**Raise More Sheep.**  
That Texas is specially adapted to the sheep growing industry is a well recognized fact by everyone who is at all acquainted with the almost unlimited resources of the state. Notwithstanding this, it is sad to note that Texas falls far short of producing enough sheep to supply the local demand.

Commenting upon the situation as it really exists, the Texas Stockman and Farmer, published at San Antonio, says:

"It is almost a daily occurrence for Fort Worth packers to receive shipments of fat lambs and mutton sheep from Colorado, Missouri, Kansas and other northern and western states. Texas packers are forced to slaughter sheep for the purpose of supplying demands upon them for mutton for their Texas and southern trade, and inasmuch as they cannot purchase them in Texas they are forced to bring them long distances from other states. The Stockman and Farmer has time and again urged Texas farmers to grow and fatten more sheep in order to supply the growing demand for early fat lambs and fat muttons. Texas instead of standing several notches below the top in the production of mutton sheep should easily rank first. It is an undisputed fact that Texas soil and climate is the best in the world for the successful growing of sheep, and it is equally as well established that in Texas can be and is grown at less cost than elsewhere the food products for the rapid fattening of sheep. Mutton can be produced cheaper in Texas than elsewhere, and has been by the few who have tried and know how to do it. This being true it is hard for us to understand why Texas farmers do not grow and fatten more mutton sheep. If farmers less fortunately situated in other states can grow sheep and ship them a thousand miles and more to Texas markets and make a profit by doing so, why do not Texas farmers claim this industry as their own? Here is an industry that should appeal to the Texas farmer in the boll weevil district, and especially to the Texas farmer who has soil admirably adapted to the growing of alfalfa. Those farmers in Texas who are raising sheep say that they are the most profitable of any animal on the farm."

### HAVE YOU SEEN IT?

The above question is somewhat  
indefinite on its face, but when one  
knows to what it refers, it is not at  
all improbable that almost every  
citizen of Hereford can answer with  
one accord "Yes!" The traveling  
men and all the homeseekers who  
have visited our city the past two  
years have seen it and it has filled  
them all alike with bewilderment.  
They have been wholly unable to  
realize what it all means. The one  
object and the only one which has  
created so wide-spread attention is  
the dumping ground, only a few  
steps east of the depot. None of us  
see this spot because we want to, but  
because we are compelled to. There  
is nothing to separate it from our  
view and all that remains to be done  
is to open wide both eyes and be-  
hold the massive heaps of tin cans  
and filthy refuse. That this is an  
eye-sore to our standard of decency  
is certainly recognized by everyone.  
We have a public dumping ground  
only a short way east of town to  
which all such should be taken.  
To make the matter plain, the  
Western Union Land Company owns  
the land now being used for this  
purpose and they have already given  
notice of their intention of prosecut-  
ing those who persist in the offense.  
This practice should be discontinued  
immediately, if for no other reason  
than general appearances to say  
nothing of the protection of our  
town from the incursions of dan-  
gerous diseases.

THE work of rebuilding San Fran-  
cisco has already been begun and  
soon, it is believed, a city greater  
than the one just destroyed will  
adorn the spot which is now a mass  
of dingy and worthless ruins. The  
determination of mankind is indeed  
great when he is driven to the last  
extremity. A people who could  
pass undaunted through such a dis-  
aster as that but recently witnessed  
certainly deserve nothing short of  
the applause of the civilized world.

FARMERS are rejoicing over the  
warm, clear weather which has pre-  
vailed the past week. The Pan-  
handle certainly furnishes an ideal  
climate for spring planting.

### WAYS TO PREPARE SOIL.

A trip through the wheat belt this  
week, thoroughly convinces us that  
it pays in a many-fold ratio to pre-  
pare the land well, it matters not  
what is going to be planted. Where  
the proper attention was given to  
the preparation of the soil, there  
was not only a good stand of grain  
secured, but it is now a dark-green  
color, promising an abundant yield,  
while in other instances where the  
crop was planted with but little care  
being exercised in the process, the  
grain is both scattering on the  
ground and presents a yellow, un-  
healthy condition. To make farm-  
ing a success in this country nothing  
short of careful preparation and cul-  
tivation of the soil will be required.  
This is the case in all other parts of  
the country and the Panhandle is  
certainly no exception to the rule in  
this respect. Our prediction now is  
that Prof. Campbell will harvest  
from five to ten bushels more wheat  
per acre this season than others who  
have planted this crop for the simple  
reason that he has observed the  
latest and best approved cultural  
methods to a greater extent than  
anyone-else. Less acreage and bet-  
ter and more thorough cultivation  
should be the motto of every Pan-  
handle farmer.

### Brings Fancy Price.

Of the registered Hereford cattle  
which L. R. Bradley exhibited at the  
Amarillo convention last week, he  
sold one two-year-old bull to Col. R.  
A. Campbell of Kansas City to head  
a bunch of registered Herefords, the  
price paid being \$250.

Our local breeders have made  
much progress in the improvement  
of their herds the past few years  
and it is pleasing to note that even  
the Missouri breeders of the boasted  
corn belt and blue-grass regions are  
finding it to their interest to come to  
the Panhandle for headers of their  
herds.

Two Hundred and Fifty dollars,

#### DRY FARMING.

Press Bulletin Issued by New Mexico College of Agriculture and Experiment Station.

"Many inquiries regarding dry farming and the Campbell system of agriculture, have reached this office. These inquiries indicate a growing demand for information on the subject of dry farming. The press of the West and the agricultural journals are devoting a good deal of space to the subject at the present time. Many farmers are taking up dry farming in an experimental way. Hundreds of others are staking both money and valuable time upon the successful termination of the issue in hand. Not a few will resort to pumping by means of which to supplement the normal rainfall or other inadequate means of water supply.

Now that dry farming is attracting so much attention, and in view of the fact that large sections of the country are being rapidly settled by would be farmers on the lines of this system, it is of the most vital importance to every one interested in the agricultural progress of the country, that the beginning efforts of the farmers in these newly settled sections shall in a large measure meet with success. It would be a very easy matter to picture the re-

sult of failure. The development of the country might be greatly retarded, and possibly even postponed for many years. Therefore, in order to avoid any such direful possibilities, every farmer, whether he expects to practice dry farming with or without the natural precipitation being supplemented by well water, should be conscious of the fact that upon him rests the future possible development and prosperity of a great commonwealth,—to the end that he will bend every energy toward making it a success. This naturally implies that he will not only become most familiar with the systems that have given the best results wherever practiced under similar conditions, but, further, that he will come to understand the principle involved, that is, he will know what will be the probable result of each operation as well as what may follow neglect or untimely effort.

Dry farming is based upon two principal objects, namely, the forming of a water reservoir for the holding of the water that comes to the land either in the form of rain or by irrigation, and upon holding that water in the soil until the crop can make use of it. Briefly stated the Campbell system consists of deep plowing to form a capacious water reservoir; Subsurface pack-

ing to augment percolation downward and reestablish capillarity from below, and constant, thorough, fairly deep surface culture in order to prevent the loss of moisture by evaporation from the surface. Proper implements are absolutely necessary to success. Every farmer may gain a fair knowledge of the subject of dry farming. Write to Dr. A. C. True, U. S. D. A., Washington, D. **Wool**

**Price Soars to High Figures Notwithstanding Effort of Eastern Buyers to Hold it Down.**

Thirty-cent wool is the prediction which is freely made at the present time by Wyoming flock masters for the 1906 clip, and as a result efforts of eastern buyers to contract for this year's clip at lower prices are in many instances in vain, remarks the Cheyenne Tribune. While this prediction seems somewhat exaggerated, it appears to be confirmed by existing conditions. In Boston, wool buyers are paying as high as 27 cents a pound for old wool, and this at a time when the 1906 clip is about to be thrown on the market.

Last week United States Marshal F. A. Hadsell had no difficulty in selling a clip of 40,000 pounds at Chicago at 24 cents and now John Wilkinson has turned down an offer of over 24 cents for about 50,000 pounds.

It is learned that wool buyers are quietly working all over the western country to induce sheepmen to contract this season's wool clip at prices ranging from 24 to 26 cents before the spring rise in price occurs, and prominent sheepmen are advising the flock masters to hold off for a better price.

Three years ago 15-cent wool was considered a good price. The next season it rose to 20 cents and last spring, when predictions of 25-cent wool were made, the statement was ridiculed. Yet before the end of the season many clips brought as high as 26 and 27 cents. And now 30-cent wool is not only a possibility, but so confident are sheep men that it will become a reality that they refuse to contract their clips at less. With an unexceptionally fine winter, aside from the recent storm, which did but little damage, Wyoming flock masters are facing one of the brightest years in the history of the wool industry in the west.—Drovers' Journal.

The above will be an interesting item for the wool growers of this and adjoining counties. The eastern buyers have hitherto secured the wool in this section far under the market price simply because they were not informed as to the true market value of their product. Our association has awoken to the fact that they have not been getting a square deal, and will no longer turn their wool loose until they are certain that it is bringing its value. Thirty cents per pound for wool will sound pretty good to the man who has 2000 sheep.

**In Operation.**

The new dynamo at the electric light plant has been installed and Hereford has again been lighted by electricity since Monday night.

The change in machinery and dynamo has incurred a large expense upon the owners, but they have heroically pressed forward until they now have a plant which would do credit to a town twice the size of Hereford. It is such enterprise that builds cities and brings to the inhabitants the conveniences of modern times and it is the duty of every citizen of Hereford to heartily co-operate with Messrs Tucker & Jacobsen in making the enterprise a financial success. However, judging from this past, we hardly deem it necessary to make this argument in their favor, for it is not characteristic of a Hereford citizen to withhold his influence and support from any worthy public enterprise.

**Graduating Class.**

Rather elaborate preparations are now in progress by the graduating class of the public school for the closing exercises which will occur next month. This has indeed been a banner year for our schools and the graduating class this year is composed of students who have done their work well.

#### Public Tabernacle.

A move is now under headway to build a public tabernacle on some centrally located block in Hereford. While the structure would be used primarily for protracted and camp meetings for all denominations, it could also be made to serve a good purpose as a place for all kinds of public gatherings.

A tabernacle as outlined above is much needed in our city and we see no reason why it should not be built. A committee is now at work on the project and developments will be announced later.
