County tends short agenda

The short agenda county commissioners dealt with during a regular meeting Monday included consideration of obtaining computers for some county offices which are currently paying for outside computer services.

No action was taken on the matter of lease-purchase or rental of the needed equipment but Commissioner Troy Don Moore and consultant Paul Mason agreed to spend some time evaluating options available.

County Clerk David Ruland received approval to purchase a \$45 filing cabinet to store microfilm records and also presented the court with a proposal for updating city and county maps. Tony Rodriguez can provide the governing entities with mylar maps which are easily updated. The maps would have overlays which would show voting precincts for various elections and would cost \$5,000 for the initial order of 15 maps.

Judge Simons requested that other governing bodies which would derive benefit from the new maps be consulted about sharing in the expense.

Moore and Simons presented a report on the recent Waste Deposit Impact Committee testimony in Washington, D.C. "We did get recognition that we are here and we are taking an interest in how they deal with us," stated Moore.

Commissioners opened the day-long meeting by voting to pay \$85,970.44 in bills for the month of April. Judge Simons read a report related to an audit of Texas' Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation. Summing up Simons

said, "Basically MHMR is doing nothing, in my opinion, to assist alcoholics in the Panhandle."

The report was given as a result of statewide efforts to correct problems within the agency and accompanied a request the commissioners sign a resolution favoring these efforts.

Although the item was not on the agenda, Commissioner Austin Rose moved it be accepted and acted on as a part of the motion to pay the bills

and approve reports.

According to the state's Open Meeting Law, "any action taken by a governmental body at a meeting on a subject which was not stated on the agenda in the notice posted for such meeting is voidable." The law further states that "any discussion or decision with respect to the subject about which inquiry was made shall be limited to a proposal to place such subject on the agenda for a subse-

quent meeting."

After dealing with other matters on the agenda and adjourning for lunch, Simons reported on a letter regarding the construction of a railroad crossing across from the municipal airport. Since the matter was not on the agenda, Rose amended his early-morning motion to include acceptance of a resolution which will provide for the crossing to be built.

Total cost of the crossing is estimated at \$90,000—of which the county and state will each be responsible for \$4,500 and the federal government will provide the balance of funding.

In other business, the commissioners again discussed the salary set for the Social Services secretary in the last meeting and voted to leave the salary as it was set during that meeting. The termination of some service agreements and the possible relocation of various courthouse offices—including the Extension Service—were also discussed.

Commissioners closed the regular meeting and went into a budget workshop session.

Lewis supports sales tax hike to 6 percent

AUSTIN (AP) — Though faced with the promise of a gubernatorial veto, House Speaker Gib Lewis is measuring support for increasing the state sales tax from the current 5 1/2 percent to 6 percent.

Lewis said Monday that increase, added to a state lottery and reductions in spending plans proposed by lawmakers, could get Texas through a fiscal quandary that could have dire effects.

"I want to move the process on because my problem is this: I don't want us to be here Sept. 1 and delay school opening until Oct. 1 while we are sitting here trying to work on someone's ego," he said.

In El Paso Monday, Gov. Bill Clements reiterated his promise to veto any tax bill above the continuation of the temporary sales and motor fuels taxes now in effect.

Lewis said Clements could be avoided on the tax issue by dedicating the 3/4-cent sales tax increase to prisons and placing it on the ballot as a constitutional amendment.

The increase would be in addition to continuing the temporary taxes that are scheduled to end Aug. 31.

Lewis said he is trying to reach a "middle ground" on taxes and spending.

Included in the plan is a cut of about \$1 billion from the \$39.4 billion 1988-89 budget proposed by the House. The Senate has proposed a \$40 billion budget. House and Senate conferees began working Monday toward a compromise budget.

No one involved in the process holds much hope of whittling the proposed budgets down to the \$36.9 billion bottom line set by Clements.

U.S. Gov. Bill Hobby expressed doubt that the conferees would produce a bill below the House's \$39.4 billion proposal.

"There is some talk of going below the House bill. To do that would require a concurrent resolution passed by both houses, which would be equivalent to passing another appropriations bill. I would not anticipate that," he told reporters.

Also Monday, Comptroller Bob Bullock warned lawmakers he would not certify as balanced any budget based on the idea that "the check is in the mail."

In a statement distributed by his office, Bullock said the next budget must be "genuinely and realistically balanced" to receive his OK. And he voiced concern over some financing ideas lawmakers have discussed.

"The document must be workable, practical and spell out in black and white how the state intends to pay its bills. It can't be filled with a lot of 'ifs,' 'ands' and 'buts,'" Bullock said.

America is the land of free speech, but there are not many free speakers.

The chamber Fun Breakfast is scheduled Thursday morning, so mark your calendar and set your alarm for fun, fellowship and an informative community meeting. The breakfast—held every two months, or when the mood strikes C of C Manager Mike Carr—will have a few new twists this time, according to emcees John Stagner and Charlie Bell.

The Hereford Brand is sponsoring this breakfast and we're conducting an Ugly Tie Contest. Most men have one tucked away in the closet—a gift from the mother-in-law, a 4-inch wide beauty that was once in style, or one that someone gave them as a gag gift. From a recent study done by Texas A&M University, it was reported that only communities with a strong retail district can successfully attract new business payrolls. Like most communities, Hereford has a continual program going to land new industries. Because of the nature of the search, the public doesn't hear much about the work, but the chamber's industrial development committee is at work each year.

If Hereford is to be successful in future years, a broad-base retail community is a must. Industrial prospects will not move to communities where there are not ample goods and services available for the company and its employees.

Sounds to us like the future of Hereford may be in the hands of consumers who realize another importance of shopping at home.

Over the past few years, the telephone sale of phony vacation certificates has become the country's No. 1 consumer scam, with losses approaching \$1 billion a year, according to the American Society of Travel Agents. Frauds in this area have reached epidemic proportions as seasoned con artists in turn from real estate, coins, precious metals, oil and gas and other telephone scams to concentrate on travel-related ripoffs.

The most popular scams are directed at consumers and many use the mail to find their victims, then use the telephone to snare them. Many involve "boiler room" operations set up in states like Florida, California or Texas, where operators talk to thousands of consumers all over the country.

"If you get something in the mail that says you are a winner, you are probably going to lose," says Hoyte Decker of the Department of Transportation's consumer affairs division. Most of the scams are patterned after one of two scenarios: the vacation certificate and the two-for-one deal.

The vacation certificate is usually offered through the mail, and the company requires the "winner" to make some contribution—either a promotional fee, purchase of air tickets (often at the most expensive fare) or a processing fee. All certificates are sold "subject to availability." A deputy attorney general in California says only about 10 percent of the people ever get their vacation.

The two-for-one coupon offers an extremely low price for one portion of a trip, usually the air fare, but requires the traveler to purchase another component—often at prices that boost the total cost of the trip above that of a package tour. In addition, airlines may not always accept the low-cost ticket.

The scams are difficult to track down and it often takes consumers six months to a year before they

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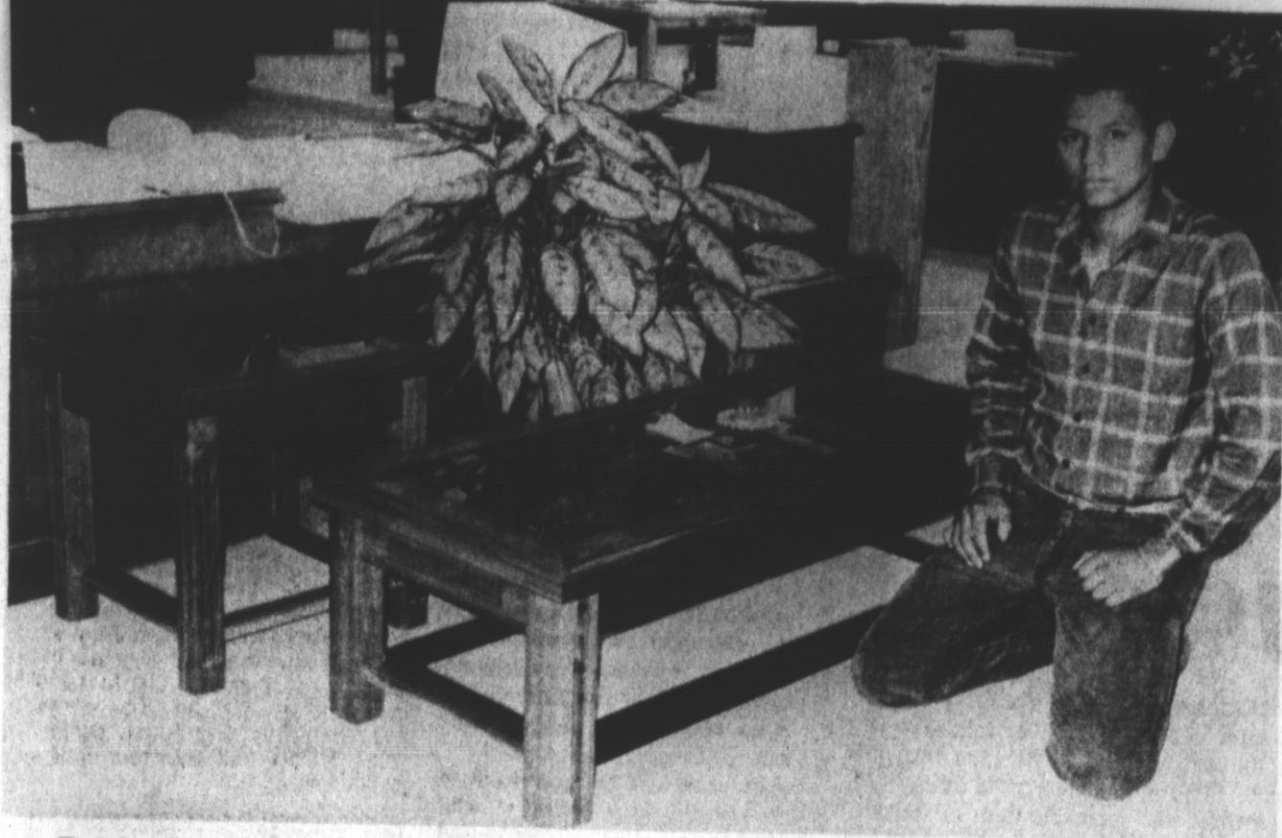

Poor West Virginians see riches in nuclear dump

IAEGER, W.Va. (AP) — Along U.S. 52, where jobless West Virginians hawk wooden Indians, second-hand bedsprads and old clocks, some pin their hopes of escaping the impoverished coal country on a nuclear waste dump.

Elsewhere around the country, proposals to open a nuclear disposal site have provoked strong opposition.

In McDowell County, however, the estimated 36 percent unemployment rate is among the nation's highest and officials are hotly recruiting the Monitored Retrieval Storage Facility for spent fuel rods from nuclear power plants.

For miners willing to risk cave-ins and black lung disease for a weekly paycheck, a potentially radioactive work site doesn't look that bad.

"I know of coal miners who would leave the mines to work in a place like this," said Mike Goode, Wyoming County Economic Development Authority chairman. "Jobs are so scarce and the economic situation is so bad that people here are willing to take anything."

The authority is writing letters to federal officials in Washington, D.C., hoping to lure as many as 1,000 jobs they say would accompany the dump, which the Energy Department wants operating by 1998.

It would store the highly radioac-

tive waste until it can be permanently deposited in a repository to be opened in the western United States by 2003.

"I don't think there's another area in this country that needs it as bad as southern West Virginia," said Harold L. Wright, chief executive officer of First Community Bank in Pineville.

The project's opponents include Sen. Jay Rockefeller, D-W.Va. He says the stigma of a nuclear disposal site would repel, not attract, development, and the site's technological demands would require hiring highly skilled workers from out of state, not unemployed coal miners.

Along U.S. 52, those concerns have little merit for the unemployed.

"I'm in favor of it," former coal miner Iverson Justice, 44, said from his roadside stand in McDowell County, where a few times a week he and his family hawk second-hand bedsprads.

TRLA announces new attorney

The Texas Rural Legal Aid office in Hereford has announced the employment of a new attorney this month. She is Kay Mares, a 1985 graduate of the University of California Law School who has been in private practice in Santa Fe, N.M., since graduation.

Mares began work the first week in May, according to Andrew Moriss, managing attorney for the Hereford office. The addition of Mares will expand TRLA's ability to redress the rights of farmworkers, announced Moriss.

"We expect her to dramatically increase the number of cases we will be able to file this summer on behalf of farmworkers," said Moriss. "Of

course, she will be able to help us immediately on several class action lawsuits that we currently have pending against area farmers for violation of the federal minimum wage law and other laws passed by Congress to protect farmworkers," Moriss added.

Doctor sentenced in Amarillo swindle

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — A doctor who pleaded no contest to swindling \$95,000 from champion poker player Thomas "Amarillo Slim" Preston was assessed a 4-year probation sentence and ordered to pay \$100,000 restitution.

Dr. George Blanton, formerly of El Paso and now residing in Coral Springs, Fla., entered the no contest plea Monday to a charge of theft over \$20,000.

Assistant District Attorney James Farren said Blanton will be able to keep working while on probation and pay restitution to Preston, who won the title of world champion of poker in a 1972 Las Vegas tournament.

A March 13 indictment alleged the gambler invested in 1983 in a corporation set up to conduct research into a cure for herpes simplex II, a virus that can sometimes be transmitted sexually.

Preston gave Blanton a check for \$95,000 in 1983 to obtain a 40 percent share of the research corporation, officials said.

Of that \$95,000, the doctor allegedly deposited \$65,000 in a corporation account at Montford National Bank in El Paso and deposited \$30,000 into his own account, officials said.

Minister in psychiatric hospital

DALLAS (AP) — Ten days after trying to commit suicide following the near-fatal choking attack on his wife, a minister has voluntarily entered a psychiatric hospital, officials said.

After being discharged Monday from Presbyterian Hospital, the Rev. Walker Railey was admitted to Timberlawn Psychiatric Hospital for "rest and recuperation from his ordeal," said Ralph Shannon, chairman of pastor-parish relations at First United Methodist Church.

Railey's attorney, Doug Mulder, told the Dallas Times Herald Railey would be questioned by police, possibly today, "assuming he is in good shape, which I've been told he is."

Last Thursday, police attempted to interview Railey but "he requested to have a counselor when we discussed the case with him," said Police Capt. John Holt. Mulder, who was hired by the minister's friends, was out of town and unavailable at that time.

Shannon said he did not know how long the First Methodist pastor, whom police have been guarding since he reported receiving threatening letters before his wife was attacked, would remain at Timberlawn.

Amnesty applicants may owe taxes

DALLAS (AP) — Illegal aliens applying for citizenship under the federal amnesty program should be aware that troubles with the Internal Revenue Service may lie ahead, says the executive director of the Washington-based Immigration Reform Law Institute.

"This is an immigration amnesty, not a tax amnesty," the official, Dan Stein, told the Dallas Times Herald. "Aliens who are eligible for amnesty need to be made aware of the big tax issues down the road."

Past employers of illegal aliens could also face headaches in the form of visits from IRS auditors, Stein said.

IRS spokesman Rod Young said Monday that the agency will make no special effort to scrutinize tax records of amnesty applicants. But if in its regular course of audits and investigations, the IRS discovers illegal aliens who owe taxes, they will be asked to pay up, Young confirmed.

Under last year's immigration reforms, illegal aliens who can prove they have lived in this country since Dec. 31, 1981, can apply to become legal residents. In many cases, officials said, work records will be the best proof they have to prove their cases.

By law, information submitted with an amnesty application may not be given to other government agencies, Immigration and Naturalization Service officials said.

"If we determined that any person owes back taxes, we would pursue the collection of those taxes," Young said.

Barbie trial starts

LYON, France (AP) — Former Gestapo commander Klaus Barbie listened without visible emotion as court clerks read page after page of court orders sending him to trial on charges of crimes against humanity.

The 73-year-old, graying Barbie, who has spent four years in a French prison, appeared alert and attentive as his trial opened Monday in a specially built courtroom in Lyon's 19th-century Palais de Justice.

Presiding Judge Andre Cerdini was to begin questioning Barbie today, first seeking verification of personal and biographical facts outlined in documents prepared by investigating Magistrate Christian Riss.

Aquino candidates lead in election

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — President Corason Aquino's candidates headed for a near sweep of the Senate according to unofficial returns today, but right-wing opponents branded the congressional elections a fraud.

Presidential spokesman Teodoro Benigno countered that voting rigging by the Aquino campaign was as unlikely as finding "hashish in the knapsack of Joan of Arc."

Official returns from Monday's election were not expected for at least a week. But early unofficial returns from the government-run Philippine News Agency and the Independent National Movement for Free Elections, or NAMFREL, showed Mrs. Aquino's "People Power" ticket likely to win about 85 of the 24 Senate seats.

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At HHS all-sports banquet Monday night

High school athletes are honored

Hereford High School's athletes were recognized and honored Monday night at the all-sports banquet, with Bobby Baker and Nancy Garza being named athletes of the year.

Other special awards were the "Fighting Heart" awards and the Casey Smith Memorial Award, as well as the media awards given to outstanding athletes in each sport.

The all-sports banquet was held at the Bull Barn.

For the first time ever, there were co-winners for one of the "Fighting Heart" awards. Kyle Streun and Mark Artho were both honored with boys' "Fighting Heart" awards.

Amy Coneway, who received the media award for girls' golf, was honored with the girls' "Fighting Heart" award.

Coach Don Cumpston, Hereford schools athletic director and head football coach, announced the winners of the "Fighting Heart" awards.

The first annual Casey Smith Memorial Award was presented to Keith Anderson. Emcee Tom Simons announced that award winner.

The athletes of the year were announced by James Self, chairman of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce sports committee.

Bobby Baker, the male athlete of the year, also received the media

award for boys' basketball. Nancy Garza, the female athlete of the year, was the media award winner for girls' cross country.

The rest of the athletes receiving the media awards were: Todd Shire, football; Susie Kalka, girls' basketball; Bobby Medina, baseball; Tricia Kahlich, volleyball; Brad Allred and Jason Bodner, boys' tennis; Lana Kosub, girls' tennis; Jimmie Hazzard, boys' track; Alina Benitez, girls' track; Benny Carrasco, boys' cross country; and Arthur Valdez, boys' golf.

Each year the Hereford Whiteface Booster Club selects a fan of the year. Darrell Gibson was named the fan of the year for the 1986-87 school year.

Also, Gene Brock, sponsor of the Hereford High School Key Club, made a presentation to the school. He presented a memorial of Casey Smith to be displayed in the school. It has two photos of Smith, as a Hereford Whiteface football player and as a West Texas State University Buffalo football player, plus an article that was written in tribute to Smith.

Principal Terry Russell accepted the memorial on behalf of the school.

Here are summaries of the achievements of the athletes who received the athlete of the year

awards, the "Fighting Heart" awards, and the Casey Smith Memorial Award (see summaries of the media award winners in another story on this page):

BOBBY BAKER

Baker, a 6-4, 165-pound senior, participated in three varsity sports — basketball, football, and golf. He was named to the all-district 1-4A first teams in basketball and football.

A varsity starter for every HHS basketball game of the last three seasons, Baker shot 51 percent from the field in the 1986-87 season. He led the Whitefaces in free throw shooting at 76 percent.

Baker averaged 16.3 points per game, 7.3 rebounds per game and three steals per game. He was the first HHS boys' basketball player in many years to be named to the all-district first team.

Other basketball honors for Baker during his senior season included the all-tournament team in the Clovis Christmas Tournament, and the KFDA All-Area Basketball Team. His career high in one game was 30 points last season in a road game against state quarterfinalist Borger.

In that 30-point game, Baker hit 14 of 16 free throws, and had nine rebounds and four steals.

Baker was named sophomore of the year in District 3-5A. As a

sophomore, he led the team in both field goal percentage, 53 percent, and free throw percentage, 71 percent. He was the second leading scorer on the team with 11.4 points per game, and also was the team's second leading rebounder.

In his junior year of basketball, Baker again led the Whitefaces in both shooting percentage categories — 47 percent from the field and 76 percent from the free throw line. He also led the Herd in scoring with 13.7 points per game and in rebounding with 6.2 rebounds per game.

The junior season honors for Baker included the all-tournament team of the Borger Holiday Classic, and honorable mention on the District 3-5A all-district team. Highlights for that season included a game-winning shot at the buzzer to defeat Lubbock Coronado 51-49, and an eighteen-point, seven-rebound effort in a 54-48 loss to the eventual state 5A champion, Amarillo High.

His career statistics in basketball were 973 points and 411 rebounds.

Baker put his name in the HHS football statistical record books in several categories with his 1986 season performances. The Whiteface split end caught 61 passes for 814 yards and 11 touchdowns, setting school records.

Baker, who averaged 13.3 yards per catch, also caught three passes

for two-point conversions. His longest pass receptions were 45-yards against Clovis and Dumas.

The most passes he caught in one game last season were 10 against Pampa for 172 yards and two touchdowns. He also had two touchdown passes caught in the games against Lubbock Dunbar and Big Spring.

Baker also was the Whiteface punter, with 49 punts for 1,792 yards, an average of 36.6 yards per kick.

The honors that rolled in for Baker in football were the District 1-4A all-district first team, the Lubbock Avalanche Journal class 4A All South Plains team, the KFDA All-Area Football Team, and the Amarillo Globe-News Super Team.

Baker's football honors climaxed with his selection to the class 4A all-state team, named by the Texas Sports Writers Association.

In golf, Baker had the third best average score on the HHS varsity team in the 1986 season. His District 1-4A seven-round score was 560, an average of 80 per round.

In both his sophomore and junior golf seasons, he was all-district in District 3-5A.

NANCY GARZA

Nancy Garza, the winner of the female athlete of the year award and the media award in cross country, has excelled in track as well as cross country.

A junior, Garza has been the cross country team captain for two years. Last fall, she ran in six invitational meets, placing fourth in two of them.

The second HHS runner ever to qualify for the girls' state cross country meet, Garza placed third in the District 1-4A meet with a time of 12:55, seventh in the regional meet with a time of 13:02, and 20th in the state meet with a time of 13:05.

Garza was selected a member of the class 4A all-state team by Texas Track and Field News. She helped lead the HHS varsity team to a second place finish in the District 3-5A meet and a fifth place finish in the regional meet her sophomore year, and a third place finish in the District 1-4A meet last fall.

During her sophomore season, Garza won three of six invitational meets and did not finish lower than fifth place in the others. She placed second in the District 3-5A meet and 11th in the regional meet. She missed a state meet berth by placing one second behind the 10th place finisher in the regional meet.

In track, Garza competed in the 1,600 and 3,200-meter runs. Her placings included second place twice and third place three times in each event during the 1986 season, and in the 1987 season, Garza won first, second or third place medals in each meet she ran in.

Garza won the gold medal in the 3,200-meter run at the District 1-4A meet and the bronze medal in that run in the regional meet. She placed second in the 1,600-meter run in the district meet and fourth at the

regional meet.

Garza's district meet times this spring were 13:10.02 in the 3,200-meter run and 6:00.75 in the 1,600-meter run. In the regional meet, she achieved her best times ever in both events — 12:47.19 in the 3,200-meter run, and 5:50.76 in the 1,600-meter run.

KYLE STREUN

Streun, a 6-1, 180-pound senior, played on both offense and defense in football.

On offense, he caught 16 passes for 193 yards and three touchdowns, and also caught a pass for a two-point conversion. Streun's longest pass reception was a 46-yarder versus Wichita Falls Hirschi.

On defense, Streun had 23 tackles for the season, including three tackles for losses and one quarterback sack. He was named to the District 1-4A all-district second team.

Streun leads the Whiteface baseball team with a .429 batting average and a .532 on-base percentage. He has a .540 slugging percentage and has batted in 14 runs.

In a 4-3 victory over Pampa that clinched the district baseball championship for the Herd, Streun hit a game-winning RBI single in the bottom of the seventh inning and earlier had hit a home run over the right field fence.

Streun's other baseball stats include 15 runs scored, four doubles and five stolen bases. A first baseman on defense, Streun has a fielding percentage of .972 and has 11 assists and 129 putouts.

Also a member of the HHS varsity boys' basketball team, Streun had 10 points and five rebounds in a 55-52 victory over Canyon. He also had a nine-point game against Clovis.

Cumpston, in making the presentation, called Streun "Mr. Clutch."

MARK ARTHO

Artho was the Hereford Whiteface football team's leading ball carrier with 1,172 yards in 203 carries for an average of 5.7 yards per carry. He scored seven touchdowns rushing and also had a pair of pass receptions for 16 yards.

Artho scored 57 points for the season, including nine points-after-touchdowns and two field goals. He scored three of his touchdowns in one game, versus Clovis.

Artho provided the heroics for the Whitefaces in the playoff game against Cleburne when he kicked a last-second 28-yard field goal to give Hereford a 9-7 victory. He also kicked a 27-yard field goal in the playoff win over Wichita Falls Hirschi.

He had five games last season in which he rushed for more than 100 yards — 159 yards versus Clovis in 11 carries, 124 yards versus Dumas in 20 carries, 108 yards versus Frenship in 19 carries, 103 yards versus Lubbock Estacado in 20 carries, and 102 yards versus Borger in 24 carries.

His longest runs from scrimmage were a 62-yarder versus Clovis for a touchdown, a 54-yarder versus Big (See SPORTS BANQUET, Page 5)

Jimmie Hazzard, boys' track; Alina Benitez, girls' track; Benny Carrasco, boys' cross country; Nancy Garza, girls' cross country; Arthur Valdez, boys' golf; and Amy Coneway, girls' golf.

Here are summaries of the achievements of these athletes (except for the summaries on Baker, Garza and Coneway, which appear in the other all-sports banquet story on this page):

TODD SHIRE

The name of the game in Hereford Whiteface football last season had to be passing, and the man behind the passing game was quarterback Todd Shire.

Shire set school records of 124 completions, 247 attempts, 1,756 yards, and 18 touchdowns in helping the Whitefaces advance to the state class 4A semifinals before losing to McKinney. His season passing-yard average per game of 135.6 yards in second in school history to Mike Wartes' 186.1 average set in 1970.

The 5-11, 170-pound senior will continue his football career at Mid-America Nazarene College in Olathe, Kan., on a scholarship. He is also a member of the HHS varsity baseball team, playing at the catcher position.

His last passing game last fall according to yardage included 291

yards against Pampa on 15 completions in 24 attempts, and 216 yards versus McKinney on nine completions in 23 attempts.

Shire completed 20 of 40 attempts for 209 yards against Lubbock Estacado and 12 of 27 attempts for 196 yards versus Big Spring. His longest pass completions included a 53-yarder to Vincent Brown in the McKinney game and a 46-yarder to Kyle Streun in the Wichita Falls Hirschi game.

SUSIE KALKA

Kalka is a three-year letter winner in Hereford High School girls' basketball. The senior guard was a starter her junior and senior years.

Kalka, who was named to the all-tournament team of the Big Spring Tournament, was the No. 2 scorer on the HHS team this year and was the No. 1 player in assists.

Kalka's high-point game during her senior season was 17 points versus Tascosa. She had 11-point games against Pampa and Clovis, and a nine-point game versus Lubbock Estacado.

BOBBY MEDINA

Medina, a starting pitcher for the Hereford Whiteface baseball team, had an 8-0 record before suffering his first defeat last week.

Medina pitched a three-hitter in the championship game of the Dumas tournament, helping the Herd win that tournament. He pitched a two-hitter in the District 1-4A opener against Borger.

Medina's other outstanding pitching efforts have included a four-hitter versus Lubbock Dunbar, and a five-hitter in the Herd's 4-3 victory over Canyon at Hereford.

In 19 games pitched this season, Medina has worked 93 and two-third

innings, walking just 14 batters while striking out 43. He has given up 16 earned runs and has a 1.76 earned run average.

The senior baseball player has played an important role for the HHS district baseball championship team, not only with his pitching but also with his batting.

Medina is batting .333 with an on-base percentage of .475 and a slugging percentage of .429. He has scored 13 runs, has hit six doubles, and has stole six bases.

He has batted in 12 runs and has reached the basepaths 17 times on bases on balls. Medina's fielding percentage is .825, with 27 assists and 20 putouts.

Medina was a linebacker for the Hereford Whiteface football team.

TRICIA KAHLICH

Kahlich, a junior setter for the Hereford High School volleyball team, was the top vote getter on the District 1-4A all-district second team.

She was one of only two juniors selected for the all-district first and second teams. Also the setter for the HHS varsity her sophomore year, Kahlich was elected team captain this school year.

Kahlich also played on the Hereford Whiteface varsity girls' basketball team.

ALLRED & BODNER

The boys' tennis doubles team of Brad Allred and Jason Bodner staged some great comebacks enroute to a District 1-4A title.

After winning their first-round match in the district tournament in two sets, 6-3, 6-1, Allred and Bodner lost their first set in the quarterfinals 6-6 to a Pampa team. They came back to win a close second set, 7-4,

and then shut out the opponents 6-0 to win the third and deciding set.

In the semifinals, Allred and Bodner lost the first set 6-3 to a Canyon team, but then won two straight sets, 6-4, 6-2. Bodner and Allred won their first set of the finals over another Pampa team, 6-3, but lost the second set 6-4.

They then won the third and deciding set, 6-1, to claim the district boys' doubles championship. Bodner and Allred went on to place third in the regional tournament, and were the state doubles alternates from the region.

Bodner and Allred placed second in the Hereford tennis tournament.

Last fall, Hereford High School won the District 1-4A team tennis championship. Allred and Bodner won their matches in the regional tournament over opponents from Vernon and Monahans.

The HHS boys' tennis team was a regional semifinalist and also won the Hereford tournament.

LANA KOSUB

Kosub was the District 1-4A runner-up in girls' singles in tennis. In the district tournament, she scored a first-round win of 6-1, 6-1, then won in the quarterfinals 6-2, 6-0, and won her semifinal match, 6-2, 6-4.

After placing second in the district tournament, Kosub placed fourth in the regional tournament. She won the girls' singles division in the Hereford tournament.

The Hereford High School girls' tennis team won the district championship in the fall, and was a regional semifinalist. The HHS girls won the team title in the Hereford tournament.

JIMMIE HAZZARD

Hazzard is a three-year letterman for the Hereford High School boys'

track team. He scored 106 points his senior season, including three first place finishes, seven second place finishes, and five third place finishes.

He also had four fourth place finishes, one fifth place finish and two sixth place finishes.

In the District 1-4A meet, he placed third in the 400-meter dash and fifth in the long jump. He was also a member of two relay teams that placed third in the district — the 400-meter relay team and the 1,600-meter relay team.

The 1,600-meter relay team, in which Hazzard ran with Brooke Perkins, Kelvin Brown, and Marcus Brown, just missed out on a trip to the regional meet. They finished two hundredths of a second behind the second place team.

Hazzard, Marcus Brown, Vincent Brown, and Perkins, set a school record in the 400-meter relay at the district meet, with a time of 42.40 seconds.

Hazzard's best times in individual events were 49.6 seconds in the 400-meter dash, 22.6 seconds in the 200-meter dash, and 10.7 seconds in the 100-meter dash. The best time by a 1,600-meter relay team that Hazzard ran on was 3:23.6.

ALINA BENITEZ

Benitez, a sophomore on the girls' track team, competed in the 800-meter run and the 1,600-meter run this year.

She placed second three times in the 800-meter run, and also fourth one and fifth once. Her best time in that event was 2:34.2.

In the 1,600-meter run, Benitez was a first place finisher twice, and also placed third twice, fifth once, and seventh once. One of her first place finishes in the 1,600-meter run came

in the District 1-4A meet with a time of 5:57.06.

That first place finish qualified her for the regional meet, where she won the third place medal. She ran the 1,600 in a time of 5:47.32 at the regional meet.

In addition to those events, Benitez ran on the 400-meter relay team and ran on the cross country team last fall.

BENNY CARRASCO

Carrasco, a sophomore on the boys' cross country team, was the team captain last fall. He was the top runner for the team all season, competing against outstanding runners from all high school classifications in eight invitational meets before the District 1-4A meet.

A consistent medal winner, his top finish in the eight invitational meets was eighth place. In the district meet, he won the third place medal and qualified for the regional meet.

Carrasco placed seventh in the regional meet, and then finished 14th out of 100 runners in the state meet. He was honored by the Texas Track and Field News for special recognition for underclassmen.

ARTHUR VALDEZ

Valdes was the leading golfer for the HHS varsity team. He had a tournament average of 79.5 and a district round average of 78.1.

His achievements included these: third place medalist in the Andrews tournament, sixth place medalist in the San Angelo tournament, fifth place medalist in the Amarillo Relays tournament, and fifth place in the District 1-4A season.

Valdes tied for first place with a 73 in the district round at Canyon. His seven-round district total was 547.

Valdes is a three-year letterman in golf.

Spring, and a 38-yarder versus Clovis.

On defense, Artho played as a defensive back and had 11 tackles for the season, one of the tackles for a loss. He knocked down two passes attempted by opponents.

Artho was also a member of the Hereford High School varsity boys' basketball team. He scored four points in a game against Pampa.

Coach Cumpton, in making the presentation to Artho, said that Artho "performed above and beyond the call of duty, performing with pain."

AMY CONEWAY

Conway participated in three sports, golf, basketball and volleyball. She was the leading golfer for the Hereford district championship team that won the title by 166 strokes over second place Pampa.

Conway won the District 1-4A medalist title with a seven-round score of 612, an average score of 87.4 per round. She was the first place medalist in five of the seven district rounds, and placed third in the other two district rounds. She shot an 81 to win the Pampa round, and shot scores of 85 in three other rounds that she placed first - the Hereford, Dumas, and Borger rounds.

Hereford High School went on to place third in the regional tournament, with Conway placing third among individual golfers. Conway missed a state tournament berth by two strokes, finishing two strokes behind two Andrews golfers who tied for first in regionals.

Conway's regional round scores were 85 and 78 for a tournament total of 163. She is a two-year letter winner in golf.

A starter for the Hereford High School girls' basketball team, Conway's best games included efforts of 18 points and seven rebounds versus Clovis, and 12 points and 15 rebounds versus Lubbock Dunbar.

Conway also had a 10-point game versus Tascosa, and eight-point games versus Lubbock Estacado and Borger. She averaged five points and six rebounds per game in basketball.

KEITH ANDERSON

Anderson, a 6-1, 190-pound senior, started for the Hereford Whiteface football team as an offensive guard. He was named to the all-district 1-4A first team, and also to the Texas Sports Writers Association class 4A all-state second team.

In baseball, Anderson had a 10-1 pitching record for the regular season, including a three-hitter in the Herd's final district game, a 4-2 win over Dumas last weekend.

He also pitched a one-hitter against Levelland and a four-hitter versus Borger. He hit a two-run homer in the win over Borger. When the Herd beat Canyon 2-1 in Hereford, Anderson pitched a five-hitter.

When Hereford clinched the district baseball championship with a 4-3 win over Pampa, Anderson pitched a two-hitter and struck out 12 batters. His triple in the bottom of the seventh inning helped lead to the winning run in that game.

Anderson has struck out 87 batters and has walked only 11 in 63 innings pitched. His earned runs average is 1.11 - 10 earned runs in 12 games pitched.

The lefthanded baseball player is batting .301 with six doubles along with his home run and triple. He has a .346 on-base percentage and a .452 slugging percentage.

Anderson, who has scored nine runs, leads the Whitefaces with 20 runs batted in. On defense, he has a .875 fielding percentage with 13 putouts and eight assists.

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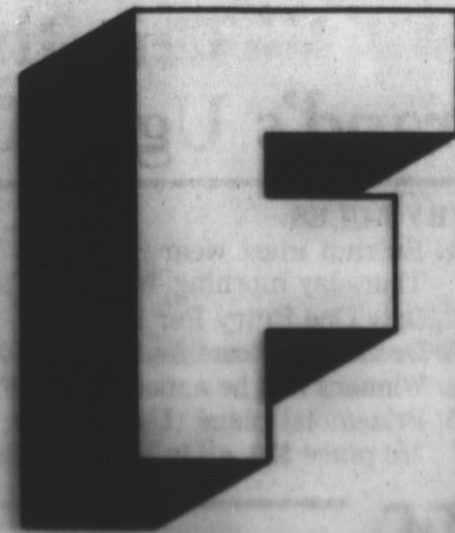
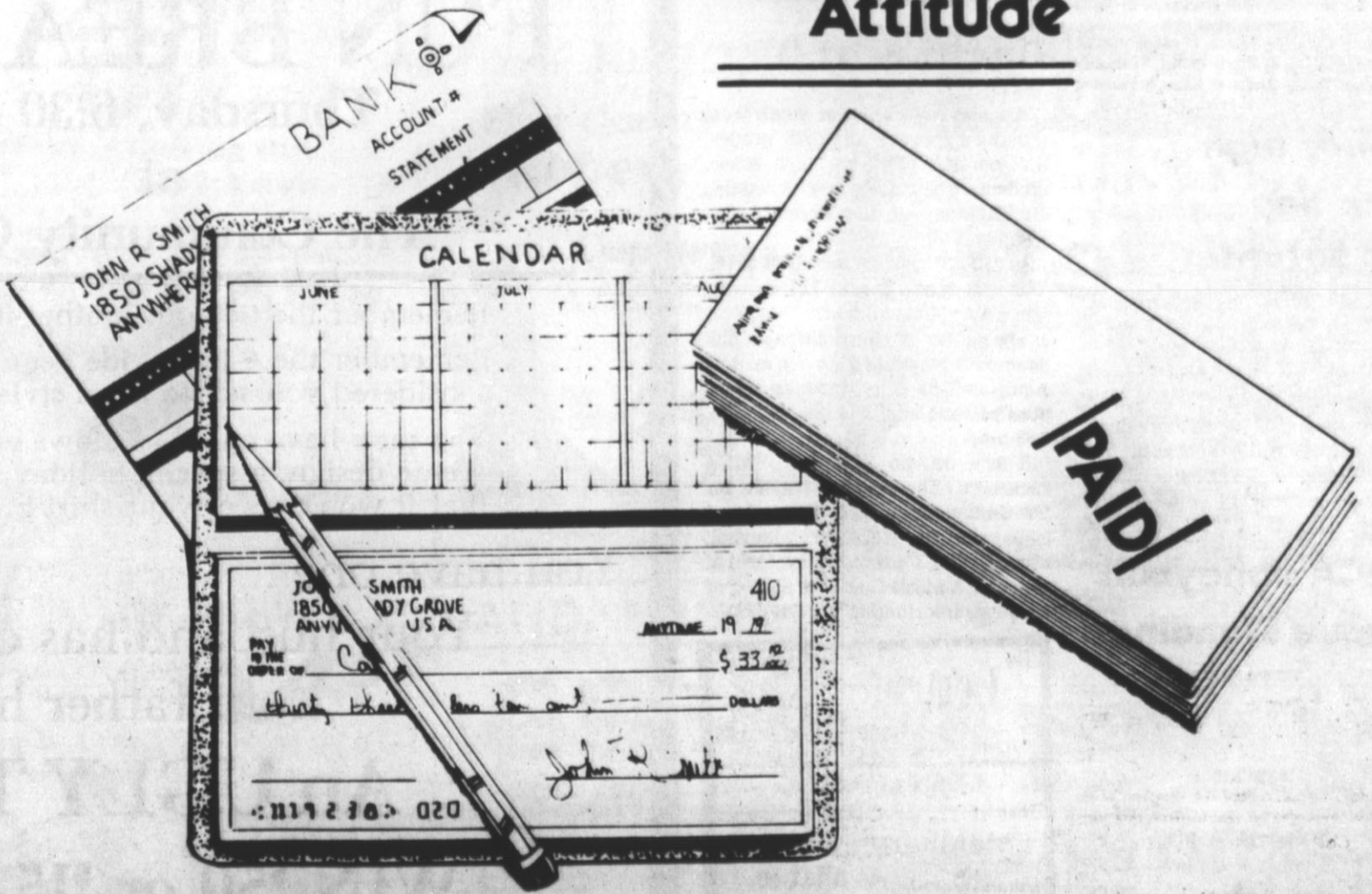

Gooden, 22, was discharged from the Smithers Alcoholism and Treatment Center on April 29 after a 28-day stay. Gooden's cocaine use was detected in a drug test he volunteered to take in spring training.

Gooden has been working out at Shea Stadium in New York, throwing batting practice and in simulated games under the watch of Greg Pavlick, the Mets' roving minor-league pitching coach.
