely give accordingly.

Our attention has been called to the condition of the street crossings by a number of farmers this week who have grain to haul to market. It is necessary for all those marketing grain to drive to the scales on Dewey Avenue which is almost an impossibility since the streets have been graded, owing to the high embankment which was left. We feel that this was overlooked unintentionally by the grading committee, but it is a matter which should have prompt attention as it is but a few days when our streets will be crowded with grain wagons.

Let's give the farmer every convenience in our power; he deserves the very best.

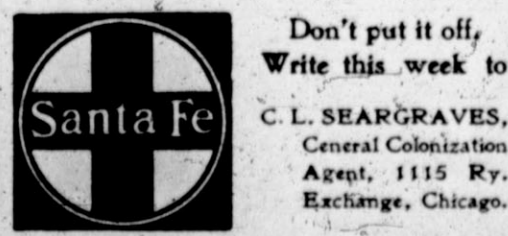

W. H. M. Society.

The August business session of the Woman's Home Mission Society will be held at the M. E. church next Tuesday, August 7th, four o'clock p. m.

During the past year, the Woman's Home Mission Society has helped to build 123 parsonages with \$11,675.39 and the Board has made 29 grants valued at \$4,327.60.

The Hereford auxiliary met in the mid-monthly session last Tuesday with a good number present to answer to roll call.

"Our Homes" now has a subscription list of 11,964. First number was issued January, 1892.

Twelve deaconesses are at work in our church field; 3 as pastors' assistants, 2 in our Home Mission schools, 6 in city missions and 1 in the foreign field. Seven additional ones will be consecrated and given work this next year.

Our Hereford society has recently lost a valued and faithful member in Mrs. E. J. Jackson, who has moved to her old home in Missouri.

Twenty three city mission boards have done active work during this past year.

Through our supply department, 825 boxes have been sent to preachers, mission schools and orphanages, valued at \$24,213.03.

No word has been had relative to date of the district joint conference of the W. H. M. and Foreign Societies to be held in Hereford. The supposition is that the date will be fixed later than the usual time, which has been first of August.
