The new tags will be sold after December 1, opening date for payment of 1934 license fees. Deadline for payment, according to present laws, is January 31, 1934.

Acreage and total bushels shown in the applications as originally submitted are almost twice as high as figures set by government offi-cials. Government figures are bas-ed upon the 1930 farm census, and a survey made in the county in the spring of 1932.






