LET'S STAY AWHILE

When in the latter part of the year 1918, the Empire Gas & Fuel Company began to file leases for the promotion of oil and gas on about one-fourth of the acreage of Deaf Smith County, there were those among us perfectly content to live in the best social, church and civic town in west Texas, who began to make arrangements to leave—soon as the "oil field" was brought in. Things from that time on began to take on the air of an oil field and from time to time more people began to acquire "interests" and when on Sept. 4, 1919 the Empire Gas & Fuel Company filed in Deaf Smith county's Deed of Trust covering their holdings to secure the sum of \$250,000,000.00, we knew that with that mighty sum Deaf Smith County could be punctured as full of holes as a pepper box (if they did not mean business, why go to the trouble to borrow that sum of money.) A Royal Poultry Show

In arranging for the big poultry show in connection with the American Royal this year the America Royal management has planned to make the Royal from November 18 to 25, an all around farmers' event.

In staging the poultry show the management has made it possible for the farmer's wife to show the results of her poultry, turkeys, geese and fowls on the farm. Many awards and prizes will be given for standard bred birds of the best stock, for hens showing the best records as layers, for eggs which will be tested and weighed and for the best points to be brought out in poultry. If the poultry breeder does not care to enter for any of the prizes but wishes to advertise his or her flock, special display pens and booths will be arranged for that purpose.

Every convenience known to the poultry industry will be shown—incubators, brooders, feeders, all sorts of appliances—in fact, everything known to the modern method of improving poultry and eggs. The method of certifying and registering hens will be fully shown and discussed. Talks will be given on poultry, and the biggest and best poultry experts of the United

States will be secured to give all available assistance to the success of the poultry show.

Poultry breeders will be shown how to cull their flocks of hens and take the producers from the non-producers.

The American Royal will hold the only recognized poultry show in Kansas City, open to all breeds, in the fall of 1922.

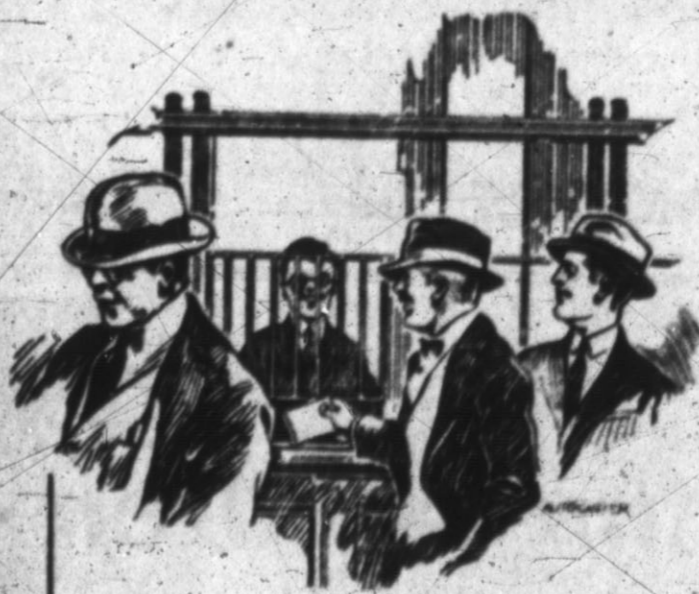
