

"REASONABLY RESPECTABLE"

ROMANS: 7:24

"Wretched man that I am! Who will deliver me from this body of death? We are sometimes perplexed by the mood of the Publican who was so aware of his own wrongness that he "smote on his breast, saying, "God be merciful to me a sinner." Quite possibly the Publican was at least reasonably respectable, but he had the good sense to know he was not nearly good enough. His eyes were on the heights he never seemed able to

The Publican was not trying to excuse his sins or deny them. On the contrary, he was courageous enough to face them honestly, and he prayed for mercy and help from a profound sense of need. He wasn't proud of his sins. He was ashamed of them and troubled by the weakness that led to

But, you ask, "Must I go around like the Publican feeling all the time that I am a miserable sinner?" Of course not. There is difference between decent humility and morbid self-debasement that borders on selfpity. Decent humility ask with St. Paul, "Who will deliver me?" The profound sense of need was there. Paul knew he needed help in order to be what he could be. So do we all.

Religion brings the resources of faith to bear on the ordinary sins of everyday people. It says with the eloquence of God that "No man needs to stay the way he is." He can be better, nobler, wiser, not by pulling himself up by his own bootstraps, but rather by finding the steadying resources of faith to meet his need. If we are honest with ourselves we know how often we have failed to be what we might have been and also how acutely we need both the forgiveness and the power of God in order to be what we ought to be.




