# House Ag Panel Ups Targets by 7%

WASHINGTON (AP) - A bill that would raise this year's target prices for wheat and feed grains by 7 percent has been approved by the House Agriculture Committee.

The committee approved the measure Thursday by voice vote.

Rep. Richard Kelly, R-Fla., who called the bill "unadulterated governmentimposed inflation." unsuccessfully tried to secure a recorded vote.

A move to raise the rates by 9.5 percent, because of recent jumps in fuel prices, was defeated, 22-10. The 7 percent bill, sponsored by Rep.

Glenn English, D-Okla., would raise the target price on 1979 wheat from \$3.40 a bushel to \$3.63 and on 1979 corn from \$2.20 to \$2.35. Rates for other feed grains are based on the rates for corn.

The Carter administration opposes the

Under the target-price system, the Agriculture Department sets a target price that farmers should expect to receive for what they grow. If market

prices are lower than the target, the government pays the farmers the difference.

The cash payments are made only to growers who have cooperated with the Agriculture Department's productioncontrol programs, already announced for this year's crops. The main wheat harvest

is beginning and corn is being planted. The department did not raise income-protection rates for farmers this year. A record 1978 corn crop had added (See PRICES, Page 2)

### and Criticizes Wheat Release

WASHINGTON (AP) - Some members of the House Agriculture Committee are miffed about the release of wheat that had been stored under the government's three-year reserve program.

The Agriculture Department late price of wheat had risen enough so that farmers, if they choose, can pay off price-support loans and sell the grain on

More than 400 million bushels of wheatequal to more than 20 percent of last year's harvest - are stored under the program, which is intended to keep the

grain off the market until prices go up. Rep. Dan Glickman, D-Kan., and others on the House committee indicated Thursday that they want an accounting by USDA of why the wheat was released at this time. Harvest of the 1979 crop will begin soon in the Southwest and will be in full swing in Kansas - the leading producer - by mid-June.

The program provides that farmers can store wheat - also corn and other feed grains - under the department's loan program for as long as three years and get federal payments to help defray the storage costs.

But if the market price of wheat; in the meantime, rises to 140 percent of the loan rate of \$2.35 a bushel - a trigger point of \$3.29 a bushel - farmers then, at their option, can pay off the loans and sell the grain for cash.

In announcing the release of stored wheat, the department said the average farm price had risen to \$3.31 a bushel. two cents above the trigger point.

Department officials said a full explanation of the decision to release the stored wheat is being prepared for delivery to Glickman and other members

of the committee. One official, who asked not to be identified, said the decision to release the stored wheat was "very borderline" and that Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland does have discretion under the rules on whether to abide by the formula's 140 percent trigger point.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The debate over corporate profits could heat up again with the government's latest announcement of profit figures:

The announcement, due today, covers the first three months of 1979.

The report two months ago that pre-tax corporate profits in the final quarter of 1978 were 26.4 percent ahead of the fourth quarter of 1977 drew howls from labor officials and from Alfred Kahn, the president's chief inflation fighter.

"Profit gouging," charged AFL-CIO President George Meany.

"It's a dramatic figure, and it's bad," said Kahn.

The problem, of course, is that the government is attempting to slow the rate of inflation by getting voluntary cooperation with wage and price guidlines.

Richard M. Nixon tried to step on the gas and the brakes at the same time in order to check both unemployment and inflation in advance of the 1972 presidential campaign. As secretary of the treasury. Connally, then a Democrat, was both a draftsman and a salesman for the Nixon

He doesn't say much about those days now. But the economic platform he offers as a candidate doesn't sound much like the one he helped Nixon

The most dramatic of Nixon's economic moves was the wage and price freeze he imposed on Aug. 15, 1971. Connally was one of the economic advisers who urged him to do it; indeed, Nixon later called his treasury secretary "the architect of the new economic policy." After the 90-day freeze came mandatory wage and price controls, which reamined in effect through the 1972 election and were lifted early in 1973.

Connally hailed the freeze as a new policy designed to solve hard core, basic economic problems. "I personally believe the president's program contains the most sweeping. courageous and important economic proposals made in the last 40 years in this country," he

> Those are the kind of numbers any president welcomes in the springtime of his re-election campaign year. ### Poor Times for Savers

NEW YORK (AP) - These are

poor times for savers. by putting away a bit of their

ncomes, they set off events that seem to benefit everyone but themselves. Their reward for getting the ball rolling is - well. there is no reward; there's a

The events begin with the saver banking \$100 for a rainy day. In effect, he lends the savings institution \$100, and receives in return 5.25 percent interest. With daily compounding he earns \$5.75 a year.

The bank relends the \$100. and more. Because all deposits aren't likely to be withdrawn at the same time, the bank can loan out more that it takes in. For illustration, though; it's

Like any good retailer, the bank marks up the price of the product; it charges the borrower 12 percent, perhaps discounting government spending and the loan in advance and giving

The borrower doesn't mind the double-digit cost of the money because he has a friend. Uncle Sam, who will help pay the bill. The borrower is in a 30 percent tax category; he gets a tax deduction of \$3.60 on the \$12 interest he pays.

The return of that \$3.60 means he has the use of \$91.60 rather than \$88. Meanwhile. because of inflation, he repays in cheaper dollars. At 9 percent inflation, he repays, effectively. only \$91 of the \$100.

In the meantime, he has invested the money in home repairs that raise the value of his home by much more that the amount of the loan. The repair man, assuming he runs a sound business, makes a profit

Meanwhile, naive to inflation, the saver might believe he has earned \$5.75 in a year. He hasn't of course. He earned interest at 5.75 percent, and lost buying power at 9. His loss: At

Why "at least?" Because he has to pay taxes on his "profits." If saver, like the borrower, is in a 30 percent tax bracket, he loses another \$1.72, or 30 percent of his \$5.75 "profit." His net loss: \$4.97.

Only one loser in the bunch: The saver who made it all

While small savers have tolerated the injustice for years. maybe feeling it is better to save something rather than nothing at all, they don't seem inclined to take it much longer. They are withdrawing their funds.

If that drain continues, - it could destroy the housing market in short order . And when housing goes, so does the economic health of related industries, such as furniture and appliances. Savings support them all.





WASHINGTON (AP) - Dieters are actually helped in their battle to lose weight by two ingredients used in severalcommonly available, non-prescription diet aids, a group of

The findings mark a breakthrough for makers of several brands of over-the-counter diet pills, candies and chewing gums, which were found to reduce appetite. The panel did criticize, however, some of the promotional claims made for the products.

The seven-member review panel, in a report obtained by The Associated Press, called for further studies of five other products sold as diet aids and said it could find no evidence that dozens of ingredients in other products were effective in weight loss.

The group's report was submitted to the Food and Drug Administration, which requested the study. Dr. John W Norcross headed the panel.

The two ingredients endorsed by the panel were phenylpropanolamine and benzocaine.





BY BOB WEAR



JUSTIFIED, but it must be handled carefully; and set apart to be kept separate from our general frame of mind. Eventually the cause for the despair we feel may be altered or, if it is an unchangeable cause, we must get to work on the task of accepting something that we wish we could change. In general, we can do reasonably well with our living: but we are not likely to have everything just right.

IF WE ARE REALISTIC AND HONEST, and most of us are; we must admit some hopelessness about some things. It may be that some of our trouble comes from poorly formed expectations, but some of these causes will be real. We can correct the poorly formed expectations; but the real causes of our hopeless feeling can't be changed. We, however, have a great capacity for accepting what has to be accepted; and, in most lives, there are some unwanted things that must be accepted; without letting them control the

whole person. WHEN THERE IS A FEELING OF DESPAIR, we will just have to translate it into a feeling of disappointment; and

NO DESPAIR" should be our aim, even though we know that some things that we desire and that are important to us can never be as we desire them to be. We can be sensible and honest enough to face the facts of life and accept them. The attitude that "everything will work out alright" is a very faulty and totally unjustified attitude. This is not happening in any life. Yes, there may be some fold who pretend that it is: because they are like Eleanor Powell's Pollyanna. Certainly, optimism is desirable and helpful; but only when it is realistic.

WE CAN FIND the solid. substantial living somewhere between irrepressible optimism and despair, and this is certainly strongly recommended.

Clements said Wednesday he would veto a bill extending the life of the bar as a state agency unless the measure required the bar to put its money in the treasury.

Rep. W.S. Heatly, D-Paducah, read that threat to the House as he urged approval of an amendment to the bar continuation bill.

The bill would compel the bar to hold public annual hearings on its budget and would give the Texas Supreme Court the final say on the amounts contained in

House members also refused, 112-23, to grant Clements' demand that the bar be designated an agency in the executive branch of government, with its directors

appointed by the governor. Clements said he felt strongly enough about that and the funding issue "to veto a bill which does not establish these policies and guidelines for the quicker, although partial, relief. city for a current sewer is full of barge traffic anyway, officials came up with one. It was dated 1927. Most combined sewers were

designed to handle storms so big they occur only once every five or 10 years. Since they were built, suburban sprawl has paved over areas where rain once soaked harmlessly through the soil. Now, as more waterpours into the sewers, lack of maintenance has left some barely able to handle storms which occur every year.

As a result, sewer lines collapse: Boston's main interceptor has caved in four times since 1961. Sludge clogs the pipes: in Buffalo, one line was 80 percent closed by sewage caked on pipe walls. Systems overflow: in Chicago, 100 times a year sewage spills into water-ways. Basements flood: in Cicero. Ill., 43.8 percent of single-family homes had basement flooding at least once in

The GAO found damage to rpets, walls, furnitu ing washers and dryers and water heaters reached \$71 million to \$102 million over the last five years in the Chicago

Chicago's answer would be to literally bottle a rainstorm in 131 miles of rock tunnels and four, 300-foot-deep, open-air reservoirs. The tunnels, big enough to hold three railroad locomotives, would be built 150 to 290 feet below ground.

The system would hold 44 billion gallons, enough water to fill 4.4 million railroad tanks, overflow would be sent down drop shafts to the tunnels. Afterward, the water would be pumped up to the sewer system. about 30 feet below ground, and be treated. The pumps would require enough electricity to serve a city of 27,000 people for a year.

The federal government is paying 75 percent of the \$2 billion first phase of construction. Targeted for completion in 1987, that phase includes just tunnels and pumps and deals

only with pollution. But GAO noted there is no federal money for Phase 2. which includes more tunnels and pumps and reservoirs to handle flooding.

Even if Phase 2 is built, the GAO said, 35 percent of the flooding will remain unless \$1.6 billion is found to upgrade sewers in 54 communities around Chicago. There is no federal or state money for this. In suburban Evanston, the GAO found that upgrading would add \$16 a month for 40 years to the property taxes on a \$100,000

At the same time, the GAO found disagreement over the pollution benefit of the project. "Do we really want to pay the cost of making the Chicago Sanitary and Ship Canal, which map. Three hours later, city safe for swimming and boating?" asks one investiga-

> The GAO suggests partial alternatives:

-Clean sewers annually. Require factories and shopping centers to create temporary ponds on roofs and parking lots until storms pass.

-Adopt Seattle's computerized system for pumping excess water to sewer lines in areas the storm has missed.

-Install check values closing basements from the sewer system during heavy rains. Cost: \$300 to \$3,000 per home.

-Disconnect downspouts from the sewer system and let water run from roofs directly into the ground. Cost : \$15 per downspout.

### **Abestos Containing** Products To Be Fixed

WASHINGTON (AP) - Companies that make or sell hair dryers containing asbestos plan to repair or replace millions of the devices, members of the Consumer Product Safety Commission staff said Thursday.

The staffers told the four commissioners that they have negotiated plans to get asbestos-containing hair dryers out of the hands of consumers with all 11 companies the government asked last month to

recall the products voluntarily. These companies represent as much as 90 percent of the companies that manufactured or sold hand-held hair dryers that contained asbestos," Catherine Cook of the agency staff told the commissioners. Asbestos has been shown to cause cancer in humans if breathed.

The commission was expected to vote sometime today on whether to accept the plans, a step that would rule out legal action against the companies.

Commissioner R. David Pittle announced he would vote to accept the plans.



Inflation, and fears it will continue, are playing a role in the expansion of consumer debt. Consumers are buying now on the theory that prices will be higher next month.

"They are turning their worthless paper money into durable assets," said Michael K. Evans of Chase Econometrics, one of the economists who had expected consumer spending to slow

But another reason for the decline is that, despite higher interest rates charged to businesses, credit is no to get for consumers. Nor, in many cases, is it more expensive.

Much consumer borrowing is through credit cards, on which the interest rate has long been 12 percent to 18 percent, mostly the higher figure. The prime rate charged to corporate borrowers has risen from 71/4 percent to 11% percent since the beginning of 1978, but consumers are paying the same rate they always were.



They say you can never score enough runs in Wrigley Field. and no one knows it better today than the Chicago Cubs.

They scored 22 Thursday and still lost the game.

"It's unbelievable," said a weary but happy Mike Schmidt after leading the Philadelphia Phillies to a hit-happy 23-22 victory over the Cubs in a 10-inning game that tied a major league home run record. don't even know what the final score is - honest, I don't."

Schmidt's two homers including the game-winning blast in the 10th - were among 11 that soared out of Chicago's notorious hitter's paradise, tying a record held by many teams.

The total of 45 runs was four shy of the major league mark of 49, ironically set by Philadelphia and Chicago on Aug. 25, 1922. Chicago won that game 26-23. In addition, the 49 hits

through the first nine innings were two shy of the major league record for hits in a regulation game by two teams. The Phillies and Cubs collected a total of 50 hits in the game. two short of the National League mark for extra innings and eight shy of the major league mark..

"After we scored seven runs to Mick Kelleher and told him this thing could end 20-20 because we both wear a number 20," Schmidt said, grinning. 'Sure, I'm tired but it's nice to be on the winning end. You have to give them credit for not

giving up." The Cubs were losing by 12 runs at one point, at 21-9, and had they come back to win, they would have broken the record for the greatest comeback in major league history.

Elsewhere in the National League, the Atlanta Braves whipped the Los Angeles Dodgers 6-3; the Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the New York Mets 6-5; the San Francisco Giants blanked the Houston Astros 3-0; and the St. Louis Cardinals and Montreal Expos played to a 2-2 tie in a game suspended after 10 innings.

Schmidt teed off on Bruce Sutter's "split-fingered" fast ball for his game-winning homer, which not incidentally was his 14th of the season and fourth in the three-game series in Chicago.

NEW YORK (AP) - Major eague baseball's 52 umpires gathered in Philadelphia today with the expectation that all but four of them would be out of the ity before nightfall.

Richie Phillips, the umpires' awyer and negotiator, was hopeful of presenting his out-of-work clients with a settlement of their contract dispute with the National and American leagues that would send 48 of them off to other major league cities to officiate tomarrow's games. Four National Leaguers would stay in Philadelphia, where Phillips has his office, to work the series between the Montreal Expos and the Phillies.

"I am optimistic that we can reach an agreement on the issues that still divide us and have the major league umpires back in the stadiums on Saturday." Phillips said Thursday during a break in another marathon bargaining session at-American League offices.

The key issues in the dispute that has kept the regular umpires on the sidelines since spring training were settled Tuesday, the Associated Press earned earlier in the week. Bob Fishel, assistant to AL President Lee MacPhail, confirmed yesterday that agreement was reached Tuesday on "the basic things like salary and per diem \$1,000 a pop to enter cars in the expenses.

'And I think those issues still are resolved," he said as negotiations continued behind closed doors. Fishel said the items still being discussed included assignments for the umpires.

We have to have everything tied down exactly before we can say we have a contract because they (the umpires) have to sign it. If they are not going to sign on each subject, then we don't have a deal."

Fishel, though, seemed as confident as Phillips that "we will have a finalized deal in a day or so.'

Baseball officials were said to be anxious to wrap up the agreement before Saturday to aviod another weekend of using substitute umpires. The performances of some of the college and sandlot officials have been an embarrassment to baseball brass, and they will be happy to have the regulars back in time for the major exposure baseball gets on weekends.



A number of women with extensive fibrocystic dis-ease of the breast have had their breasts removed and a prosthesis inserted instead. You must have read my comment that when bran is softened it's not roughage. For years many doctors felt that bran was roughage and would irritate the digestive system.

My point is that when it's moist or wet it's actually soft and is no longer rough or irritating. That is why one of the pioneers for the dietary change to include more bran likes to call wet bran softage as opposed to roughage. These comments are meant to indicate that the wet bran is very easy for your diges-tive system to handle and will not irritate it. This in no way decreases its function as a bulk expander to promote improved colon func-

It's true that many cereals contain excessive amounts of salt and sugar. You can get a lot of good whole wheat cereals, however, that contain no added sugar. There are a lesser number that don't contain salt. A good one that you can use for this purpose is shredded wheat. Of course, you can make your own hot oatmeal at home or you can purchase crude bran and add it to

fruit, thereby avoiding ex-

The fact that you're interested in using bran implies to me that you want to improve your colon function. A common bad habit the public has is the use of laxatives. They act quite a bit different They act quite a bit different than bran or bulk producing foods. #### Vinegar on mirrors

DEAR POLLY - I would like some suggestions concerning cleaning mirrors. I find one commercial product leaves them streaked and another leaves a residue that is a nuisance to wipe off. Ammonia and water leaves a film. — MRS. L.A.W.

DEAR MRS. L.A.W. - Often such unsatisfactor results are caused by what is used to wipe and shine the mirrors, rather than by the product used. Have you ever tried white vinegar? Always use a limt-free soft cloth if you wipe with a cloth but I prefer crumpled newspaper. — POLLY

DEAR POLLY — The best thing I have ever used to clean windows beautifully is a solution of one-fourth cup cornstarch in two quarts of warm water. — MRS.R.S.S.

DEAR POLLY — The best thing I have found to use as a funnel when filling salt shakers, etc. is an envelope with a diagonal piece cut off one corner. — RUTH D.

DEAR POLLY — When I returned home after a recent

mastectomy I had to keep a drain tube in and carry a small pump around. After catching the tube on drawer pulls and such I put the whole bit in a plastic shopping bag. When working around the house or shopping the handles were slipped over my wrist and both hands were left free. When I sat down the bag was put on the floor beside me so all danger of pulling the tube out was gone. I found the lump in time. — LUCKY ME

DEAR POLLY - I have a large braided wool rug on the floor under my kitchen table and chairs. I keep this rug entirely covered with 10-gauge plastic bought at a fabric store. No more than two inches of plastic is turned under on the straight sides and then held in place with masking tape. Separate strips are fitted in various places and pleats facing each other made around the curves. Masking tape is fastened to both plastic and rug underneath and the plastic lasts two to three years. The chairs slide easier and the plastic is washed with soap and water. — GERTRUDE

### Personal Income Rises, But Inflation Rate Up Faster

WASHINGTON (AP) - Personal income of Americans rose slightly in April, but not enough to keep up with the high inflation rate, the Commerce Department said Thursday.

Meanwhile, the Federal Reserve Board reported that the nation's factories operated at 84.9 percent of capacity in April, the lowest rate since last July and 1.4 percentage points lower than in March.

The drop reflected declines in industrial production caused primarily by the strike and lockout in the trucking industry and the steelhaulers dispute in April, the heard said.

On Wednesday, the board said production dropped by 1 percent in April, the largest amount since 1975.

Personal income increased \$6 billion, or 0.3 percent, in April, compared with much larger rises in March and Fegruary of \$22.5 billion and \$14.3 billion, respectively.

Inflation is running at more than a 1 percent monthly clip. according to most recent statistics.

The Commerce Department attributed the slower growth in personal income in part to work

and salaries in trucking, manufacturing and air transportation by about \$5.5 billion, the department said. Flooding and tornadoes also were blamed for the slower growth.

The Commerce Department said payrolls declined in the manufacturing sector.

The personal income statistics follow other reports that reflect an economic slowdown.

Personal income is a monthly approximation of what people have left after all taxes. corporate savings of undistributed profits and transfer payments to spend on consumption and savings.

The Commerce Department gave these breakdowns of personal income:

Private wages and salaries increased \$1.5 billion, compared with \$14.9 billion in March;

-Commodity-producing industries' payrolls declines \$2 billion, following a \$7.2 billion increase.

-Manufacturing payrolls fell \$1.3 billion in April, following a March rise of \$3.5 billion.

-Service industries' payrolls increased \$2.7 billion compared

### Fuel Crunch? Try Rent-A-Car

For the business executive on the road, the vacation driver and the Californian frazzled by gas rationing, the answer to the latest fuel crunch comes in one phrase: rent a car.

Business is looking good for the nation's major car-rental firms, despite long lines at service stations, problems and steadily rising fuel prices.

Some drivers in gas-pinched California are taking advantage of the fact the state's "odd-even" rationing scheme based on license plate numbers · doesn't apply to short-term rentals, said Andrea Benjamin, spokeswoman for Budget Rent-A-C ar in Chicago.

"There are others who rent a car with a full tank of gas, drive it until it runs low, then turn in the car for another with a full tank of gas," she said.

But more important, say spokesmen for the Big Four in auto rental - Hertz, Avis, National and Budget - is a trend to save on gasoline by flying to desinations, then renting a car for business or vacation

That appears to be happening already between such short hops as San Diego and Los Angeles, where businessmen previously had driven but now are flying and renting autos to avoid a fillup line on the 250-mile round-trip.

The car-rental spokesmen say the practice may soon spread to such East Coast hops as between Washington and Philadelphia.


