The work will cost in the neighborhood of \$19,000 to \$20,000, which will be met by city warrants, accepted as cash by the contractors. A special tax of approximately ten cents will be levied to take care of these warrants and interest, the series being so arranged that the interest and part of the principal will be cut down each year, gradually retiring the warrant issue. The warrants will run from sixteen to
