ANOTHER CONSUMPTION CURE.

Patients to Be Taken for an Outing in Artic Circle.

Washington, May 27.—The latest cure for consumption is a three or four months' trip to the Arctic Circle. Dr. Fredrick Sohon of this city is the first' scientist to advocate this treatment.

Dr. Sohon himself is an example of the treatment he advocates. He was cured of tubercular troubles after two trips to the Arctic region with Peary.

Dr. Sohon will take a party of tubercular patients to Greenland next month. They will remain there until September. He is negotiating for the Havanah, a vessel at Halifax, with which to make the trip.

Arctic treatment consists merely in living outdoors through the Greenland summer. From four to six months, depending upon the latitude, there is a continuous Northern summer day, with incessant sunlight. It is contended that this never-setting summer sun imparts energy and vitality to a degree impossible in a region of day and night. Moreover, the atmosphere is dustless. sterile and purified to an extent impossible of attainment in warmer climes.

Dr. Sohon asserts that the Artic summer is not cold and bleak; but pleasant and comfortable.
