Black by making publication of this citation once in each week for a period of four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in a newspaper published in the nearest county where a newspaper is published, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Deaf Smith County, to be holden at the courthouse thereof, in Hereford on the 10th Monday after the second Monday in January 1923, the same being the 30th day of April, 1923, in a suit numbered on the docket of said court No. 1378, wherein Fannie B. Curtis is plaintiff and E. G. Black, Earl H. Lewis, M. A. Lewis, and John Lewis are defendants; said petition alleging:

That on November 26, 1919, the defendant E. G. Black executed and delivered to plaintiff his five certain promissory vendor lien notes, each for the sum of \$1200.00 due and payable 1-2-3-4 and 5 years from date, bearing seven percent interest per annum, from date, said interest payable annually; and further providing that in event of failure default, refusal or neglect to pay each of said notes when due that the owner and holder thereof, might have the right to elect to declare each and all of said notes due and payable; said notes each provide for ten per cent attorney's fees if placed in the hands of an attorney for collection; that said notes, were given for part of

the purchase money for Section No. 19 in Township 3 North Range 3 East, of a Capitol Syndicate subdivision of Capitol Reservation League No. 422, of lands in Deaf Smith County, Texas, and that a vendor's lien was retained in the deed of conveyance from plaintiff to said defendant Black to secure the payment of each of said notes, and is likewise retained in each of said notes; plaintiff alleges that the second note of said series of notes, together with the interest on all of said notes was due and payable on the 20th day of November, 1921, and that default was made in the payment thereof, together with the interest on all of said notes—that plaintiff has declared each of said notes, together with the attorney's fees thereon due and payable; plaintiff prays for judgment
