Day Care is debt-free

Hereford Day Care Center is debt-free, and celebrated Thursday with a note-burning ceremony at the Ruth Warner Memorial Center on 16th Street.

Past and present board members and center benefactors were on hand to burn the note for the center.

The Warner Center has 110 children enrolled, and Della Hutchins is the director. The original center on Norton Street has 70 children enrolled, and Georgie Pinkerton is the director. Bettie Dickson is the administrator of the overall program, which has 21 employees.

Hereford Day Care was established in October 1970 at 215 Norton. The building was donated by First Baptist Church and renovated from funds and materials donated by the community and matching funds from the Jim Hill Estate.

The original center was licensed for 45 children, but was expanded in 1976 with two rooms and a basement funded by memorial gifts for Ruth Warner and donations from the community.

By August 1978, Hereford's growing population had established another waiting list, and a second center was established at Wesley United Methodist Church.

In August 1982, Hereford Day Care purchased the original Church of the Nazarene building at 248 E. 16th. The building, which became the Ruth Warner Memorial Center, was renovated to meet the center's needs, including installation of playground equipment and commercial kitchen equipment. A \$25,000 donation from the Jim Hill

Estate and donations of money and materials from the community again met the center's needs.

In less than three years, the center was full again. The Hereford Day Care board of directors decided to add on to the center, with 1,600 square feet to handle two additional rooms for children, storage space and laundry facilities.

George Warner was cited by Mrs. Dickson for his long-standing commitment to Hereford Day Care, along with Emmett Milburn and Rocky Lee. Lee was a trustee for the Jim Hill Estate, which benefited many projects in Hereford. The last of the estate's funds were given to the Hereford Senior Citizens Association in January to assist with the expansion of the Senior Center.

Clements adamant on taxes as study begins

AUSTIN (AP) - The chairman of a committee working to write a compromise school-finance reform bill says he won't let Gov. Bill Clements' no-new-taxes pledge affect his panel's work.

"I am not going to conduct the business of this committee based on what the governor has said or hasn't said. If we relied on what the governor has said, we wouldn't have done anything," Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, said Thursday.

A \$300 million cap on additional state spending for schools in 1990-91, cited by Clements as the limit to avoid a tax increase, is "irresponsible, because it wouldn't help anything," Parker said.

The conference committee is negotiating differences between a \$450 million House bill and \$1.2 billion Senate measure, passed in response to a Texas Supreme Court

ruling that the current school-finance system is unconstitutional.

Clements favors a reform plan that would pump \$234 million more into public education next school year. He has outlined a way to pay for it by cutting other parts of the budget and increasing the state fee for obtaining driving records.

The governor has said he would allow a bill with a higher price tag if it didn't require new taxes, but some legislative leaders say a tax increase is necessary to reach spending levels endorsed by the House and Senate.

The House will consider ways to pay for school-finance reform next week. Options include cuts in other state programs, state fee increases, a state lottery and higher taxes.

But Clements accused lawmakers who are looking at higher taxes of playing political games and said

Texans support his promise to veto new taxes for schools.

"The people of Texas in poll after poll do not want any increase in taxes, period, and somehow or other, these legislators don't seem to understand that," he said.

Lawmakers are in their second special session to address the Supreme Court's finding of unconstitutional disparities in funding available to property-rich and property-poor school districts.

The court set a May 1 deadline for changing the \$13.5 billion-a-year system, which relies on state aid, local property taxes and some federal funds.

But the governor, who has sole authority to call lawmakers into special session, said he doesn't think the state will meet that deadline.

"If it takes up through this summer and through Thanksgiving or up 'til Christmas, I'm right here," Clements said.

Space-borne tomatoes may produce toxic fruit

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Tomato seeds that spent six years in space before they were distributed to schoolchildren to conduct experiments were exposed to cosmic radiation that could produce poisonous fruit, it was reported today.

An unsigned memorandum from a NASA contractor described the danger as "remote," according to the Los Angeles Times, which obtained a copy of the memo.

But the memo said the research director at Park Seed Co., which gave NASA the seeds, "seemed to favor against" eating the tomatoes.

A class at Bluebonnet School in Hereford is one of the 180,000 classes across the United States that is growing the space-borne tomatoes along with "regular" tomatoes to study differences. School was not in session today in Hereford because of the Good Friday holiday and officials could not be reached for comment this morning by the Brand.

No such warning was included in written materials sent to 180,000 teachers involved in the experiment designed to give 4 million students the chance to study the effects of space exposure on living tissue.

National Aeronautic and Space Administration officials on Thursday admitted there was an "infinitesimal" risk of poisonous tomatoes.

They defended the decision not to warn teachers and students about eating the tomatoes, saying they should not be eaten as part of the experiment anyway, the newspaper said.

The Space Exposed Experiment Developed for Students (SEEDS) was among 57 experiments carried aboard an 11-ton satellite launched by shuttle astronauts in April 1984. About 12.5 million seeds were stored on board in aluminum canisters.

The satellite laboratory was to remain in space only 10 months, but because of delays and the Challenger explosion, it wasn't retrieved until

January, when the shuttle Columbia brought it back to Earth.

Frank Owens, deputy director of NASA's educational affairs division said the two-page document obtained by the Times was "not an official NASA memo."

The memo apparently was sent by mistake about two weeks ago to the NASA-JPL Teaching Center in suburban La Crescenta, which has been distributing the seeds throughout Southern California.

The Times said the memo was written by Nelson Ehrlich, associate director of the aerospace education services program at Oklahoma State University, which oversees NASA's school programs.

"There is a remote possibility that radiation-caused mutations could cause the plants to produce toxic fruit," the memo said. Radiation levels in space are higher than those on Earth.

Sen. Gramm accused of abortion 'smokescreen'

WASHINGTON (AP) - Texan Phil Gramm, one of the Senate's most ardent foes of abortion, is backing a proposal by home-state Republicans that would ban most abortions only after pregnancies pass the halfway mark.

Yet Republican Gramm, who has co-sponsored five constitutional amendments to ban abortions even in cases of rape or incest, insists he isn't waffling.

State Sen. Hugh Parmer, a pro-choice Democrat who is running against Gramm, sees a "smokescreen" and is accusing Gramm of trying to project a more moderate image on abortion to voters back home without really changing his stance.

The "legislative action plan" was issued last week by leaders of the Texas Republican Party and endorsed by Gramm and GOP gubernatorial candidate Clayton Williams.

Abortions would be prohibited "when medical tests performed by a licensed physician determine that the child is viable, except when medically necessary to save the life of the mother." The plan also calls for a ban on sex-selection abortions and advocates parental consent before minors can obtain abortions.

The party's focus on abortion comes as a number of Democratic and Republican candidates around the country have moved away from anti-abortion positions. Since anti-abortion candidates were defeated in the Virginia and New Jersey governor's races last year, there has been a growing perception that electoral majorities favor legal abortions.

Bill Price, president of the largest anti-abortion organization in Texas, said he saw no compromise in the limited reach of the Republican plan, but added: "This is a recognition of political reality."

Price, who heads Texans United for Life, acknowledged the release of the plan was meant to coincide with the election season.

"Why should Republicans have the Democrats bang them over the head" on the abortion issue, he said.

Phyllis Dunham, executive director of the Texas Abortion Rights Action League, said the GOP proposal could backfire.

"The anti-choice Republicans won't think it goes far enough and pro-choice Republicans will see right through it," Ms. Dunham said. "The pro-choice will see it for being a piece of political maneuvering that it is."

Fred Meyer, chairman of the Texas Republican Party, said the plan is a "reasonable, responsible program" that supports the rights of the unborn as well as the rights of women.

Meyer said Gramm's position on the constitutional amendments stems from his national perspective, while the legislative action plan addresses state-level issues.

Gramm spokesman Larry Neal said the senator's position on abortion remains unchanged and that the proposed constitutional amendments "speak for themselves."

"I think the question which pro-choice Republicans will have to ask themselves is: 'Is Phil Gramm looking out for the lives of Texans or is he looking out for his own political hide?'" she said.

Parmer said Gramm's support of the GOP plan is an attempt to confuse people because "he knows his own position is totally unacceptable to a vast majority of the voters in Texas."

"He is prepared to take a position opposed by almost everybody in Texas because he thinks it's good politics for him" to maintain conservative support around the nation in case he runs for president in 1996, Parmer said.

'Now, Charlie the Tuna has a reason to smile'

WASHINGTON (AP) - Environmentalists and lawmakers are hailing a decision by three U.S. tuna canners - including the world's largest - not to buy or sell tuna captured along with dolphins.

Environmental groups predicted the move by companies selling the

StarKist, Bumble Bee and Chicken of the Sea brands will save some of the estimated 100,000 dolphins that die annually in huge nets used to catch schools of tuna.

StarKist Seafood Co. said Thursday it "will not purchase any tuna caught in association with dolphins" and "will sell only dolphin-free tuna."

The action was taken in "recognition of increased consumer concern for the environment" and because "the greatest concern in the tuna industry is dolphin mortality," said Anthony A.F. O'Reilly, president of the H.J. Heinz Co., which owns StarKist.

StarKist has a 35 percent share of the U.S. tuna market and is the world's largest tuna canner. The change could cost consumers "a couple or more cents" per can, O'Reilly said.

Bumble Bee Seafoods Inc., a chief competitor, followed suit a few hours later saying it "would now implement its plan to end the purchase of tuna caught in association with dolphins."

"Our tuna cans will begin to reflect the dolphin-safe label in U.S. stores within the next three months," the statement said.

Van Kamp Seafood of St. Louis, seller of Chicken of the Sea brand, said it would "discontinue buying tuna caught in association with dolphins," according to a statement from Jose E. Munoz Jr., company president.

"To do this, we are asking our few

existing contract vessels to relocate their operations to the western Pacific, where the dolphin mortality problem does not exist," Munoz said.

"Now Charlie the Tuna has a reason to smile," said Rep. Barbara Boxer, D-Calif., author of the Dolphin Protection Consumer Information Act of 1990, in a statement read by Biden. Charlie the Tuna is an animated character used in StarKist advertisements.

However, the American Tunaboat Association criticized the new policy as "politically and marketing motivated."

August Felando, ATA president, said the move was "devastating" for the U.S. tuna fleet. "Basically, we have now lost our market. The Eastern Pacific is the most productive area in the world for yellowfin tuna fishing and it's our traditional grounds," he said.

"U.S. boats ... will be forced to other fisheries, or even go out of business," while foreign boats will sell their tuna to non-U.S. buyers, Felando added.

StarKist's new policy was aimed at purse seine net fishing in the eastern Pacific Ocean because it is the only fishery where dolphin swim with tuna. The nets are intentionally dropped below schools of dolphins to capture the tuna underneath when a drawstring is pulled to close the net.

Bush, Thatcher discuss Eastern European problems

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Bush and British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher are meeting today against the backdrop of Bermuda's coral beaches to "stay in touch" on the changing landscape in Eastern Europe and state of superpower relations.

Bush scheduled an early-morning departure for the session, one of a series he plans with NATO allies in advance of his five-day summit with Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev beginning May 30.

"He wants to go into the session with Gorbachev with a firm view of the attitudes of other members of the alliance," White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said Thursday.

Next month's superpower summit, arms control negotiations, the unrest

in Lithuania and German reunification headed the agenda for the day-long session between Bush and Mrs. Thatcher.

Bush planned to brief Mrs. Thatcher on his talks last week with Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze. At the time, the Soviet Union indicated it might be willing to accept a unified Germany that is not neutral.

The United States insists that a unified Germany be part of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. Britain favors a somewhat slower approach toward German reunification than the United States and the rest of the NATO alliance.

On Lithuania's strive for independence from the Soviet Union, the two countries agree on the need for restraint.

"The United States and Britain believe that in this period of rapid change, the cohesion and stability of the Western alliance is most important," Fitzwater said.

Census Bureau sued over 'low' tally

WASHINGTON (AP) - Millions of Americans haven't sent back their census forms. Millions of others didn't get forms in the first place. Local governments are suing the Census Bureau.

All in all, the 1990 national head count is off to a rough start.

Years went into the planning before roughly 100 million census forms were sent to households at the end of March.

Promptly, things started to go wrong.

Forms began pouring into the bureau's Jeffersonville, Ind., clearinghouse. But they weren't completed responses from citizens. They were undeliverable forms being returned by the post office.

Census Director Barbara Bryant estimated Thursday that between 4 million and 4.5 million forms were undeliverable for various reasons, largely incorrect addresses.

That is being fixed by sending out workers to hand-deliver forms, she said.

But even many of those who received their forms haven't cooperated, Bryant said, pleading with those who haven't filled them out and mailed them back to "do it now."

If the response doesn't pick up, she said, the price of taking the count could escalate by \$80 million.

Bryant said that so far only 57 percent of the forms delivered to American homes have been returned.

At that rate, she said, the total will be only 62 percent by the time the bureau starts sending workers out to count those who haven't answered, starting before the end of April.

Officials had hoped to get back 70 percent of the forms, and Bryant said counting people "on the doorstep" will cost an extra \$10 million for each percentage point below that level. The census already is expected to cost \$2.5 billion.

Several local governments announced Wednesday that they were filing suit, charging that the results - whatever they are - will be unfair.

Census figures are used to distribute seats in the House of Representatives and to allocate billions of dollars in federal funds.

The cities and other local governments that sued contended their residents will not be fully counted, resulting in a loss of representation and money.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I just read the letter from Victimized in Brooklyn, and my own life was laid right out there in front of me, because I, too, am a battered wife.

My husband is an alcoholic who suffers from depression and paranoia. For nearly four years, I listened to doctors tell me that medication and therapy would help.

When "Jack" beat me up for the umpteenth time, I had him arrested. He was given 30 days but was released after four days on "good behavior."

I nearly fainted when I heard Jack's voice on the phone, telling me that he was out of jail. The law says I have to let him speak to his son, but it doesn't say that I have to take any more garbage. Again I heard him say, "Honey, I've changed."

I wanted to believe him, but I'd heard that line so many times I didn't weaken. I just said, "Fine. You say you've changed? Prove it. Get a job and support yourself. Join Alcoholics Anonymous. Go through the Options Programs." (Options is a self-help group for men who beat their wives and girlfriends.)

Needless to say, he hasn't done any of the above, but I am determined to keep him out of this house until he proves that he is willing to clean up his act.

Hints from Heloise

Q. What's the secret to making popcorn in the microwave using your own popcorn and oil? I wanted to make it in a paper bag but read that this is dangerous. I tried a bowl, but no matter what size I use, half the kernels don't pop and the ones that do are burned. What's the secret? — Adele in Yarmouth, Maine

A. You're right about the danger of popping corn in a paper bag! Don't do it! Popcorn has very little moisture, so it doesn't attract microwave energy well. The microwave-safe bags are specially treated to make them hold moisture and to withstand the high heat needed to make corn pop. Regular paper bags can easily catch fire at these temperatures, so never use an ordinary paper bag for popping in the microwave.

Regular bowls and casseroles won't work because they're shaped wrong. The popcorn kernels must be concentrated to produce as much heat as possible to get them all to pop, so the bowl has to be cone-shaped.

Microwave popcorn poppers are available in most places that sell microwave cookware. Follow the instructions for the correct amounts of popcorn whether or not oil is required and for popping times. You should have perfect hot popcorn in a few minutes. It's worth buying one, they are great! — Heloise

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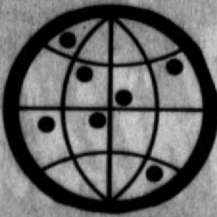
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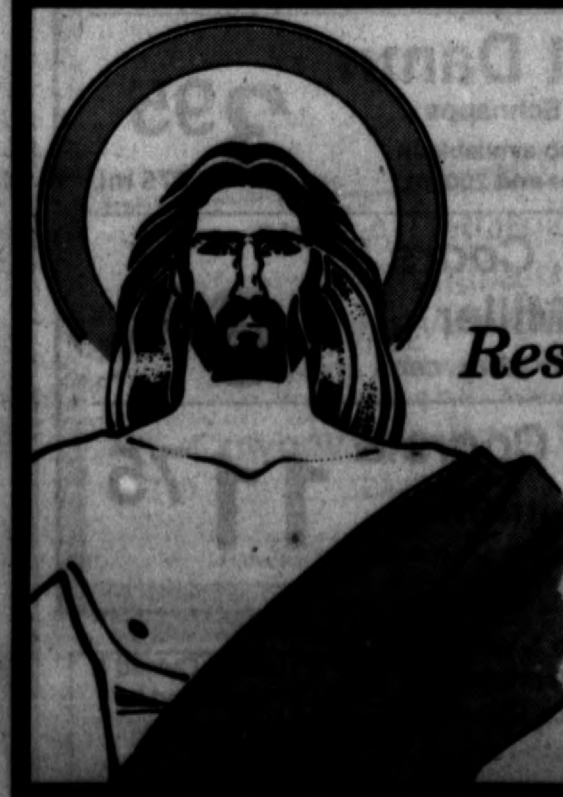

Grijalva up 1-4A lead; team clings to second place

Naomi Grijalva of the Hereford Lady Whiteface golf team increased her lead in the District 1-4A medal standings Thursday in the third district round played at Borger's Phillips Country Club.

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McGriff helps hammer Rangers

Fred McGriff hadn't forgotten how to hit home runs. It only seemed that way.

McGriff led the American League with 36 homers last season, but didn't hit one after a Sept. 4 drive at Chicago's Comiskey Park.

On Thursday night, McGriff hit his first home run in 108 at-bats as the Toronto Blue Jays beat the Texas Rangers 7-1.

"It was all mechanics," McGriff said of his slump. "I've heard people saying I'm tired or that the pitchers have figured me out, but I know and a lot of other people know that it was just bad mechanics. I've been collapsing on my back leg and it was causing me to have a long swing. Basically I've just shortened up my swing."

McGriff's second-inning homer off Jamie Moyer tied the game 1-1. Manny Lee's RBI single in the fourth gave Toronto a 2-1 lead, and the Blue Jays broke the game open with four

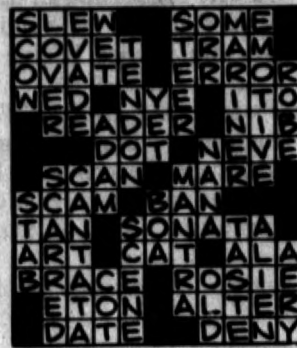

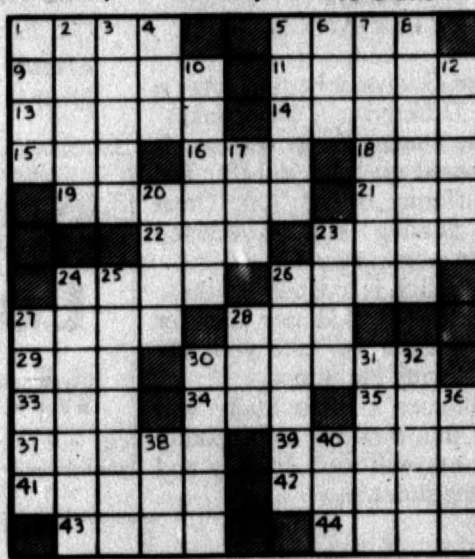

"I'm getting there," Clark said Thursday after driving in three runs with a pair of hits in San Francisco's 13-4 rout of the Atlanta Braves. Clark, who signed a \$15 million, four-year contract on Jan. 22, drove in five runs during the three-game series. He said he feels no pressure to be a one-man gang.
