### **Gasohol Plant** Rejects Texas

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The president of a Kansas firm that wanted to build a \$25 million gasohol plant in Texas says the company will look elsewhere while a Senate committee tries to figure out how to revive the abandoned project.

"We have been besieged by offers from just about every state in the union,' said Cloud Cray, Midwest Solvents-president. "Texas just didn't want us."

Cray commented at a Senate Special Committee on Gasohol hearing. The committee wants to know why the proposed Rio Grande Valley project died after apparently winning legislative and Alcoholic Beverage Commission approval.

At the heart of the issue is whether 190-proof alcohol is fit for human consumption. A top. ABC official originally told Midwest the potent alcohol it planned to produce was not drinkable, but he said he was "overruled" by other

staff members. The project died. Joe Darnall, assistant ABC administrator, said he initially decided, "I could live with an interpretation that 190-200-proof alcohol - raw and straight from the still - is unfit for human consumption.'

### Commodity **Exports** Hit Record

WASHINGTON (AP) - Farm exports have set another record but could have been even larger - perhaps by \$1 billion - if transportation snarls had not developed last summer, according to

some Agriculture Department insiders. Even so, the department officially announced Thursday that exports in the fiscal year that ended Sept. 30 rose to \$32 billion, a record for the 10th straight year. The value of commodities shipped also was up 17 percent from exports of \$27.3 billion in 1977-78.

One USDA source said "the total would have been larger" had it not been for the strike at Great Lakes port facilities railroad stoppages, including service by the Rock Island, a major artery for grain and soybeans in the Midwest.

Another source said "there is some disagreement on the numbers" within USDA but that some officials felt the total export value would have been "'at least \$1 billion" higher if the transportation problems had not developed.

Neither of the sources, who asked not to be identified, would say whether he thought the United States actually lost any new sales of farm commodities

O-Did Hereford Superintendent Harrell Holder go to the National Honor Society and other organizations, asking them to lower their standards so more Mexican-American students could be involved?

A--Dr. Holder did not go to the National Honor Society, whose standards are set by the national organization and primarily concern academic work. However, he did ask the drill team to lower its standards somewh . According to Dr. Holder, the school district has a much higher dropout rate in high school among Mexican-American students than among others. Extra-curricular activities may be justified on a basis of serving as enrichment to regular academic programs, according to Dr. Holder. Research has shown that on the average, students who are involved in activities make higher grades and have better attendance than those who are not. HOlder said that where rules exist which have nothing to do with skills in a particular activity but tend to eliminate more minority students than other students, those rules should be eliminated. The superintendent said he sees no justification for drill-team standards being higher than those for football. Holder has requested that school district personnel examine entrance requirements to all extra-curricular activites to see if the rules have a high correlation with the activity and/or might tend to exclude otherwise. qualified minority students.

## Interest Rates, Saving Habits Take Toll on Business

Savings and loan associations are down but not out, says Dwight Turner, adding that his company has continued to survive even in these times of inflation and rising interest rates.

"Our management has always been conservative enough not to take risks with people's money, but we have been progressive enough and well-managed enough to make money even in times of adversity." said Turner, corporate vice president of Security Savings and Loan Association and manager of the Hereford

But, Turner admits, it hasn't been easy. Security Federal, like most other similar financial institutions, isn't making any home mortgage loans, and people are

changing their money-saving style and therefore costing the association more money through higher interest dividends.

"Right now, we're unable to make home loans. We are making a few home-improvement loans. This week, we're paying 12.193 percent (interest) on these money-market certificates. Close to 30 percent of our total deposits are in these certificates. Obviously, we can't be paying money at 12.193 and lending it at the usary rate, which right now is 11 1/4,"

"The money we get on these money-market certificates, we try to keep it in short term obligations."

Turner, a former real-estate salesman from New Mexico, said it is still possible for someone to purchase a home, though not through Security Federal.

"Right now, we're seeing a lot of assumptions of present homes. But that normally requires a higher down payment. And you see some sellers carrying second-lien notes," Turner said Builders are hurting, too, as interest

rates continue to rise. "Their problem, in the first place, is. on a new home, it has to have a new long-term mortgage on it. Once they get the house built, it's going to be hard to

sell because it's hard for the buyer to get his money," Turner said. "In the second place, when they start to build a house, they have to borrow money from their own banker at 15 to 16 percent interest for interim financing.

That's hard on the builder.


Turner praised the Federal Reserve Board's inflation program, saying it ultimately should slow down rising costs. "I think if the Federal Reserve sticks to

it's own program, it will drive down interest rates and even the cost-of-living, so inflation won't be so high. This is the only program that looks like they have the fortitude to try," he said.

"Of course, the best program would be to lower government spending. It would lower everything else. But, for years, monetary policies have been used as a scapegoat for the federal government."

Loans for homes might become available as early as next year. Turner said. "I think loans will be available. I think the first quarter of 1980 is going to be pretty tight, though."

Less people are putting their money into savings accounts as in the past, (See BRANDING, Page 2)

#### RTC Chairman Wants Government Limits

SAN ANGELO, Texas (AP) - Chairman John Poerner of the Texas Railroad Commission said today spending and taxing limitations should be placed on the federal government.

The commission regulates Texas' energy and transportation industries.

We must put a limit on the authority of our Congress to spend, to prevent the value of our money from being further diluted," said Poerner in a speech prepared for delivery to the Rotary Club.

Poerner said Americans are "supporting a bloated, expensive federal government...that has taken to inflating the currency so that the dollar of 40 years ago is now only worth 18 cents."

Ha said the printing of more money to battle inflation encourages Americans to live beyond their means. "Living on borrowed money, a practice once frowned on, is now considered a smart thing to do because today's debts are scheduled for repayment in tomorrow's cheap dollars."

The ringleader of the movement to chase the Vietnamese from Seadrift was Aplin, Malo-

Aug. 3 touched off violent reprisals against the town's 150 Vietnamese immigrants. The shooting stemmed from a "crab war" over local fishing customs between local fisherman and newly-transplanted Vietnamese crabbers.

Tensions are still simmering in Seadrift, forcing the trial to be moved 90 miles inland to Seguin. A Seadrift city council member said Thursday that the innocent verdict for Chinh made it "very possible violence could

Check Fall-Foliage For Ideas COLLEGE STATION - with trees that offer spectacular explains Janne. Improve your home landscape fall foliage colors, says Everett

> "By properly selecting plant materials capable of producing fall color, mixed with few evergreen plants, you can enjoy a spectacular foliage display in your own backyard," contends Janne, a horticulturist with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service, Texas A&M University

"Get an idea for your fall landscape by traveling around Texas and looking at the display of foliage colors," suggests the horticulturist.

The two most spectacular areas for fall color in Texas are usually the Hill Country area. with a preponderance of Texas oak, and the Piney Woods of East Texas, which feature sugar maple, black gum, Shumard Oak, flowering dogwood and American sweetgum.

These selections as well as others can bring fall color to home landscapes, says Janne. "One of the best introduced

varieties for home landscape color is the Callery pear, especially the Aristocrat and Bradford selections," contends Janne. "The Chinese pistachio is also well known for its fall color."

A tree which frequently has better fall color than most is the Chinese tallow, adds the horticulturist. However, it has become a problem tree in some coastal areas as it is taking over many fertile river bottom soils.

"The color intensity of fall foliage depends a great deal upon climatic and environmental conditions existing as plants finish out the growing season,"

### Young TV Star Sues ABC Over Interview by Rivera

LOS ANGELES (AP) — This could be serious. NBC's cute young star, Gary Coleman, is mad at ABC's cute young star, Geraldo Rivera. And now the grownups on both sides are involved.

Coleman's grownups have filed a \$1 million suit against ABC and "20-20," the newsmagazine show for which prizewinning investigative reporter Rivera reports. ### Defense Firms Seek **Engineers from Rivals**

LOS ANGELES (AP) - It used to be you could tell an aerospace engineer by the pink slip peeking out from behind the half-dozen pens in his shirt pocket. Now engineers are so scarce that defense firms are paying bounties to steal them from each other.

A simultaneous jump in defense and airliner business has Texas Instruments running ads in Los Angeles on the virtues of Dallas, Northrop offering \$1,000 in cash for new workers and Boeing hiring overseas for the first time in a decade. The boom-or-bust aerospace busi-

ness is booming again. The Commerce Department's Bureau of Economic Analysis predicts that aerospace companies will sell \$47 billion worth of missiles, planes and other defense equipment this year, a 20 percent jump over 1978. In addition, several companies are beginning new commercial airliner programs and the result is unprecedented demand for

engineers and other skilled

workers. "When we're in sync with Douglas, Rockwell and Hughes, that's what causes the problems," says Dave Crowther, spokesman for Lockheed-California Co. "If it's timed so that

when we're hiring, Hughes is laying off, that's beautiful. But if the needs are the same across the board, there's just not enough people to meet the demand.'

Lockheed has added 6,000. employees in the past year as it speeds up production of its L1011. Seattle-based Boeing has added 631 engineers to its permanent staff and 553 temporaries - almost a third of the

spokesman Pete Bush. Boeing has also "borrowed" engineers from some of its subcontractors, he said.

Jury Deliberations May Begin Monday

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) Lawyers say jury deliberations in the marathon murder solicitation trial of millionaire Cullen Davis could begin as early as Monday.

Lead defense attorney Richard "Racehorse" Haynes spent more than three hours Thursday trying to discredit testimony given by the prosecution's rebuttal witness, Gale Helms,

Prosecutors hailed Helms' testimony Wednesday, saving it destroyed defense attorneys' theory that Davis was framed.

State attorneys repeatedly objected - to Haynes questioning, calling it repetitious and irrelevant. At one point Havnes asked same question three times, with different wording, and was chided by State District Judge Gordon Grav.

'I've been down that road before and I don't intend to go down it again," Gray said. "I've heard all this before."

"You haven't heard this." Haynes argued.

"And I'm not going to hear it. either," Gray countered. "I'm going to sustain the objection." Obviously frustrated, Haynes finished his cross-examination by midafternoon and a short time later, prosecutor Jack Strickland got to his feet and



even though he doesn't drink coffee, tea or colas and doesn't smoke, it might be having him checked again. If he's in very poor physical condition, it might also be worth having him start a physical fitness program. Finally, I would just observe that laboratory tests are not infallible and occasionally a person with an overactive thyroid gland may have a normal blood test report. However, if he did have an overactive thyroid the probabilities are that he would have some other findings which would help to lead

to the correct diagnosis. DEAR DR. LAMB - I am a 24-year-old female who has chest pains like you described for angina. Sometimes, though, they are very sharp and feel almost like a needle poking down and in. I've had some that are around the ribs at about the same place. Some people think it might be pleurisy. I've asked several doctors about this and all they do is listen to my chest and tell me that I'm healthy. I wonder if I need other tests but no one

has run any. DEAR READER - I'm sure it would relieve your mind to have some other tests, such as an electrocardiogram. Your doctors probably haven't done them because your story doesn't really sound like heartpain. It's rare for a 24-yearold female to have coronary artery disease. The other kinds of heart disease that might cause chest pain usually create abnormal heart sounds which your doctor should be able to detect when

he listens to your chest. Heart pains are seldom sharp or needlelike. Those are usually caused by other

Pleurisy pains are usually associated with respiration. Sharp chest pains are sometimes related to nervous tension or combined with a group of symptoms including faint ness and dizziness and other symptoms that may be called neurocirculatory asthenia.

That's not associated with any structural changes in the heart or any significant disease. It's more often the kind of symptoms you see after recovering from a prolonged illness or prolonged bed rest. In fact, one of the earlier descriptions of it was in soldiers recovering from severe diarrhea during the Civil War.

Glue on table top

DEAR POLLY - I glued a ceramic figurine to a mahogany table with milky white all-purpose glue but now I want to remove the figurine from my table top without marring the table top if possible. Can you or any of the readers suggest a method for doing this?

DEAR ISABEL - Something is going to have to go as there is a big chance of either breaking the figurine or marring the table top. If the glue is old, perhaps you could try slipping a spatula or putty knife under the ornament to loosen it. If you are lucky a bit a vinegar MAY soften the glue on the table top so that it can be removed but there is a definite possibility that the top will have to be refinished. I am curious as to why you did this in the first place. - POLLY

DEAR POLLY - A discarded sock slipped over a fly swatter is great for dusting under furniture and for reaching hard-to-reach places. Saves a lot of energy and your back, too. DEAR POLLY - The tops off those plastic squeeze type
