### Believe in Equalization.

A call meeting of citizens and tax payers was had Tuesday afternoon at the law office of Geo. W. Barcus, who was elected chairman, the purpose being to devise ways and means of securing an equalization of taxes on Deaf Smith county property.

While the meeting was not largely attended, those present took a decided stand in their endorsement of a thorough readjustment of the county tax roll so that equity may prevail in every department from which revenue is derived from Taxation. The point at issue is that the lands of the county, most of which has a market value of from \$6 to \$20 per acre is rendered at the minimum sum of \$1 to \$6 per acre, no rendition whatever being made of the many nice country residences extant over the county, while in Hereford, residences, business houses and merchandise is rendered at 60 per cent of its marketable value. The situation was thoroughly reviewed and investigated, those present being decidedly of the opinion that a more just equalization should be made.

In view of the fact that the Commissioner's Court meets as a board of equalization on next Monday, a committee was appointed to confer with that body in regard to the matter, Geo. W. Barcus having been asked to present the matter to the Court.

More will be given in our next issue as to the results of the conference.

### Hereford Dirt Valuable.

With possibly one exception, the record for high-priced land was broken this week, when H. B. Webb executed a warranty deed to J. Ray to a strip of land on North Dewey Avenue, 3 1/2 inches wide by 140 feet long, consisting of only about 50 square feet, the total consideration being check for \$200.00. This is approximately \$4.00 per square foot and would be considered a fancy price for land in many of the smaller cities.

ELSEWHERE in this issue will be found a brief report of the meeting of tax payers which was held in this city this week, the purpose of the meeting as is shown in the report, being to equalize the taxes of the county. Hitherto it has been the custom to assess town property at from 50 per cent to 60 per cent of its marketable value, while ranch property has been rendered at from \$1 to \$5 per acre, owing to the distance from town, the improvements in the country not being rendered at all. We feel that all will agree with us in saying that this is an unjust state of affairs. Our government was founded on the universal principle that all men are created equal and since all have the privilege of sharing alike in the benefits of the government, it is a natural conclusion that the burden of government should fall upon all alike. This is a matter which should be handled judiciously and with the greatest justice. It seems to be the decision of all that a readjustment of taxable values should be made; the only question being the manner in which it should be brought about. Since the rate of taxation is already at its maximum, the BRAND believes that the rate should remain as it is, but that the valuations in some instances should be lowered while in others they should be raised. This seems to be the only equitable solution to the question. However, this is only our way of looking at it and we do not claim to be infallible. Our columns are open to each and every one who wishes to make his views on the question public.

## NEED BETTER FACILITIES.

A matter of public interest which is being constantly overlooked to the great detriment of the growth of Hereford is the providing of better depot facilities. Six years ago when the town began her existence and the railroad first made its appearance, the present depot building was, in every respect, adequate for the business transacted; but with our continuous growth and development, the company's business has multiplied in a manifold ratio so that the present structure is wholly inadequate. The traveling public, as well as the business interests of Hereford, are clamoring for a commodious and well appointed depot building; the present conditions demand it. We believe if the matter was laid before the Santa management, there would be but little hesitation in supplying the long-felt need. The management of the road has always manifested a great interest in Hereford's development and they, if we are not mistaken, stand ready to do what they reasonably can to continue the town on the upward road. At any rate, it would do no harm to place the matter before them.

FREQUENTLY the BRAND receives communications from its subscribers and friends which it cannot afford to publish. We take this method of explaining why this is the case so that the omission of different articles sent in for publication will be understood. Sometimes they contain reflections upon the integrity of individuals, sometimes they reflect upon the country, etc., etc. No newspaper man can make a success of his business unless he throws a restraint upon this particular part of the business. We this week received a communication from subscribers in New Mexico which would not admit of publication because of comparisons made between New Mexico and the Panhandle. To make a long story short, nothing shall ever find place in the BRAND which has a tendency to tear down the country. Our purpose and mission is to work for the development of the entire West in general, but we are making a specialty of giving to the public each week the many advantages which Deaf Smith, Castro and attached counties offer to the actual home-seeker. We say this is our specialty and in no event can we afford to let anything come between us and this purpose.

Now that street-grading in Hereford has been well begun, we see no reason why the work should not be carried on till all the principal thoroughfares have been put in first class condition. It requires but a small donation from the property owners to pay for grading and the cost of is insignificant as compared to the permanent results obtained. Mr. Woods does the work on very reasonable terms and those desiring his service will do well to see him while he has his full crew together.

THERE seems to be a great degree of confusion over the representative race in this district between Messrs Gibson and Bowman, each claiming a victory in the recent special election, not counting Potter County. Whichever way this may be matters little. The question which should concern these gentlemen most at present is "Can I get the majority of votes in the primary election?" It will be noticed that "your Uncle Fuller" no longer advises the BRAND readers to come to California. We rather think that when he felt the earth rocking under him he remembered the Panhandle, and devoutly wished himself back where he could sing "How firm a foundation."

## ODD FELLOW SERMON.

Rev. Thos. S. Barcus Preaches Interesting Discourse to Local Lodge on Brotherly Love.

We publish below at the request of different members of the lodge, the sermon delivered by Rev. Thos. S. Barcus to the Odd Fellows of Hereford Lodge at the Methodist church on last Sunday at 11 a. m. Mr. Barcus spoke in substance as follows:

I have been requested by the Odd Fellows to preach for them today on the subject of brotherly love, hence the sermon will be topical rather than textual. We have many instances on record, both in sacred and profane history, illustrating the principle of brotherly love. It was love for his brethren which led Moses to slay the Egyptian who was found mistreating the Hebrew. Though Moses was the adopted son of the royal court, yet through brotherly love for his brethren he gladly surrendered all claim to the throne and went in defense of his brethren.

It was love for her mother-in-law which led Ruth to turn from her own people and declare unto Naomi: "Whither thou goest I will go; thy people shall be my people, and thy God my God. Where thou diest I will die, and there will I be buried."

It was love for his friend and companion which led Jonathan to expose the cause of David who was being persecuted even unto death.

But in each of these there might be found an element of selfishness in them. Moses suffered for the Hebrew children but they were his own kindred. Ruth was willing to leave all else and cleave only to Naomi but Naomi was the mother of her husband and was alone in the world. She had learned to love Naomi and Naomi loved her. Hence it was natural for her to cling to her. Jonathan and David had been very close friends and he was willing to stand by him because he was his friend.

But Christ came into the world and gave to the world a higher type of brotherly love. When Christ came the law was love the man who loves you; hate the man who hates you; but Christ came with a new command and said "Ye have heard that it hath been said, thou shalt love thy neighbor and hate thine enemy, but I say unto you, love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them that despitefully use you and persecute you."

1. The scope of Christ's command, the principle of brotherly love as taught by Christ embraces the world. The Jews had declared that their neighbor was simply the Jew and that spelled with large letters. The only neighbor they recognized was the narrow neighborhood of Hebrew speech and Hebrew sympathy. The Hebrew mind was as isolated as their land and all who could not frame their Shibboleths were barbarians, Gentiles, whom they were at perfect liberty to spoil, as with anathemas and swords they chased them over their Jordans. But Christ gave to the world a different teaching as He talked to the lawyer in answer to the inquiry as to who is my neighbor, as He taught in that wonderful parable of the good Samaritan. This parable teaches that every man is our brother. Not simply the man who lives next to you or believes as you do. Not simply the man who is bound to you by some tie of friendship, but every man is your neighbor and brother and in no possible way can you restrict the claims of your fellowman upon you, and to endeavor to make this parable teach that I am to be brotherly only to those of my own church or to my own part of town or to my own fraternal order is a perversion of one of the most helpful and beautiful passages of Scripture. This parable was not given us to teach us that we could organize for mutual helpfulness to the utter exclusion of all others, but rather to teach us that every man is our brother. The Samaritans were, in the sight of the Jews, a despised race, and according to the testimony of the Samaritan woman with whom Jesus talked had no dealings with the Jew. And yet the plain teaching of Jesus is that this unfortunate Jew was his neighbor, and that he owed a duty to him that could not be ignored. Mere membership in the order does not make a true Odd Fellow any more than a mere membership in the church makes a true Christian. He only is a true brother who has a heart to feel his brother's need. It was left to Christ to give this highest type of brotherly love and if we follow the teaching which He gave us we will encircle the world and claim the world as our brother.

2. The great need of brotherly love. I rejoice in every movement in every organization which has for its end and object the helping and binding together of mankind in one common brotherhood. I stated a moment ago that this parable does not give us authority to organize for mutual helpfulness to the utter exclusion of every one else, yet it does not teach that we are not to organize for purposes of mutual helpfulness.

It teaches the common brotherhood of man and this principle can best be carried out by such organizations as yours. In this day of such stringent living and such diversified interests, organization becomes a necessity. Go to the business world and there is not a business enterprise of any note that is not organized for mutual counsel and helpfulness. We have found it necessary to organize for the most successful work for our Master. But while we thus organize for mutual benefits we must still remember that the world is our brother, and I believe that such organizations as yours helps to bring about this brotherly feeling. Hence they are to be encouraged rather than discouraged. Some one objects to them and says you cannot apply the principles of this order to all men for all men do not belong to, and therefore it should not be encouraged. And if it does not reach the world then let it reach as many as possible. I believe that one of the greatest needs of the world today is for this principle of brotherly love to be applied to the every day life about us. Let your fellowman know that there is another heart that beats in sympathy with his. The most despairing thought that ever comes to a man is for him to feel that he is in the world alone, and that no man cares for him. The Psalmist understood something of this feeling when he cried out from his sorrowful, bleeding heart "No man cares for my soul." Lives have been rescued from the very brink

of ruin by a kindly word spoken in the proper moment, which led the unfortunate one to feel that after all some one did care for him. We are told that in the city of Dallas that when a few of the consecrated workers from the rescue home were holding services in one of the most sinful parts of that city that a poor dejected, heartbroken girl threw herself down before them sobbing and weeping as though her heart would break, when one of the workers went to her and placed her arms around the fallen woman and said, "sister look to Jesus He will help you and forgive you." When the poor woman looked up in such pitiful tones and said, "You call me sister, no one cares for me." And then as she told her of the simple story of the Christ who died for her and that He would pardon her sins, she trustingly gave her heart to Jesus and He forgave her all. Oh, the power of sympathy to help man! Who can measure it? Fellow members of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, be true brothers, not in name only but in deed and in truth. Remember as this parable of the good Samaritan would teach and does teach that, the true priest is not in the temple, nor the true levite in his robes, but that he who helps his fellow man who needs help, that he is the true friend and brother. Also remember that true Odd Fellow is not the one who knows the ritual by heart or has spent the greatest number of years in the halls of Odd Fellowship, but he is the true brother who sees his brother's needs and then goes to the assistance of his fellow man. This young lawyer with whom Jesus was speaking in the tenth chapter of Luke was perfectly familiar with the law and when Jesus said to him "What is written in the law, how readest thou?" He very promptly replied, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy strength, and with all thy mind, and thy neighbor as thy self." And Jesus as promptly replied, "Thou hast answered right this do and thou shalt live." But he needed to be instructed further as to who was his neighbor. He must get the narrow prejudice out of his heart and this could not be done in any way so well as through this parable which was brought so closely home to him. The mere fact that he knew the law did not make him a good man, fit for the Kingdom of God. Narrowness and prejudice must first be gotten out of the heart before God could use him.

Sometimes we neglect the great lesson of this parable. This young lawyer knew what he should do but he was not doing it. Is it not possible that you becoming familiar with these wonderful words shall neglect the most essential truth? Since it is true that the highest and noblest and truest type of brotherly love is to be found in the life and teachings of the Son of God, it is also true that no man can live this life without the Christ in his heart. You may have joined the brotherhood and you may have understood her teachings and yet I declare unto you that you cannot be a true brother and leave out of your life the life of Jesus—the Christ. You may become what this young lawyer was, a man with a fair knowledge of what the law teaches and yet not be actually living that life yourself. We must have something more than a theoretical knowledge of the law. This parable teaches that we must love man for man's sake and not for any special ties that may be binding us. Love your

enemies as well as your friends is the plain teaching of this parable. If this unfortunate man had been one of this Samaritans friends or neighbors, as he understood the term neighbor, it would not have had the lesson for us nor would it have had any lesson for that young lawyer. For his religion had taught him that he must love his friends and neighbors as he interpreted the term neighbor.

But permit me to plead with you my friends to go a little further than friendship, than brotherly love and give your hearts to Jesus Christ. Be not deceived in your relationship to your Heavenly Father. Your lodge is good if you will only permit it to occupy its proper sphere, but its place is to teach and practice fraternalism, fraternalism of the highest order if you please, and not to lead men to Christ. And when I say that its place is not to lead men to Christ, I do not condemn it. The lodge has its mission and the church has its mission. The mission of the one is not the mission of the other. I do not hesitate to say that whenever you endeavor to have your

lodge take the place of your church, that you make a monumental mistake. Your fraternal relations will never make of you a devout Christian. There is something more in life than fraternalism. I appreciate a good fraternal order. They have an important place in the world. Every first-class fraternal order is a factor for good. And I would say to each of you, be true to your order, but above all be true to Jesus Christ, for He it is who gave you the truest example of brotherly love—and after all He is the only sure anchor of the soul. Men may fail us, but God never does. "All things that are on earth shall wholly pass away except the love of God which shall live and live for aye." Be sure that you have not lived so as to leave out the one essential of life. We may love our neighbors and friends without any great effort on our part, but if I understand the true teaching of this parable as well as the teachings of Christ on fraternalism as we find it in the fifth chapter of Matthew, it goes beyond and

Strive earnestly after that higher life in Christ Jesus lest He shall say unto you "One thing lackest thou yet." "Without me" says Christ "Ye can do nothing." The man who goes through life without Christ is a failure even though he may have united with every fraternal order.

"Go and do thou likewise" is the Master's word to us. Discipline your heart that you may see in every man a brother, whose keeper you are. Let fraternity be, not a theory only but a realized fact, and then a factor of your life. "Train your eye to watch for other's needs, to read another's woe. Train your soul to sympathy and your hand to helpfulness, for in our world there is room for both." "He who would lift another's load, who soothes another's smart, who brightens a life that else would be dark, who puts a music within another's soul wakes even a sweeter music within his own, for he enters on earth into his Master's joy, the joy of a redeeming, self sacrificing love."

### Have Sheep on the Farm.

The American idea of sheep raising is entirely different from the English. We practice the same theory with sheep raising that we unwisely do with general farming in requiring too many acres. We have an idea that we cannot raise sheep unless we have large pastures or wide range to run in all the time except winter. This is a mistake. The sheep is the easiest of all domestic animals to handle and the cheapest to raise if proper management is exercised. Sheep can be made to pay on the farm where they are cared for, and no farm in South should be without a flock.

The English plan is not to let sheep run at wild over a wide range, as is the practice in this country, but to keep them on limited areas all the time, by using "hurdles" or movable fences. And they not only have their splendid grass pastures to run them on in this way, but also sow different things for the purpose, notably turnips. English sheep eat a great many turnips.

Now, if we adopt their plan, we can use turnips, too, but probably dwarf Essex rape would be better. There are many other things, too. Corn and rye are both good, and a chance at weedy fields sometimes will help a great deal. Then think of the value of cowpeas and the different legumes. In fact, our list is unlimited. Sheep pastured on fields where weeds flourish will more than pay for their keep in destroying weeds and other noxious growths.

A portable fence that will turn sheep, any farmer can construct at small expense, and by herding the flock of nights for a short time, the fertility of worn and tired lands can soon be restored and made productive. Let no farm in the South remain without a flock of sheep, and of as many as can be properly protected and cared for.—Ft. Worth Farmer and Breeder.
