### USDA: Farmers Storing Wheat Despite Fed Cutoff

WASHINGTON (AP) — Latest figures show that most wheat farmers recently have been holding onto grain they have in the government's three-year reserve program, despite a cutoff on June 30 of

federal storage payments. Agriculture Department officials say that for many of the farmers with wheat in storage, no other choice exists because of transportation snarls caused by strikes and a backlog of shipping orders to help move the oncoming fall harvest of corn and soybeans.

William T. Cherry of the department's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service said many farmers also "are just waiting to see" whether market prices will improve later on.

"But in some areas like the upper Midwest it's a matter of getting transportation to move the grain," Cherry said. "That's also true of other grain in the reserve that they might like to unload."

At its peak, the reserve program in-

cluded about 732 million bushels of corn; 413 million bushels of wheat and much lesser amounts of barley oats and sorghum.

The concept involves a farmer agreeing to put grain in storage under federal price-support loan for up to three years to keep it off the market and help boost prices. If market prices go up to specified trigger levels, however, the producer has the option of repaying the loan, redeeming his grain and then selling it as he chooses.

Prices of all the reserve commodities have been at or above the trigger or

"release" levels for some time. As of Aug. 24, after 10 weeks of being in release status, wheat farmers had

redeemed about 149.4 million bushels, about 36.2 percent of the 413 million they originally had in the program.

Corn producers had redeemed by then about 163.6 million bushels, 22.4 percent of the 732 million they had in storage.

Thus, wheat farmers - although they had much less total grain in the program (See FARMERS, Page 2)

### **David Tears Into Mainland**

COCOA BEACH, Fla. (AP) -Hurricane David whipped up the Atlantic Coast today, pummeling coastal northcentral Florida and taking deadly aim at

Georgia and the Carolinas. The densely populated Miami area was spared Monday as David, one of the century's worst summer storms, hit the United States mainland after taking a heavy toll in the Caribbean.

Hurricane-spawned tornados snaked out ahead as it ripped through a string of coastal cities, leaving behind power outages, roofless homes, shattered windows and damaged condominiums.

Furious winds snatched refrigerators and television sets out of wrecked apartments and tossed heavy camper trailers a quarter mile.

At least five Florida deaths were indirectly caused by the storm's Labor Day arrival, adding to David's growing toll. In the hard-hit Dominican Republic, officials raised the death count to at least

Forecasters said David's 90 mph winds were likely to grow stronger and predicted the storm would move further offshore before slamming back into the

Resort hotels in Daytona Beach were virtually deserted early today as thousands of tourists responded to evacuation orders. Others trimmed vacation plans and prepared to leave beaches along the Georgia and South Carolina

At 4 a.m. EDT, hurricane warnings were extended to Charleston, S.C., some 500 miles to the north. The storm's center was at latitude 29.2 north and longitude

80.7 west, 20 miles offshore from Daytona Beach, Fla. David was moving north at 10 mph.

Meanwhile, Hurricane Frederic lost strength and was downgraded to a tropical storm as it moved along the path David took last week when it attacked Caribbean islands with 150 mph winds more than double Frederic's force as it moved near Puerto Rico early today.

Dick Young, spokesman foy the Kennedy Space Center, said an Atlas Centaur launch rocket was the only heavy piece of hardware left exposed and that no major damage was reported.

Just south of the space center, David devastated two condominiums and dozens of trailers when it roared through the nearly deserted island town of Melbourne Beach.

"Televisions, radios, refrigerators everything - was sucked out and thrown across the street," said Police Chief Euel Roberts. "It ripped out about 50 percent of the trailers, did hundreds of thousands of dollars of damages."

"The whole county is just a mess. Telephones out, no power, blocked roads..." saiu a spokeswoman for the Brevard County sheriff's department.

Ronnie Book, an aide to Gov. Bob Graham, said damage estimates would be made after teams surveyed the coastal area today

Graham ordered the evacuation of 50,000 residents in low-lying areas in South Florida as the storm approached. and a call for "voluntary evacuation" of the Florida Keys ousted more than half of

### Oil Hurts Coastal Industry

SOUTH PADRE ISLAND, Texas (AP) - The tourist industry began assessing its losses today from an oil spill that scared away summer business and reduced Labor Day weekend revenues to a fraction of last year's income.

"It's a terrible disappointment," said Ralph Thompson of the South Padre Island Tourist Bureau.

Drizzle and cloudy skies along the Texas Coast most of Monday ended hopes for a last-minute surge of vacationers.

Thompson estimated the hotels, restaurants and shops that depend on seasonal sales lost three weeks of their peak summer business because of oil spill publicity.

The establishments have no way to make up the loss, he said.

Thompson planned to survey businesses today for an estimated percentage of their lost income. He would not put a dollar figure on anticipated losses.

Today also marked the first opportunity for operators to apply for Small Business Administration loans made available to offset effects of the Mexican oil spill. Seven coastal counties have been

designated disaster areas after either the brown crude or threats of its coming chased away tourists.

Cleanup crews had removed most traces of oil by Labor Day and there were no n new sightings of oil floating off-

However, the seashore was almost deserted on the summer's last holiday.

"Business is pretty bad, especially for a holiday," said Bonnie Walker at the Dockside Deli.

"The only customers we've had are local people and some Coast Guard guys," she said. "I haven't seen any tourists this week."

Business annually goes into a lull between Labor Day and Christmas, when the winter season begins, Thompson

### Storm Dumps Rain, Hail Over Area

Heavy weather returned to the local area over the weekend, unleashing torrents of rain in some locations and pelting down hail in the Friona area and northeast of the Dawn community.

HAVANA (AP) — The Non-Aligned Movement's sixth summit meeting opened on a negative note, with attacks on two governments that once enjoyed places of honor in the Third World as well as on that perennial target, the United

In a frequently applauded address opening the five-day meeting Monday, Cuban President Fidel Castro delivered his most scathing attack in years on the United States and also criticized Egypt and China. U.S. and Chinese representatives walked out, and Egypt's foreign minister took issue publicly with his host.

Castro Criticisms

Previous non-aligned summits have had anti-American undertones. But Castro, the movement's chairman for the next three years, this time is sponsoring a draft declaration to condemn the United States on a number of counts and openly

support Soviet foreign policy. Speaking to more than 50 chiefs of state and government heads and lesser ranking representatives of more than 50 other countries and liberation movements, the Cuban leader recalled the American war in Vietnam and past U.S. attempts to assassinate him and other Cuban leaders. He said the United States was indirectly responsible for "genocide" in southern Lebanon and southern Africa.

He accused the United States of maneuvering behind the scenes to try to prevent the summit meeting being held in Havana. He also said his neighbor to the north was guilty of "dirty scheming" by trying to portray Cuba as the tool of the Soviet Union.

Ignoring the Carter administration's frequent criticism of white rule in southern Africa, he said the United States "fully supports the Nazi facist spirit" in that area. He also accused the United States of supplying arms to South Africa and Zimbabwe Rhodesia although both countries have been subject to a U.S. weapons embargo for many years.

Turning to other targets, he assailed Egypt, whose late President Gamal Abdel Nasser was a founding member of the Non-Aligned Movement, for signing the Camp David peace agreements, which he called a "betrayal ... an unjust, dirty cause." And he accused China of

"uncivilized behavior" toward other nations. Wayne Smith, the chief U.S.

diplomatic representative in Havana, and China's representative both walked out since as observers they could not speak. But Egyptian Foreign Minister Butros Ghali as the representative of a member nation demanded the podium to answer Castro's "pernicious" remarks, and Castro insisted that he be heard after the meeting's moderator from Sri Lanka tried

#### Dominican Republic Receives U.S. Aid

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) - U.S. aid poured into the Dominican Republic as the official death toll from Hurricane David passed 800.

Civil defense officials said they feared the toll would go much higher when relief workers reached remote parts of the interior that suffered heavy damage.

A giant C-5A military cargo plane brought four helicopters for search and rescue missions, a water purification unit from Ft. Campbell, Ky., and jeeps, trucks and other equipment. C-130 military cargo planes shuttled to and from Puerto Rico, bringing rice, milk, flour, blankets, tents, medicine, electric generators, communications equipment, and rescue

"The situation is catastrophic." said Civil Defense Director Pedro Justiniano Polanco. "Hunger is starting to be felt by the thousands of country people isolated by blocked roads.

President Antonio Guzman took a helicopter tour of the badly battered southwestern and western parts of the country, where an estimated 60,000 were homeless.

That has not occurred so far, according to USDA figures. When prices were around \$4 a bushel earlier this summer, farmers were redeeming wheat at the rate of 20 million bushels or more each week.

Whether because of the decline in prices, the transportation problems or other reasons, redemptions recently have been a trickle. For example, only 2.6 million bushelf were redeemed in the week that ended on Aug. 24.

those sack lunch safety measures you've had all summer to forget. Strain no more. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has some tips to reduce the chance of food

First, consider the bag itself. If you have an insulated lunch box, use it. It's designed to protect the lunch, and it's easier to keep clean. If you do use paper bags, buy them specifically for lunches and use them once. Don't pack bags that have been used to carry groceries or other items.

Quality Service reminds that common sense in food handling can save your child a severe belly ache. Sensible sanitation. personal hygiene and sound food care are essential to safety. Keep everything clean, from your fingers to utensils to counter tops.

Keep hot food hot and cold food cold. Use a vacuum bottle if you have one. You also can use a freezer gel device or make one by cleaning out a plastic margarine tub. filling it with water and freezing it. That will help keep the lunch cold in the bag.

You may even try freezing the sandwich. That may cost you some flavor, but it prevents contamination and helps keep the rest of the lunch cool. Keep

"JEANS - WHICH FOR YOU?"

Whatever "jean look" you want to create, the jean-fashion. menu has it -- so choose those that flatter you.

With jeans with a "staple" in the clothing "diet," more varieties are on the scene from the very bland to the very gourmet.

To look your best and feel your best, consider how jeans make you look and choose the right ones for you.

Think color first.

Light colors generally make an area look larger, while darker ones look smaller. One way to look slender starts with choosing traditional navy-blue denim. However, watch out for the now-fashionable bright. eye-catching colors, unless you want added emphasis. Think texture next.

### Market Pricing Increases Stripper Reserves

Market pricing, the report adds, has contributed to the maintenance of the marginal production to such an extent that in 1977 the number of stripper wells, abandoned de-

clined to 9,000 for a 16-year low

The independents estimate there now are 8,800 stripper wells on the verge of abandonment even under existing market pricing economic conditions.

The independents say a new tax such as proposed in a House approved bill would more than double the number of wells on the verge of abandonment and could very well push the number to 26,500 wells.

### Building Analyst Predicts Housing Cycle To Slow

**AP Business Writer** NEW YORK (AP) - The housing industry has a longstanding reputation as one of the most volatile sectors of the U.S. economy.

Its cycle has traditionally run from boom, in stimes of easy credit, to bust whenever money gets tight.

mortgage markets - the mechanism that supplies the industry with its lifeblood - may be changing all that.

In the 1980s, predicts Jonathan Golfarb, building industry analyst at Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith, "the housing cycle, while still in evidence, will be significantly less volatile

But dramatic changes in the than it has been during the last 15 years."

In the past, the ups and downs of home-building have been influenced not only by fluctuations in demand for houses, but also by what happens in the money markets.

In bad times for the economy, demand for houses was reduced by normal economic forces. On

top of that, many potential buyers were shut out of the market because savings institutions didn't have the mort-

gage money to lend them. The lofty interest rates of the 1970s compounded this problem, attracting deposits out of savings accounts into other, higher-yielding investments, in a process known as dis-

But several things have happened in recent years to alleviate that threat, Goldfarb noted in a recent report.

First of all, the rules have been changed to allow the savings and loans and savings banks to combat disintermediation with a number of during the last year and have "new products" that are more

competitive than the standard passbook account. These include the six-month money market certificates, or MMCs, which pay rates equal to those offered by six-month Treasury

"MMCs have been successful in maintaining deposit flows provided critical support to

housing," Goldfarb said.

At the same time, he added, "Elimination or reduction of usury ceilings on mortgage rates in some states have also helped to make it possible for lending institutions to earn portfolio returns sufficient to permit higher-rate accounts, and increased use of variable-rate mortgages should have the same effect."

Perhaps the most important change of all, however, has been the rapid growth of a secondary market for mortgages, in which they can be bought and sold much like stocks on Wall





Our Nations's Race Relations

My sister and I never suffered any sweat or strain in our "race lence. relations." Our mother brought us up with the casual understanding that "God has flowers of many colors in his

We accepted that as naturally as we accepted Scripture.

garden."

My son matured in the awareness that a pianist confined to either the black or white keys is limited to his own disadvantage; harmony requires both.

So I have been able now and then to offer some top-sergeant remonstrance to troublemakers of whatever color without sacrificing a mutuality of respect.

I can "tell it as it is" when any black demands special favors in the name of "rights." I can call him what he is when a Philadelphia mayor urges

voters to "vote white." I can call it what it is when blacks, who comprise 12.6 percent of our nation's population, comprise 28 percent

of our armed forces. And when cities 20 percent black have a prison population of 67 percent black.

Blacks, their number multiplying twice as fast as the white population, if not yet in position to lead are in a powerful position to push.

And I can call their misleaders what they are when they dare--as one did on TV the

other night -- to promote vio-

When unemployment nationally is 5.7 percent--but among young blacks it is 30.9 percent--despite an abundance of help-wanted ads for unskilled workers. I can challenge them to shape up.

Or when they occupy low-rent housing, then misuse it.

When whites abandon cities because they refuse to share them--I can rub their upturned noses in the tenets of their own religion.

Now we come to another facet of our nation's race relations. Asians are moving in in unprecedented numbers. Their background, mores and traditions are entirely foreign to

The open-arms response of politicians is understandable. especially since a news-hungry multiplicity of media is dramatizing the "boat people" as martyrs.

Some of us owe these immigrants some reminders that are shirt-sleeve honest. For example: "Don't come to this country because it is what it is and then try to change it into

something which it is not." Understand, Boat People, very many Americans don't want you here. Some because of your color or because you will take jobs or because you will not take jobs.

As the son of an immigrant, I cannot be that selfish.

Instead, I am anxious that you might resist assimilation, divide your allegiance, distort our institutions. Don't do that.

Add spice to the soup; don't spit in it. Then--as generations of immigrants who preceded you, lean, hungry, unspoiled and appreciative, you might make of yourselves better Americans than we are.







NEW YORK (AP) - "Yaz" is a familiar word in big league baseball. Get used to it. It could be around for the next 20 to 25

Kidding? Not in the least.

Another Carl Michael Yastrzemski is being readied to pick up the glove and bat of the old man when Yaz Sr., Mr. Indestructible of the Boston Red Sox, finally decides he's had enough - if ever.

Keen-eyed diamond scouts call Yaz Jr., just turned 18 and a freshman at Florida State, a natural.

"Sure. I'm pointing for a baseball career," the trim, handsome youngster said while lounging in the Red Sox dugout prior to Monday's game with the New York Yankees at Yankee Stadium.

"Dad wants me to get an education first. I'll try to work my baseball around my studies. I have been playing in an independent league this summer.

Yaz Jr. motored down from Boston with his father for the Yankee series, hoping to see his famous dad get his 3,000th hit. Earlier this year, he had seen the elder Yastrzemski hit his 400th home run.

"I think that's the toughest - 400 home runs," the kid said. "Anybody can hit singles."

Yastrzemski, a Boston fixture for 19 years, needed only five more hits of any description to join the exclusive 400 homer-3.-

cial," the youngster said proudly. "Only Hank Aaron, Stan Musial and Willie Mays have done both. Nobody in the American League."

Yaz Jr., clean-cut with an athlete's build, said his father stuck a bat in his hand when he was big enough to toddle and he hasn't been spittin' distance for a war club since.

"At first, he taught me the do's and don'ts," the youngster explained. "Now he doesn't correct me too much. We work out together all winter."

The Yastrzemskis live on Highland Beach in Florida, not far from Boca Baton. Mike - as he prefers to be called so there will be no confusion with father Carl — is the only boy. He has three sisters, one older, two

Mike specializes as a third baseman-outfielder, is a switchhitter but a natural left-hander. Scouts contend he has all the ingredients of potential greatness - power, speed, excellent arm and the inspiration of a father destined for the Hall of

Although his father attended Notre Dame and got his degree from Merrimac College, young Mike chose Florida State because of its reputation for producing good baseball teams.



### Borg Advances By Stubborn Stockton

NEW YORK (AP) - Dick Stockton was full of surprises, both for himself and Bjorn Borg, although, in the end, the result was anything but surprising.

Stockton extended Borg, the world's top player and the No.1 seed at the U.S. Open tennis championships, to four sets Monday before bowing 6-4, 1-6, 7-6, 7-5. Borg thus advanced to the quarterfinals where he'll meet either fifth-seed Roscoe Tanner, whom he beat in a fiveset final at Wimbledon in July, or No.14 Tim Gullikson.

"I was a little surprised the way Dick was playing," said the Swede who has won four consecutive Wimbledon championships but has never won the U.S. Open. "That's the best match he's ever played against me. He was serving well and covering the net real well, which gave me problems to pass. I needed almost perfect passing shots.'

Today's matches featured four all-American men's singles confrontations. Aside from Tanner-Gullikson, No.2 seed Jimmy Connors, the defending champion, battled No.11 Brian Gottfried, No.3 John McEnroe



### HEALTH **Bulk may help**

DEAR DR. LAMB - I had a barium test of my colon because of increased peristalic action after being overseas several years. The only information on the X ray was two small polyps but the X-ray technician made a comment that I had an extremely long veriform appendix.

Although operations are discouraged now, I wish to avoid this possibility as a senior citizen. I have averaged one or two peristalic upsets a year unrelated to the appendix as far as I know. A quick recovery has prevented me from losing a single day's work.

Is there a diet or other health habits you can advise that might shrink the appendix or keep it in a healthy condition? My many physi-cal activities include jogg-Polish Remember Attack

DEAR READER — There is no solid information on diets that you can use to prevent appendicitis. Nevertheless, the advocates of increased bulk in the diet claim that such diets prevent appendicitis. As evidence, they cite the relative infrequency of attacks of appendicitis in cultures where the diet includes a lot of bulk, particularly cereal

I gather from your comment about increased peristalic action that you mean you have intermittent at-tacks of diarrhea. How the increased fiber in your diet would influence this I'm not certain and probably the best way to find out is to try it. In some instances, when the individual doesn't have enough bulk in the diet, increased amounts relieve this problem. That's because a spastic or irritable colon not only causes constipation but it can cause intermittent attacks of diarrhea.

As The Health Letter I'm sending you explains, a few rare people have sensitivity to gluten found in all cereals except corn and rice. I doubt that's your problem but it means that if you decide to try an increased amount of bulk in your diet that you might need to approach this cautiously.

Incidentally, individuals who have developed the capacity to jog long distances sometimes do have diarrheal episodes associated with the jogging itself.

DEAR DR. LAMB — I

have very fine, thin hair which will not take a permanent wave. My fingernails split and have rough ridges on top. I take a daily vitamin plus iron. I would like to know if there is some vitamin I should be taking that would help my condition.

DEAR READER - Probably not. Taking more vitamins and minerals than your body needs will not improve your health or the condition of your body.
You might review what

you're eating in reference to your protein intake. If you're on a protein-deficient diet, it can affect your hair and your nails.

Beyond that, as far as fingernails are concerned, you'd be surprised how many women have fingernail problems because they use fingernail polish. In some instances it may be the polish itself and in other instances, it's the reaction to the strong chemicals in the fingernail polish remover. DEAR DR. LAMB - My

husband and I have a question. I'm 22 years old and have had a hysterectomy. I was five months pregnant and had a miscarriage. They took me to surgery and found that the afterbirth had grown around the outside of the uterus. I guess the baby had attached itself half in the tube and half in the uterus. It was just a freak accident. I still have my ovaries and tubes and they just took out the uterus. Now my question is, has there been anything like a uterus transplant? They transplant hearts and other parts of the body so I was wondering if

this has been done. I'm perfectly healthy in all

other respects and my husband and I were looking forward to having children. DEAR READER - You must be describing an ectopic pregnancy, meaning that the fertilized egg was implanted outside the main d

have not been done and I seriously doubt they ever will be, at least on a practical basis. Remember there's a lot of trouble in avoiding rejection of transplanted organs. It's a fairly complex problem. The medicines that most people have to take to avoid rejection just aren't compatible with a pregnan-

Perhaps at some future date as more is learned about how to prevent rejec-tion, something of that sort might be contemplated but I would think that if that ever comes to pass it will be a long way off.

If you want to compare the situation to research that's been done in animal reproduction, there is only one real possibility. That would be to produce a test tube baby from an ovum released by your ovaries and your husband. The fertilized ovum would then have to be implanted in some other woman's receptive uterus to serve as an incubator.

Things similar to this are done in the cattle industry. For example, the fertilized ovum from a very expensive well-bred cow can be transferred to the uterus of a cow of lesser quality and she is literally used as the incubator for the pregnancy.

There are lots of moral questions "Bout" whether these things should or should not be done which I won't attempt to answer but will restrict my comments to what the scientific facts are.

If such a human experiment were to be achieved successfully, the baby that would be born would genetically be from the woman who provided the ovum and the man who provided the sperm, regardless of what woman's uterus served as the "incubator" for the

regnancy. DEAR DR. LAMB - I'm a 13-year-old male and have a concave chest. This has just become noticeable in the last couple of years.

I'm involved in sports and my friends are asking me why my chest is caved in. I'm becoming self-conscious about it. Is there anything that can be done to correct this condi-

DEAR READER - Unless it's very severe, it's one of . those conditions that should probably be left alone. It's sometimes called a funnel

All that's happened is that the breastbone in the center of the chest is bent inward. If the bend is slight, it won't create any problem. In severe cases, it can dis-

place or compress the heart. In that situation, it can cause some problems. I'm certain that's not true in your case since you are involved in sports. It sounds from your letter that you are fairly active and don't complain of any symptoms. The only way it could be corrected would be surgery and that's pretty drastic treatment for a minor body variation.
