


The judges awarded the honors to Arthur Rogers, first rank, and Albert Carter, close second rank.



### CYCLONE AT ZEPHYR

Thirty-One Dead, Sixteen not Expected to Live and a Large Number Injured.

In a cyclone that struck the little town of Zephyr in Brown county last Saturday night, thirty-one persons lost their lives, several more are not expected to live and many were injured. The town was literally destroyed and after the storm many ruined and wrecked houses were burded. The property loss is estimated at \$100,000.00. Many of the injured were taken by the Santa Fe road to Temple, Texas where they are now in the hospital. Zephyr is on the Santa Fe road in Brown county, about 15 miles southeast of Brownwood. A list of the dead and injured has been published by the daily papers.
