Tongue-tied Mother



DEAR ANN LANDERS: Your answer to "Tongue-Tied in Appleton" bothered me. It was good, but I think that mother needs more help. If you remember, she asked for advice on how to answer her 14-year-old daughter who said, "I know I'm a rotten kid, but it's your fault...you raised me." You told her, in effect, to tell the daughter she could change and make something better of herself. Of course, she can, but she can do it a lot easier with her mother's help. I have a few suggestions for the mother that will ease a tense and unhappy situation:

1. Never engage in a shouting match with your daughter. If she screams, bite your tongue, lower your voice and say anything you feel compelled to say in a voice only slightly above a whisper. If you can't manage that, tell her quietly that you will discuss the subject with her when you are calmer. Then do it.

2. Never let her reduce you to tears. You are an important person, too. When she gets out of hand, send her to her room, deprive her of a privilege, but don't let her defeat you.
3. Let her know you love her. Tell her the next time she rages at you that there is nothing she can say that will cause you to stop loving her. You may not like her behavior, but she is your daughter and you are committed to loving her, so let her know she might as well stop trying to alienate you. (Don't worry, there will be times when you can't stand her, but remember, you're probably not lovable all the time either).
4. Touch her a lot. This is important! When she's glued to TV and you pass by her chair, reach out and pat her. Give her lots of hugs and don't be put off by her groans or pulling away.
5. Try not to criticize too often. Suggest if you must, but don't be on her back about every little thing. Save your "nos" and "don'ts" for the biggies and MAKE THEM STICK!
6. Stop blaming your husband for not spending time

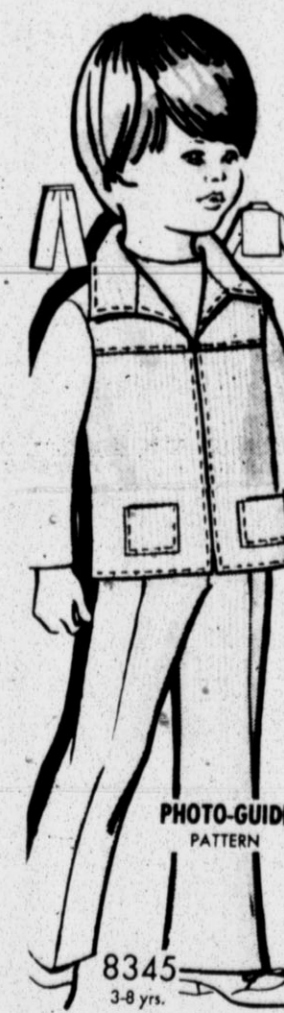
Check Fall-Foliage For Ideas

"By properly selecting plant materials capable of producing fall color, mixed with few evergreen plants, you can enjoy a spectacular foliage display in your own backyard," contends Janne, a horticulturist with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.
 "Get an idea for your fall landscape by traveling around Texas and looking at the display of foliage colors," suggests the horticulturist.

The two most spectacular areas for fall color in Texas are usually the Hill Country area with a preponderance of Texas oak, and the Piney Woods of East Texas, which feature sugar maple, black gum, Shumard Oak, flowering dogwood and American sweetgum.

These selections as well as others can bring fall color to home landscapes, says Janne. "One of the best introduced varieties for home landscape color is the Callery pear, especially the Aristocrat and Bradford selections," contends Janne. "The Chinese pistachio is also well known for its fall color."

A tree which frequently has better fall color than most is the Chinese tallow, adds the horticulturist. However, it has become a problem tree in some coastal areas as it is taking over many fertile river bottom soils. "The color intensity of fall foliage depends a great deal upon climatic and environmental conditions existing as plants finish out the growing season."

Plants growing under shaded conditions usually do not produce as much color as those growing in full sunlight.

Weather may not be favorable. Night temperatures must drop below 45 degrees for good color, but cold daytime temperatures can severely reduce the amount of fall color. Cloudy or rainy days will also reduce color intensity.

Soils with low levels of nutrients will generally produce plants with poor foliage color. However, excessive amounts of nitrogen can have the same effect.

Guadeloupe lies in the Leeward Islands of the West Indies. The main crops are sugar and bananas, with cotton, coffee, vegetables and tropical fruits also grown. Fishing and rum production are significant activities.
