Astros Fall From First With Loss To Cards

HOUSTON (AP) — St. Louis catcher Ted Simmons knows you have to take what you can get against Astros ace right-hander J.R. Richard.

You have to score one or two runs at a time against him," said Simmons, who belted a run-scoring double in the Cardinals 3-1 triumph over Houston Thursday night.

"Richard is probably the most intimidating pitcher in the league. When the ball comes in around 95 mph you know it's going to be tough to hit."

Richard, 4-2, retired 19 of the

first 20 St. Louis batters to face him before Keith Hernandez lined a single to right with one out in the seventh inning.

Simmons followed with his RBI double and scored on George Hendrick's single to give the Cards a 2-0 lead.

The Astros cut the lead in half in the bottom of the inning on a double by Bob Watson and Julio Gonzalez' run-scoring single to center, but one run was not enough to prevent Houston from dropping out of first place in the National League West for the first time in 26 days.

St. Louis added another run in the eighth on a single by Ken Oberkell, a sacrifice by winning pitcher Bob Sykes and Garry Templeton's base hit off Richard.

Sykes, 3-2, pitched the first seven and one-third innings before being removed during the potential eighth inning Houston rally.

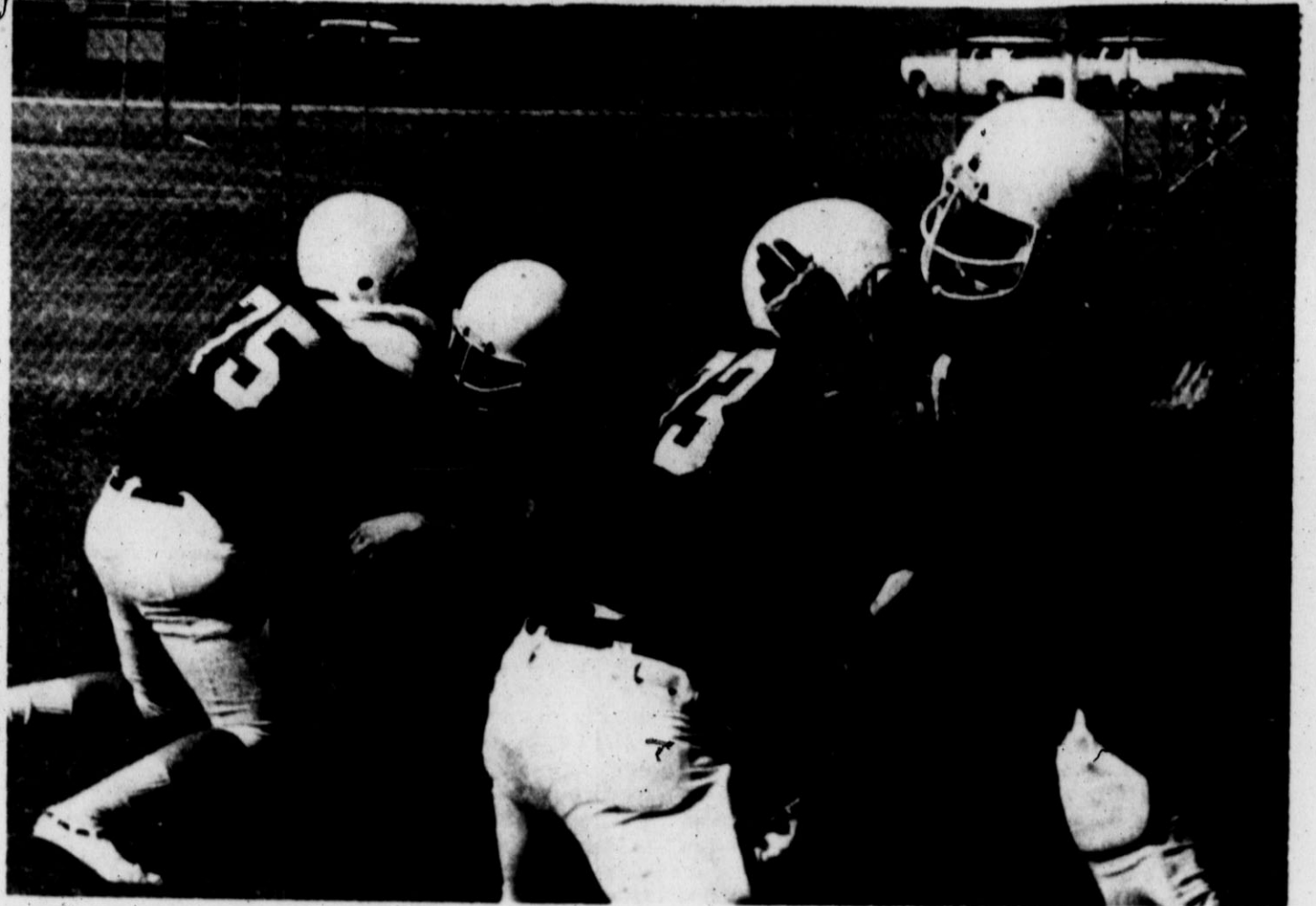
Mark Littell secured the game's final four outs for St. Louis to pick up his first save of the season as the Astros lost for the fifth time in their last seven games.

Sykes, who walked six and struck out two, praised his teammates for their outstanding defensive support.

"I thought I pitched pretty good tonight, but there were several excellent plays behind me," Sykes said.

"I put 11 runners on base and they only scored one run. The three double plays behind me sure helped."

The loss dropped the Astros to second place, five percentage points behind division leading Cincinnati.

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NCAA Slaps Auburn For Violations

AUBURN, Ala. (AP) — Auburn University President Harry Philpott scheduled a 9 a.m. press conference today to discuss the school's probation for a series of football and basketball recruiting violations.

Philpott said National Collegiate Athletic Association rules prevented the school from commenting until today.

The NCAA probation announced in Mission, Kan., Thursday cited Auburn for 18 violations.

The football team was banned from postseason competition and appearances in televised NCAA games through the 1980-81 season.

The basketball team was barred from postseason play or televised games during the coming season.

THE NCAA said the probationary period ends April 24, 1981.

Auburn, under the NCAA enforcement program's show cause provision has disassociated itself from two former football coaches and will not accept recruiting help from seven representatives of its athletic interests during the probationary period.

The chairman of the Committee on Infractions, Charles Alan Wright, said the group found in its investigation "a pattern of deliberate violations on the part of certain representatives of the university's athletic interests."

Wright commended Auburn for its presentation of facts to the NCAA and its promise to prevent a recurrence of the violations.

The violations, dating to 1974, cited 21 instances of improper football recruiting practices and 11 cases in basketball. Also listed was one instance of improper aid to a football player already at Auburn.

The NCAA committee listed several cases in which a prospective football or basketball player was offered clothing, money or an automobile to attend Auburn. A player was offered all three in at least two cases, the committee said.

In another case, a football player was offered cash and his mother a washing machine, money and round-trip air fare between her home an Auburn.

Other violations listed by the committee included paying transportation costs for prospective athletes, free or reduced rates for others to attend a sports camp operated by a former basketball coach, unauthorized tryouts, more than the NCAA limit of three personal recruiting contacts with prospective athletes and improper publicity about the signing of a football player to a conference letter of intent.

The NCAA said a football player already at Auburn was improperly provided clothing by a representative of the school's athletic interests.

In addition, the NCAA cited Auburn for erroneously stating it was in compliance with NCAA legislation in 1974 through 1977.

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Uneasy Look Key To Spurs Downfall

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — If Dick Motta has anything to be optimistic about for tonight's National Basketball Association Playoff game here, it's that uneasy look he claims he saw in the eyes of the San Antonio Spurs when his Washington Bullets clawed back Wednesday night.

"This team the Spurs has a tendency to get rattled. They get too far ahead and avalanche," Motta said after the Spurs fought off a furious Washington rally to win 116-114 in the third game of the best-of-seven Eastern Conference championship series.

I saw that look in San Antonio's eyes. It's the same look they had up in Philadelphia. The same look they had at our place Sunday," added Motta.

The defending NBA champion Bullets face the possibility of falling behind 3-1 in the series if they lose tonight in the Spurs' cozy HemisFair Arena. The series doesn't return to Landover, Md., until Sunday's fifth game and Spurs already have erased Washington's homecourt advantage by winning the opening game there 118-97.

But the "look" Motta claims he saw came late in Wednesday night's game, when dogged Washington trimmed a 107-93 San Antonio lead midway through the fourth quarter to

only 113-112 with 53 seconds left.

The Spurs, who have shown a sometimes disastrous tendency all season to fritter away big leads, managed to hold on, thanks to three key points and three crucial rebounds by Larry Kenon in the final 32 seconds.

"It was exciting, wasn't it?" said San Antonio Coach Doug Moe.

"It's happened to us all year, but we just held on to win," said San Antonio forward Mark Olberding.

"A win is a win, whether it's by one point or 10 points," said reserve guard Mike Gale, who had 14 important points against the Bullets.

The Spurs had built a 3-1

edge over Philadelphia in the semifinals series, but the 76ers knotted it 3-3. San Antonio then just a lead that had reached 18 points in the second quarter before edging the 76ers 111-108 in the tense seventh game May 7 at San Antonio.

And last Sunday in Landover, the Spurs led by nine in the second period and four at half-time before a second-half explosion gave the Bullets a 115-95 victory.

The racehorse Spurs, never known as barroom brawlers under the basket, say they'll continue to physically challenge the heavyweight Bullets.

"Mark Olberding and Billy Paultz just didn't let Unset get through," said Moe.

John Collects 7th Win As Yanks Rout Seattle

Give Jerry Narron credit: the big catcher of the New York Yankees knows when to butt out.

Narron made his second major league start Thursday, filling in behind the plate as regular catcher Thurman Munson took a turn as designated hitter. On the mound was Tommy John, the crafty 36-year-old veteran for whom the New York Yankees spent 12.75 million on the free agent market next winter.

Narron had the great good sense to let John, a veteran of 457 major league games over 17 seasons, do his thing. The result was an artful seven-hitter as the Yankees beat the Seattle Mariners 8-1 and the unbeaten John became the major leagues' first seven-game winner.

"I let John call most of the game," said Narron. "It's not hard for any catcher to catch a pitcher."

In other American League games, Cleveland beat Milwaukee 8-1, California defeated Boston 5-3, Baltimore downed Oakland 3-1, and Chicago defeated Kansas City 5-2.

John gave up a run in the first inning on Tom Paciorek's 410-foot triple, but Yankee leadoff man Micky Rivers got it right back by slamming the first pitch from Mariners starter Odell Jones into the right-field stands.

Reggie Jackson added a run-scoring single later in the first, the seventh game in a row in which Jackson has driven in at least one run.

INDIANS 8, BREWERS 1 — Eric Wilkins and Don Hood

combined for a five-hitter as Cleveland beat the Brewers, putting the game away with five runs in the eighth inning Ron Pruit drove in three runs, two of them on a double in the eighth.

ANGELS 5, RED SOX 3 — Brian Downing hit a two run homer, a double and a single. Rod Carew, Carney Lansford and Rick Miller doubled and Don Baylor had three singles to lead California's 12-hit attack against the Red Sox.

Jim Rice hit his fifth homer of the year for Boston, which kept the score close by killing a seventh-inning threat with a triple play. With Carew on second and Baylor on first, second baseman Jerry Remy snared Joe Rudi's liner and flipped to shortstop Rick Burleson to double up Carew, then Burleson threw to first to nail Baylor.

ORIOLES 3, A'S 0 — Gary Roenicke's seventh-inning homer ended the Seattle Mariners' winning run, putting the Orioles up 2-0 in the fourth inning against John Johnson, 0-5.

Meanwhile, Dennis Martinez stopped the A's on three hits. "Martinez really goes after them," Orioles Manager Earl Weaver said. "He's got all four pitches and he knows how to use them."

WHITE SOX 5, ROYALS 2 — Claudell Washington hit a homer in the first inning and a triple to set up a run in the sixth, then singled to trigger a three-run eighth that carried the White Sox past Kansas City.

After Washington's single in the eighth, his fourth straight hit, Chet Lemon walked and Eric Soderholm, Rusty Torres and Wayne Nordhagen delivered run-scoring singles.
