Schlesinger: No Oil Conspiracy

Hereford Man Dies After Fight

A 35-year-old Hereford man died at 12:03 a.m. Thursday after he was stabbed four times in the chest in a fight on Interstate 27 four miles north of Canyon.

Potter County Justice of the Peace Roy E. Byrd pronounced Michael Smith dead at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo after the incident, which occurred about 11:50 p.m. Sunday in the southbound lane of the Canyon E-Way

Randall County Chief Deputy Recil Johnson said no arrests have been made in the case "but we have some suspects and we're getting statements." He added that one suspect probably will undergo a polygraph examination.

He said two vehicles were involved in the incident, which took place outside of the pickup which Smith had been driving. Smith's wife also was in the pickup. according to Reed.

We know there were four persons inthe other car. As to who provoked it (the fight), we just don't want to release anything about it right now." Reed said.

Funeral services for Smith are being conducted at 2 p.m. today in Rose Chapel of Gililland Watson Funeral Home. Burial will follow in Rest Lawn Memorial

Born Jan. 21, 1944 in Baltimore, Md. Smith married Phyllis Roberts Dec. 8. 1978 in Hereford. He was employed as a driver by Armour Food Express.

He is survived by the widow of 202 Gracia; his parents. Mr. and Mrs. Al Smithers of Hereford, a daughter. Theresa Ann of Hardin County, and a sister, Mrs 'Pat Conger of Oak Ridge, La.

Students, Directors Favor Choice Not To Play in Arizona Festival

Herword High music coordinator Randy Vaughn said Thursday that high school concert band and orchestra members were disappointed about not playing Saturday in an Arizona music . , festival but added that the students, like their director, did not want to perform.

Concert band and orchestra director Bill Huff refused to have his band perform Saturday in Tempe. Ariz., after a judge accused the band of cheating and promised the Hereford students no better

Bands and orchestras were judged in the festival on a I to V basis, with a I rating being the highest. Hereford High's symphonic band 'under the direction of Vaughn, picked up a I Friday.

"The concert band didn't perform because of a misunderstanding about the warmup procedures to be followed at the

contest." Vaughn said. According to Vaughn and other local school officials, a contest chairman became angry at Huff when he heard the Hereford band warming up on stage rather than in the warm, up room a few

minutes before the contest Saturday. The contest chairman said Hereford would be penalized one rating for practicing on the stage.

The reason they were on there (the stage) is because the people that ran the contest did not have anyone at the site to meet the Hereford band to show them the appropriate Rarmup room." Vaughn

So rather than warm up in the warmup room, they just went to the (See BAND, Page 2)

WASHINGTON (AP) - Energy Secretary James R. Schlesinger says he plans to watch the oil industry closely in the next few weeks to see that gasoline production is not held back in anticipation of higher prices.

But for the moment, Schlesinger told

the House Ways and Means Committee Thursday, it is principally a shortage of crude oil - not any oil-industry conspiracy · that has held U.S. refineries to 85 percent of capacity.

In an effort to reduce U.S. consumption of foreign oil, President Carter will begin phasing out federal oil-price controls

Schlesinger went before the committee seeking support for Carter's proposed new tax to take away some of the windfall revenues that will flow to the oil companies after decontrol.

The committee planned to hear today from Charles L. Schultze. Carter's chief economic adviser, on the economic effects of decontrol.

Rep. Ed Jenkins, D-Ga., told Schlesinger many Americans strongly suspect the current scattered shortage of gasoline is a deliberate effort by the oil companies to hold down production until decontrol begins and the maximum allowable price of oil is raised.

"We have no such evidence." Schlesinger replied.

He added that as oil imports from Iran continue to climb toward normal levels. refinery output should increase. The Energy Department will monitor the refineries and "if they are too conservative, we will take action," he promised.

The Carter administration contends controls have held the price of U.S.-produced oil artificially low in comparison with oil from the rest of the world and has contributed to a 30 percent

decline in the value of the dollar abroad. Schlesinger estimated that removal of controls will raise the price of gasoline five-to-seven cents a gallon by 1981 and will cause an overall incrase in inflation of

about 0.3 percent. But the alternative would be worse, he told the committee. The decline of the dollar over the last few years "has cost the average American family many times over the modest cost of phased decontrol," Schlesinger said.

House Knocks Down Standby Rationing

WASHINGTON (AP) - House leaders are blaming the stunning defeat of President Carter's standby gasolinerationing plan on confusion over which Americans would have gotten the most fuel uner its provisions.

After several days of intense White House lobbying on Capitol Hill, the House voted 246-159 Thursday night to kill the rationing plan under which Americans would have needed coupons to buy gasoline during a national fuel

Disregarding an impassioned appeal from House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill that "this is the only plan you'll have." the Democratic-controlled House handed Carter a bitter setback.

'Many Americans felt this was a plan to implement rationing." said House Whip John Brademas. D-Ind., "even though the bill would only have given Carter standby authority."

In addition. Brademus said last-minute changes to the plan made by the White House to win votes needed in the Senate led to fears in the House that some drivers would have ended up with a disproportionate share of a limited

"It is difficult for members to approve something they don't feel they can count on," he said.

O'Neill likened the issue to the 1938

congressional debate over implementing the national military draft, which was in place when World War II began three years later.

The majority leader said that in a major energy crisis the president would need a rationing plan.

He appealed to colleagues to put aside questions of how much gasoline their own districts would receive if rationing were invoked.

Carter declined immediate comment. but Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich .. chairman of a House Energy subcommittee, said it was unlikely the president would try to find another rationing plan acceptable to Congress.

A White House spokesman said Carter

would comment on the situation today. While Carter could send a new plan to Congress, the one voted on Thursday faced a Friday deadline for action and there is no legal requirement for him to fashion a new plan.

The rationing proposal originated with a 1975 law which required the president to propose various standby measures for use in case of a major cutoff of foreign imports such as the 1974 Arab oil.

state in past years. The rationing plan cleared the Senate Wednesday 58-39. But there was fear among White House officials that the compromise approved by the Senate would simultaneously lose votes in the House, which has stronger urban

Similar complaints were heard from Pennsylvania.

'Moderate, Brief' Recession Forecast

HOT \$PRINGS. Va. (AP) - Inflation should begin easing as the economy slides into a "moderate" brief" recession in the second half of the year, according to economic consultants for a prestigious group of businessmen.

The analysis released today at the semi-annual meeting of the Business Council was more pessimistic than the group's previous quarterly reports.

And it was a contrast to Carter administration insistence that a recession can be avoided as inflation is brought in check by tighter money and budget policies and the voluntary wage and price

The report to the council, which is made up of board chairmen and chief executive officers of 100 major U.S. corporations, predicts the economy will decline for six to eight months before turning up again.

"I think the consensus was tht this is what we need, this is what we are moving into," Clifton C. Garvin Jr., chairman of Exxon Corp., said in remarks prepared for his introduction of the report. "It's not all that bad."

Potential Draftees May Register at 18

WASHINGTON (AP) - Boys reaching age 16 this year will have to register as potential draftees when they turn 18 if a measure approved by the House Armed Services Committee becomes law:

The committee voted 30-4 Thursday to renew draft registration starting Jan. 1. 1981, but there is no indication whether the full Congress will go along.

The House may act as early as next week on the registration provision, which is contained in a \$42 billion weapons authorization bill. The overall bill was approved by the committee. 35-2.

The draft itself would remain suspended even if the registration provision becomes law. The measure under consideration would require young men to merely register so mobilization would be speeded up in case the draft is ever reinstated for a war or emergency.

However, a House Armed Services subcommittee plans hearings within the next two months on a proposal to go one step further and draft up to 200,000 men a year into the Army Individual Ready

Russians, Turkey Swap Oil for Grain

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Soviet Union and Turkey are doing what many American farmers are advocating these days: exchanging oil for grain.

The Agriculture Department said Thursday that "Turkey has signed a contract with the Soviet Union to barter 40,000 (metric) tons of Bezostaya wheat for 50,000 (metric tons) of Soviet

Although the brief note, included in a weekly report on world production and trade, did not provide further details, it seems Turkey will be trading about four bushels of wheat for one barrel of oil.

The mathematics appear to work this way: A metric ton is about 2.205 pounds. According to the American Petroleum Institute the average weight of a barrel of oil is 302.65 pounds.

Thus, a metric ton would be equal to 7.28 barrels of oil. But Russia is trading 1.25 metric tons of oil to get one of wheat. meaning it is providing 9.1 barrels of

petroleum to get one metric ton of wheat. Wheat weighs 60 pounds a bushel, translating into about 36.7 bushels in a

Total Wheat Crop

Same as Last Year

WASHINGTON (AP) - This year's total U.S. wheat crop seems to be shaping up about the size of last year's harvest of around 1.8 billion bushels, according to the latest government outlook figures.

Winter wheat production, which accounts for about three-fourths of the total, was estimated Thursday by the Agriculture Department at 1.39 billionbushels.

Although such a harvest would be 11 percent larger than the 1978 output of 1.25 billion bushels, it would be about 4 percent smaller than USDA forecast last Dec. 21. not long after the crop was planted.

The new estimate, based on May I prospects, was the first since then.

from friends of the industry, who say oil companies should be allowed to use the windfall revenues however they want. and from liberals, who want to continue controls indefinitely in an effort to Kold down prices.

The Treasury Department estimates removal of price controls will increase oil-company revenues in 1979 through 1981 by a total of \$15.4 billion. After existing state and local taxes, federal income taxes and payments to owners of oil lands are subtracted, the oil companies would be left with \$8 billion. Carter's proposed tax would take \$2 billion of that \$8 billion and use the money to help the poor pay their fuel bills, to aid mass transit and to finance

development of new energy sources. Meanwhile." White House press

secretary Jody Powell indicated Thursday Carter would be reluctant to sign any legislation reimposing oil price controls unless it were accompanied by provisions to reduce U.S. reliance on imported oil, to restrain oil consumption, to encourage domestic production, to provide funds for alternate energy sources and to help the poor pay their fuel bills.

In other energy developments:

Analysts in New York said Saudi Arabia is cutting back on oil sales to U.S. companies in what could be intended as an expression of that country's displeasure with the U.S. role in the Egyptian-Israeli peace agreement. The cut, which has been expected, totals about 500,000 barrels a day - about 2.5 percent of the daily oil consumption in the United States.

Rep. Thomas A. Daschle said Thursday administration officials "swear up and down" farmers will get all the additional diesel fuel they need to get this year's crops planted.







Losing a bit of weight

husband and I have decided to lose a few pounds together. The idea is fine with me but my problem is I don't really know what our calorie I am sending you The intake should be to lose and

maintain a certain weight. I usually go on a 1000-calorie diet when I want to lose some fat but I know the calorie requirements are different for men. My hus-band is 39 years old and he is 5 feet 8 and wants to maintain 155 pounds. Right now he is five or six pounds over

I'm 38 years old; 5 feet 2, of medium frame and weigh 125. I would like to maintain 115 pounds. We are both active and play tennis together and plan to start jogging again. I would appreciate any information

you can give us DEAR READER - The most important advice I can give you is not to try to lose the weight all at once. Since you are both active, it would be a simple matter to lose the small amount of weight you want to get rid of through increased exercise It doesn't have to be strenu-

If you'll just stay on the same diet and be very careful not to increase your calorie intake, all you would need to do is walk a mileand-a-half a day. That would be approximately 90 calories a day for your husband. If he did this every day, within a year's time he would have eliminated the number of calories in approximately 10

pounds of body fat. Since you weigh a little less and it requires fewer calories for you to walk a mile, you won't do as well but the results will still be very impressive.

Now that's the healthy way to lose a small amount of excess fat. It's so much better for your body than those wild fad diets that people use for a crash weight loss. Most of those really tend to wreck people is health. The only good thing about them is that most people don't stay on them.

You can get it in other ways and usually once you've had it and have totally recovered you're not likely to develop it again, just like when you recover from measles, chicken pox or any variety of viral infec-

Often the infection occurs in very early childhood and the symptoms are indistin-guishable from a minor respiratory infection. These children then have immunity to infectious mononucleosis and don't have it later in life

some people escape this infection in early childhood and develop it in early adult life. In these instances the symptoms may be more prominent with sore throat, low-grade fever and a number of nonspecific symptoms. Your doctor usually makes the diagnosis on the basis of blood tests.

Usually the illness only lasts a few weeks although there may be residual fatigue, faintness and such nonspecific symptoms for some months after the acute illness has subsided.

In some instances if the symptoms are marked, doctors will give steroid hor-mones to help decrease the symptoms. They really don't cure the infection.

Usually the illness has to run its course and should leave no permanent residual damage. There are very rare cases of a ruptured spleen and it's probably wise during the acute illness not to engage in excessive amounts of physical exer-

How do you like being in the college age crowd? Most parents and grandparents have already been exposed to the virus at some point in life and it's relatively uncommon for individuals in your age group to develop infectious mononucleosis. DEAR DR. LAMB - What

is the difference in an angiogram and a myelogram? DEAR READER - An angiogram is an X ray. Dye is injected into the circulation which is opaque to X ray. Pictures are then taken id you can outline the size of arteries, veins or chambers of the heart. If there's an obstruction in an artery that's being examined, you can see it because the flow of the dye is blocked.

A myelogram involves an injection into the space around the spinal cord. Since the dye is opaque to X ray, you're able to outline anatomical structures that you ordinarily wouldn't be able to see. A ruptured disc that is sticking into the space around the spinal cord or even pressing against the cord can be seen by an indentation in the dye.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) Paul Maddox doesn't have time to get sick: he's too busy keeping other folks alive.

Last year he saw an average of 130 patients a day. The figure would have been higher but the 53-year-old general prac-titioner took a 15-day vacation. His clinic at Campton, operating seven days a week, opens at 8 a.m. and, despite the hour,

the lines are long. "We make no appointments," Dr. Maddox explained. "Appointments slow you down. When people feel bad, they want treatment today, not three

days or a week from now." Maddox runs his clinic like an assembly line. He has three examining rooms and 12 employees to get things set up for

him and handle the paperwork. "Our program's similar to General Motors, which puts out a car every minute and a half. We're so well organized I get to spend enough time with each

patient." He also has "one of those computers that you dial into Chicago. It gives you a diagnosis in 30 seconds, except on Mondays when you may wait 30

minutes for an answer." The people of Appalachia don't know what they'd do without him.


