Hunter also spoke against the major oil companies which he declared were manipulation prices at the expense of the consumers to the degree that "millions of dollars are being taken from Texas unfairly each year." He urged that legislation be enacted to divorce the pipe line and fililing station set ups from the integrated corporation system.

Turning to a discussion of his recovery for Texas Hunter declared that it was essential to reallocate the tax burden in order to relieve real estate from bearing an excessive share of the load. He declared that

while real estate is bringing in but 15 per cent of the state's burden it bears 77 per cent of the ad valorem tax burden.

"There is nothing fair about a condition that permits 85 per cent of our income, which is from sources other than real estate, to escape with but 23 per cent of the tax burden. A blended tax system, designed to reach all these tax dodgers and making each pay in proportion to the ability to pay is an essential part of a Texas recovery," Hunter said.

STATE'S RIGHTS AND OIL

The old question of whether the state of Texas can control the turbulent East Texas oil field was brought up again at Tyler yesterday when oil men met and adopted resolutions petitioning congress to provide adequate federal control for petroleum.

Railroad Commissioner E. O. Thompson was critized for his recent stand against federal investigation.

It was asserted that the state had failed to curb the flow of "hot oil", said by one speaker to amount to 40,000 barrels daily now.

When several hundred oil ment meetand demand federal action to clear up the difficuties existing in the field, something must be wrong somewhere.

The old plea of state's rights doesn't carry the weight it once did. When men can't get their rights under the state they are willing to call on Uncle Sam for redress.-Abilene Reporter.

RACE TRACK LOSS

From the Dallas News.

The News in its editorial, "Play at the Tracks," and predicting a \$3,000,000 mutuel handle for the twenty-one days, infers that it will cost 100,000 persons in and around Dallas \$15 per person. It might not cost a great number of them anything, as the mutuel department is only stakeholder and patrons win 90 per cent of the money bet on each race. 

Sometimes corrections come from several directions, sometimes only from those who have specialized in whatever science or profession may be for the moment under discussion. So when S. P. said he doubted if God had any particular favorite among nations he was corrected abundantly, not nly by thse envinced by their prejudices but thse animated by study and comparison. Today we have in hand-we've had in hand a couple of weeks in fact-a volume entitled "Bible Proof That America Is God's Chosen Nation." The book is by the Rev. William M. Groom, D. D., pastor of Central Baptist Church, Dallas. Dr. Groom is a student and logician, as all Baptists are, more or less. John the Baptist was a logician but probably not much of a student, while State Press, also a Baptist, is a something of a student but not much of a logician. We Baptists are diversified, it appears. Dr. Groom makes out a good Biblical case for his contention that America is God's chosen nation, yet our dear country, our beautiful and sweet continent, was altogether unknown when the Bible was written. Of course God knew America was here. He having made it and given it to the Indians. But the authors of the Scripture from Moses to John of Patmos, hadn't heard even a hint of it. This, of course, doesn't argue against the theory that our land is God's first choice. He may have held it in reserve for the inauguration of the millennium, but that blessed interregnum appears to be nearer now than when George Washington warned against entangling alliances with less favored nations. All that State Press knows about it is that if God is the Author of all mankind he doesn't look upon the children of earth as being Americans, Chinease, Frenchmen, Hindus, Britishers, or Hitlerites. He must look on them as human beings, all equally entitled to His good will. It may be that He most esteems those who most nearly do His will, but in that case we fear Americans have failed to register for first place.-State Press in Dallas News.



rency inflation measures, a moderate lag in trade volumes is likely. Heavy Government purchases of raw materials involved in the PWA and other projects, however, will sustain certain of the lagging industries during the next several months and thus ameliorate any late spring recession.

"Adjournment of Congress is expected to occur within the next six weeks and in the meantime a certain amount of compromise legislation will probably be enacted. Although some concessions to the radical inflationists and social reformers are anticipated, sentiment seems to be growing that the administration will in the future place greater obstacles to business management and enterprise and less upon atrifical stimuil of doubtful imediate value and with potentially unfavorable results over the longer period.

"Not alone economic but longer term political considerations seem to sugest clearly the wisdom of a policy which will be reasoning to efficient business management in both large and small enterprises. Successful economic planning can be carried out only as the wholewharted cooperation of private enterprise is enlisted and such cooperation in turn presupposes confidence on the part of business men in the underlying philosophy of the government program.

"It is becoming increasingly celar that i any sound jrogram of economic promotion of international trade is of first importance."
