### B. D. Galloway Passes Away.

Grim Death has once more entered the ranks of our citizenship and has again cut down one of our most prominent citizen. Mr. Galloway is dead! We speak of his death as a great loss, but to all of his children and loved ones, impossible as it may seem, it is God that has done it. He doeth all things well. In removing him he did not remove his loving kindness from his loved ones. On February 9th 1907 after a short but painful illness, B. D. Galloway was, by the dispensation of an allwise and unerring providence, removed by death from the home which he so much loved and to the members of which he was attached by all the tenderest ties of love and affection.

His was a short illness and he suffered greatly but he never complained. He was seen on the streets only about four days before his death, and although old and feeble, was seemingly in his wonted health. In the middle of the week he took down with a bad cold which soon developed into a severe case of Pneumonia. He battled hard with this dread disease but being a sufferer from heart trouble, complications arose and in his wasted condition this was too much for his frail

constitution and before his friends and loved ones were hardly aware of the fact that he was seriously ill, his spirit took its flight about noon Saturday and went to rest in his heavenly home he had been building for so many years.

B. D. Galloway was born in Transylvania county, North Carolina, July 29th, 1835. He married in 1862. He came to Texas in 1878 and settled in Comanche county from which place he moved to Hereford in December 1905. As a business man Mr. Galloway was a success; as a citizen he was of the most progressive type. In him Hereford loses one of its strongest supporters. For 51 years Mr. Galloway has been a consistant member of the Baptist church. He was not only a member of the church but lived the religion he professed in his every day life.

He leaves a widow, several children and grandchildren to mourn his loss. Funeral exercises were conducted at the family residence Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock by Rev. O. W. Dean, Pastor of the Baptist Church, his remains were laid away at the city cemetery.

We have learned from the surveyors and others connected with the Santa Fe construction company, that the question of a new depot for Hereford is being strongly agitated.

### Edison Sixty Years Old.

Great Inventor says he is now going to "Play Awhile".

New York, Feb. 11.—Thomas A. Edison, the inventor, is 60 years old today. In an interview yesterday he said it was now time for him to knock off work and play awhile.

"For forty-five years I have been making experiments with electricity" said Mr. Edison, but all these years I have been turning these experiments to commercial value so fast that I have not had a chance to play with electricity for the fun of the thing, just to see how much I can find out about it. But from tomorrow I am going to give up the commercial end of it and work in my laboratory purely as a scientist. That will be a pleasure I have long been promising myself."

"Is it possible to foretell what the next great step of electricity to present day life will be?" Mr. Edison was asked.

"I would be a daring man to venture a prediction," he answered. "We are all busy collecting data, we investigators, and maybe in 100 years or more we will begin to respect something."—Dallas News.

#### SITE FOR STOCK SALE

Judge Nelson in Roswell Picking a Place For The Next Convention.

Judge O. H. Nelson, president of the Western Stock Yards Company of Amarillo, Texas, and Fort Madison, Iowa, arrived in Roswell this morning from Carlsbad. He stopped here to look for a site for the annual Panhandle sale of pure blood stock, which always goes with the Panhandle Cattlemen's Convention, and making other arrangements. He and the Roswell men interested have found two sites, either one of which would be satisfactory. Their decision will be announced later.

Judge Nelson is enthusiastic as to the success of the April meeting of cattlemen. He says that he will have as fine cattle, both Herefords and Shorthorns, as can be found anywhere in the world, and they will be drawn from the herds of the Southwest.

"As to the convention," said Judge Nelson, "I look for a great attendance. For the past three years there has been an average of 2000 people at the convention at Amarillo. It should be much larger in Roswell, for the reason that it is coming to a new place and to a place which the members and their families would naturally want to visit. They will come too, if the T. P. gives the rate they have partly promised. The association now has 800 members. It is understood that enough applications for membership will be received at the Roswell meeting to bring the total up to 1,500. That does not include the ladies."

Judge Nelson was accompanied here by W. F. Anderson, of Lakewood, who, as live stock agent for the Santa Fe, is interested in the cattle convention. He reports that the Lakewood country will send a feature to the Roswell convention that could not be secured elsewhere in the world. It will be a delegation of 100 cowboys, dressed in the native garb and mounted. All will bring their ponies, and G. M. Slaughter, W. M. Atkinson and others have promised entertainment for the horses during the convention. These 100 cowboys, right off the range, will be a show worth coming to see. Mr. Anderson says they will hold a tournament for fancy riding, instead of the usual roping contests. This tournament will be carried on according to the ideas of the old time riders as described in Scott's "Ivanhoe." Riding with lances and catching rings will be one of the contests. Levi Joy, who is said to challenge the world in this kind of riding, and will be here to enter the lists.

Another feature will be a revival of the expert rifle marksmanship contest. Several contestants of world wide fame will be in attendance. One of these will be A. H. Bogardus, Jr., of Springfield Illinois.

However, he will have a worthy opponent in the person of a local product. Homer Wilder, of Lakewood, will be put up against the best.—Roswell Daily Record.

#### Proposed Tax on Bachelors.

Representative Liveley of Dallas has had prepared, and will likely introduce in a few days, a bill imposing an annual tax on bachelors. For the purpose of the proposed act bachelors are divided into three classes as follows:

Between the ages of twenty five and thirty years, class one (1) on which is imposed a yearly tax of \$5 00; between the ages of thirty and thirty five years, class two (2) who are to pay \$10.00 per year; over thirty five years of age class three (3) who are to pay \$25.00 per annum.

If the bill should become a law, which is not at all probable, Mr. Liveley himself would be subject to the tax of \$10.00 imposed on bachelors of class two. The bill exempts all persons who are, under the law, exempt from the payment of Poll taxes.

## A TERRIBLE DISASTER.

**A Small Steamer and a Coal Schooner Collide in Block Island Sound.**

On Wednesday February 12th occurred a most appalling marine disaster when the steamer, Larchmont collided with a coal schooner in the Block Island Sound, causing the death of about one hundred and twenty-five or one hundred and fifty lives. There were only a few passengers on board saved from the terrible disaster and these entailed suffering almost beyond human endurance, caused by the zero weather. In the boat were found the bodies of several persons whom had frozen to death and the others who were alive were almost insensible to the danger they had been in, so great was their suffering from the bitter cold.

From this wreck came tales of the most intense suffering and most horrible deaths.

The accident occurred about 11 o'clock Wednesday night when the coal schooner bound from South Am-bay with a heavy cargo crashed into the steamer Larchmont, on which were nearly two hundred passengers. So great was the impact with the vessel that a huge hole was torn in her side and damaged it so badly that no attempt was made to run for shore and she sank to the bottom in less than half an hour. By hard work the crew of the Knowlton managed to keep her afloat until she reached a point where life boats could be put out and they rowed ashore. There were no losses of life on the schooner.

A large audience saw "A Race For A Widow" at the Brooks last night. It is a clever three act farce full of good clean humor. It moves at a lively clip, but is entirely free of the slap and bang business so common in farce comedy. Nina Bell Wilber, as Rose, an American widow, gives a clever portrayal of an adventuress, the chief trouble maker for Holtzmueller. ## C. O. D. LIQUOR KNOCKED OUT.

### Heavy Fines Imposed on Offices Handling Such Business.

A bill was passed by the House and Senate this week placing a heavy tax on the C. O. D. Liquor trade in Texas. This law will sorely cripple the jug trade and will break up the blind tiger which has been the source of a great deal of annoyance in the dry territories. The passage of this bill is the greatest forward movement made on the local option question and will do more towards enforcing the law in counties where whiskey has been voted out than any other act of the legislature passed in the state of Texas. The local option question is now practically solved. The fine imposed is so heavy that the dealers will not ship any more C. O. D. whiskey into our territory or any other.

The amount due the state for the maintenance of such a business, where such business is conducted, is \$5000 and the county and city each are allowed to collect half that amount making a fine of \$10,000

which we are sure no company can afford to pay for the privilege of bringing whiskey in any territory.

This bill is not only supported by the prohibitionist but by anti's as well. An honest law abiding citizen, though he be opposed to local option, is always in favor of the passage of laws that can be enforced or that will aid the enforcement of laws already passed.—Thus the attitude of a great many anti's on this bill.

This bill was unanimously passed by the House and Senate with an emergency clause and was signed by the governor which caused it to go into effect immediately after its passage.

All the express offices were immediately dispatched not to allow any whiskey leave their offices, thus putting a sudden stop to the C. O. D. business.

The following is a text of the bill as amended and passed:

An act imposing an annual occupation tax upon each office or place kept and maintained by any person, firm or corporation in this State at which intoxicating liquors legally deliverable are delivered upon payment of purchase money therefor, providing a

penalty for failure to pay such tax and declaring an emergency.

Any person, firm or corporation doing business in this State shall, at each office or place kept, operated or maintained by such person, firm or corporation at which intoxicating liquors legally deliverable are delivered upon payment of purchase money therefor, commonly designated as shipments C. O. D., pay annually for each office or place so kept, an annual occupation tax to the State of Texas of five thousand dollars. And any county or any incorporated city or town wherein such office or place is located may levy an annual occupation tax upon such person, firm or corporation herein referred to for each of said offices, not to exceed one half the amount hereby levied by the State, such tax to be due and payable annually.

Sec. 2. The maintaining or operating such office or offices, place or places, by any person, firm or corporation in this State without paying the occupation tax required in Sec. 1 of this act shall subject such person, firm or corporation so operating and maintaining such office or offices, place or places, to pay to the State of Texas the sum of fifty dollars, and to the county, or any incorporated city or town in which said offices or places are located each the sum of fifty dollars for each day such office or offices, place or places, may be maintained or operated and for each office or place so operated, and the State or county or any incorporated city or town may sue for and recover either jointly or severally, each the said sum

for each day that each of said offices or places may be maintained and operated with out prepayment of the aforesaid occupation tax.

Sec. 3. The fact that persons, firms and corporations are doing an extensive business in shipping and delivering intoxicating liquors in this state at their various offices or places on the payment of the purchase money therefor, and are paying no occupation tax for such privileges, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity for the suspension of the constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each house, and that this act take effect from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

### Endowment for Peabody.

The Legislature of Tennessee has just passed a bill giving to the Peabody College for teachers, at Nashville, the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars. Appropriations from other sources, notably one from the Peabody Education Fund of one million dollars, which had been made but depended upon the appropriation just passed by the state of Tennessee, make the total already given more than a million seven hundred thousand dollars which will come to the College this year.

Assurances of other donations had been given, to be made as soon as the College is permanently and adequately endowed, which is now practically accomplished.

The College will have handsome buildings, new departments, additional professors, and promises to be one of the greatest Teacher's Colleges of the country.

### Farmer's Terrible Death.

Terrell, Texas, February 4th.—Mr. Garth, who was employed by Jerry Minchew on a farm near McCoy in the Northwest part of this county, was killed Saturday evening by a run-away team which he was driving to a plow. During the afternoon some portion of the harness got wrong and he went between the two mules that were pulling the plow and started to fix the disarranged tug. While in a stooping attitude the mules became frightened and ran away, dragging Mr. Garth about seventy-five yards, and during the run the plowshare stuck into his shoulder and inflicted frightful injuries, from which he suffered terrible agony until he died a few hours later. Deceased was fifty years old and leaves one son, who has been an employe at the North Texas Insane Assylum at this city. The remains were interred at the new Salem cemetery yestheday afternoon.

**The Railroad Meeting.**

A most enthusiastic railroad meeting was held at the court house on Wednesday afternoon which was attended by over 100 of the best citizens of Lubbock and the county.

The meeting was brought about by the arrival of Col. J. H. Ransom, who proposes to build a line of railroad from Hereford to a point south of here on the Texas & Pacific railroad to be known as the Panhandle Short Line. The meeting being called to order Col. Ransom was called upon for his proposition, ect which he told in plain words with no appearant desire to withhold anything from the people in the way of information about his proposed road. He stated his proposition as to Lubbock and Lubbock county which was about as follows:

A cash bonus of \$20,000, forty acres of ground for depot and stock pens and the right away through the county, 1-3 of said bonus to be paid when the grading is complete from Hereford to the Texas & Pacific and the balance when the the road is in operation.

After Col. Ransom had taken his seat, Mr. Clayton arose and made a motion that the people of Lubbock form themselves into an organization at once so as to take some action in the matter, whereupon Hon. O. L. Slaton was nominated and unanimously elected chairman and Mr. George C. Wolfarth secretary. It was then in order to select the necessary committee to secure the right-of-way and the cash bonus.

Mr. Ransom stated that he would be absent probably three weeks, interesting the towns south of here in his proposed road, and when he returns to Lubbock he will expect Lubbock to give him a definate answer so that he will know how to operate matters on his return to Hereford.

It is now up to the people of Lubbock and Lubbock county, to secure the right-of-way 100 feet wide through Lubbock county, 80 acres for depot and stock yard ground and a cash bonus of \$20,000. This appears to us to be the best proposition that has ever been presented to Lubbock and we believe it should receive the careful consideration of every citizen of the town and county.

Col. Ransom left Thursday for Tahoka, thence to LaMessa and on to Stanton or Big Springs.—Lubbock Avalanche.
