With Barnes were football stars, Bob Lilly and Walt Garrison, of the Dallas Cowboys. They were kept busy signing autographs and passing out pictures to the crowd.

After shaking hands and talking to the crowd gathered on the parking lot of the Law Enforcement Center, Barnes mounted the platform and spoke to the audience. Seated the main platform with the Lt. Governor were Lilly, Garrison, Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake and Bailey County Judge Glen Williams. Judge Williams introduced several people that were on the adjacent platform and then introduced Walt Garrison who gave a short talk and then turned the microphone over to Lilly who also spoke briefly to the group.

Barnes statement pertained mostly to the water problem in West Texas and to his campaign for Governor of Texas.

Barnes, at the age of 33, has already compiled a record of 11 years in service to the people of Texas. In 1960, when he was 22, Barnes was chosen by the people of State Representative District 64 to represent them in the Texas House of Representatives. He was re-elected in 1962 and 1964 without opposition. During his second term in the House, he was named Chairman of the crucial Rules Committee.

Barnes became the youngest man in the state's history to be elected Speaker of the House when, in 1965, at 26, the membership of that body chose him.

Absentee voting for the May 6 Democratic Primary is underway at the County Clerk's office in the Bailey County Courthouse. The last day to vote absentee in the statewide primary will be May 2.

In the county race, only one county office is opposed. In the County Commissioners race, Precinct Three, four men are running. They are W.H. (Bill) Eubanks, R.P. (Bob) Sanders, Gordon H. Green, Sheriff, S.D. (Dee) Clements; Tax Assessor-Collector, Jean Lovelady; County Commissioner, Precinct One, W.M. (Matt) Dudley; Constable, Precinct One, W.A. (Bill) Russell; and Constable, Precinct Three, W.E. (Wendall) Young.

In state elections, the most

contraversial is the race for governor. The seven candidates entered in the race include Ben Barnes, Dolph Briscoe, Mrs. Frances Farenthold, Robert Everett L. Looney, William H. (Bill) Posey, Preston Smith and Gordon F. Willis.

Five candidates are running for United State Senator. They are Thomas M. Cartridge, Barefoot Sanders, Alfonso (Al) Ve-C.A. Pstree and James Warren, Hugh Wilson and Ralph W. Yarborough.

The eight candidates running for Lt. Governor are Joe Christie, Wayne W. Connally, Ralph M. Hall, Bill Hobby, Bill Jones, Robert E. McCord, Troy Skates and John Armstrong Standlea.

In the Attorney General race, John Hill, Crawford Martin and William Pate are in the running.

Outstanding Young Educator Named

The local chapter of the Texas State Teachers Association held their annual Public Relations Banquet Tuesday night, April 18, at the Muleshoe High School Cafeteria.

The invocation was given by Fred Hedgecoke and the welcome and recognition of guests was given by Wayland Ethridge.

Archie Roberts, president of the Texas State Teachers Association, gave the principal address. He was introduced by Mrs. Norma Prather.

The highlight of the evening was the presentation of the Outstanding Young Educator Award presented by the Muleshoe Jaycees. The recipient of the Award this year was Ben Ingham. Ingham has been a teacher of the Migrant Children in Mary De-

Shazo Elementary School for the past three years.

He is a 1966 graduate of Amarillo High School where he received many honors during his junior and senior high school years. When he was a student in junior high he went to Mexico City and studied at the University of Tampico for eight weeks. He was an exchange student for the American Field Service and went to Peru where he lived with a native family and attended school. When he attended Amarillo High School, he was selected to go to Mexico for two weeks on the Good Neighbor Policy. Agagin he lived with a native family to learn their language. When he was a senior, his family sponsored an exchange student from Tur-

key. Other honors which Ingham received in high school included Mr. Sandman of Amarillo High School, the American Legion Award for Citizenship and best all-around band member. Ingham will receive his B.S. degree from West Texas State University this summer. He has a major in Spanish and English with a minor in French. Ingham is married to the former Betty Welch and they have one son, Christopher.

In presenting Ingham the Outstanding Young Educator Award, a Jaycee spokesman stated, "Ingham is a young, enthusiastic teacher who believes that children should be allowed to find their own way of creating and expressing themselves. The Muleshoe Schools are fortunate to have such an aspiring, innovative, bi-lingual teacher to help children hurdle language barriers."

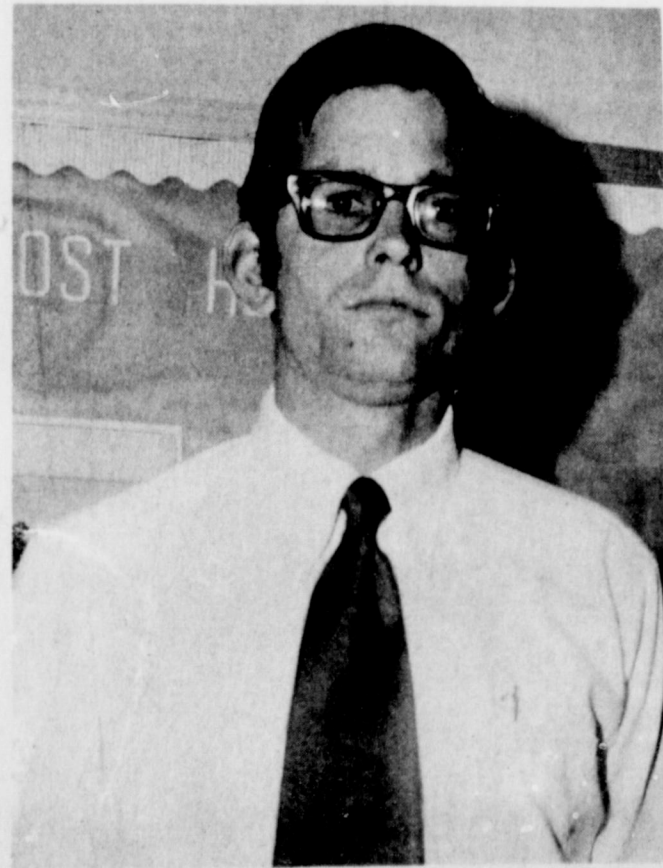
Neal Dillman, Superintendent and President of the School Board, presented service awards to the teachers.

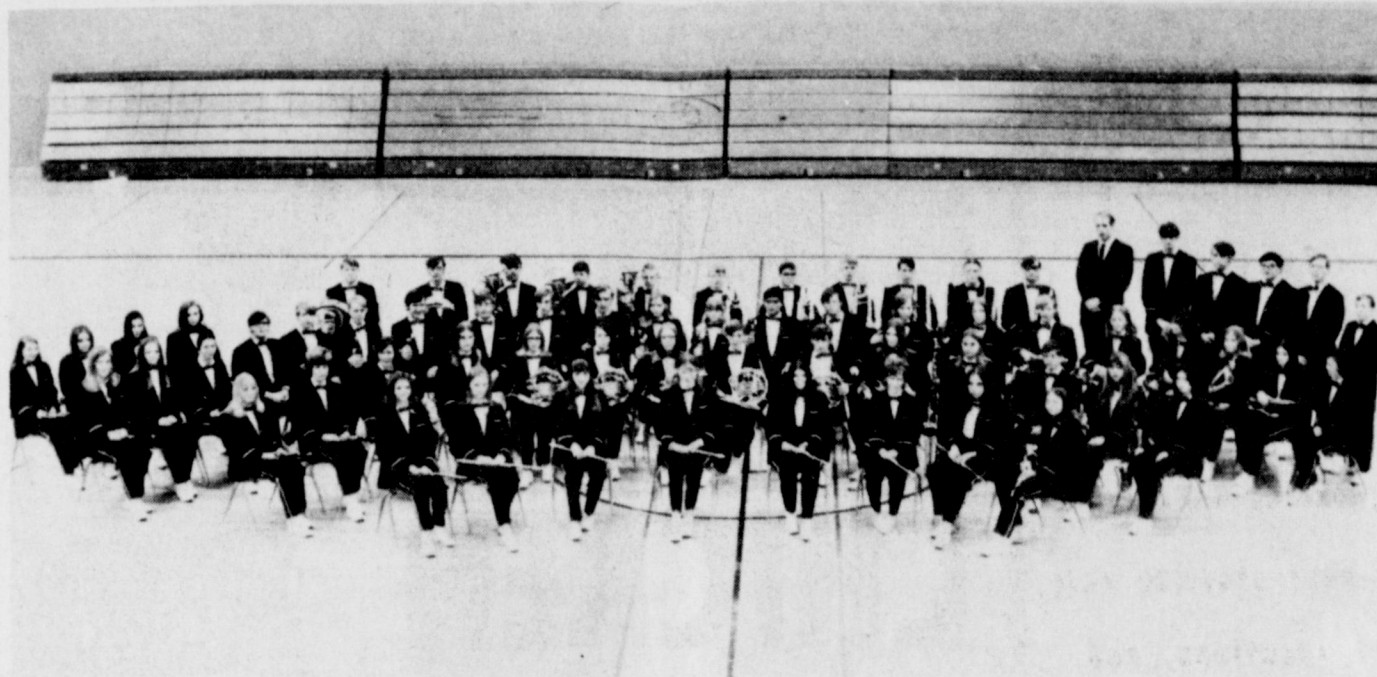

Is Latin Dead?

Upon analyzing this question one must look at some statistics. About 1,167,000 students were studying Latin in 1964 in grades 7-12 in the US alone. Approximately 1,000 university students chose Latin as the major subject for their bachelor's degree in the same year. Latin today is read by millions in many countries. For five centuries English-speaking people have found it reasonably easy to learn because there are many Latin elements in English.

Latin introduces the students to classical authors, gods, and other classical concepts which are constantly referred to in European and American Literature. Latin encourages international understanding by facilitating the recognition of a common cultural heritage. Lack of knowledge of the classics makes us appear uneducated to some Europeans for whom such is the mark of an educated man. Latin augments a pupil's mental horizon through the introduction of a completely new medium of verbal expression and communication. It is the mother of five languages, can make us more sensitive to our own grammar. Furthermore most of our grammatical terminology comes from Latin. Knowledge of Latin becomes extraordinarily practical if you desire to learn to read Spanish, Italian, Portuguese, Rumanian, and French since all five descended directly from Latin. High school students who occasionally have difficulty deciding which language they will eventually need, should remember that Latin is the portal to five languages. The budget will be made and ideas will be discussed for different money-making projects. Suggestions will also be entertained for next year's student council theme.

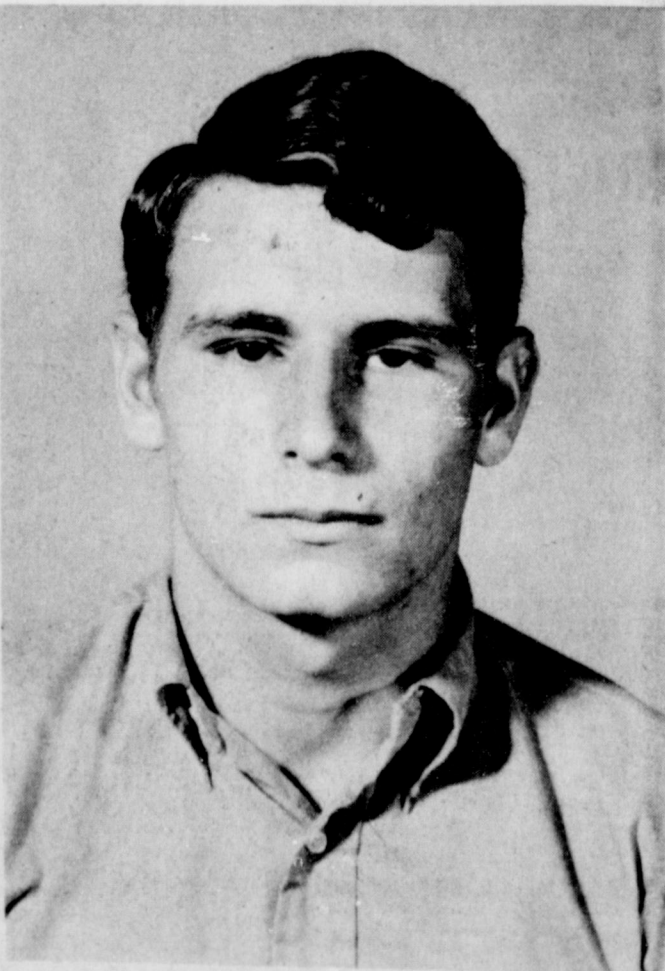

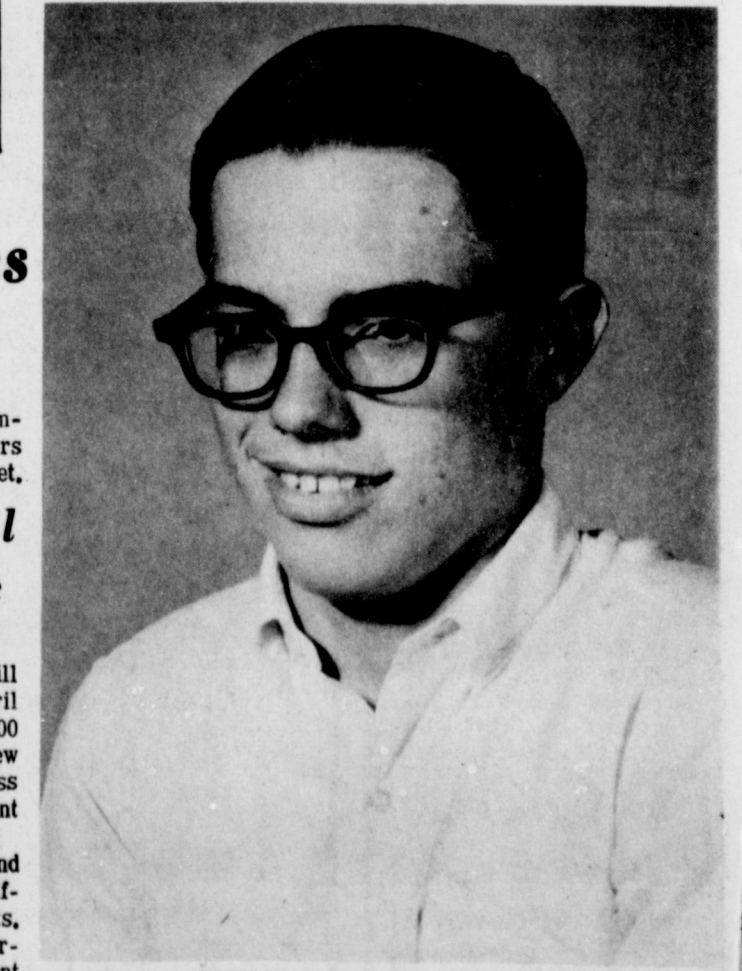
