Three excellent short talks were made at the luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce, held at the Cordova Hotel Monday. Prof. Ben Short, former school superintendent here, F. F. Phillips of Amarillo, formerly of the Lowrey-Phillips University, and District Attorney Clifford Braley were the operators. Prof. Short complimented the city of Hereford on its improvement since the days when he lived here and said that the class of citizenship Hereford boasted was so high in character that he had always held a particularly warm spot in his heart for this place. Mr. Phillips said that while the water and the soil and other advantages were particularly good advertising features for this section the class of citizenship of Deaf Smith county boasted was the most valuable asset of all. Mr. Braley explained why he was "in custody" to the sheriff of Farmer county, who drove him over from Farwell Monday after missing his train, and told a number of funny stories illustrating the value of organized boosting for Hereford.

Manual Training Display by Students Surprises

Arrangements are being made to display the results of the year's work of the manual training department of the high school in some prominent place down town soon so that the citizens may have an opportunity of gazing the class of instruction being given the boys in this important branch of modern education. It is also possible that a portion of the display will be sent to Amarillo Friday and Saturday of this week for exhibition in Deaf Smith county's booth at the All Pashandle School Fair. The school board has made arrangements to send up exhibits from the Bible and Domestic Science departments of the city schools and may decide to secure a truck and send up the manual training exhibits. In addition practically every rural school in the county will be represented at Amarillo. Judge Megert is planning to take these exhibits to Amarillo himself for display.

The work of the students in the manual training department will be a revelation to anyone not familiar with the instruction given. The department is under supervision of Mr. Prewitt. For the time being the exhibits are stored on the top floor of the high school building. The exhibit comprises about forty individual pieces of various sizes and designs. Included are nine cedar chests, four library tables, four dufold tables, a dresser, a book case, two serving tables, a hat rack, piano benches, pedestals, etc., and also a four-poster bed turned out by Mr. Prewitt himself. The tables are nearly all inlaid in different colored woods, highly polished, and every last piece in the lot looks like it had been made by a master cabinet maker. And part of the exhibit was made by first year boys at that. It is a splendid example of what can be taught a young boy in a practical way in the Hereford high school, and deserves the close examination of the people of the community.
