HANDLE SHORT LINE ROAD.

Charter Issued for Line in Deaf Smith and Martin Counties. Austin, Texas, March 30.—The Handle Short Line Railroad Company was chartered here this afternoon with a capital stock of \$2,000,000. This is the purpose of the company to build from Hereford, in Deaf County, to Stanton in Martin County, connecting with the Texas and Pacific at that point. The incorporators of the company are J. H. Ransom, C. W. Dodson, J. L. Fuqua, J. P. Slaton, J. E. Howard, W. B. Beach and J. Ray of Deaf Smith County, and W. E. Kitterman,

J. G. Archibald, J. C. Esslinger, A. R. Donaldson and O. G. Place of Boulder County, Colorado.

The line, when built, will be 210 miles in length. The road will begin at Hereford, running southeasterly through the county of Castro to a point in the north line of Lamb County, southeasterly through Lamb County to the west line of Hale County, southeasterly through Hale County, southerly through Lubbock County, south through Dawson County and south until connection is made on the Texas and Pacific within five miles of Stanton. The principal offices are to be at Hereford. — Dallas News.

New Bank for Tulia.

Our neighboring town of Tulia, in Smith County, has a new bank under the style of the Tulia Bank and Trust Company. J. M. Oakes of the Amarillo National Bank, will act as Cashier, with W. B. Hall, President; William Wood, Vice-President, and W. C. McInnitt, Secretary and Treasurer. It will be organized under the Texas state banking laws with a capital stock of \$50,000. They will have a new building with all modern banking equipments. This makes two banks for this progressive little town, The First National Bank of Tulia being the other.

The rapidly growing country contiguous to Tulia will well support the two banks and they have flattering prospects before them for a large business.

KILLED BY AUTOMOBILE.

W. W. Snyder Loses His Life in Automobile Accident.

On Wednesday evening at about eight o'clock, on the county road about six miles west of town, a party of men in one of the J. P. Snyder Land Company's automobiles happened to a sad accident in which one of the party, W. W. Snyder, was killed.

The automobile was running at a high rate of speed and in attempting to turn a sharp curve the machine was turned over and Mr. Snyder and the driver, Albert Murphy, were pinioned under the car. Fortunately the rest of the party were thrown clear of the wreck and escaped serious injury. Mr. Murphy was pretty badly bruised but not seriously hurt. When the machine was raised Mr. Snyder was found to be unconscious, having sustained serious bruises about the head which resulted in his death a few minutes later.

Mr. Snyder's brother, J. P. Snyder, was in a machine just ahead of the ill-fated one, and when it was noticed they did not follow, turned around and went back to ascertain the cause of the delay. On reaching

the scene of the accident they immediately came to town for medical aid, but when they returned with a physician Mr. Snyder was dead.

The other men of the party were Ira T. Blakely and Tom Carter, of this city, Mr. Johnson, of James-town, Kansas, and Chas. Hill, also of Kansas. All of these, except Tom Carter, sustained painful but not serious injuries.

Mr. Snyder had just come in that day to visit his brother, J. P. Snyder, of this city. He leaves a wife and one child to mourn his sad and untimely death. His remains were shipped Thursday evening to Modina, Missouri, his home, for burial.

CIVIC IMPROVEMENT.

Woman, a Factor In Civic Improvement.

After God created Adam He said it is not good that man should be alone, I will make a helpmeet for him, and from one of Adam's ribs made he a woman, and Adam said this is now bone of my bone and flesh of my flesh. This signifies to my mind he considered her his equal and after many centuries some few men consider woman their equal in point of intellect. God placed them in a beautiful garden to dress and keep; but ah! sin entered their hearts and they were driven out but not the desire still to beautify and improve their home and country. So from the beginning of ages we see woman a factor in civic improvement. Another lesson we can gather from the first garden of Eden which God gave us a pattern of; is, it is in the power of man and woman to have these gardens, though not without sin, in the way of parks in all our cities and towns. Civic improvement pertains to a city and its citizenships where woman can have the largest play of the faculties which it takes to beautify a city and uplift its citizens. Grandly and nobly is she doing it in many ways. During the reign of Queen Victoria we see her identified with numerous educational and charitable institutions. Mrs. Walker among the poor girls in Poplar, Miss Octavia Hill in the West End Courts, Mrs. Vickers among the fallen women at Brighton. We have all heard of Mary Carpenter, a true sister of Charity. In her active life she devoted herself to the reclamation of the neglected poor. She found and superintended a reformatory institution in Bristol. Armed with purity of purpose she went into courts and alleys, through which policemen could scarcely go. The horrors of the back slums were open to her. Nothing daunted or disgusted. She obtained the children for her school from these miserable quarters. At length she won a great victory, for the government adopted the project and established

reformatory and industrial schools which have done so much for that class. In our own America I could cite you to numbers of women who have had a hand in the civic improvement of her citizenship. Helen Gould for one, look what she has done to elevate and ennoble humanity. In our own fair state I point you to the Rescue home at Dallas, look what Mrs. Johnson and Miss Effie Johnson have done for poor fallen women and girls. The plan for a bond issue to make possible the establishment of a dormitory in connection with the College of Industrial Arts at Denton has been taken up by the Woman's Home Mission Society of the M. E. Church South and is said to be meeting with considerable success; several thousand dollars of the bonds have already been placed. Now I have given you a few instances where woman helped to improve her citizens, now I will show you how she has helped and can help improve her town or city. By promoting and aiding in establishing parks, putting out shade trees along the streets, putting fountains on the school grounds, and other places convenient to travellers and poor people; by assisting the health officers in keeping sanitary conditions of our city correct; by organizing cemetery associations and how sadly we need one here. Last but not least she can help procure a hall and have a Y. M. C. A. and its auxiliary a Y. W. C. A. organized. If we women of Hereford cannot do the big things we can help beautify and make our town so attractive to the young people they will not want to do what would be questionable. A poet has aptly said:
"We talk about a woman's sphere,
As though it had a limit;
There's not a place on earth or heaven,
There's not a place to mankind given,
There's not a blessing seen or heard,
There's not a whisper yes or no,
There's not a feather, a weight or worth,
There's not a life, a death or birth,
Without a woman in it,
A great work lays out before us,
Sister; what other women have done
on a large scale we can do on a small scale. Let's up and be doing for the night cometh when no one can work."

It will be a great factor in developing the Panhandle country, running north to the rich coal fields, giving you direct connection with the important cities of central and southern Texas and the Gulf of Mexico.

Railroad as to Assessments.
Aust, Texas, April 1.—The activities of Capt. McDonald with his prodding stick is causing some to kick. Capt. McDonald has been reading notices of letters both from assessors and members of Commissioners' Courts. As a rule, Capt. McDonald says, the Assessors promise to co-operate with him in the effort to increase assessments, but many of the Commissioners seem to think their prerogatives are endangered. Some of them intimate that Capt. McDonald is meddling in affairs that do not concern him, while

others declare that in instructing Assessors not to follow the direction of County Commissioners in making up their rolls he is advising them to go contrary to the law. This has prompted Capt. McDonald to make some inquiry of the Attorney General as to what the law is. The Attorney General has advised him that Commissioners' Courts have no authority whatever to instruct Tax Assessors as to the value at which they shall list property. The duty is upon the owner to state its value under oath, and Assessors who do not do so are recreant.

For every failure to do so the Assessor is subject to a forfeiture of \$50. No duty is imposed on the County Commissioners until the completed roll is submitted to them. Dallas News.
