Farm Electricity Early Next Week

With installation of the large sub-station transformers underway this week, H. V. Hennen, REA supervisor, said today that the lines will likely be energized early next week. He also said that a formal opening is being planned in connection with turning electricity into the lines.

Mr. Hennen said that the majority of prospective users of power through the REA lines already have their homes wired, or that the work is in progress at the present time. Around 90 per cent of the users are expected to be ready for electricity when it is turned on next week.

The three transformers, which weigh 17,000 pounds each, arrived last Friday and were moved to location at the substation, Tuesday. The transformers have delayed energization of the lines for several weeks, and their arrival is expected to cover the last hitch anticipated in bringing electricity to farm homes of this area.

While rural power for domestic use will form the chief load on the lines at the present, they are also expected to offer increased irrigation facilities over the area during the ensuing year. The project includes a total of 176 miles of lines in Deaf Smith and Castro Counties with a potential of 186 irrigation customers and 180 customers who will use electricity in farm homes.

Following the play-off series, the two winning teams will also be featured in a Donkey Softball game on the field, Wednesday night, Sept. 14. Arrangements have already been made for the Donkey game, and much enthusiasm is reported in regard to this game. A similar game last year drew record attendance for the season.

Rains Improve Farm And Range Outlook In Area

Rains in Hereford this week totaled 1.62 inches, bringing hope to many farmers of this area. Spotted rains were reported over the entire county, and over the Panhandle.

In addition to the benefit which row crops received from the moisture, it was also considered a boon by farmers who have land prepared for wheat planting; still others hoped as a result to be able to plant grain at an earlier date. To the few who had already planted, the rain was indeed welcome.

Ranchers in many sections also welcomed the rains, reporting pastures in many sections were drying up for lack of moisture. Many lakes were filled as a result of the moisture and range lands were generally benefited.

Local School Enrollment Totals 859

HIGH SCHOOL TOTALS 320 STUDENTS; 539 IN ELEMENTARY

With a total enrollment of 859 students this year, Knox Kinard, superintendent, said today that the high school enrollment is 320 and the elementary enrollment 539.

Comparing the total enrollment for this year with that at the same period in 1937, an increase of 41 students is seen in the Hereford Schools. In September, 1937, the enrollment totaled 818—and odd enough the same figure of 41 was shown for increased enrollment over 1936; when schools opened with a total enrollment of only 777 students.

The greater majority of the 41 increase was this year seen in the high school, where 25 more students were reported than last year; the remaining increase of 16 was reported in the elementary division.

The high school enrollment showed 110 freshmen, 90 sophomores, 67 juniors and 53 seniors.

Mr. Kinard was at loss to account for the increased enrollment in the high school division, attributing it in part to the transfer of Ward and Wyche students.

With organization completed, classes had already started this week and the Hereford schools were operating on mid-season basis. A special chapel has been planned for 10:45 o'clock Friday morning, to which all ex-students of the high school were invited as special guests. An invitation was also extended parents and other interested parties in the community.

Publicity Given This Section By Associated Press

Valuable publicity for this area followed a recent visit of Associated Press representatives from Denver, recently.

Although there is no way to definitely check the publicity, visible results have been seen in several papers. Monday the Amarillo News carried a large spread of pictures and an article on the Joe Evans farm west of here. In the Sunday issue of the Kansas City Star a full-page in the rotogravure section devoted well over a half of its space to Deaf Smith County, the remainder being devoted to Oklahoma. The Kansas City spread showed corn, irrigation and cattle in the area, and was aimed to show how "dust bowl" land has been reclaimed for successful cultivation. Similar recognition was also given in the Denver Post.

More and more recognition of this sort is anticipated for this area as news spreads of the winning battle which farmers, SOS operators and cattlemen have waged to return blown and damaged land.

City Tax Rate Set At \$1.20

Reporting a five cent reduction on city taxes, Mayor C. J. Paddock today said that the rate for the coming year will be \$1.20 on the hundred.

The rate is lowest since 1926, and has dropped from \$1.45 to the present figure during the past four years. The reduction was made possible through the retirement of bonds, \$7,500 having been retired last year.

POSSIBILITY OF HARD SURFACE ROAD SEEN FROM PROPOSALS

Prospects for surfacing "Farm-to-market" roads in Deaf Smith County appeared possible this week, following a visit to Hereford, Wednesday, by A. A. Meredith, WPA Administrator, of Amarillo.

The bright spot in the horizon comes in the form of a new ruling on WPA, which will allow farmers to secure employment without actually going on relief rolls.

Mr. Meredith and the WPA engineer met Wednesday with the county commissioners, and will likely return to Hereford next week to more thoroughly discuss possibilities of hard surfacing several miles of lateral roads.

Following is a release from WPA headquarters, which supplements Meredith's statement here, when he said, "We have the money to pay farmers—all you have to do is sponsor a project and give them work."

In the following paragraphs will be found a summary of the Farm Labor provision as explained by A. A. Meredith, Administrator for WPA in the Panhandle territory. Mr. Meredith visited Hereford Wednesday, and reviewed the situation with the county commissioners, also briefly in a talk before the Lions Club.

In expressing his satisfaction over the arrangements completed by Works Progress Administration to work farmers in need and who need employment to supplement low farm income, Congressman Marvin Jones said:

"Due to the heavy burden caused by lack of crops through a series of years, many farmers are unable to finance their production of crops unless they have a little assistance. Many others are so far behind with their payments that they are badly handicapped. A small amount of work on projects in this area will mean more than you probably realize. It will enable them to pull through and make it on their own."



MORE ABOUT FREIGHT RATES

The tilt between Congressman Marvin Jones of Amarillo and Secretary Wallace over freight rates in the Southwestern area is typical of discussions of freight rates all over the land. It is a complicated subject and those who discuss it, particularly we laymen, are unable to definitely define each other's terms, which makes any full and mutual understanding impossible.

Congressman Jones complained that wheat freight rates in the Southwestern zone were discriminatory. Secretary Wallace replied that he found the wheat rates in line with other Southwestern rates. Congressman Jones promptly came back and said that the secretary or his underlings who gave him the data hadn't understood what he was talking about. He had said that wheat rates in the Southwestern area are discriminatory, not in relation to other rates in the zone, but in relation to rates elsewhere and furthermore that the general freight rates in this zone are discriminatory.

The low rate of wheat loans in the Panhandle-Plains has only one factor that brings them to the lowest level in the country. That is freight rates. The handling charge and the storage charge are constant.

Only by strong and timely opposition were cotton loans promulgated on a basis that did not consider freight rates. Again, we would have been sinned against if the formula for loan making had been "less the freight."

Congressman Jones has moved to secure a reduction in freight rates on grain that is moving for export. His theory is that industrial products have lower rates to encourage their movement abroad. That sounds logical and reasonable. It is a big question, however. The movement of grain involves transit privileges in milling. What is the best economic policy in this principle of rate making is a moot question. This much is certain: Interests that have built up the transit privileges are certainly capable of taking care of themselves in any rate matter, and will not permit themselves to suffer.

After all, most of the troubles of the producer so far as freight rates are concerned come because he has not looked after his own interests as well as others have theirs.

We wouldn't be unfair to the common carriers in the matter of rates. They perform an essential service and are entitled to pay for it at a profitable rate.

We are convinced very firmly that our area, on the basis of miles of haul, density of traffic and volume of production and consequent tonnage, has higher freight rates than other sections. Our production has increased and our rates on grain have progressively climbed.

Every cent a bushel hike costs Hale County producers an average annually of \$15,000.

They are reducing rates elsewhere. Eastern trunk lines have filed schedules of lower tariffs on all grains from Chicago and river points to Atlantic ports for export. The cut is 10 cents per hundred pounds or SIX CENTS PER BUSHEL. Panhandle-Plains rates were HIKED 12 CENTS PER BUSHEL this season.

The new Eastern rate is made to gain back some wheat that is now water borne.

We haven't the water. That's why this newspaper is espousing canalization of the Trinity River. Some say it is impracticable. That's a question that the United States engineers are most capable of passing upon. There are some mighty fine Yankee brains in that organization. You may remember that the French couldn't build the Panama Canal. —Plainview Evening Herald.

Lions Hear Talk By Jack Little Here Wednesday

HE ASKS HOW AND FROM WHERE IS 40 MILLION DOLLARS COMING

Stating that he believes Governor-elect W. Lee O'Daniel will attempt to pay the proposed pension in his platform, State Representative Jack Little told members of the Hereford Lions Club, Wednesday, that the coming year will be one worthy of close observation.

"Paying the pension will require an additional 40 million dollars annually to the state," he said. "On August 31, 1937, the general fund showed a deficit of 10 million dollars, but other funds showed cash on hand amounting to approximately 25 million dollars. On July 31, 1938, the general fund deficit had increased to 13 million dollars and the cash on hand in other funds had dropped to 19 million dollars."

Pointing out that O'Daniel has already sought summaries of expenses in all state offices and departments, he predicted a possible consolidation of the 16 state boards now in existence, and possibly elimination of some phases. This move he estimated might save around 8 million dollars. However, in view of the fact that the legislature turned down attempts to increase taxes this year, he is wondering what steps will be taken toward raising the proposed pension funds.

Mr. Little also traced for club members the steps necessary in getting a bill before the house, and the many channels through which it goes before it is finally passed. Following Mr. Little's talk, A. A. Meredith, WPA director, traced the new WPA ruling which allows farmers to work on relief projects without taking the relief oath.
