Negotiations Lag; Strike 'Inevitable'

Gas Tax Junked By House

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House of Representatives, working through the last sections of President Carter's national energy program, is adhering to White House wishes except for the issue of a higher gasoline tax.

With House leaders hoping to complete work on the bill today before Congress begins a month-long recess, the main votes remaining are on a Republican effort to junk the President's energy plan in favor of their own.

Meanwhile, James Schlesinger, Carter's nominee to head the new Department of Energy, was scheduled to be sworn in today in a White House

Schlesinger won Senate confirmation in the post on Thursday, hours after Carter signed the first legislative department in 11 years.

Generally, the GOP alternative energy plan calls for less regulation of the oil industry. Backers of the proposal say it would assure ample fuel supplies and prevent a repetition of last winter's shortages and plant closings.

The Republican blueprint has virtually no chance of approval by the Democratic House, and Republicans are so confident that Carter's program won't work that they already have announced plans to campaign against it in next year's congressional elections.

In debate Thursday, lawmakers handed the President one of his few setbacks on the bill, rejecting a plan he supported to hike the federal gasoline tax by a nickel a gallon. The vote was 339-82 against increasing the current tax of four

A proposed tax hike of four cents also was defeated, 370-52

The House took these other actions Rejected by voice vote a proposed four-cent increase to 11 cents in the tax

on gasoline for private aircraft. -Killed, 226-190, a proposal to earmark crude oil tax revenues for support of Social Security benefit payments.



Remember All Those Sunflowers?

Carter Signs Jobs-Giving Bill

Carter is signing legislation to put 200,000 young Americans to work under a \$1-billion program that includes park and forestry jobs like those in the Depression-era Civilian conservation

Carter scheduled a ceremony today in the Rose Garden at the White House to put his signature on the bill, intended to

The program includes training, and part of it is aimed at cutting the rate of high

The President set aside time for the signing before meeting for the third time in two days with President Julius Nyerer

Powell said the two leaders are turning to efforts to improve relations between Tanzania and the United States after discussing the possibilities of bringing black majority rule to Rhodesia without an escalation to massive bloodshed and

Washington about midweek. Carter asked Congress for the youth jobs program to attack persistent high rates of unemployment among the nation's 23 million young workers. In recent years, the unemployment rate for persons between 16 and 24 years old has

hovered around 15 per cent Icen-age unemployment is even higher. For blacks and other minorities, it ranges from 35 to 40 per cent. The national unemployment rate is "1 per cent, which means about seven million persons are out of work.

The new program, funded in May with \$1 billion, provides:

A Young Adult Conservation Corps, patterned after the Civillian Conservation Corps (CC established during the

The program will put 35,000 persons between the ages of 16 and 23 to work stocking streams, planting trees and repairing trails in the national parks and forests. The jobs will last a year each and pay at least the minimum wage. About a third of the money for the jobs will be earmarked for work in state and local parks and forets

-30,000 jobs in local communities for people 16 to 19 years old.

These jobs will provide 20 hours of work a week during school and 40 hours a week during the summer if the workers stay in school. Each community can determine jobs to be handled by the workers, from weatherizing homes of the

-138,000 jobs and work training positions for people 16 to 21 years old

from low income families These jobs will prepare workers for careers. State and local governments can experiment with a variety of training projects. Funds for the jobs generally will be distributed according to each state's

A nationwide strike by 700,000 telephone workers, including Hereford Southwestern Bell employes, is almost inevitable, the chief union negotiator in contract talks with the Bell System said Thursday

President Glenn E. Watts of the Communications Workers of America said that bargaining has come to a standstill. He said that time for the negotiations, recessed since Tuesday, is running out.

"I can see no way to avoid a strike unless there is a dramatic break-through in the next few hours, which I candidly do not forsee," Watts told a news conference.

Current contracts with the Bell System expire at midnight Saturday and the unions involved in the negotiations have threatened a strike at 12:01 a.m. EDT

In addition to the CWA with its 500,000 members, the unions involved are the International Brotherhood of Electrical workers, representing 120,000 workers, and the Tele-communications International Union with about 70,000 members.

The unions rejected the company's offer July 21 of a new three-year contract with a 10 per cent wage increase, plus cost-of-living adjustments over the life of the agreement. The proposal would have raised the average salary of a top-paid craft worker earning \$333.50 by 18.3 per cent over the three years.

Watts said the proposal was far below recent settlements in the auto and steel industries and declared that his members would not accept anything substantially below those agreements. Steel and auto workers won wage increases of about 10 per cent a year in three-year contracts.

Watts predicted that if a strike is called, it would be a lengthy one and would seriously disrupt telephone

The contracts expiring Saturday with the American Telephone & Telegraph Company cover the 23 Bell System operating companies; the Western Electric Co., Bell's manufacturing arm; and the Bell Laboratories.

John Clemmons, district manager of Southwestern Bell, doesn't expect a strike would cause any "undue hardship on the Amarillo area.'

Clemmons in a telephone interview with the Brand from his Amarillo office this morning said, "We have made plans (See STRIKE, Page 2)

Zoos Investigated For Illegal Reptiles

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - Zoo officials 'were just looking the other way' as an international smuggling ring brought more than 600 rare contraband reptiles into the United States, a federal prosecutor says.

"I think the mentality among the zoos in this country when this investigation started was, 'If you can get an animal, get it." U.S. Atty. David Marston said Thursday after a federal grand jury here indicted 12 persons in a two and one-half year investigation that ranged from the United States to France, Switzerland, Africa and Australia.

Eight of the nation's most prestigious 2005 were identified as having received the contraband animals. The zoos are: the National Zoological Park in Washington, D.C., a branch of the Smithsonian Institution; the Philadelphia Zoological Garden; St. Louis Zoological Park, Dallas Zoo; Knoxville Tenn. Zoo; Sacramento Calif. Zoo; Seneca Park Zoo in Rochester, N.Y.; and Overton Park Zoo in Memphis.

Although no zoo officials were named in the indictments, Marston said the U.S. Interior Department would seek civil penalties against institutions and curators that received the rare snakes. lizards, crocodiles and other cold-blooded

Zoo officials denied any complicity in the alleged smuggling.

"We did not smuggle any snakes." said Charles Hoessle, deputy director of the St. Louis Zoo. "We bought the animals in good faith. The animals were in the country at the time we negotiated for them. If the animals were contraband, we weren't aware of it."

He declined further commment, saying federal authorities had asked zoo officials not to discuss the case.

In Memphis, Tenn., zoo director Charles Wilson said he believed the two Fijiiguanas at his zoo were not listed

purchased. "To my knowledge, those iguanas were bought before the Fiji Islands declared they were endangered and we believed we were buying them from a reputable dealer," he said.

"The thing that shocks me is that if they were illegal, then why blame us," he said. "We didn't import the animals and did not know they were illegal, if that is the case.

Wilson said he has not been contacted by Customs officials, who conducted the investigation, but said Charles Beck, the zoo's curator of aquaria and reptiles, had testified twice before the grand jury.

Ronald T. Reuther, president of the Philadelphia Zoological Garden, said last February when the investigation was announced that "these animals came in with permits we thought were proper."

A Customs official said the investigation showed that more than 600 reptiles were illegally brought into this country.

About 300 of the reptiles died shortly after being "clandestinely brought into the United States on one expedition in late 1974," the official said. The resale value of the 300 surviving snakes (and other reptiles was estimated at \$35,000.

Marston said the indictments were the first ever under the Endangered Species Act of 1973. He said the penalty for conviction of illegally importing animals is \$5,000 for each offense.

Amnesty Too Late for Alien

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter's proposal to allow millions of illegal aliens to stay in the United States came too late to help a 23-year-old El Salvadorean name Tomas

By the time Carter announced his proposal Thursday. Tomas was back in El-Salvador, the victim of bad luck and too much to drink. But millions of other illegal aliens in this country may get to stay without fear of deportation if Congress approves Carter's plans

Carter asked that illegal aliens who can prove they were in the United States before 1970 be made legal residents.

eventually able to apply for citizenship. Those who slipped into the country between Jan 1 1970, and Dec. 31, 1976.

would be eligible for what Carter called "temporary resident" status. By registering, they could stay in the United States for five years and hold jobs. They would not be able to get welfare benefits. or bring their families into the country to

Tomas is a short, slender man with curly black hair and a wispy goatee. While awaiting his depportation hearing. he told his story

He said he had nine years of schooling in El Salvador, where he learned meat-cutting and drafting. But because his country has a massive unemployment problem, he said he found work only once, in a rice factory at \$2.80 per day Soon, that ended.

Mexico. He says he walked across the border at San Ysidro, Calif., and eventually got a job as a meat-cutter in the kitchen of an Arlington restuarant. He was paid \$3.25 an hour.

From his earnings, he saved \$2,000 and bought a house in San Salvador. He said another year in America would have enabled him to open a butcher shop

If Tomas has been able to stay out of the law's clutches, he would have been able to qualify for the new, temporary resident status.

discovered that he had a phony Social Security card for identification. They turned him over to the Immigration and Naturalization Service:

Hiring Tomas was a benefit to his employer, a restaurant that in migration officials say has hired aliens before. According to local union officials, the restaurant paid Tomas at least \$1-per-hour less than it would have had to pay a union meat cutter

Atty. Gen. Griffin Bell said the new program will help determine how many aliens are in the country illegally and what kinds of jobs they hold. Syrians to Oppose Minister Conference

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance takes his peace mission to Jordan today but the U.S.-backed plan for a meeting of Middle East foreign ministers apparently has been shelved by Syrian opposition

President Hafez Assad met with Vance Thursday and rejected the proposal for a ministerial conference. The Syrian leader said it was "better to concentrate at this stage" on preparations for Geneva peace talks

Egypt had suggested the gathering of foreign ministers from Israel and its Arab neighbors in New York or Washington next month. Vance and Israeli Prime Minister Menahem Begin endorsed the idea

Record Numbers Of Aliens Crossing

Rumors that President Carter plans to grant amnesty to illegal aliens have helped prompt record numbers of Mexicans to illegally cross the Rio Grande into Texas say U.S. Border Patrol officials

We do feel that part of it is rumors of amnesty. We have had some questions about it," said Roger Brandemuehl. deputy chief agent in El Paso, where the U.S. Border Patrol said it eclipsed all previous records during July by apprehending 15,252 illegal aliens

That total compared with 12.459 arrests in July 1976

The Carter Administration unvieled its plan Thursday to recommend lemency for persons who entered the country illegally several years ago. The proposal however speaks only to those who entered the country before 1970

Missing Fuels Topic of Search

WASHINGTON (AP) Members of both houses of Congress are calling for investigations following a government report that nuclear fuel plants cannot account for thousands of pounds of weapons-grade nuclear material

Officials of two federal agencies releasing previously classified information, on Thursday conceded that the plants are unable to trace 8 43" pounds of uranium and plutonium that has disappeared since World War II

The missing uranium and plutonium was part of the government's supply of nuclear material to be used for onstruction of atomic weapons But federal officials insisted there is no evidence of theft of the materials or of a hlark market

One official said the amount of material missing from government plants or private facilities under federal contract was sufficient to construct hundreds of

No Short Cuts

One of the most common sources of human disappointment and general unhappiness is the mis-conception that there are short cuts to every destination. Much of the frustration in the lives of people couple of close calls when is caused by their efforts tomake the short cuts work

> A man tries to take his place in the work of the world without having adequate training. He decided to take a short cut, and. consequently, he finds that he is compounding his burdens and problems. He sees opportunities that he must let others have. and he finds many instances in which he cannot fill the role in life that he desires to fill. The short cut which seemed so desirable has brought him to an

undesirable situation.

Then, there are the people who by-pass the God-given laws pertaining to the relationship of the sexes. With this, they also flaunt the legal and traditional standards of behavior. Here again, they permit the short cut to seem attractive and they take it. This is an age-old problem. and the same old miserable conditions are created. The short cut does not terminate in a happy, meaningful man-woman relation. The right road is a little longer, but it does lead to the

Quality in workmanship and in goods being produced is in short supply. This is a growing source of human loss. Too many persons are trying short cuts. refusing to devote the time, energy and thought that successful craftsmanship de-

only desirable relationship.

Short cuts may be acceptable in some instances; but they are not possible in others. There are no "short cuts" to the truly

In such matters as character

development, personality improvement, business and professional success, satisfactory human relationships, happy marriages, and successful home life; there are "NO SHORT CUTS

Most short cuts are blind alleys." Anon. From some of these, there is no satisfactory

The increasing practice of taking some of the poorly conceived short cuts is leading to greater numbers of misused and miserable lives. We must remember that certain biological, physiological, and psychological facts make some short cuts unusually dangerous; and others impossible.

There are right times and ways for many of the experiences important to human well-being, but short cuts will not work.

We want desirable results from our labors and our services, and this is a proper desire. Much of the widespread sadness among people exists because so many folks have created wrong situations for themselves, and most of these situations are the result of

having tried "short cuts" The truth is that there are no right destinations which can be reached by way of "short cuts"







Legislators Veto **Gas Deregulation**

Congressman Bob Krueger has red defeat for the second straight year in his efforts to deregulate natural gas prices. Krueger, a New Braunfels

Democrat, said the 227-199 vote that killed his amendment to stop federal price controls over new interstate gas was caused by excessive partisanship by both parties.

Last year the then-freshman lawmaker introduced a similar proposal that was narrowly downed, 205-201.

Krueger said that the House probably would have gone along with a plan to raise the price of gas gradually and deregulate it some time in the future, perhaps five years hence.

But when that idea was broached to Republicans in the House, they refused to go along. Liberal Democrats, sensing they could defeat an outright deregulation proposal, refused to back down. Krueger, who needed Republican support to buck the Carter administration and the Democratic leaders. said he was stymied.

Krueger said he has no doubt that the GOP expects the Carter price control policy to fail and will use it as a campaign issue in the 1978 congressional elections and against the President 1980.

Krueger's Republican cosponsor, Clarence Brown of Ohio, denied partisan metives. He placed the blame for delegation voted for the deregulation's defeat on Rep. Jim Wright of Fort Worth, the House majority leader.

Wright did not support deregulation this week. Instead, he and Reps. Charles Wilson and Bob Eckhardt engineered a compromise that Brown condemned as "a hokey fake."

In return for supporting Carter's price control policy, Wright won a more liberal definition of "new gas," which gets higher prices, and an assurance that the Democratic leadership would resist efforts to repeal a tax preference for

independent oil men. Wright, in debate, said hestill favored eventual deregulation. But he said he still favored eventual deregulation. But he said sudden deregulation would have a severe inflationary impact on the economy. His compromise position, he said, allowed the House to reach a position accetable to all regions of the country.

The Senate has yet to act on the energy proposals, and it has been more sympathetic to deregulation in the past. But if the House version of the natural as bill becomes law, it would ave a major impact on Texas.

It would, for the first time, place the state's gas supply under federal control. In an emergency shortage, the federal government could order the diversion of supplies from Texas to the rest of the country. Most likely, this would affect Texas' industrial users.

Residential consumers might notice a slight, short-run price decrease for gas as existing intrastate contracts were replaced with new contracts at the federally controlled price. That price would be \$1.75 in 1978 and is expected to rise about 10 per cent each year thereafter. The intrastate price is now about

WAHINGTON(AP) - Texas really worries me," said Rep. Jim Mattox, D-Tex.

Federal allocation policies favor residential users and work to the detriment of states like Texas which have a high percentage of industrial users.

In the event of a severe winter, Mattox said, he fears that Texas factories might have to curtail operations or shut

Administration officials have consistently said they do not plan to use the allocation authority but they have been adamant about wanting to have

Although the gas industry's association in Washington issued a statement - an hour before the vote was taken deploring the House action. Mattox said producing interests should not be unhappy with what the House has done.

"Despite what they say, they know they've won three-fourths of what they wanted. When you consider that two years ago natural gas was selling interstate for 54 cents, it's a helluva compromise," said Mattox, who waited until nearly all of the votes had been cast before committing himself. He voted in favor of deregulation.

Texans who voted against deregulation were Wright, Wilson, Eckhardt, Barbara Jordan, and Henry Gonzalez.

The rest of the Texas Krueger-Brown proposal, except for ailing Rep. Olin Teague, who missed the vote.

"I still have all the companies I had before, although they were inactive while I was gone, Taylor said. "I don't know which ones I will reactivate."

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) -A cousin of Eagle Pass businessman Engique Salinas testified in federal court Thursday that she lied before a federal grand jury investigating the collapse of the Citizens State Bank of Carrizo Springs.

Salinas was principal owner of the bank when it was closed down in June 1976 by state authorities after an official examination.

Blanca Alicia de Aldaco, a Mexican citizen now living in Eagle Pass, said she lied on at least three occasions to protect Salinas, her cousin.

She said Salinas briefed her on how to explain her financial dealings to the grand jury, what to say in a deposition given to the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. And what to say in a court

The grand jury earlier this year returned a 49-count indictment charging 12 persons, including Mrs. Aldaco and

No Action in TRC

The commission has won its first case in federal court, and its top executives say the matter should have died in the U.S. **Equal Employment Opportunity** Commission.

Nothing ever came of the 1976 grand jury investigation.

U.S. District Court Judge Woodrow Seals of Houston ruled on July 22 that racial discrimination was not involved in the forced resignation of Billie W. Singer, a former TRC counselor.

Singer, a white man, sought \$500,000 in damages, plus reinstatement and back pay. He accused the commission of retaliating against him for his friendship with James Copeland, a black man who had filed an EEOC complaint.

Copeland complained of discrimination in January 1975 after his job was eliminated in an austerity program. Even though the EEOC found no discrimination had occurred. Copeland is suing the TRC in federal court.

Commissioner Jess Irwin said Singer was given the choice resigning or being fired after inspection teams said he had falsified his record of rehabilitating TRC clients.

A client is considered vocationally rehabilitated if he gets a job and keeps it for 60

We either could not find the employer, could not verify a client had been employed or could not find he had worked the required 60 days," said TRC general counsel Edward Austin.

Two other discrimination cases against the TRC are pending in Houston federal

-Allan Provost, a black whose job was eliminated in the 1975-76 austerity program. EEOC said there was discrimination. Irwin says Provost was an unfortunate victim of inadequate state and federal funding.

whom Irwin says he fired as a supervisor in Houston because he refused to accept 180 days' probation. EEOC held that Nunnellee was fired for refusing to falsify personnel records sought by the EEOC in Provost's case.

Irwin said Nunnellee had failed to obey orders to closely supervise a counselor, who later resigned when it was learned she had paid an eye doctor for general medical treatment of TRC clients and had cleared illegal financial aid payments to four members of a Vietnamese refugee family.

Three of the four also were involved in a Harris County grand jury probe of the TRC Houston office last year.

Copeland complained to the Houston district attorney's office last year about TRC operations. Nunnellee and Provost were called as witnesses during a Harris County grand jury probe of the local TRC office.

Department of Public Safety officers worked with district attorney's investigators in the TRC probe, and Irwin said the DPS entered the case at his request.

Asst. Dist. Atty. Sam Adamo of Harris County wrote Irwin on Nov. 17, 1976, that the 10-month investigation had failed to produce enough evidence to warrant indict-

"Therefore our office is closing the investigation." said Adamo, who no longer works for Dist. Atty. Carol Vance.

The four discrimination cases reached federal court after EEOC finished its investigaremedies against a state agency. The U.S. Justice Department can follow up an EEOC finding by suing the agency. Or it can back off and merely tell a complaining party he or she has the right to sue privately. This it did in the Singer, Nunnellee and Provost





Sheriff Wants Reward Fund Stopped at \$5,000

PRYOR, Okla. (AP) - Mayes County Sheriff Pete Weaver says he doesn't want a special reward fund aimed at the arrest of triple-murder suspect Gene Leroy Hart to be raised past its current level of \$5,000. Hart has been charged with

the murders of three Girl Scouts near Lucust Grove in June.

"I don't want it the reward fund to grow at all," Weaver said. "It is staying at \$5,000. I insist on it. I don't want someone waiting around holding back information for that reward fund to get bigger."

Weaver commented after it has been learned that a \$3,000 donation from the town of Leesburg, Fla., won't be used to add to the arrest fund as had been discussed last week.

The Florida contribution instead will be used to reimburse about \$2,500 in personal loans that board members of Mayes County Drug Awarness, Inc., took out to raise the fund to \$5,000.

Another reward fund has been established totaling about \$16,000, but it requires the arrest and conviction of the killer of the three Girls Scouts before the money is paid.

Residents of Leesburg raised the \$3,000 by selling peanuts. seeking cash contributions and holding an auction.

Ron Palmer, a Leesburg grocer who spearheaded the fund-raising drive in the central Florida town, said the arrange-

ment to keep the reward fund at \$5,000 was satisfactory.

We just want the money to go where it will do the most good," Palmer said. "If it means making it so the Drug Awarness members won't be personally in debt for the reward fund...then all right."

Nearly half of the \$16,000 reward fund might have to be returned to donors because of an agreement that the money would be returned if there had been no arrests by July 31.

Ginny Young, spokeswoman for the Magic Empire Council of Girl Scouts in Tulsa, said that questionnaires were going out to donors to ask if they wanted their money to remain in the fund despite the deadline

"I think they will," she said. "Several people sent message with the donations saying they didn't want the money back. I thinkthis will be the general feeling of all the people."

The national headquarters of the Girl Scouts USA has announced that it is "endorsing and supporting" an appeal of the Magic Empire Council to make the arrest-and-conviction reward fund nationwide.

But the announcement stopped short of the wishes of Richard Guse, father of one of the slain Girl Scouts.

Guse has called on the Girl Scouts to organize a nationwide fund drive. "I think this is a step in the

right direction," he said Wednesday of the action taken by the national Girl Scout organization. His daughter, Michele, 9,

along with Lori Lee Farmer, 8, and Doris Denise Milner, 10. was found sexually abused and slain the morning of June 13 at Camp Scott near Locust Grove.

Hart, a 33-year-old escaped convict, has been charged with murdering the girls.

WASHINGTON(AP) - President Carter Thursday intensified his efforts to acheieve black-white detente in southern Africa as he received Tanzanian long-time foe of white supretacist rule in that region.

Nyerere's visit here symbolizes the warming relations between the United States and black African nations since the Carter administration took

Nerere has been highly appreciative of the bolder U.S. approach toward ending white supremacist rule in southern Africa but he is skeptical about the strategy Carter has adopted.
