#### World, National

MOSCOW - The Parliament resumes its session on sweeping governmental changes and President Mikhail Gorbachev's request for more power after Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze quits, charging the country is sliding toward dictatorship.

WASHINGTON - While urging the Soviet Union to accelerate its economic reform efforts, a study of the Soviet economy concludes that massive amounts of Western aid would be wasted if offered now.

WASHINGTON - President Bush says Saddam Hussein does not understand the military threat he faces in the Persian Gulf and must be made to realize Iraq is going to lose badly if it comes to war.

GARY, Ind. - Some residents are carrying guns and some have stopped going out at night but others seem unfazed by a string of seven shotgun slayings in industrial northwestern Indiana. Everyone does seem to share a common hope - that the killer will be stopped soon. "I just hope they catch this guy, I don't care if they blow him away," said Robert Ribicki, a pawn shop owner who has begun packing a pistol since the homicides began.

NEW YORK - They'll still need their parents' permission for field trips. But teens in the nation's largest school system could get condoms next year simply by asking, if the Board of Education approves the schools chancellor's proposal next month.

UNITED NATIONS - Jewish groups react with rage over America's vote in the Security Council for U.N. monitoring of Israel's treatment of Palestinians, and Israel swore it will "not accommodate" the United Nations.

DALLAS - Former Vernon Savings Association owner Don R. Dixon, convicted of defrauding the thrift's customers, has money overseas and may not stay in the country for sentencing, investigators told a federal magistrate.

ST. LOUIS - McDonnell Douglas Corp. and General Dynamics Corp. are sending notices to about 8,000 workers who could lose their jobs if the Defense Department scraps the A-12 Avenger bomber program.

SPACE CENTER, Houston - Columbia's astronauts said Thursday they returned home with a "rich harvest" of scientific information gathered

"We are seriously disturbed that the most visible actors in perestroika .. under the pressure of reactionary forces, have been forced out of political activity," he said, citing former Politburo member Alexander Yakovley, Shevardnadze and former Interior Minister Vadim Bakatin.

The Inter-Regional Group believes Gorbachev should be given powers only to put into effect a specific program, and not merely to do as he pleases, Chelyshev said.

He urged delegations from the Baltic republics and Armenia that have walked out of the Congress to "return immediately and use your votes to assure the preservation of democratic processes.'

Chelyshev said the Congress should convoke the leaders of the 15 Soviet republics to propose a specific program that sets limits on the president's powers.

Sobchak, a former law professor considered one of the country's leading reformist politicians, later took the podium to say Shevardnadze's warning was "more than serious."

Congress allocated the money last month to renegotiate the terms of 88 savings and loans, the remains of which were used to create 15 new thrifts in 1988. Most of the bailouts were in Texas under the Southwest Plan, which cost the FSLIC at least \$25 billion.

Renegotiating the terms of the 15 Southwest Plan thrifts will include the disposal of assets seized from the failed institutions, regulatory officials

The 1988 transactions were criticized because they committed the government to long-term subsidies and generous tax breaks.

The FSLIC's Texas legacy is massive. The agency's Southwest Plan strategy was to combine troubled institutions into large S&Ls under new ownership and sustained by government subsidies.

The \$22 billion in new funds gives the government a strong hand to shape the Southwest Plan contracts. In the process, regulators could determine the viability of institutions now dependent on government

and generous tax breaks.





We're going to win the state championship Saturday and I will have finished what I came here to do," Parker said.

Saturday's game also will be a reunion between Parker and Rockets coach D.W. Rutledge. When the two were assistants at Judson, they lived about a mile apart near the Guadalupe River and commuted the 40-mile

Parker emphasized the title game is not between him and Rutledge, but between two determined football

## Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: I am 76 years old and had a biopsy of my prostate by ultrasound. The results showed a very small tumor, the size of a small pea. It was malignant. The doctor said it was at a very early stage. He said I wouldn't need an operation. I was X-rayed from head to toe and everything was negative and I was in perfect health.

I decided to have the prostate removed. The operation turned out fine. Four months have passed and I feel great. The doctor said I have done real well. As I no longer have my prostate, do you think I have to keep going back to be examined? If so, for how long?

DEAR READER: In recent years the wisdom of not operating on early prostate cancer in older men has been seriously questioned. One reason is that many such men live much longer than in the past and that means there is enough time to get into trouble with progression of the prostate cancer. It

sounds like you made a wise decision. If there has been no spread at all of the cancer and the operation removed all of the prostate gland, you should be cured. Such a procedure is called a radical prostatectomy. That is an

The X-rays and other studies evidently showed no evidence of cancer having spread to the bone or elsewhere. That affected what your

doctor recommended to you. But there is always that small danger that there may be some cells that could not be visualized. That is one reason why your doctor wants to continue to follow you. If that should occur he would want to institute additional early treatment. So you want to return to see him as long as he thinks it is advisable in your case.

had a heel spur. He gave me Cortisone shot. It was so painful I almost screamed. It is bothering me again and I sure don't want another

shot. Could I have a stress fracture? DEAR READER: Yes. Or you could have other causes for heel pain. A stress fracture can involve the heel bone and it may not be seen on a plain X-ray. Rather, a bone scan done after injecting radioactive substances into the circulation is much more likely to identify the fracture. Stress fractures are really a crack in the bone, and not a complete fracture as you are used to thinking about. Stress fractures can cause severe pain and will not respond to Cortisone shots. Rest and time is the best treatment.

Heel spurs are bony outgrowths where the bone has been injured. You can have heel spurs and have no pain. Or you can have heel pain without either a spur or stress fracture. Often it is from inflammation of the soft tissues and attachments to the heel bone. Repositioning the foot with pads at the inside of the foot to put more weight on the outside of the foot sometimes helps. The proper treatment depends on first making the right diagnosis.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I am a 20-year-old male with rather large nipples. They are slightly larger than a quarter and stick out about half- to a quarter-inch, making them noticeable when I wear T-shirts or other tight fitting clothes.
