housewife, and escaped with \$535. Muleshoe Sheriff Dee Clements gave the following account: The victim of the attempted rape, Mrs. Donna Johns had her clothing torn but managed to fend off her 18 - to - 20 - year-old attacker while her 65 - year-old mother - in - law, Mary John, was held at gunpoint in the next room. LARRY JOHNS, husband of the young woman, was at a local service station at the time getting a tire repaired. After the unsuccessful attack Clements said, the three men ransacked the two - bedroom house - trailer, and were given the money by the mother when they threatened to harm the young wife further.

The Johns were on their way to Arizona when they had pulled into the rest area for the night. The three men, described as a youth between 18 and 20 years of age, a short, dark complexioned man between 30 and 32, and a

tall slim man about 35, entered the trailer soon after the husband departed.

School Names System Officers

Head Dillman, superintendent of Schools, announced the appointment of City Police Officer, Harold White, and Bailey County Sheriff's Deputy, Bob Henderson, as Attendance Officers for the Muleshoe school system.

This is the first year that the school system has used the attendance officer, leaving the job to the school principals in years past. This move was made to curb the mounting number of absences in school.

This year, in accordance with State law, the parents of children that have numerous absences will be notified by letter from the school. In event that the letter is not answered, or the child does not return to school, the Attendance officer will be notified and they will call on the parents of the person. In the event this fails, charges will be filed against the parents in accordance with the state law.

Dillman also stated that the Muleshoe School "does not" let out early for cotton chopping or pulling. He also stated that the

street between the High School and Jr. High School will be blocked off during the lunch hour.

Students in High School who drive cars to school will not be allowed to drive them until they leave school in the evening.

The following is a reprint of the State laws, regulating school attendance:

Article 2894. "Excuses for absence Any child not so exempt may be excused for temporary absence due to personal sickness, sickness or death in the family, quarantine, severe storm (See SCHOOL, Page 5)

U. S. Senate Candidate George Bush today announced the appointment of Dr. W. M. Dean of Muleshoe as Chairman of the Bush For Senate Campaign in Bailey County.

Bush, a conservative oil and businessman from Houston, won a victory over Jack Cox in the primary run-off.

"I am greatly pleased to have Dr. Dean working in my behalf and in behalf of sound, responsible, conservative government," said Bush.

The announcement came from the Bush State Campaign Headquarters in Austin.

Dr. Dean is co-owner of Green Memorial Hospital and is general practitioner at that hospital.

It was also announced that George Bush Headquarters would be open in Plainview Monday, August 31, from 9 to 5 and remain open six days a week until November 3rd. The Hall County headquarters will be located at 502 Quincy St., phone no. 806-CA44431.

Bush will be in Plainview for a speaking engagement on the evening of September 9, at the Plainview High School.

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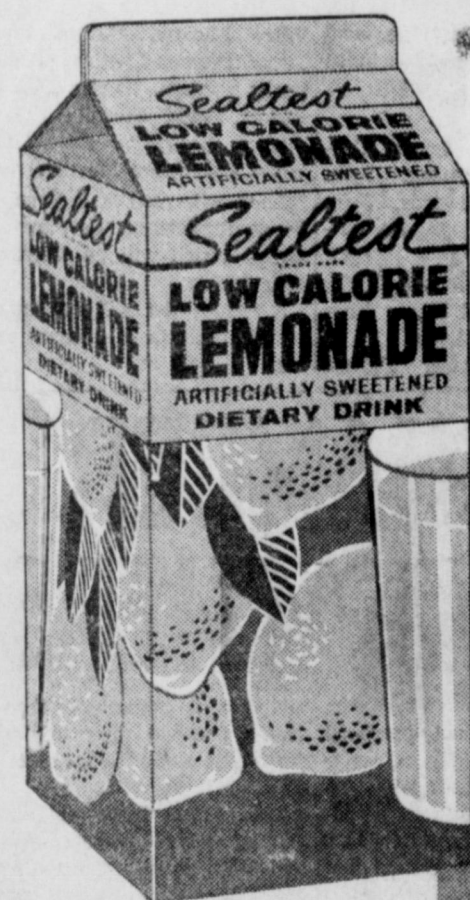

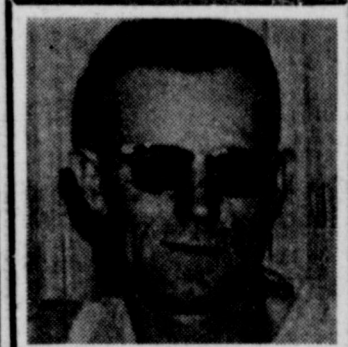

The speaker for the morning was introduced by Mrs. Betty Jennings. He was John Lovelady who is Assistant Director of the Field Service Division of T. S. T. A. is state consultant for the Texas Future Teachers and is the T. S. T. A. staff consultant for the State T. E. P. S. Committee.

Lovelady's talk centered around the plan for a state raise in salary for teachers in 1965. The slogan used was "\$45 for '65." One of his opening remarks was that Texas has a greater potential for raising teachers salaries than any other state. He said that Texas teachers' salaries have always been below the national level and that Texas ranks 29th in comparison with the other states. By rates of the tax burden of each state Texas could raise \$600 million every year if they carried the same burden as their neighboring states. Teachers welfare and child welfare cannot be separated.

After Lovelady's talk, Bill Bickel presided in a business meeting. After committee reports, Bill Taylor was elected treasurer for the year. Other officers include: Bill Bickel, president, Mary B. Obenhaus, first vice president, Betty Jennings, second vice president, Inez Middlebrook, Secretary, and Milton Oylar, parliamentarian.

Plentiful Foods

COLLEGE STATION, — Three choices of meat, a selection of vegetables and all fruit are your plentiful foods selection for September, according to the Texas Extension Service.

The list prepared by the Agricultural Marketing Service, features beef, fresh prunes, broilers, turkey and late-summer vegetables.

Although beef production in recent weeks has been somewhat below record levels set earlier this year, beef is still in big supply. And consumer prices continue attractive. Since September is "Better Breakfast Month" try serving steak for breakfast.

Another good breakfast item is fresh Italian prunes. Almost half again as many prunes will be available as were produced last year. Oregon, one of the three big prune-producing states, is predicting a crop three times as large as in 1963. Tart fresh

prunes are just the thing for sleepy back-to-schoolers. Look for a wide variety of fresh vegetables during September. Tomatoes, onions, lettuce, snap beans and cabbage likely will be plentiful in most markets. There'll be a good supply of other vegetables, too.

An estimated five percent more broiler-fryers coming to market over a year ago should put attractive consumer prices in prospect for September. Prices last September were the second lowest on record.

Turkey, too, will be abundant. Mid-summer marketings ran 18 percent higher than a year earlier; refrigerated holdings are about the same. And ready-to-cook turkey prices encourage frequent use.

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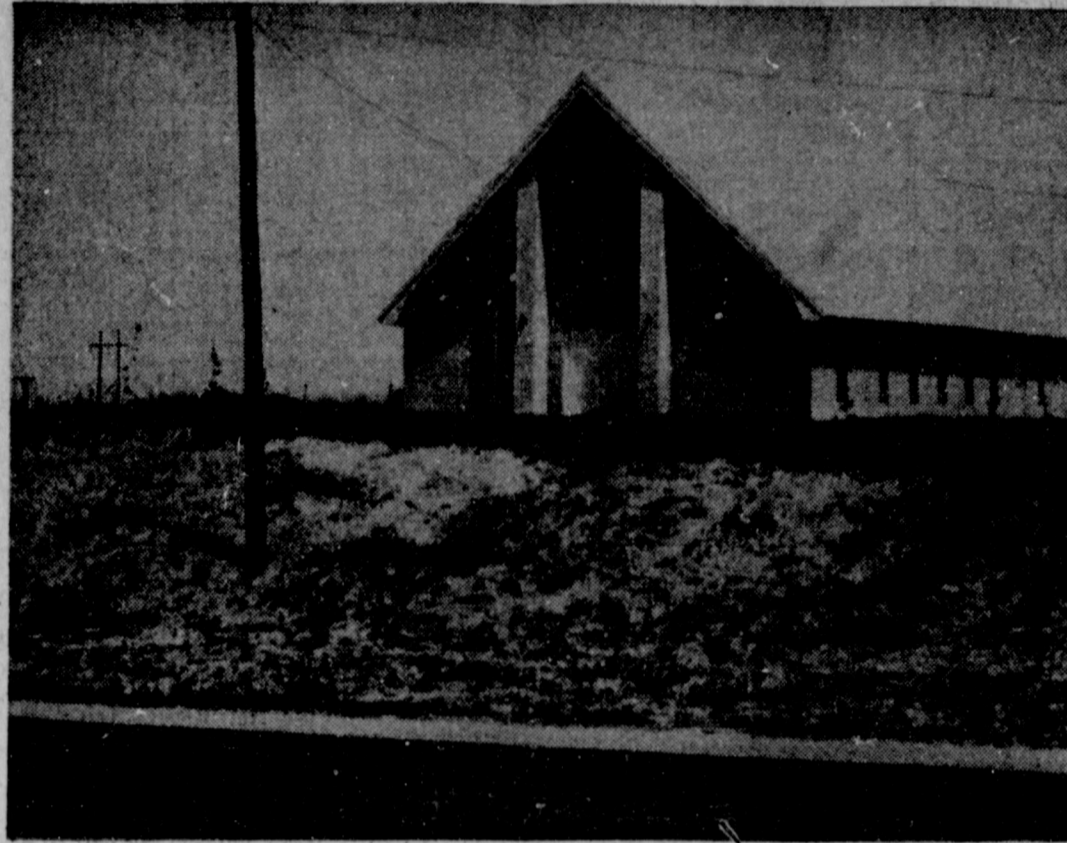

"Wretched man that I am! Who will deliver me from this body of death? We are sometimes perplexed by the mood of the Publican who was so aware of his own wrongness that he smote on his breast, saying, 'God be merciful to me a sinner.'" Quite possibly the Publican was at least reasonably respectable, but he had the good sense to know he was not nearly good enough. His eyes were on the heights he never seemed able to reach.

The Publican was not trying to excuse his sins or deny them. On the contrary, he was courageous enough to face them honestly, and he prayed for mercy and help from a profound sense of need. He wasn't proud of his sins. He was ashamed of them and troubled by the weakness that led to them.

But, you ask, "Must I go around like the Publican feeling all the time that I am a miserable sinner?" Of course not. There is difference between decent humility and morbid self-dobasement that borders on self-pity. Decent humility ask with St. Paul, "Who will deliver me?" The profound sense of need was there. Paul knew he needed help in order to be what he could be. So do we all.

Religion brings the resources of faith to bear on the ordinary sins of everyday people. It says with the eloquence of God that "No man needs to stay the way he is." He can be better, nobler, wiser, not by pulling himself up by his own bootstraps, but rather by finding the steady resources of faith to meet his need. If we are honest with ourselves we know how often we have failed to be what we might have been and also how acutely we need both the forgiveness and the power of God in order to be what we ought to be.

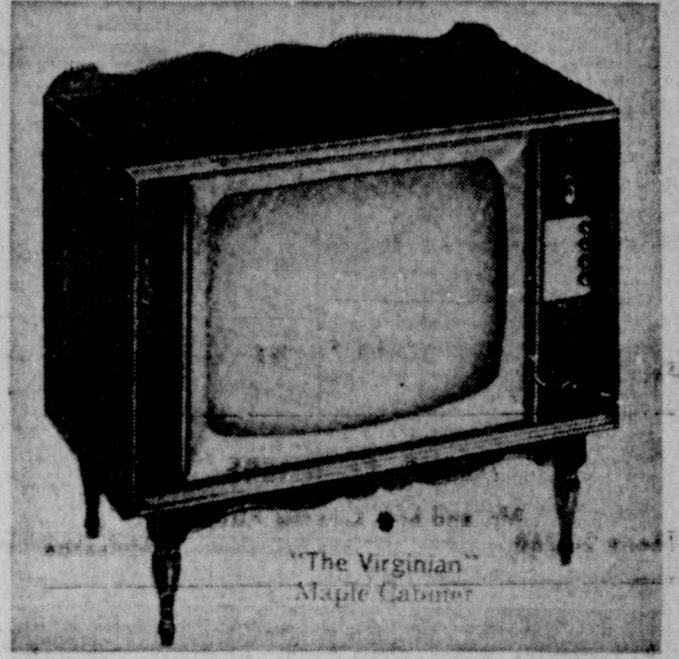

which has destroyed bridges and made the regular mean of travel dangerous, or for unusual cause acceptable to the teacher, principal, or superintendent of the school in which said child is enrolled; provided that the excuses are in writing and signed by the parent or guardian of said child. Any case so excused may be investigated by the authorities discharging the duties of attendance officer for the school from which said child is so excused.

Article 299. (P. C.) Duties of parent or guardian. — If any parent or person standing in parental relation to a child within the compulsory school attendance ages who is not properly excused from attendance upon school for some exemption provided by law fails to require such child to attend school regularly for such period as is required by law, it shall be the duty of the attendance officer, who has jurisdiction in the territory where said parents or person standing in parental relation resides, to warn such parents or person standing in parental relation that this law must be immediately complied with, and upon failure of said parent or parent or other person standing in relation to immediately comply with this law after such a warning has been given, the official discharging the duties of the attendance officer shall forthwith file complaint against such parents or persons standing in parental relation to said child which complaint shall be filed in the county court in the justice court in the precinct where such parent or guardian resides. Any parent or other person standing in parental relation upon conviction for failure to comply with the provisions of this law shall be fined for the first offense five dollars, and for the second offense ten dollars, and for each subsequent offense twenty-five dollars. Salt Analysis of Irrigation Water Advised

It's poor business to guess at the quality of your irrigation water. Rather than be in doubt as to possible harmful effects of the water on future soil productivity, County Agent J. K. Adams suggests you have the water evaluated by a chemical analysis. The ideal time to collect samples is during the highest period of water use.

This need is particularly acute in a worship service several years ago while continuing to serve as a staff member.

with new wells and in instances where wells are deeper than average for the area. Adams says it is known that common salt in high concentrations may exist below the red bed formation. If wells extend into this strata, there is a greater possibility of dangerous salt levels in the water.

Soils vary widely in their ability to tolerate salt without being harmed — and some crops are more tolerant than others. Clays, where the water intake rate is already slow, can be made even less porous by a water high in sodium. — Obtaining stands can become a problem on the lighter soils due to sodium accumulation that "seals" or crusts the surface.

Water samples may be submitted to the Soil Testing Laboratory at Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas. Samples must be accompanied by the complete Information Sheet D-617, available through the office of County Agent Adams. The present fee is \$5.00 per sample.

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COTTON TALKS

LUBBOCK — Final approval of a \$1 million federal appropriation to match another million dollars of High Plains money has made the launching of a massive boll weevil control program an absolute certainty and planning activities are rapidly approaching a feverish pitch.

Beginning about August 24 more personnel from both the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Plant Pest Control Division of USDA will begin arriving in the area to clean up last minute preparations and get the program underway. Most of these people will likely remain in the area until about the middle of November. At least 20 additional men from the Texas Department of Agriculture will meet in Lubbock on September 1 to kick off an intensified drive to complete the signing of spraying permits by all farmers in the seven-county control zone. Permits to spray infested cotton are needed from approximately 3500 farmers in Garza, Dickens, Crosby, Floyd, Motley, Biscoe and Kent counties and full cooperation is being urged from all farmers in these counties. To

date, probably less than 1500 of the farmers have signed permits, but blank permits have been mailed to all other along with stamped, self addressed envelopes.

The responsibility for getting these permits signed has been accepted by the Texas Department of Agriculture, and Fred Roy of that agency says that all permits need to be signed by September 5 or 6 in order to allow for plotting the spray area by September 10, the target date set for getting spray planes in the air. In addition to those permits mailed to farmers, others are available at banks, from county agents, ASC offices and from Plains Cotton Growers' committee in each county.

Either PCG boll weevil committees, county agents or Texas Department of Agriculture personnel will have personally contact those farmers who have not signed a permit by September 1. "It is necessary to the success of the program that every acre of weevil infested cotton be sprayed," Roy said, "and a lot of time and money can be saved if farmers in the seven control zone counties will make the necessary effort to secure and sign spray agreements before September 1."

Beginning the week of August 24 from 18 to 25 Federal Plant Pest Control personnel from all over the United States will start arriving to help put on the program. D. H. Russell, Supervisor of the Lubbock PPC office, said these men will be distributed between five points of operation tentatively set up in Floydada, Ralls, Crosbyton and Dickens. Two of the five points will be located in Dickens with one operating north and one south of Dickens.

"The prospectus and invitations to bid have been mailed to aerial applicators," Russell said, "with instructions that they must be completed and in the New Orleans business office of PPC by 1:00 p.m. August 28. He said the

bids would be opened that same afternoon and the successful bidder probably notified by telegraph no later than Monday or Tuesday of the following week.

With the decision to use the new technical malathion in the High Plains program, Russell said the need for only about 10 planes is being anticipated, and the entire job is being let under a single contract although there is the possibility of some subcontracting. Technical malathion is to be applied at the rate of 12 fluid ounces per acre (less than one pint), which compares with the three or four gallons per acre applied when conventional materials diluted in water are used. This advantage allows a plane to continue spraying until its fuel supply is exhausted without the necessity of reloading, also, the new material can be flown on from 15 to 25 feet above the cotton, taking a swath of 100 feet instead of the usual 35 or 40 feet covered when diluted chemicals are used. Obviously this development will effect considerable savings in the overall cost of this program.

Final decisions on total acreage to be sprayed and the amount of chemical needed are being held up pending late developments in weevil activity but already 500 drums of technical malathion, 55 gallon capacity, have been ordered for delivery no later than September 5. The 500 drums will carry 275,000 pounds of the material and will arrive on five 100 foot railroad cars, Russell said. Storage for up to 1600 drums of the chemical at any one time has been secured in Lubbock. The contract with the aerial applicator will make him responsible for transporting the chemical from Lubbock to the airstrip and for draining the barrels and returning them to the storage location.

The best estimate available now, according to Russell, is that an area of about 225,000 acres of weevil infested cotton will be sprayed an average of four times for an aggregate total of 900,000 acres, requiring approximately 720,000 pounds of chemical.
